## Board Votes to Discontinue Busing Within Village Limits

On a 5-2 vote, the Kewaskum School Board, Monday night,

approved the recommendation of the Finance-Transportation-Building and Grounds Committee to discontinue all busing of

students within the village limits effective with the start of the 1986-87 school year.

While the cost, \$9,752, to run one bus into the Bel-Ric subdivision was discussed, it was not the overriding issue for the recommendation said Committee Chairman Perry Ankerson. "We are discriminating against other village residents when we bus only Bel-Ric students," said Ankerson. The purpose of the recommendation was to provide a policy which is consistent throughout the village.

One Bel-Ric resident told the board she had recently moved from Hartford where she had the option to pay for busing which would not normally have been provided. The cost was \$12.00 per month per student she indicated. "I think we should have the option to pay for busing our students."

Board member Jean Goeden told the woman, "if we would give the option to you, we would have to give it to everyone in the village and that would increase costs dramatically."

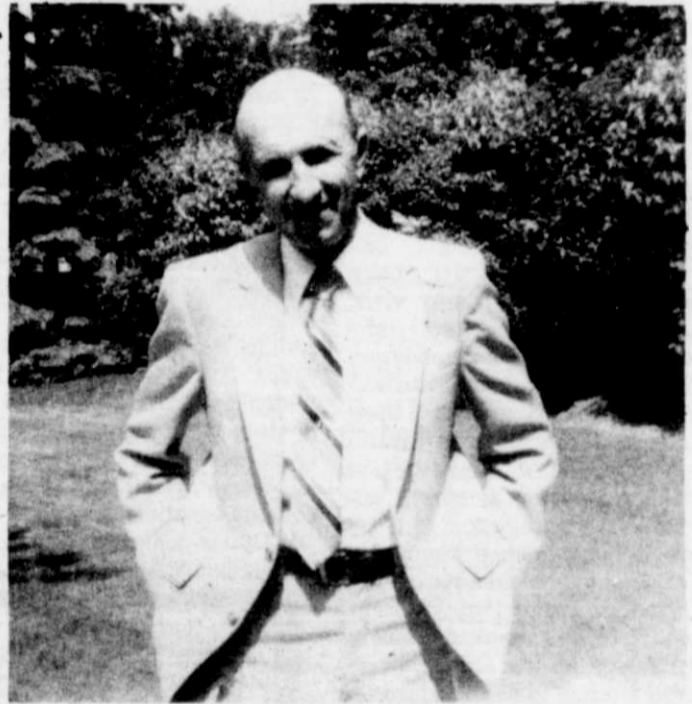
James Hosking, 706 Memorial Drive, showed the board pictures of unshoveled sidewalks along Highway H, and asked them if they expected small children to walk through snow that was up to his knees in some places. After one storm the roads weren't even plowed at 11:00, and the police office told me he was having trouble getting to calls, said Hosking. Ankerson said it was not the school district's responsibility to see that the walks were shoveled.

Janet Martinson told the board it takes her approximately 20 minutes to walk from her home in Bel-Ric to the Administration Office where she works.

Peter Deshotels, 704 Main Street, told the meeting he understood the concerns these parents have with their small children because he had the same concern for his children. "We live on the east side of town." We also have a lot of sidewalks that don't get shoveled, it also takes my kids twenty minutes to a half hour to get to school. I'm not around to take them to school and I can't get busing because I'm within the village limits. There have been some problems but my kids have managed to get to school on time, they've managed to wade through the heavy snow, and I don't think we should have the busing in Bel-Ric.

## Young Man Found Dead After Motorcycle Accident

A rural Campbellsport young man, James R. Lauters, 20, of 1266 County Trunk GGG, near New Fane, who had been missing since Monday night of last week, was found dead Thursday morning along County Trunk S in the Town of Auburn, from injuries he received in a motorcycle accident.

Lauters was found by his mother at 8 a.m. in a gully off Highway S, south of Highway GGG near St. Mathias Church.

Lauters apparently lost control of his motorcycle sometime Monday night and was thrown off the cycle, according

to a Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Department detective who investigated the accident.

Assistant Fond du Lac Coroner, Judy Mortensen was called to the scene at 8:30 a.m. Thursday, and the victim was transported to St. Agnes Hospital, Fond du Lac, by Campbellsport ambulance.

Lauter's family reported the man missing Wednesday night to the sheriff's department. Lauters had been last seen at his home on Monday.

The accident was the fourth Fond du Lac County fatality in the past month and the eighth this year.

Behnke spent the last two years serving a Hispanic mission in Miami, Fla., where he began a nucleus of a congregation. Work with Hispanic missions occupied Behnke's vicar year in Mexico City and Puerto Rico. He spent two years

as a tutor at Michigan Lutheran Seminary in Sarinaw, Mich.

The new pastor was born Sept. 20, 1955, in Kewaskum to Orval and Ruth Behnke. He graduated from Kewaskum Community High School.

Behnke attended University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh for one year and then enrolled at Northwestern College of Watertown where he graduated in 1978. He received his master of divinity degree in 1982 from Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary in Mequon.

He is residing in the parsonage at 607 Illinois Ave. with his wife, Karen Zank Behnke whom he married June 26, 1982.

# School Board Reprimands Trapp

In an unusual move during its meeting Monday night, the Kewaskum Board of Education passed a resolution which publicly censured board member Clara Trapp for her participation in an incident at the Deerfield Community School District administrative offices on May 13.

The situation involved three individuals (two women and a man), who allegedly represented themselves to the High School secretary as being from the Sheboygan School District.

In her letter to Board President Tom Brigham, Deerfield District Administrator Linda Barrows stated the secretary reported she had been told by the group that they were making inquiries about the district's former administrator, Penny Kleinhans, who was a finalist for an administrative position. According to the letter, "they further indicated they had spent the morning in the community talking to local people at the restaurant and gathering information for the selection process."

Since she had not been informed of a community visit, Barrows said in her letter, she was not aware of a Sheboygan job opening and decided to ask the individuals about their business. "I introduced myself and asked if I may be of assistance. They seemed uncomfortable and repeated they were an interviewing committee from Sheboygan and gathering information about Penny Kleinhans. I pressed them to identify themselves and a short, white haired woman identified herself as Clara Trapp, Sheboygan County. The others did not identify themselves."

Barrows' letter continued, when she again asked how she could assist, "Ms. Trapp indicated they had all the information they needed and they left hurriedly." A third woman was also reported to have been in the group but remained outside, noted Barrows.

Barrows informed Brigham that, because of the circumstances of their visit and suspicious behavior, she phoned Kleinhans to determine whether she was a candidate for the job in Sheboygan and if Kleinhans knew Trapp. She was told that Kleinhans was not seeking a position and that Trapp was a School Board member.

In the conclusion of her correspondence Barrows stated, "Mr. Brigham, please understand that the Deerfield Staff and I are open and accessible and willing to share information in a professional, ethical manner. Our Board President, the staff and I are very concerned, however, about people coming into our district and misrepresenting themselves. We resent being misled or tricked. I hope you will communicate our concern to your Board."

After reading Barrows' letter, Brigham then read a letter from Trapp to Barrows in which she admitted they had been in Deerfield, but refuted the statement that they identified themselves as being from any Sheboygan School District.

In her letter, Trapp said she gave Barrows the names of each one. "She wanted to know if she

could help us and I said no, we had all the information we wanted and politely left." Trapp denied the group's saying it was an interviewing committee.

After making the contents of the two letters public, Brigham made the following comments: "There are three reasons for including as an agenda item the public disclosure of the contents of the May 14, 1986, letter to me from Linda Barrows of the Deerfield Community School District and Clara Trapp's response of May 23, 1986. First, the Kewaskum area community should know of this highly unusual action by a Board member. Second, I, as President of the Board and as a Board member, wish to state publicly that Mrs. Trapp's visit to the Deerfield Community School District was in no way authorized, condoned, or approved by this Board, this District, or any member of the Board other than Mrs. Trapp. Lastly, I believe it important to emphasize that while every public policy issue, whether it be the Beechwood School question, curriculum concerns, or any other school related matter, has been and will in the future be open to good faith, public debate and discussion, there is no room for actions which appear designed to intimidate an Administrator because of his or her policy recommendation, including controversial issues."

"Under whatever version of the facts are accurate, whether

as stated in Ms. Barrows' letter or Mrs. Trapp's letter, the action of Mrs. Trapp was unrelated to Board policy making and is unacceptable conduct. Therefore, I move that the following resolution be adopted: Be it resolved that the Kewaskum School Board make known by this resolution that it did not authorize, approve or condone and does not now authorize, approve or condone the visit to the Deerfield Community School District by Clara Trapp or any inquiries made by Mrs. Trapp about Penny Kleinhans' credibility and whether she should have been hired by the Kewaskum School Board as District Administrator, or any other similar action by any Board member or District employee as part of any public policy dispute. Be it further resolved that Mrs. Trapp is hereby censured for her activity in this regard."

The resolution was approved on a 5-1-1 vote. Brigham, Perry Ankerson, Jean Goeden, Kim Peterson, and Ron Theusch voting yes, Ralph Horner voting no, and Trapp not voting.

In other action, the board voted to advertise for bids on student bus transportation services. The board okayed the contract which will be used to obtain bids, along with the

Finance Committee's recommendation that the contract be negotiated on a three-year basis, through 1988-89.

Goeden told the board she had already received one request from Valley Transportation to bid on the contract. The board instructed Business Manager Cherna Gorder to place ads wherever necessary. "For \$1½ million over three years, I think it's worth advertising," said Ankerson.

The board also gave Gorder permission to get bids on the purchase of a phone system for the district. Presently the district rents equipment at a cost of \$5,300 a year. Gorder felt, within four years, the purchased system could be paid for and the only cost to the district after that, would be a minimal maintenance contract.

The board also approved the request of Principal Dennis Reha to obtain materials for the construction of four wall partitions between the seventh and eighth grade classes at the Middle School at a cost of \$4,000 which would be put into next year's budget.

Reha told the board the teachers had been asking for the walls since 1974. When the Middle School was originally built, it had been planned to use the open classroom concept. The teachers, however, found noise and other distractions from one class to another caused teaching difficulties so they had set up various temporary forms of sound buffers to reduce the noise. The new partitions would solve

those problems.

Board member Ralph Horner again brought up the question of support staff layoffs by seniority. Board President Tom Brigham said there had been considerable discussion on the issue already and directed the Negotiations Committee to look into the situation and make a report to the board.

District Administrator Penny Kleinhans told the board they should be aware of the fact that the Support Staff is looking into unionizing and if that happened, the board could be assured that layoffs by seniority would be a bargaining issue.

Julie Backus, Director of Instruction, informed the board of two grants the district had received to cover stipends, travel and other expenses for teachers participating in workshops and in-service programs. She also noted she was working on a third grant of \$3,000 for a one-day staff development workshop which she felt confident the district would also receive.

The board also approved the continuation of the Farmington summer library program.

Summer special education programs for two students were approved along with the hiring of a music teacher, advisors and coaches for various Middle and High School activities. The board also approved the request of the Senior Class to plant four trees in the front of the High School as part of a landscape project.

The board then adjourned to closed session.

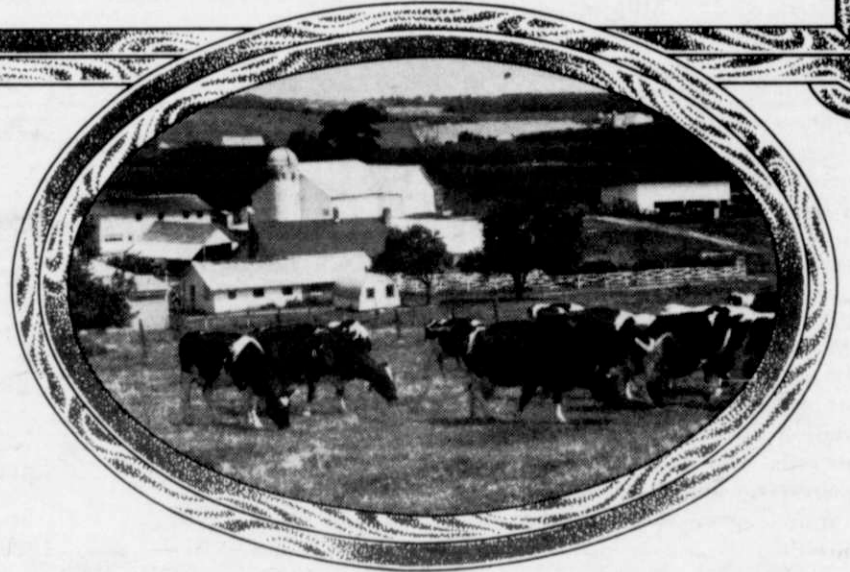


The "Park Rules and Regulations" prohibits all dogs

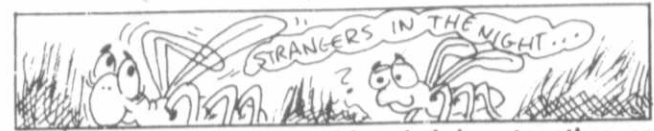

Ice cream and ice milk may be kept up to two months if stored at 0°F or below. A tightly closed carton prevents drying, shrinking and the formation of ice crystals. It may be over-wrapped with foil or plastic for storage of more than a few days. After the carton has been partially used, the surface of the ice cream should be covered with protective wrap, the kind that molds to the ice cream itself.

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# The Current 'Basics' in Wisconsin Education

As I meet with various groups of people throughout the district and attend different professional meetings the word "basics" is heard frequently. At meetings with the public it is usually in the form of a statement or question about why schools don't just "teach the basics" whereas at meetings with other professionals or legislators it is to determine what really constitutes "basics" today; how they can, and must, be implemented and what will it cost the school districts.

Some of us still equate the good old "3 R's," reading, writing and arithmetic with the basics. In reality I think most people understand that even one hundred years ago much more was being taught and required in our schools. Old report cards and records show vocational training, classical foreign languages, civics (social studies), various types of history, language arts classes as well as department (behavior) and manners.

A survey of the records show that the schools are utilized to teach whatever the nation happens to need at any given time. In many cases it is purely educational only in a coincidental or related way. Some brief examples include the great socializing function performed by the schools during the great waves of immigration to our country in the late 19th century and early 20th century. It was in our public school that English as a common language was taught, as well as what representative democracy means and participatory citizenship in such a government. In the late 1950's after the Soviet Sputnik went up the schools were called upon to teach much greater amounts of math and science to meet a demand for more scientists and the development of technology. In the 1960's and continuing today we see the schools being used to enforce the law of the land by implementing integration and bussing programs for children. In the 1970's we were called upon to document the immunization of every student and be sure they met all health standards.

Now, in the 1980's, what follows are some of the requirements for school districts in Wisconsin as they seek to educate children for today and the future. Typically they are called 'standards' and can be found in the state statutes (particularly 118 and 121). The 1985-87 biennial budget amended S. 121.02 to create 10 (ten) new standards, (in addition to 10 (ten) existing standards), and amended two of

the existing standards.

The law outlines that each school board shall:

1. Ensure that every teacher, supervisor, administrator and professional staff member holds a certificate, license or permit to teach issued by the department before entering on duties for such position.

2. Annually, establish with school board employes a professional staff development plan designed to meet the needs of individuals or curriculum areas in each school.

3. Provide remedial reading services for under-achieving students in grades kindergarten through grade 3.

4. Operate a 5-year-old kindergarten program, except in union high school districts.

5. Provide guidance and counseling services.

6. Schedule at least 180 school days annually, less any days during which the state superintendent determines that school is not held or educational standards are not maintained as the result of a strike by school district employes.

Annually schedule at least 525 hours of direct pupil instruction in kindergarten, at least 1,050 hours of direct pupil instruction in grades 1-6 and at least 1,137 hours of direct pupil instruction in grades 7-12. Scheduled hours under this subdivision include recess and time for pupils to transfer between classes but do not include the lunch period.

7. Provide for emergency nursing services.

8. Provide adequate instructional materials, texts and library services which reflect the cultural diversity and pluralistic nature of American society.

9. Provide safe and healthful facilities.

10. Ensure that instruction in elementary and high schools in health, physical education, art and music is provided by qualified teachers.

11. Develop a written, sequential curriculum plan that includes language arts, mathematics, social studies, science, health, computer literacy, environmental education, vocational education, physical education, art and music. The plan shall specify objectives, course content and resources and shall include a program evaluation method.

12. In the elementary grades, provide regular instruction in reading, language arts, social

studies, mathematics, science, health, physical education, art and music.

In grades 5-8 provide regular instruction in language arts, social studies, mathematics, science, health, physical education, art and music. The school board shall also provide pupils with an introduction to career exploration and planning.

The state has minimum allocated instructional time recommendations for all of these areas of study.

In grades 9-12, provide access to an educational program that enables pupils each year to study English, social studies, mathematics, science, vocational education, foreign language, physical education, art and music.

13. Provide access to an education for employment program that has been approved by the state superintendent. This includes formation of a council involving community and business members. We must also establish partnerships with local business and industry.

14. Develop a plan for children at risk under s. 118.153. (This refers to students who are potential dropouts, etc.)

15. Annually, adopt and publish a performance disclosure report. The report shall describe the school board's and each school's educational goals and objectives, including learning-related performance objectives, and the results of the tests administered under Standard 19 during the previous school year.

16. Comply with high school graduation standards under s. 118.33(1) i.e. meet the required number of credits in academic areas.

17. Evaluate, in writing, the performance of all certified school personnel at the end of their first year and at least every 3rd year thereafter.

18. Annually administer a standardized reading test developed by the department to all pupils enrolled in the school district in grade 3.

19. Using achievement tests that are aligned with the school district's curriculum, test all of the pupils enrolled in the school district in reading, language arts and mathematics at least twice in grades kindergarten to 6, at least once in grades 7-9 and at least once in grades 10-12.

20. Provide access to an appropriate program for pupils identified as gifted or talented.

21. Develop and have in place

a curriculum for protective behaviors by 1988 i.e. physical and sexual abuse.

These standards are expanded on with greater detail in either the Administrative Code or Department of Public Instruction (D.P.I.) rules.

A further review of the state statutes will show numerous other areas mentioned as being the responsibility of schools. They include but are not limited to such items as moral behavior, values education, knowledge of dairy products and their value and state history.

The law, (specifically sections 121.03(2) and (3), requires the Department of Public Instruction to audit each school district for compliance at least once every five (5) years on a random sample basis, and withhold up to 25% of a district's equalization aids if the district is not in compliance with the standards. In Kewaskum for example that could mean up to \$600,000.00 approximately for 1986-87.

This review of current state requirements doesn't include the many programs that have been added in the past ten (10) years for Special Education or exceptional educational needs (EEN) students. That includes programs for learning disabled, emotionally disturbed, speech, sight and hearing disorders, mentally and physically handicapped and retardation.

It can easily be seen that the "basics" for 1986 and the 21st

century cannot be regarded as the "3R's" any longer. The scope of education and the job of your school district has been greatly expanded in the past few years. The numbers of tasks now being asked and mandated of schools can only be accomplished with the understanding and support of you, the public. We always welcome your assistance and input.

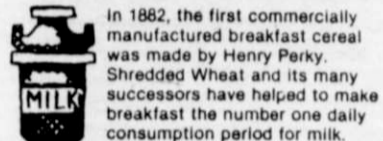

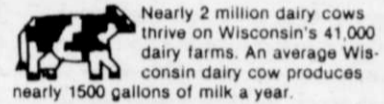

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## 25 Years Ago

June 9, 1961

Information was released this week by the Godfrey Company of Milwaukee that a modern, new Foodliner supermarket will be built in Kewaskum by Marx IGA. The Foodliner will be located across the street from the present store at 140 Main St. on property acquired by the owners, Mr. and Mrs. Harold Marx, from the H.J. Lay Lumber Co. and Chicago and North Western Railway. The site purchased by the Marxes for the store includes the present municipal parking lot adjoining the railroad tracks and owned by the railway and a large part of the Lay Lumber Co. property west of it. The new Foodliner will be 6,000 square feet, which is a very large store for a village the size of Kewaskum. Surrounding it will be a large paved parking lot with spacious room for 65 cars. It is expected to have construction completed in fall and the store will be opening around the end of October or the first of November.

In conjunction with the major building project which will find Marx IGA constructing a Foodliner and parking lot on a large portion of their present lumber yard site, the H.J. Lay Lumber Co. will also build a new store, office and lumber yard on the west end of their present business location. The owner of the company is Henry J. Lay of West Bend. All but one of the seven buildings now housing the lumber company will be torn down to make room for the Foodliner and new Lay buildings. Buildings to be razed include the present brick store and office, the mill work storage shed adjoining it on the east side, the cement storage shed along the railroad tracks on the east end and four lumber storage sheds. The new lumber company store and office, which will face east, will run north and south almost directly in line with the rear of the Bank of Kewaskum building. The store will be 76 feet long and 58 feet wide. The lumber yard will be U-shaped and will be situated in the rear of the store. The lumber company has been in business and conducted by the Lay family at the same location for the past 88 years. It was taken over in 1873 by H.J. Lay and has been in the family since.

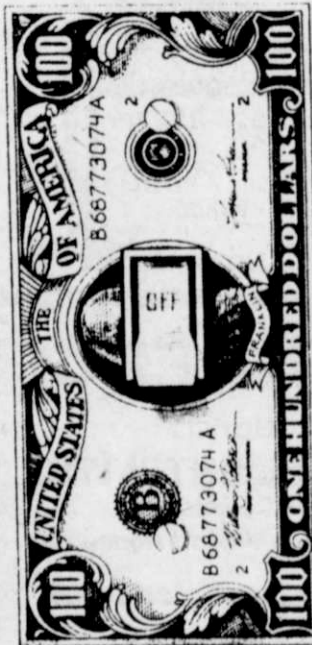

The most recent example of this is a decision by the Kewaskum village board to take away the safety island on Main Street at its intersection with Fond du Lac Avenue. The reason given was that the truckers did not like it, nor did the snow plowers.

Well, what about pedestrians? Main Street at this intersection must be at least 40 feet wide, and getting across it safely is not always easy for everyone. I am thinking especially of the many school children in the area, the elderly, and the handicapped. And, of course, dogs being walked on a leash do not always cooperate, as we all know.

This is an area of many small businesses, where people may need to park on one side of the street and cross over to the other. It is an area close, furthermore, to churches, schools, and the municipal building and library. There probably is more pedestrian traffic here than anywhere else in the village.

Wisely, then, an earlier village board had a safety island installed there. It is particularly ironic that this village board wants to remove the safety island at the same time millions of dollars are being spent for sidewalks in the village, for more pedestrian traffic.

It is ironic, too, since many communities - West Bend, Waukesha, and Madison come to mind here - have remodeled their "Main Street" to discourage truck and other through traffic, and to encourage people to park a while, and do business there, on foot. They even erect fancy barriers in the street to do this. This is a new trend.

The least Kewaskum should do is repair or replace its one safety island. If you agree, let the village board know, and also, Lowell Jackson, secretary of the state Department of Transportation, in Madison.

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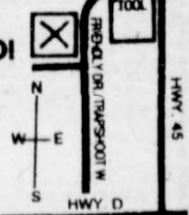
