Shefond Self/Serve Gas Station Robbed

A lone gunman robbed the Kewaskum Shefond Mini-mart and gas station, 1149 Fond du Lac Avenue, early Monday evening, getting away with approximately \$300 in cash.

Kewaskum Police Chief Donald Hlavaty said the robbery occurred at 7:30 p.m., when a man came into the store. No other customers were on the premises at the time. The man walked to the bathroom area, came out and asked employe Kathy Gudex if she had any magazines. She replied no. He walked over to the card racks and then to the cooler where he got a bottle of Gatorade.

The suspect walked to the

counter, put the drink down and asked Gudex how much it was. He then pulled out an automatic gun, cocked it, and told Gudex, "this is real, give me all your money." Gudex did as she was told. The man then ran out the door, down the street toward the bank, and disappeared.

Gudex went to the office and called the police. The Kewaskum squad was about two blocks away from the robbery scene when it received the call. Police searched the area but the suspect was not found.

Hlavaty said the robber was described as about 5'10" tall, 150 pounds, slim build, with olive colored skin and no facial hair. The man was wearing a brown leather jacket, blue watch cap, and gray sweatpants

with "Wisconsin" on the sides.

Hlavaty said the robbery is similar to an incident which took place in Sheboygan a week ago. It looks like it could be part of a chain of robberies, noted Hlavaty. "The man is apparently working the Fox Valley."

The Chief said it was not known if the gunman had any accomplices. He must have had a car nearby which either he or an associate drove to make the escape.

The Washington County Sheriff's Department is assisting in the investigation and neighboring law enforcement agencies have been alerted to be on the lookout for the suspect.

Petitions Seek Injunction To Stop Alleged Harassment

On behalf of Kewaskum School District Administrator Penny Kleinhans and Business Manager Cherna Gorder, Milwaukee lawyer Alan D. Eisenberg has filed petitions in Washington County Circuit Court seeking permanent injunctions to stop alleged harassment by Kewaskum School Board member Clara Trapp.

The petitions address alleged incidents which have occurred and alleged comments which have been made since June of 1985.

As of Wednesday morning, Judge J. Tom Merriam had not signed the petitions. A spokesperson for the court said that a review of the petitions by the Judge found that they did not meet the requirements of state statutes in specifically identifying the allegations.

Kleinhans and Gorder made the following statement in response to the court's

comments. "We are disappointed that Judge Merriam did not issue the restraining order for harassment as requested. However, we have learned through this process that charges might more properly be filed on the basis of violation of civil and constitutional rights, in particular 14th Amendment property rights, and potential damages for liable, slander, and defamation of character. A review of this will be undertaken in the near future and a decision on filing new charges made at that time.

We believe that elected officials must be held to a reasonable, ethical code of conduct and that employes in the public eye, such as ourselves, must be allowed to perform their jobs as directed without threat of personal and professional harm."

In a telephone conversation Wednesday morning, Trapp declined to make any statement other than the fact that it was in the hands of her lawyers.

Buettner, Brickle Top Vote-Getters in Area 18th Senate District School Board Primary Eliminates Weare

Tuesday's Kewaskum School District primary election narrowed the field of candidates by one, eliminating Neal Weare who received 231 votes.

Top vote-getter was Ruth Schmitt with 557 votes, followed by Ronald Beimbom with 457, Robert Schulteis 445, Jean Goeden 315, Donald Nowak 315, and John Spoerl with 281 votes.

Village Proceeding With Sidewalk Extension Plans

Administrator Dan Schmidt advised the Kewaskum Village Board that plans for the first two phases of Kewaskum's Capital Improvements Sidewalk Extension Program are progressing.

Project One consists of 14,980 feet, or 2.84 miles of new sidewalk, said Schmidt. Project Two contains 14,796 feet, or 2.8 miles. The cost of the two phases is expected to run \$240,000 each, with \$60,000 of that amount assessable.

Schmidt said the next step will be to look into the financial aspects and how the village plans to pay for the work. He noted one lending agency had given him an interest rate of 5 1/4%. That's a very favorable rate, noted Schmidt. He said he would be looking into other funding sources and would bring his information to the March 16th meeting for review and discussion.

Schmidt and Fire Chief Donald Ehnert advised the board that the village's engineers have gone over plans for repairs at the fire house to correct moisture problems. The building has had continual problems with water running

from the parapit area and down some of the walls.

Ehnert said bidding should take place in March, with work to begin in April.

In other business, the board adopted a resolution opposing state legislation which would require pre-registration of all voters prior to elections. Presently voters are automatically registered at the time they come to the polls to vote.

Trustee Mary Krueger informed the board that the West Bend Incineration Plant Study Committee will be holding its first meeting on February 26th, and she will represent the Village on that committee.

The board also approved renewal of the conditional use permit of Mr. Fred Robertson for the former Pro-Bilt building used as living quarters by some employes of Kemp's Dairy.

The Public Works and Water Pollution Control Department were given permission to advertise for summer part-time help, and Schmidt was given authorization to rent metro toilets for summer use at the village parks.

The board then adjourned to closed session to discuss the sale of a parcel of land in the new Kewaskum Industrial Park.

KHS Graduate Dies In Car Crash

Mark D. Durian, 21, of Milwaukee, died after midnight Sunday when the car he was a passenger in went out of control on a snowcovered road in the Town of Barton and struck a utility pole. He was a 1983 graduate of Kewaskum High School.

Randall R. Gau, 22, of 4623 Ridge Road, Kewaskum was the driver of the car.

Gau, who suffered multiple injuries, was flown to Milwaukee County Medical Complex by the Flight for Life helicopter. He was still listed in critical condition as of Wednesday afternoon. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Norbert Gau, Kewaskum.

According to the Washington

County Sheriff's Department report, Gau was traveling south on Glacier Drive, south of County D when he lost control. The car crossed the northbound lane, entered the ditch and struck the utility pole on the passenger's side of the car.

No charges have been issued, although the Sheriff's Department is continuing its investigation.

Jayson P. Reynolds, 17, of Colgate, was killed Friday morning when the car he was driving was struck by a truck at County CC and Pleasant Hill Road, Town of Erin.

Reynolds was driving west on Pleasant Hill Road and stopped for a stop sign. When he drove into the intersection, the car was struck by a small truck

driven by Nicholas J. Hansen, 16, of 4343 Hubertus Road, Hubertus.

A passenger in the Reynold's car, Kelly A. Hulenbacher, 16, of 4555 Pleasant Hill Road, Richfield, was transferred from Hartford Memorial Hospital to MCMC. She was in satisfactory condition Monday with facial and abdominal injuries.

Hansen was treated for head and leg injuries at Community Memorial Hospital, Menomonee Falls, and released.

Two passengers in the truck, Michelle L. Misiara, 18, of 1371 Emerald Road, Hartford; and Daniel S. Cooke, 17, of 1325 Sunny Dale Court, Hubertus, were treated at Hartford Memorial Hospital and released a hospital spokesman said.

DOT Mails First Revocation-Intent Notices Under Drunk Driving Law

Under Wisconsin's new drunk driving law, the Department of Transportation has mailed its first notices of intent to revoke the licenses of people arrested for driving with blood-alcohol levels of .20 percent or more.

"We have mailed notices to 421 drivers who were arrested January, the first month the law was in effect" said Al Johnson, chief of the DOT revocations and suspensions section.

Under state law, a driver with a blood-alcohol level of .10 percent or more is considered legally drunk. The new law kept .10 as the minimum level to be considered drunk, but created a special category for drivers with blood-alcohol levels of .20 or higher. Under the law, such drivers can lose their licenses even if the drivers' drunk driving cases are pending in court.

When drivers with these high blood-alcohol levels are arrested, local law-enforcement authorities notify the DOT, which sends each driver a "notice of intent to revoke operating privileges."

"This is not an order of revocation," Johnson said. "This is a notice of intent to revoke if you do nothing, if you don't ask for a hearing."

A driver who receives such a letter has 10 days in which to ask for a court hearing, at which the judge will consider only these questions:

- Whether the arresting officer had probable cause to believe the person was driving drunk;

- Whether the officer informed the driver of his or her

legal rights; and

- Whether the driver's blood-alcohol level tested at .20 or more.

If these three tests are met, the judge can order the license revoked.

The judicial hearing is separate from any trial that eventually may stem from the drunk driving arrest.

If a driver does not request a judicial hearing within 10 days of receiving the DOT notice, the agency orders the license revoked. First offenders lose their licenses for six months. Subsequent offenses carry longer revocations.

After the revocation period ends, a driver can get a new license by filling out an application, providing proof of financial responsibility (usually risk insurance) and paying a reinstatement fee of \$30. In some cases, the driver may have to take another road or written test.

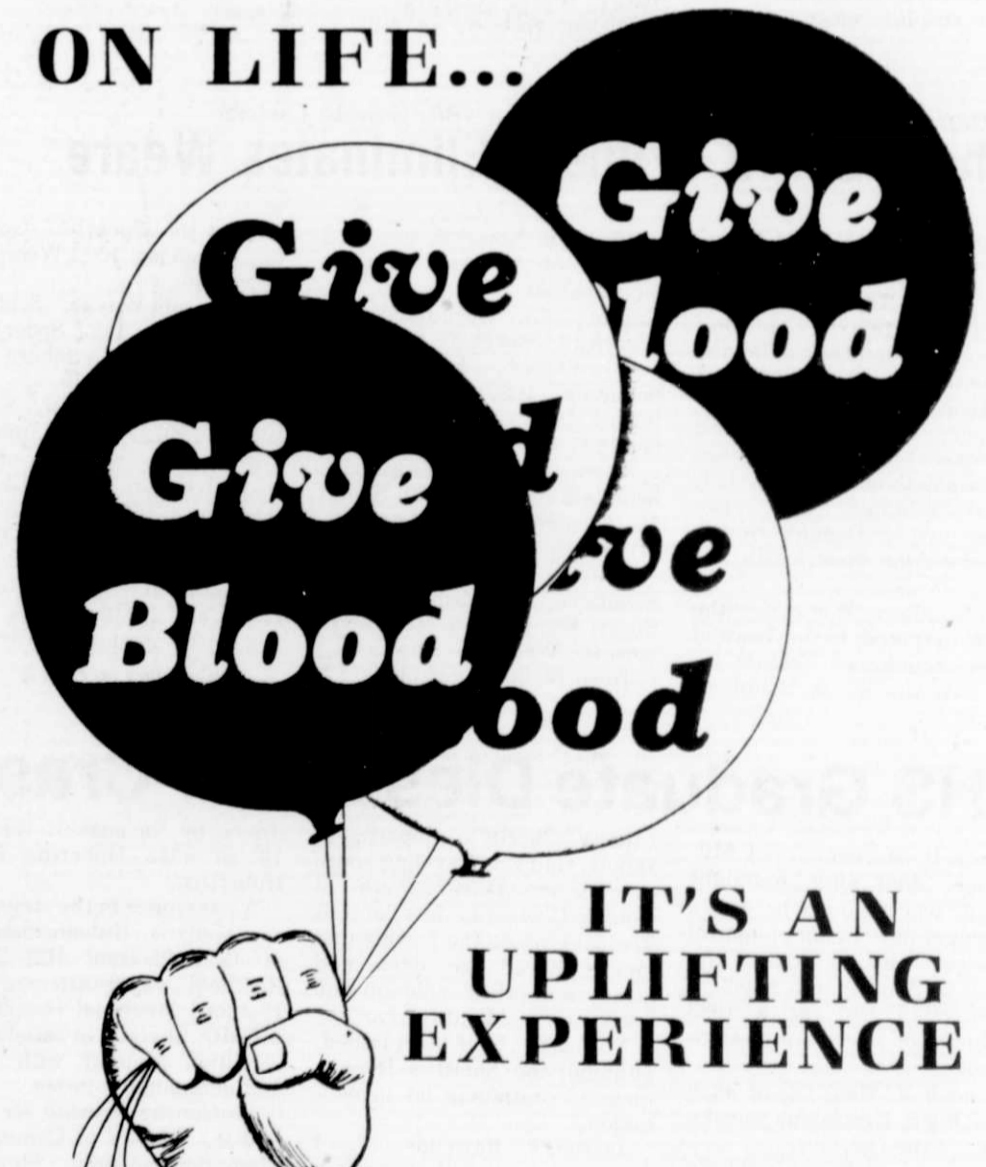

COFFEE vs HEART

Drinking large amounts of coffee may increase cholesterol levels in the blood, enough to double the risk of heart disease, report Norwegian scientists from Univ. of Tromso. Their study of 15,481 coffee-drinking men and women found that as the amount of coffee consumed rises, the cholesterol in the blood rises dramatically. The Natl. Coffee Assoc. claims that other human studies disprove this correlation.

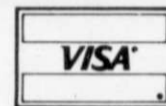

Inpatient Program County Mental Health Center Moved to St. Joseph's Hospital

The Washington County Mental Health Center Inpatient Program will move from its present location at the Samaritan Nursing Home to St. Joseph's Community Hospital, 551 Silverbrook Drive, West Bend, on February 27th. On February 26th from 3-7 p.m. an open house will be held so that the public can view the new facility on the second floor of the East building of St. Joseph's Community Hospital. A major remodeling project has been completed to provide a 19 bed unit that is bright and comfortable in its design. There is a fully equipped kitchen, dayroom, dining room and exercise room.

The new Inpatient Program is designed to provide prompt diagnosis and treatment of persons in acute psychiatric distress. The program offers comprehensive assessment, treatment, discharge and after-care planning, coordinated with the patient and the treatment team. A daily schedule provides group therapy, occupational

therapy, recreation and exercise. The concerned and respectful staff are highly trained and represent fields of medicine, psychiatry, psychology, social work, nursing and occupational therapy. At discharge a whole range of outpatient services is offered by experienced therapists through the Mental Health Center's Family Education and Treatment Program. The Inpatient Program also offers short term alcohol or drug detoxification services.

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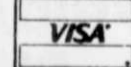

The motor is of a four cylinder type, capable of developing 45 to 48 H.P. and the pump is of the rotary type fitted with a churn valve or pressure regulator. Through 1000 feet of 2 1/2 inch fire hose, using a 7-8 inch on 1 inch nozzle, a stream of water can be thrown in still air a horizontal distance of from 125 to 140 feet. The finish of the engine is to be in vermilion and colors in fancy striping. The engine will be lettered "Kewaskum Fire Department."
