School Bussing Bid Rejected

Preliminary Indications Hint a Brighter School Budget Picture

If the administration can maintain its efforts to hold down 1986-87 budget expenditures, Kewaskum School District taxpayers may see some improvement on their tax bills in the form of lower school tax levy increases this year.

In presenting the preliminary budget Monday night, Business Manager Cherna Gordor indicated the district, at the close of the 1985-86 school year, was standing on a little firmer ground than had been originally anticipated. That, coupled with the administration's efforts to stay within the board's recommended 3.5% gross levy increase limit for the coming

year could provide some much needed relief to the taxpayers who have been facing double-digit tax hikes.

Preliminary figures presented by Gordor show a proposed \$6,764,779 General Fund budget for 1986-87, up 6.44% over 1985-86's budget of \$6,355,336. Gordor noted, however, that these figures stayed within the 3.5% levy limit and, state tax credits were applied, this could equal a 0% increase for the average taxpayer.

Depending upon equalization values, if the district's values drop lower than the state average, there is a possibility Kewaskum could get additional school equalization aids which

would improve these figures even more.

The board scheduled a special meeting for 7:00 p.m., Monday July 28th, to review the budget.

In other business, the board heard Chuck Johnson of Johnson Bus Service present his transportation bid for student bussing. After considerable discussion, the board voted to reject the bid and go back to negotiations. Johnson's company was the only firm to submit a bid.

Neither the board members or administration felt it could accept Johnson's explanation or justification for an approximately 12% increase in his bid to

Tornado Spawning Storms Go Through Area

A severe line of thunderstorms passed through the Kewaskum area Saturday resulting in the village's tornado alert siren being activated.

The first alert was sounded at approximately 3:40 p.m., with a second alert given at 7:00 p.m., as a line of storms moving northeast from the Madison area produced tornadoes in the Neosho and Slinger areas in a line with Kewaskum. No damage was reported.

Tuesday afternoon another line of severe storms, this time coming down from the north traveling southeast, passed through Kewaskum and the southeastern part of the state. Police reported a confirmed tornado sighting in the Rosendale area and an unconfirmed tornado in the Oakfield area. Neither tornado touched the ground.

Rainfall totals from the two storms was almost two inches.

Forecasts for the balance of the week predicted high humidity and temperatures in the 90's.

Second Meeting of School Steering Committee Tuesday

The second meeting of the Kewaskum School's Steering Committee will be on Tuesday, July 22, from 9:00 a.m. to 4 p.m. in the Community Room of the Kewaskum Municipal Building. The committee of community members, board member, administrators, and teachers will continue to review long-range plans for curriculum and program evaluation and development as part of the district's work in the School Evaluation Consortium. The committee will finalize plans to be presented to the Kewaskum Board of Education at their August meeting. They will also discuss educational philosophy and goals that will guide the future work of the committee.

Julie Backus, Director of Education and chair for the group, indicated that the following teachers will be on the committee for a two or three year term: George Allmann, Rob Charlier-Anglim, Dave Drexler, Mary Ann Koss,

Denise Leong, Ray Martens, Clark Pearson, Dale Squier, Dave Wietor, and Connie Zemlicka. The administration members are Penelope Kleinhans, LeRoy Kopecky, Tom Larsen, Dennis Reha, and Richard Zarling. The Board is represented by Jeanne Goeden. Community representatives are Mary Ann Peterson and Penny Schurrer. A student representative will be appointed in the fall.

Countywide Library Okayed

The Washington County Board last Tuesday voted 26-4 to start a countywide library system to end a battle that began back in 1959. The library issue was favored in a recent referendum and the campaign was spearheaded by the Washington County League of Women Voters.

Included in the library resolution was a recommendation that \$180,000 be appropriated by the county for use with the new library system in 1987. Funding for the library system will be voted on again this fall during the annual budget session of the county board.

Tuesday's action leaves only two Wisconsin counties in the state without countywide library service. The 26-4 vote added 46,000 county people to the lists of those who have the right to borrow library books free of charge.

Fire Destroys Barn

A barn on the Wilmer (Bill) and Mae Emmer farm, 434 Highway BB, Campbellsport, was destroyed during a fire early Saturday afternoon.

The Campbellsport Fire Department received the call at approximately 12:30 p.m. As the fire intensified, a call for

assistance went out to neighboring departments. The Eden, Kewaskum, and Kohlsville Fire Departments responded with men and equipment.

The fire reportedly started in the oat storage area. Firefighters had their work cut out for them as steel siding on the structure made it difficult to get at the burning hay and straw on the west side of the barn. After

dislodging a section of the siding, firemen, with the aid of backhoe, were able to extinguish the fire.

Firemen had to hose down the Emmer home to protect it from sparks blown on it due to winds preceding Saturday's storms.

There were no injuries and no animals lost. No dollar loss or cause of the fire has been given.

provide bussing. The three-year proposal also included another 5% increase for 1987-88.

Board member Kim Peterson noted increases of the past few years had ranged between 4 1/2% and 5%. Peterson acknowledged that one of the new contract changes required the bidder to purchase the gas rather than the district but, even removing that cost, the contract increase was well above 5%.

Johnson told the board the revisions in the routes would cause a reduction from 103 trips to 87 routes, from 20 busses to 17 busses. That's a loss of 12% of my income, noted Johnson. To make up for that loss he indicated he would have to increase the value of the remaining busses. District Administrator Penny Kleinhans asked Johnson, "and where does that leave us (the district), we're trying to reduce our costs by reducing routes and you want to charge us more for less."

Most of the board members felt they did not understand the reasoning that using less (17) busses for basically the same amount of miles should cost the district more than receiving service with more (20) busses.

Peterson noted the district would be better off to renegotiate a contract where the district paid for the gas because it would end up paying less than what Johnson was charging in his bid.

On a 6-0, one absent, vote the board sent the contract back to the Finance Committee for further negotiations.

In other action the board approved the installation of moveable walls at the Farmington School at a cost of \$3,830. The cost of the walls will be 100% funded with state special education aids.

The installation of a wheel chair lift at Kewaskum Elementary School at a cost of \$6,500 was also approved. The lift will comply with federal and state laws concerning accessibility of buildings to all individuals.

The board approved the request of Middle School Principal Dennis Reha to hire either two part-time, or one full-time aide to assist with various duties throughout the building.

The board also approved the administration's recommenda-

tion for the Trainable Mentally Retarded students program. The program will include a Designated Vocational Instructor to work with the older students.

Parents of the students in the class had asked that the board consider dividing the group into two classes for at least part of the school day since the ten youngsters range in age from six years to nineteen years old. The board felt it could not justify hiring a second, or part-time teacher and that the needs of the children would be met by the new program. Kathy Charland, TMR teacher, had some reservations about the plan and asked if she could come back to the board if she felt things were not working satisfactorily. President Perry Ankerson told her she was welcome to do so and asked also, that if the program was successful she advise the board in that respect. She agreed.

The board approved the purchase, through CESA, of 19 computers and 10 printers. Part of the \$23,280 cost will be funded with grants and one computer will be paid for with special education funding aids.

The purchase of two coolers at a cost of \$2,158, and a proofing oven for \$1,069 were also approved.

The board approved the request of Football Coach Fran Charland that \$1,000 be released from the athletic budget for the purchase of a new blocking sled. The remaining cost of the \$1,980 sled has been secured through fund-raising activities.

Director of Instruction Julie Backus informed the board that the district has received vocational and in-service grants totally over \$26,000 for use during the 1986-87 school year.

The board accepted the offer of the Kewaskum Lions Club to provide a program entitled "Quest" for Middle School students. The program covers various subjects including developing decision making

skills, self-understanding, and prevention of drug abuse.

Lions Club President Dale Squier told the board his organization would provide \$1,300 to send people to future workshops.

The board approved the appointment of Gerald Couch to serve on the Finance-Transportation-Buildings and Grounds Committee. Appointments were also made to the Beechwood Elementary School Disposition Committee. Ankerson will chair the group which will consist of community representatives Mary Feind, Chuck Voge, Jack Theusch, Joan Rosenberger, Ken Weddig and teacher representative Daniel Beske.

Board member Clara Trapp

asked why a Beechwood resident had not been appointed to the committee. Ankerson, Kleinhans and Board President Tom Brigham said they had not received any Beechwood area names. Trapp told the board she had sent a letter to Gorder submitting Ralph Buchel, Ron Beimborn and her own name. The three said they had never received the list. Brigham said it had not been intentional to leave out a Beechwood resident and directed Kleinhans to add Beimborn as a sixth citizen representative.

The board accepted the resignation of three teachers and one recall to fill an opening created by a resignation.

The board then adjourned to closed session.

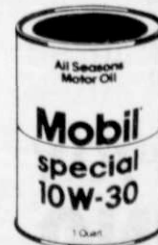

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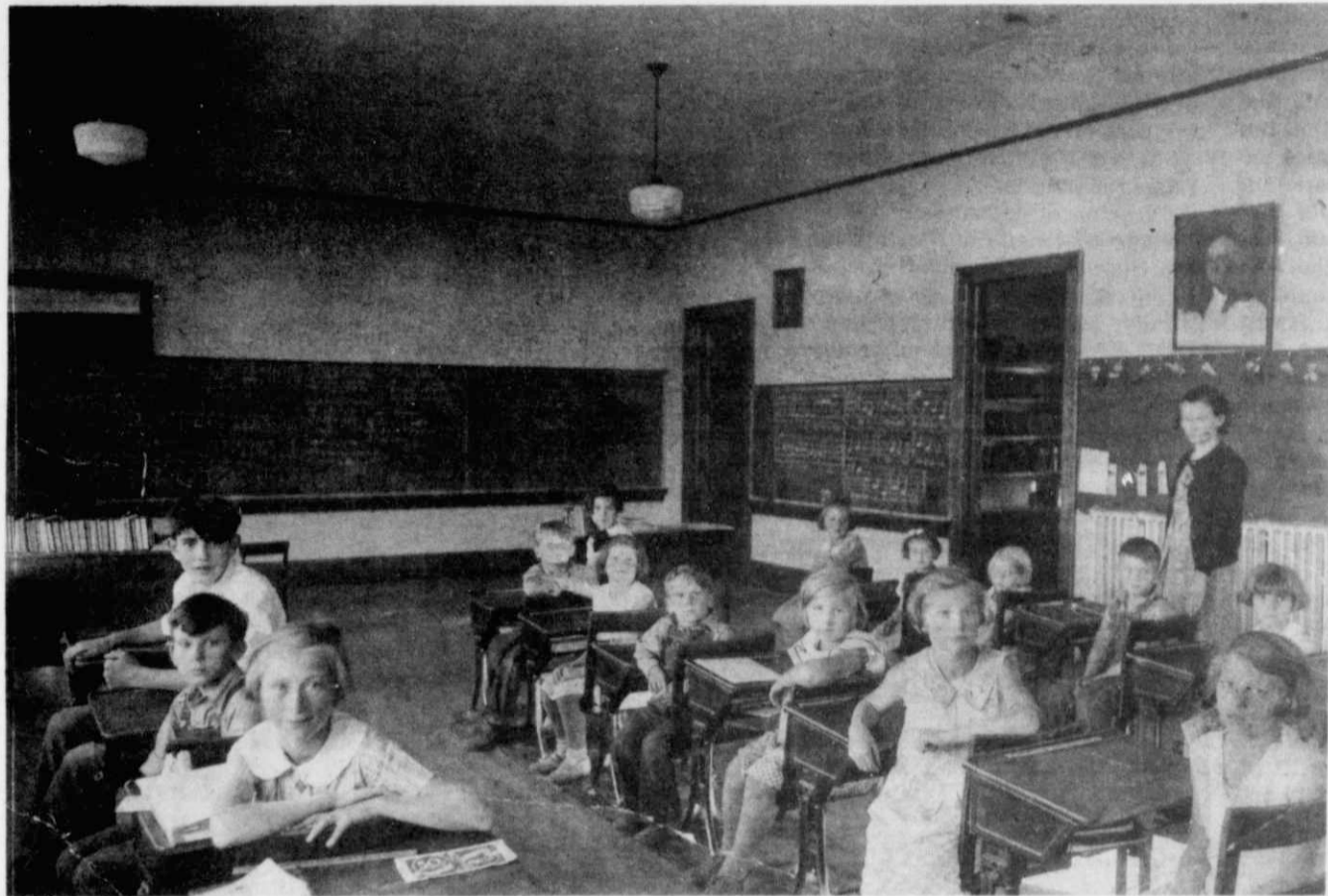

Sensenbrenner Rated Lowest Spender by Taxpayers Union

(Washington, D.C.) — The National Taxpayers Union said in its 13th annual rating that REP. F. JAMES SENSENBRENNER, JR. (R-WI) voted more often than other members of the House of Representatives or the Senate in 1985 to reduce federal spending.

In its annual rating, the non-profit organization ranked Sensenbrenner the number one "friend of the taxpayers" with an 80 percent rating. On the other end of the spectrum, Sen. Daniel Inouye (D-Hawaii) and Rep. Dan Murtha (D-PA) were ranked as Congress' biggest spendings. They narrowly edged out Sen. Gary Hart (D-CO) and Reps. Claude Pepper (D-FL) and Charles Wilson (D-TX).

Overall the National Taxpayers Union named only 88 lawmakers as "taxpayers' friends." The Senate's average score for reducing spending dropped 3 points to 45% from last year, while the average House score rose by 7 points to 43%.

"These are shockingly low scores," said Sensenbrenner. He added, "the scores explain why federal deficits have reached new highs."

Vi Gerhardt to Lead County Kasten Effort

Vi Gerhardt of West Bend has been named by U.S. Senator Bob Kasten to be the Washington County coordinator of Kasten's reelection campaign.

"I am delighted that Vi has joined my campaign team," Kasten said. "Her enthusiasm and dedication will be an important factor in our campaign and in our victory this

November."

Kasten is seeking reelection to the Senate seat he has held since his election in 1980. The senator is a member of the Senate Budget, Commerce, Small Business, and Appropriations committees. John Gildersleeve Wins Silver Medal At Badger State Games

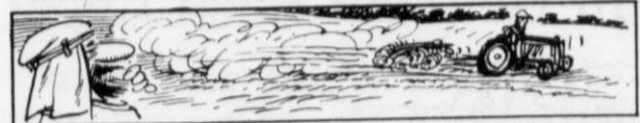

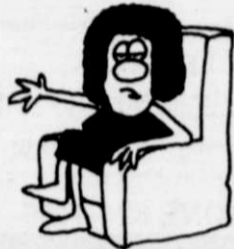

50 Years Ago

July 17, 1936

Approximately 80 acres of grain, pasture and small timber were destroyed and thousands of dollars worth of farm buildings were threatened at noon last Friday when fire swept fields located near the junction of Highways 55 and 67 at the site of the Dutch Mill filling station near Campbellsport, about eight miles north of Kewaskum. The Campbellsport fire department, aided by more than 100 volunteer fire fighters with brooms, brought the flames in the grain fields under control as they threatened farm buildings. The fire, which started at the side of the road, was believed to have been caused by a cigaret tossed from a passing car.

According to a report made by the Fond du Lac County highway commission, the terrific heat of the past week damaged the pavement in several places between this village and Fond du Lac on Highway 55 when the pavement slabs buckled under the heat. Workmen have been busy repairing these sections. The heat has also destroyed much of the grain in this vicinity and unless rain falls very soon the corn crop will also be destroyed. Pastures are drying up; berries, potatoes and most other garden crops have already been destroyed.

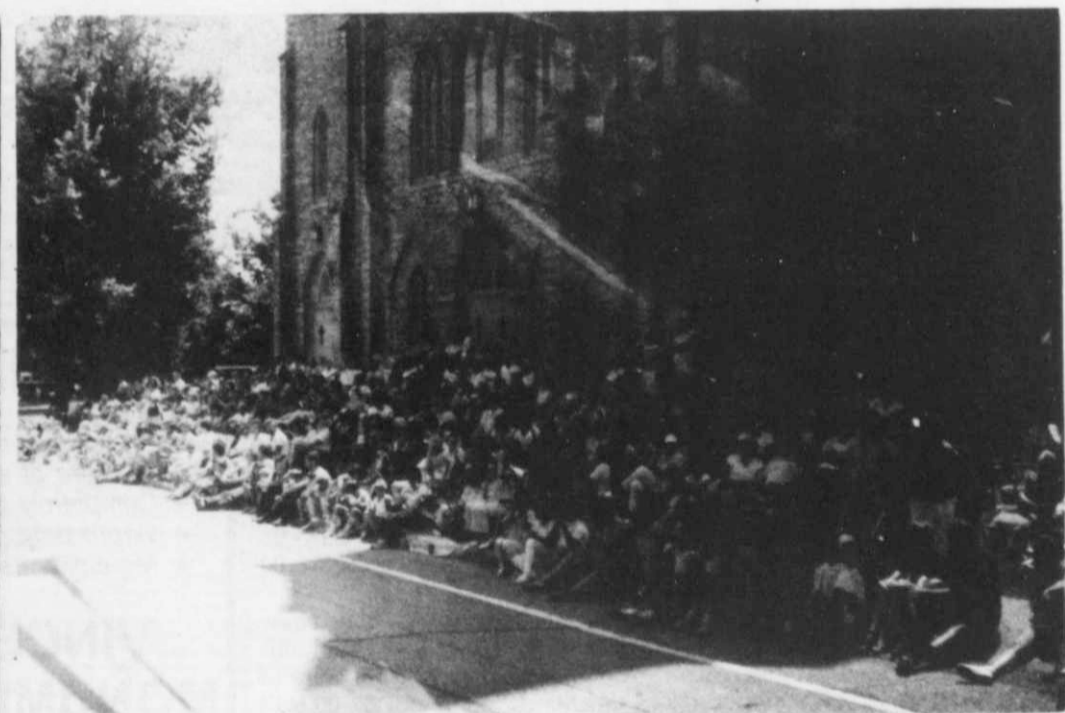
