Gambling Referendum Expected to Draw Large Turnout

## Area Electors Face Local, County, State Issues Tuesday

A varied assortment of election issues should draw area voters to the polls on April 7th. Of major interest on the local level is the Kewaskum School District's election to fill three positions on its board. Of the three incumbents, Tom Brigham, Jean Goeden, and Kim Peterson, whose terms are expiring, only Goeden has decided to run for re-election. She is a ten-year veteran of the board.

In the February 17th primary, Goeden came in fourth in a field of seven including candidates Ruth Schmitt, Ronald Beimborn, Robert Schulteis, Donald Nowak, John Spoerl, and Neal Weare who are eventually eliminated.

Goeden will be facing stiff competition from her opponents, Schmitt, Beimborn and Nowak who have made previous attempts to win a seat on the board. Spoerl, a former board member who was defeated in his bid for re-election, and Schulteis who is making his first bid to win a position on the board.

Leading up to, and since the primary, official campaigning by the candidates has been based on everything from their previous records to reducing the budget, and staffing changes.

In the Village of Kewaskum, Trustee Thomas McElhatton is challenging incumbent trustee

Paul Blumer for the post of Board President. The seat went up for grabs when incumbent president David Nigh announced earlier this year that he would not seek re-election to another term.

Blumer, whose term as trustee is expiring, has been placed on the hot seat by McElhatton's decision to run for the top Village post. If Blumer should lose the election, he will be off the board. However, should McElhatton lose, he would still remain on the board in his un-expired term as trustee.

Village Administrator Dan Schmidt said last week that, should McElhatton win the village president race, his trusteeship would become vacant. That position would then have to be filled by either a special election, board appointment, or left unfilled. Because there are four candidates running for the posts of trustee does not mean the candidates would all automatically fill the vacant positions.

Besides Blumer, the terms of trustees Mary Krueger and

Richard Schlice expire this year. Both are seeking re-election and are facing competition from first time candidates Charles Boegel and Kenneth Bonlender.

In township elections, officials in three races are being challenged for their jobs. In the Town of Auburn, incumbent supervisors Ervin Seifert and Kenneth Jandere are opposed by Roger Brace. Town Chairman Roger Schleif and Clerk Camilla Butzke are running unopposed for another term while Maureen Heberer is seeking the Treasurer's post being vacated by her husband Norman.

In the Town of Wayne, incumbent supervisors Mark Strobel and Leonard Peter are being challenged by John Oelhafen and Ronald Panzer. Chairman Carl Hohlweck, Clerk Orville Kern, and Treasurer Gerald Schulz are unopposed.

Chairman Jack Theusch, Clerk Joanne Oneska, and Treasurer Kenneth Ramthun in the Town of Farmington are also unopposed, while incumbent Supervisors Frank Mayer and Joe Sekeres are being

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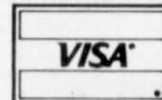

challenged by Richard Schneider.

In the Town of Kewaskum, all the incumbents, Chairman George Allmann, Clerk Barbara Hinz, Treasurer Dolores Prost, and Supervisors Daniel Stoffel and David Dorn are running with no opposition.

Officials in the Town of Scott are also running unchallenged. They are Chairman Charles Fick, Clerk Lester Benzschawel, Treasurer Marie Edeler, and Supervisors Dale Burke and Clarence Janz.

On the state level, electors who reside in the 18th State Senate District will be going to the polls to select an individual to fill the seat vacated by former Senator Scott McCallum when he resigned to become Lieutenant Governor.

Competing for that post are Mary Brickle, Democratic candidate from Fond du Lac, Carol Buettner, Republican candidate from Oshkosh, and John Daggett, Green America Party candidate from the Oshkosh area.

Of statewide interest on the spring ballot will be the official referenda on pari-mutuel betting and a state-run lottery.

The referendum asks voters

to decide whether or not the State Constitution, Section 24 of Article IV, should be revised to permit pari-mutuel on-track betting in the state (which would encompass horseracing, dogracing, or both).

The second part of the referendum covers revision of the same section to allow for creation of a lottery to be operated by the State with the requirement that lottery proceeds must be used for property tax relief.

Both issues have been the subject of heated debate among both public officials and private citizen groups. Because of the controversy, it was decided to take the issue to the people in the form of a referendum. The results are expected to provide officials with a more accurate picture of just where Wisconsin residents stand on the issue of legalized gambling.

It is anticipated that a state run lottery would bring in revenues of approximately \$80 million a year. Some officials feel, however, it is just a drop in the bucket that has a \$1 billion price tag and would provide little relief to Wisconsin's taxpayers.

Also on the state level, William Callow will be running unopposed for Justice of the Supreme Court.

### Prime Before You Paint

A prime coat seals porous surfaces to prevent the first coat of paint from soaking in and drying to an uneven appearance. And it helps form a tight bond between that first coat and the surface. Always prime painted surfaces that have never been painted before. That goes for wood or metal. On previously painted surfaces, prime only if the paint is peeling or has been scraped off and the bare surface is showing through. These areas must be completely scraped and cleaned right to where the paint is still adhering to the surface. Be sure to sand it smooth. Then spot prime these areas.

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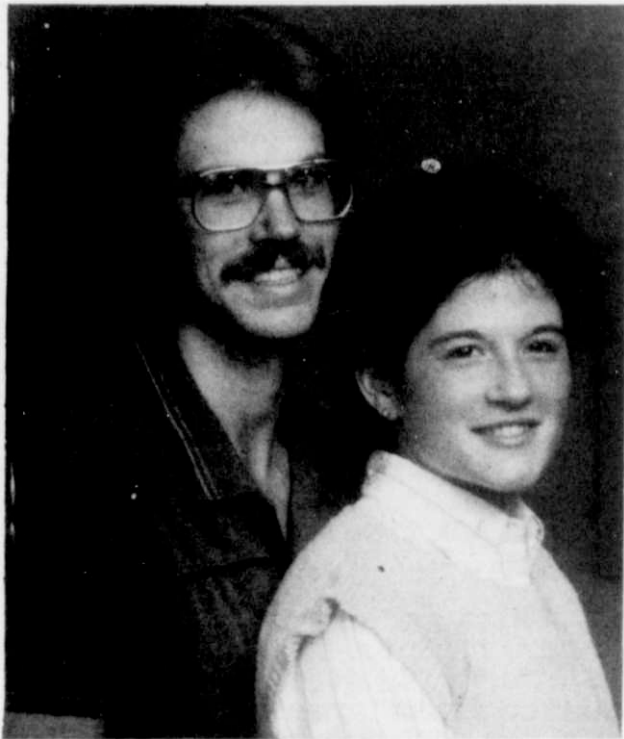

**INFORMATION TO ELECTORS**

The following instructions are given for the information and guidance of electors:

- (a) Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall give his or her name and address before receiving the ballot card and ballot envelope from the ballot clerk. The initials of 2 ballot clerks must appear on the ballot card envelope. Upon receiving the ballot card and ballot card envelope, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth and punch/mark his or her ballot card and ballot card envelope. A ballot clerk may inform the elector of the proper manner for punching/mark a ballot card and ballot card envelope, but he or she shall not in any manner advise or indicate for whom to vote.
- (b) To vote for a person whose name is printed on the ballot, insert your ballot card with both hands, be sure the pins are through the two holes, hold the punching device straight up and down, press down firmly opposite the candidate and/or proposition selections of your choice.
- (c) Write-in voting. To vote for a candidate whose name does not appear on the printed ballot, use the ballot card envelope to "write-in" the office and the candidate's name.
- (d) The ballot card and ballot card envelope should not be punched/marked in any other manner. If you incorrectly punch/mark, tear, or deface the ballot card or ballot card envelope, return it to the election judge for another one, but not more than 3 ballot cards or ballot card envelopes shall be issued to any one elector. Not more than 5 minutes' time shall be allowed to punch/mark the ballot card or ballot card envelope. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in punching or marking his or her ballot card or ballot card envelope may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot card or ballot card envelope is punched/marked.
- (e) After the official ballot card or ballot card envelope is punched or marked, remove your ballot card, place it in the ballot card envelope and take it to the inspector at the ballot box, hand him or her the ballot card envelope with the ballot card placed inside, to be placed in the ballot box, and leave the polling place promptly.
- (f) An elector may be assisted by 2 election officials of different political parties in punching or marking the ballot if he or she declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read or that due to physical disability he or she is unable to punch or mark his or her ballot. ## Asch to Teach Photography Class at UWWC

Up until six years ago, Bud Asch said, "I always considered a camera a nuisance." Since then, he has become an accomplished photographer.

For the last four years, Asch has been teaching continuing education courses in photography at the UW Center - Washington County, where he is an associate professor of music. On April 7, he begins a five-week class on beginning 35mm photography at UWWC. Asch sees "a lot of similarities" between photography and music. "They talk the same language," he said, citing terms like form, tone and expressiveness.

He quoted the late Ansel Adams, a famed photographer, who compared a photographic negative to a musical score. "Getting all the potential" out of a score, Adams said, depends on what a musician does with it. For the negative, the potential is determined in the darkroom, he added.

Asch agrees, setting himself apart from another main school of photography which, he said, advises: "Snap the shutter and do not toy with what you get." He now has a complete darkroom in his home, having converted a bedroom to that use when the last Asch child left home. Before that time, he used the family bathroom, setting up and taking down all his equipment to each developing session.

Asch also separates himself from the shotgun approach type of photography that snaps picture after picture in hopes of hitting upon a rare acceptable image. "That," he said, "is like seating 100 monkeys at 100 typewriters and hoping one will write a sonnet."

Students in the April class will shoot one roll of black-and-white film each week. Asch develops and evaluates each student's work. "I can generally tell what's wrong with pictures students don't like and help them correct them," he said.

All students are required to have a camera that can be operated manually. Asch acknowledges that photography is "in an era of ultimate automation where you aim and shoot." But he sees such technology as limiting. "I could have used an automatic for only about a half of the pictures I've taken," he said.

Understanding the camera and its controls is the starting point for the course. Asch said, "A camera is a light-tight box with a hole for a lens to let the light in. There are two ways you can regulate that - the size of the hole and how fast it opens and closes."

Asch has seven cameras including three 35mms, a Leica theatre camera which is "very quiet," a twin-lens reflex for portraiture, and two four-by-fives, including a monorail for studio work and a lighter field camera.

Cameras stopped being a nuisance for Asch after he saw a slide show at UWWC. He was impressed, checked out the school camera and began learning everything he could about photography. "It must have been a latent bug I had," he laughed.

Classes he has taken have been "key turning points" in his own picture-taking, he said.

Changes have come as he has studied with other photographers and "seen the images they come up with."

His first teaching was in a class he team-taught with two other UWWC faculty members. His first UWWC continuing education course came in 1983.

Asch looks forward to teaching photography. "The classes are absolutely the most pleasant ones I have," he said.

"No one is forced to take them. Students are not told they need it in order to get a job. They're there because they want to be."

Students range from high school age to senior citizens who might bring "an old camera they haven't used for years." Some people take the class to share on their skills for a trip; some are serious hobbyists; some need the skill in their work.

Along with his classes, Asch serves as photo advisor to the UWWC student newspaper and handles professional assignments including slide shows and brochures. This year he started his own business, AJA Photo.

"When I find something I enjoy, I do not do it halfway," he said. Ten years ago his table tennis hobby culminated in his winning the state champion-

ship. "I keep shying away from computers," he said, admitting a concern about where that might lead.

Photography has changed the way Bud Asch sees life. He said, "I don't look at things without thinking, 'I wish I had my camera.'"

If the elector spoils a ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one elector. If the ballot has not been initiated by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the elector shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place. Not more than five minutes' time shall be allowed inside a voting booth. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in marking his or her ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

After an official paper ballot is punched or marked, it shall be inserted in the envelope provided so the punches do not show or folded so the inside marks do not show but so the printed endorsements and inspectors' initials on the outside do show. After casting his or her vote, the elector shall leave the booth, and deposit the envelope containing his or her ballot in the ballot box and where paper ballots are distributed to electors, deposit his or her folded ballots in the proper ballot boxes, or deliver the ballots to an inspector for deposit. NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that at an election to be held in the several towns, villages, wards and election districts of the State of Wisconsin, on the first Tuesday of April, 1987, being the Seventh day of said month, the following proposed amendments to the Constitution of the State of Wisconsin, having been approved by two successive legislatures, will be submitted to a vote of the people pursuant to law.

1987 Assembly Joint Resolution 2 ENROLLED JOINT RESOLUTION 3

To renumber and amend section 24 (intro.), (1), (2) and (3) of article IV, and to create section 24 (5) of article IV of the constitution, relating to excepting pari-mutuel on-track betting as provided by law from the prohibition against legislative authorization of lotteries (2nd consideration).

Whereas, the 1985 legislature in regular session proposed an amendment to the constitution by 1985 Assembly Joint Resolution 45 (1985 Enrolled Joint Resolution 36) and agreed to it by a majority of the members elected to each of the 2 houses, which amendment reads as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 24 (intro.) of article IV of the constitution is renumbered section 24 (1) of article IV of the constitution and amended to read:

[Article IV] Section 24 (1) Except as provided in this section, the legislature shall never authorize any lottery or grant any divorce.

SECTION 2. Section 24 (1), (2) and (3) of article IV of the constitution are renumbered, respectively, section 24 (3), (4) and (2) of article IV of the constitution and amended to read:

[Article IV] Section 24 (2) Except as the legislature may provide otherwise provided by law, the following activities do not constitute consideration as an element of a lottery:

(a) To listen to or watch a television or radio program.

(b) To fill out a coupon or entry blank, whether or not proof of purchase is required.

(c) To visit a mercantile establishment or other place without being required to make a purchase or pay an admission fee.

(3) The legislature may authorize the following bingo games licensed by the state, and but all profits shall accrue to the licensed organization and no salaries, fees or profits may be paid to any other organization or person: raffle games operated by religious, charitable, service, fraternal or veterans organizations or those to which contributions are deductible for federal or state income tax purposes. All profits must inure to the licensed organization and no salaries, fees or profits shall be paid to any other organization or person.

(4) The legislature may authorize the following raffle games licensed by the state, and but all profits shall accrue to the licensed local organization and no salaries, fees or profits may be paid to any other organization or person: raffle games operated by religious, charitable, service, fraternal or veterans organizations or those to which contributions are deductible for federal or state income tax purposes. The legislature shall limit the number of raffles conducted by any such organization. All profits must inure to the licensed local organization and no salaries, fees or profits shall be paid to any other organization or person.

SECTION 3. Section 24 (5) of article IV of the constitution is created to read:

[Article IV] Section 24 (5) This section shall not prohibit pari-mutuel on-track betting as provided by law. The state may not own or operate any enterprise for pari-mutuel betting, or lease any state-owned land to any other owner or operator for such purposes.

SECTION 4. Numbering or new section. The new subsection (5) of section 24 of article IV of the constitution, created in this joint resolution, shall be designated by the next higher open subsection number in that section if, prior to the ratification by the people of the amendment proposed in this joint resolution, any other ratified amendment has created a section 24 (5) of article IV of the constitution of this state.

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the assembly, the senate concurring, that the foregoing amendment to the constitution is agreed to by the 1987 legislature, and, be it further:

Resolved, That the foregoing amendment be submitted to a vote of the people at the election to be held on the first Tuesday of April, 1987; and, be it further:

Resolved, That the question concerning ratification of the foregoing amendment to be stated on the ballot as follows:

"Pari-mutuel on-track betting. Shall section 24 of article IV of the constitution be revised, and shall an additional provision be created in that section, to permit pari-mutuel on-track betting in this state as provided by law, but prohibiting state ownership or operation of any facility or enterprise for pari-mutuel betting or leasing by the state of any state-owned land to any other owner or operator for such purposes?"

EXPLANATION

A "yes" vote on this constitutional amendment would permit the legislature to authorize pari-mutuel on-track betting in pari-mutuel betting those people backing the winners of the race divide the total amount bet less a percentage for the track operators and other expenses. Under the proposed amendment betting could be authorized only at the race track itself. The state could not own or operate any facility or enterprise for pari-mutuel betting, or lease any state-owned land to any other owner or operator for pari-mutuel betting purposes. A yes vote would also result in the renumbering of present sections 24(1), (2) and (3) of article IV of the constitution. A no vote would retain the present language of section 24 of article IV of the Wisconsin Constitution, containing the prohibition on this form of gambling.

The Kewaskum area largely provides my family and I with a living and I feel that serving on the Kewaskum School Board is one way of repaying the people for their confidence in me. I feel that my past experience and qualifications would provide a new, fresh and "positive" insight to the Kewaskum School Board. "It is time for a change."

Some of the negative campaigning initiated by other people is distressing; especially since there is a possibility that we may have to work together, hand in hand, on the school board.
