## Committee's Proposals Could Mean An 8-Period Day for High School

A Schedule Committee, consisting of approximately 15 high school teachers and administrators, met with the Kewaskum School Board during a special meeting Monday night to discuss their concerns and proposals on curriculum and scheduling for the 1987-88 school year.

In a unified front, armed with a three-page report, the committee addressed the board on issues ranging from courses to the number of class periods.

District Administrator Penny Kleinhans opened the discussion on behalf of the committee saying the purpose of the meeting was to discuss the committee's concerns on options for the present

schedule. "We are looking for ways to improve our schedule and improve education for our children," she said. Kleinhans noted the committee had been a very open and honest group in addressing the issues during its meetings.

The three-page "Working Papers" listed 24 concerns including both current programs and courses and proposed courses, activities and related issues. Items such as the current Math Lab, which is designed to provide additional assistance to students, does not have enough time or teachers available the committee felt. Similar labs for other subjects such as writing were recommended as well as a tutorial program to help "At-Risk" students who are not meeting

graduation requirements.

The report and teachers also expressed concern for a student decline in elective courses, especially in Fine Arts and Vocational Education due, it was noted to the increased graduation requirements.

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Teachers noted that serving on various committees also took them out of class resulting in the need for substitute teachers to cover for them.

The report also touched on expansion of the high school's curriculum. It stated, "there

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## Special Electors Meeting Held Off

District Administrator Penny Kleinhans sought the Kewaskum School Board's approval to set December 23rd as the date for a special Electors Meeting to vote on the Beechwood Elementary School's disposition. Instead, the board delayed action on setting a date until its December 8th meeting.

The action came at Monday night's special school board meeting when members Clara Trapp and Ralph Horner voted against the approval.

When Board President Tom Brigham asked Trapp her reason for voting against the date she said it was too close to Christmas and people would

have conflicts as they prepared for the holiday. Trapp indicated she also would not be able to attend a meeting on that date. Board member Perry Ankerson and Brigham had to agree with Trapp's comments.

Kleinhans said she had looked for a time that would not interfere with a lot of activities and we wouldn't have a chance of bad weather.

Brigham asked that the item be placed on the board's next agenda with the idea of finding a more suitable date, possibly in mid-January. Kleinhans told the board, in selecting a date it must keep in mind the fact that two public notices must be published prior to the meeting date.

## Wayne Well Water Okay

Buildings & Grounds Superintendent Fred Boehlke advised the Finance-Transportation-Buildings and Grounds Committee, Monday night, that the last of three Department of Natural Resources test reports on the Wayne Elementary School well had been received indicating the water is again safe to use for drinking and cooking purposes.

We did chlorinating of the well ourselves, said Boehlke, so the only cost to the district should be for the cleansing materials and one test costing \$15. Boehlke said the bacteria was apparently entering the well in subterranean water below the 50-foot level of the well's casing. The DNR feels if the casing had been extended lower than 50 feet, the contamination problem would have been avoided.

The school had a similar problem a few years ago. During both instances bottled water was brought in for all drinking and cooking needs until the problem was eliminated.

Boehlke also updated the committee on the waterpipe situation at the Middle and High Schools. The district's new consultants have advised him that the pipe problems at the two schools are due to a form of electrolysis which is causing the galvanized pipes to flake and, in time, wear through. "We've been told there is no way to stop the

electrolysis other than to replace all the galvanized pipe with copper," said Boehlke.

Committee member Kim

Peterson asked Boehlke to look into the pipe system layout and determine just where and how

## Town of Kewaskum Approves 1987 Budget

The Town of Kewaskum recently approved a 1987 budget of \$192,445. The budget carries a 23% increase which will result in a 43c per \$1,000 increase in its tax rate.

The townships rate will go up from \$1.86 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation to \$2.29. As

with other municipalities, part of the large increase was due to the continually escalating cost of insurance and the loss of federal revenue sharing funds. The town will lose approximately \$7,000 in revenue funds, which neces-

sitated the substantial hike in its tax levy for 1986.

## Commission Reviews Timblin Survey Map

The Kewaskum Plan Commission reviewed a new certified survey map for the Tom Timblin property just west of the Kewaskum Shopping Mall during its regular meeting Tuesday evening.

Zoning Administrator Richard Zarlring informed the commission that "unknown" to the village at the time the original map was approved, an island "isolated portion of land" was being formed. Under the law this is prohibited. Zarlring said the new map simply extends the east-west boundary of the Timblin property approximately 50 feet further north encompassing that small strip of land.

Since the original approval of this project earlier this year, Timblin has revised his building plans. In place of the original two 16-unit apartment building, he has decided to construct one 36-unit structure.

Commission member Don Mlodzik asked Zarlring how the

new larger unit will fit on the property. Zarlring said there was enough land there and adequate per unit footage so it was just a matter of the mechanics of fitting the building on the land. He noted that because there was no major change in the plan other than putting up one large unit, basically the same size as the two combined units, Timblin was not required to come back to the village for any further approval of the project.

The commission voted to pass on its recommendation to the Village Board that it approve the new certified survey map under the same conditions which applied to the original map. Those conditions included a provision for a developer's agreement for completion of roadwork for a portion of Timblin Drive.

Due to the wet fall, Timblin has postponed the start of construction until next spring.

In other action the commission continued its review and discussion of the proposed new zoning ordinances book for the village.

## Winter Parking in Effect

On Monday, December 1, 1986, the Village of Kewaskum Night Parking Restrictions will go in effect.

All vehicles are prohibited from parking, stopping or standing on any street within the corporate limits of the Village of Kewaskum between the hours of 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. These are the same restrictions as in the past and

will be in effect until April 1, 1987, or until rescinded by the Village of Kewaskum Board.

Violators will be fined \$5.00 if paid within 3 days of the violation, \$10.00 if paid within 10 days and \$20.00 after the 28th day of the violation. After 28 days the registrations for any vehicles you own will be suspended for failure to pay fines. 11-28-2t

are concerns that we do not have an extensive enough curriculum to meet the new credit requirements, we need to develop some new courses, particularly in the area of higher level courses, such as the Advanced Placement courses."

The paper also addressed subjects that had been previously brought to the board, Gifted and Talented, Cooperative Class-Work Experience programs, Career Education, and Competency Based Testing.

In listening to the teachers, board member Kim Peterson said, "What I'm hearing is more periods per day." Student Government representative Jill Rimmel told the board, "students I've talked to feel they would benefit by an eight-period day." Student Government rep Craig Hubbell told the board that a survey he ran last December showed that of 225 students, 55% of those polled were in favor of an eight-period day.

A proposed alternative for the present schedule as stated in the "Working Papers," was the creation of an eight-period day. Questions to be resolved with that proposal included student scheduling such as how many classes, etc. The proposed teacher schedule would include five regular credited classes, one preparation period, one or two supervisory periods and one professional period which would be used for committee meetings, curriculum writing and other items which might otherwise take a teacher out of their normal teaching schedule.

Peterson told the group, "What I've been hearing this evening is concerns for your scheduling. On the periphery, I've been hearing about students who are a little below average and a little above average. So far I haven't gotten much for the individual in the middle." Director of Instruction Julie Backus replied, "That's why we're saying we need these electives, especially in the vocation area."

"What I'm hearing is, do we want an eight-period day, if it is, please state it," said board member Perry Ankerson. "What is the consensus and what are your proposals," Ankerson asked the committee. Teacher Denise Leong told the

board, "It is a majority of the faculty that favors the professional period, not the eight-period day. If future boards take it out of context and say the faculty favors an eight-period day, they could then say the professional period doesn't count and eliminate it."

Leong thought the schedule should be included in bargaining. Ankerson noted his concern was that if it were negotiated it could become a free period for an individual. Peterson said he was opposed to the idea because in future negotiations it could become another political pawn to be pushed back and forth during bargaining sessions. Kleinhans also indicated she was opposed to the suggestion, "I'm afraid of bargaining a schedule into a contract, to me it doesn't make much sense."

Board member Clara Trapp asked what the financial impact would be for these recommendations. Backus noted that while she wouldn't bet on it, the indications were there would be little if any additional cost. For these changes we would need 475 slots and I estimate 500 openings so we shouldn't need additional staffing. The only cost she discussed was approximately \$18,000 to cover curriculum writing during the summer if this could not be done by teachers during the regular school year.

Several of the board members seemed to have reservations on at least portions of the submitted paper.

The committee's recommendations and eight-period day will be placed on the December 8th School Board agenda.

much piping would really have to be replaced. "It would seem foolish to start knocking out walls when maybe replacing the readily accessible sections might take care of the problem."

The Middle School kitchen area seems to have the most serious problem with a sprayer screen on a faucet/continually plugging because of the flaking in the line.

The committee then made an inspection tour of the Home Economics classroom. At an earlier meeting the committee

heard a request from teacher Mrs. Martin, to make modifications and repairs to correct acoustical, flooring and electrical problems in the room.

Boehlke indicated the cost to do all the repairs would run \$6,000 to \$7,000, with approximately \$2,000 for ceiling work, \$4,100 to \$4,400 for flooring and \$660 for electrical work. Peterson said he thought the work should be done one step at a time. "It's hard for me to say go out and spend \$6,000, when \$2,000 would do it."

Committee member Bob Schulte asked Boehlke to look into the cost of using an acoustical spray on the ceiling. Peterson also asked Boehlke to check with some acoustical engineers to see if installing carpeting would eliminate some of the sound problem. That step would, if plausible, take care of two problems, noise and floor repairs. Peterson told the committee, "I think we should recommend that the electrical work be updated without any further delay. There are problems and they should be fixed now and not have to wait until we make a decision on the other modifications."

The committee also inspected the hall lighting system in the 1955 portion of the high school. Boehlke recommended switching from incandescent to fluorescent lighting which would almost double the amount of light given off with 1/2 less wattage use. He had one quote of \$4,068 from Steiner Electric. Peterson asked Boehlke to get more quotes and bring them to the next committee meeting.

District Administrator Penny Kleinhans advised the committee that the district is reviewing bus routes in relation to transporting parochial students. She indicated that preliminary

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reviews suggest the district may be busing students that it is not legally obligated to transport. "We had a cooperative meeting between ourselves and the schools involved," said Kleinhans, "and one concern is their getting back to us with their attendance boundaries." A lot of the schools don't even know what theirs are, she noted.

In reference to transporting students to Kettle Moraine Lutheran High School, Kleinhans said the district has no legal obligation since it is out of the district's busing limits. She suggested parents of KML contact the bus company directly and arrange their own transportation as recommended in a letter from Mr. Erv Gorecki of Johnson Bus Company.

Kleinhans also informed the committee that Mr. Donald Schneider, consultant for pupil transportation, with the Department of Public Instruction, had attended the meeting. He was also given a tour of the Bel-Ric subdivision with regard to busing from that area. In a letter to Kleinhans, Schneider stated, "Upon reviewing your Bel-Ric area, in my opinion, I feel you have eliminated whatever unusual hazards may have existed for children walking to school in that area. The sidewalk and crossing guard eliminate unusual traffic hazards."

In other business, Business Manager Cherna Gorder updated the committee on the proposed in-house phone system purchase. She told the group the administration had met with four vendors and all quotes were under \$20,000.

Peterson asked Gorder to bring some payback figures and a vendor recommendation to the

next committee meeting

scheduled for December 22nd. The committee then adjourned for the start of a special school board meeting.



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### Hubbell Speaks at Regents Meeting

Janet Hubbell, 1010 Hillside Drive, Kewaskum, member of the University of Wisconsin Centers Board of Visitors, spoke on behalf of that group in a public hearing in Madison on Nov. 5. Hubbell represents the UWC-Washington County campus on the Board of Visitors.

The hearing was conducted by the UW System Board of Regents Study Group on the Future of the University of Wisconsin System, and addressed Study Group recommendations for UW System future directions.

Hubbell's presentation focused on recommendations affecting the 13 UW Centers campuses, and she praised the value and contributions of the Centers.

Hubbell voiced support for the recommendation which would make the Centers' associate degree transferable to all other institutions in the UW System as fulfillment of general education requirements. Six institutions currently accept the Centers' associate degree as meeting those requirements.

"I believe that the adoption of this recommendation would

be an encouragement to incoming Centers students and would be a major factor in their remaining at the Centers campuses throughout their sophomore year," said Hubbell.

She also commented on the recommendation for tuition differential, which could lead to substantially lower tuition for the UW Centers as an enrollment management incentive.

"We believe that in addition to encouraging students to remain at the Centers through the sophomore year, tuition differential would maintain the basic Wisconsin Idea and the original mission of our UW Centers," said Hubbell.

"Educational access to all citizens is a concept of which the UW System should rightly be proud," Hubbell said. "The application of this proposed tuition policy will help ensure that the Wisconsin Idea remains alive in our local communities."

Hubbell also reaffirmed the Board of Visitors strong commitment to high quality, affordable education and cultural enrichment which the Centers offer to local communities.

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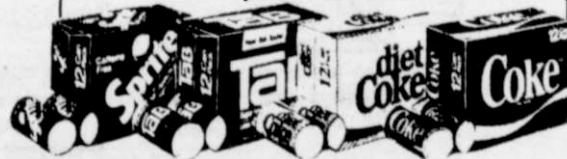

## Reestablishment of Competency Based Testing in Kewaskum Schools Announced

Julie Backus, Program Manager for the Competency Based-Testing in Kewaskum Schools, has announced the reestablishment of an advisory committee to continue the program begun three years ago. Mary Ann Koss, a teacher at Farmington Elementary School, will serve as the chair of the Advisory Committee. Other members are Ron Theusch, School Board Representative; Sue Flynn, Jackie Branchford, and Rae Schmidt, Parent Representatives; Penelope Kleinhans, District Administrator; Richard Zarling, Principal; and Jim Westphal, Clark Pearson, George Allmann, Erv Uhlmann, and Diana Glick, teaching staff.

The purposes of competency testing are to promote improved instruction in the areas of reading, language arts, and mathematics by encouraging the reexamination and prioritization of the learning outcomes. It is also to focus on specific needs for remedial instruction based on pupil competency test results. Another key purpose is to promote increased home-school communication regarding student learning in these basic areas by providing test results and conferences to parents regarding needed remediation. The third key purpose is to verify to the community, higher education, and to the work world that student have attained the established proficiency levels in the basic skills.

The purpose of the committee will be to act in an advisory capacity to the Board of Education on the development of plans and timelines for program development and to recommend policies related to competency based testing. Members of the advisory committee have been attending workshops in the past two months related to recent revisions in state developed competency tests and to changes in scoring and reporting procedures. Under the program, students are tested in reading, mathematics, and language arts once between kindergarten and grade five, once between grades six and eight, and once more between grades nine and eleven. Currently, over 150 districts are participating in the program state-wide.

The first meeting of the advisory committee will be at 6:30 p.m. on Thursday, December 4, in the Kewaskum Middle School library. Tom Stefonek, Director of the Bureau for Achievement Testing from the Department of Public Instruc-

tion, will provide an orientation to CBT. The past committee's work will be reviewed and general guidelines for the operation of the committee will be established. This meeting is open to any interested citizens.

**Farm Income Tax Seminar Scheduled In County Dec. 4**

A Farm Income Tax seminar has been scheduled for Thursday, December 4, at the Washington County Courthouse in West Bend from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.

The Tax Reform Legislation recently passed by Congress and signed into law means changes in tax laws that will affect everyone.

The seminar will be helpful to individuals that either prepare their own tax returns or work with a tax professional. A better understanding of the tax laws will help you with adequate records and needed information to prepare your tax return. The following subjects will be discussed by a taxpayer service specialist from the Internal Revenue Service.

1986 tax law and pending changes  
Schedule F (Form 1040) - line

by line

Form 4797 - line by line for sales of cattle and farm machinery

Schedule E - for rental income of farmers and farm owners

Schedule D - for reporting capitol gains and losses

Farm expenses related to all of the above forms, plus:

Form 4562 - for reporting depreciation deductions

Form 4255 - for computing investment credit recapture

Form 4136 - for claiming fuel tax credits

A part of the program will also include a discussion of Management Strategies for 1987. Income tax management can help reduce tax liabilities and minimize after tax income. Tax management is not tax evasion, but making use of the tax laws and using all allowable deductions.

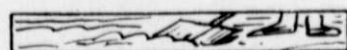
Hoskins succeeds Norman Wood who retired on October 25, 1986, after 31 years of service.

## DOT Announces License Plate Numbers to Be Replaced in December

The state Department of Transportation today announced the license numbers that will be replaced with new graphic plates in December.

Norbert K. Anderson, administrator of the Division of Motor Vehicles, said 25,000 sets of plates issued in December 1979 with numbers between Y10003 and Y73075 will be replaced as part of the scheduled replacement program.

Anderson said the 25,000 sets of plates will replace about a third of the ones originally issued in December 1979. The remainder will remain in service at least another year and the owners will receive a single year validation sticker with instructions to place it on the rear license plate. The front plate must be kept on the vehicle, but will not have a new sticker.

People with December renewals not scheduled to receive graphic plates this year may exercise an early replacement option by sending in an extra \$10 and their vehicle's certificate of title.

Requests for early replacement should be sent to Wisconsin DOT, Graphic Plate Processing, P.O. Box 7911, Madison,

WI 53707. They will then receive a set of new graphic plates along with their renewed registration.

# Sunburst Plans Dec. 5 Opening

The new Sunburst Ski Hill located just outside of Kewaskum will open their 1986-87 ski season with many new additions and improvements that will make the hill more attractive for this year's skiers.

Kim Engel, who is in her third year as one of Sunburst's owners reported that a new run has been opened for the coming season. Kim said that the new run will be rated EXPERT-EXPERT. Other improvements are the addition of five miles of new wiring for the hill's lighting

system, and an additional mile of new snow-making pipe so that more of the hill can be opened up faster when snow making conditions are right.

Live entertainment will be featured one night of the week in the lounge, and the hill's facilities will be made available for weddings and other banquets.

On Jan. 24 and 25, the hill will host a U.S.S.A. sanctioned slalom race that will attract skiers from all over the midwest, who will be competing for points toward a national title.

The hill's owners have also purchased a new tiller type of

groomer, and this, too, will make skiing conditions much better for the up-and-coming season.

Sunburst has rental equipment enough to outfit at least 400 skiers and at times all of the hill's rental equipment is in use.

During the 1985-86 season the hill accommodated over 25,000 skiers and to give everyone better service as conditions are improved the hill has purchased a second double chair lift. Although the second lift has already been delivered it cannot be installed in time for this year due to the forthcoming cold weather.

## Fleury and Coulter Pace Indians in Loss at Slinger

The Kewaskum Indians boys' basketball team lost their second game of the season to the Slinger Owls Friday night, Nov. 21, by a score of 72-55. The Indians were paced by scoring leaders Joel Fleury, a 6'6" junior center, and Mike Coulter, 6'3" senior forward who also doubles at center, as both of them scored 16 points. High scorer for the Owls was senior Kevin Kirkland, who finished the evening with the game high of 20.

The Indians started out well enough in the first period and played a very precision type of offense and controlled and handled the ball very well committing few mistakes and turnovers. A high point for Kewaskum in the period was the passing of their junior guard Noel Stollenwerk. Noel set up consecutive scores by Dave Harju and Fleury with sharp outlet passes, one after a Kewaskum rebound and the other coming on a Kewaskum steal. Stollenwerk is one of only two Kewaskum players that looks down floor immediately after getting the ball on a turnover and shows great promise as being the one man able and experienced enough to set up some Indian fast breaks. The Indians led at the end of the first period by the score of 13-9.

In the second period the Owls decided that it must have been time to try to impress their girlfriends with some attempts at fancy behind the back dribbling and passing that really didn't impress anyone at all. On one hot dog behind the back pass Kirkland was so wild he missed his man all together and threw the ball out of bounds with several hundred fans and GOD watching and that ended the hot dogging for the game and not a minute too soon.

The Owls did, however, get their act together well enough to take a 4-point halftime lead at 31-27. Although the Indians went into the locker room very much in this one they came out and gave it away in the second half with enough turnovers to last for the rest of the season. Final score, 72-55 Owls.

Forecasting is always fun so what can Kewaskum fans reasonably expect from the 1986-87 varsity team.

Quite a bit. The Indians have two genuine blue chip players in Fleury and Coulter with the possibility of another in Stollenwerk. With four or five more games under their belt and the additional time spent playing together it would not be unrealistic to expect them to finish the regular season with about a .500 average. It would also be right on target to expect this year's team to put on a real good show in the regional playoffs. Down shifting to class B will be a definite plus and there's no reason why this team can't bring home the regional trophy. As far as conference play that's a different story. The Indians won't finish in the cellar and conversely they won't be at the top of the pile either. Just some place happily in between.

The Lions won from the free throw line, sinking 20 of 37, while Kewaskum got only eight free throws, making four.

Lomira was in better condition for the contest, having played two previous games and getting more practice, while the Indians had only three days of practice by the entire squad because a number of the girls started late after going to state in volleyball.

KHS got off to a slow start with only five points in the first quarter but progressed well after that. The girls fell behind in the third quarter when the Lions scored 19 points but came back to score eight straight in the fourth quarter to make it close again.

## Early Deer Kill Heavy in Fond Du Lac, Washington Counties

A phone call to DNR headquarters at Mauthe Lake in the Northern Kettle Moraine State Forest revealed that a total of 367 deer had been killed up to Wednesday afternoon in Fond du Lac County and part of Sheboygan County registered there. A breakdown of the number of bucks and antlerless deer registered was not reported.

Of this number, 290 were registered on Saturday and Sunday of the opening weekend, slightly above last year. Animals registered over the weekend included 107 bucks and 183 antlerless deer.

In Washington County, 319 deer were bagged over the opening weekend according to manager Bill Ishmael of the Department of Natural Resources office at Pike Lake State Park. A call was made to Ishmael Wednesday afternoon for the kill up to that time but he was not available. The number of deer shot over the weekend was close to that last year. They included 133 bucks and 186 antlerless deer.

One of the largest deer bagged over the weekend was a 191 pounder registered at Wayne's Sport Shop in West Bend Saturday by Gilbert Lopez of Waukesha. This nine-pointer was killed near the Sunburst Ski Hill just southwest of Kewaskum.

Chris Thistle, 17, a senior at West Bend West High School, also got a large eight-point buck Sunday east of Kewaskum.

The gun deer season closes on Sunday.
