The details of the incident are somewhat bizarre. According to the Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Department report, Sylvester Krahn, 807 Highway A, Adell, was traveling south on Highway S, just north of New Fane at about 3:15 p.m., on his way to work, when he noticed smoke off the roadway. Krahn, a volunteer fireman, stopped to investigate and found a young woman standing next to a burning car.

Krahn spoke to the woman and asked her if there was anyone in the vehicle. She said yes. He then tried to open the doors but they were locked. Krahn asked where the keys were and the woman said they were inside. Krahn broke some windows to determine if there was anyone in the vehicle but the car was too heavily engulfed in flames.

As Krahn was trying to see if there was someone in the car, the woman grabbed some of her clothes and started walking up the hiking trail to the wooded area at the top of the hill.

While Krahn stayed at the car, he flagged down Myron Strobel in his oil delivery truck and asked him to call the fire department. Strobel relayed the message to a man standing at his mailbox. He ran to his home to make the call. After waiting awhile and not hearing any sirens, Krahn went into New Fane and made a second call, returning to the burning car. The Sheriff's Department acknowledged receiving two calls on the incident.

After more than a year, the Washington County Sheriff's Department announced in a written statement Monday, that it is suspending its investigation into the February 12, 1986, shooting deaths of Allen Guenther and Lee Luebke at a Town of Farmington residence.

Sheriff Clarence Schwartz and District Attorney David Resheske advised that the criminal investigation into the deaths has been suspended pending any new information. In November, 1986, Sheriff Schartz requested that experts from the Division of Criminal Investigation, Wisconsin Department of Justice, conduct an independent review of the Sheriff's Department investigation into the incident.

After reviewing the case, the Division of Criminal Investigation concluded that the investigation of the incident by the Washington County Sheriff's Department was complete and professional and that all investigative leads had been developed to their maximum potential.

During that inquest Glenn Zimdars admitted shooting the two men. According to Zimdars shot witnesses. Guenther and Luebke in selfdefense. Schwalbach also felt there was insufficient evidence to indicate the shootings were in self-defense.

According to other individuals at the scene, a long hose was found near the car and it appeared that the victim had apparently first tried to commit suicide by hosing the exhaust carbon monoxide into the vehicle, but somehow the car caught fire.

A Fond du Lac County spokesperson said there was no motive for the suicide listed in the report.

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

Bicycle licenses will be sold on the first two Saturdays in May of 1987. The hours will be from 8:00 until 11:30 a.m. on May 2nd and May 9th.

There are two major changes in the bicycle registration being done this year.

1. The cost of a bicycle license is now \$5.00.

2. The registration is now **Non-Expiring** for as long as you own the bicycle.

In other words when you come in to buy a license this year and pay the fee of \$5.00, you will not have to purchase another license for the length of time you own the bicycle, be it one year or 50 years.

All bicycles OPERATED in the Village of Kewaskum are required to be licensed.

# **County Homemakers Observe 50th Anniversary**

There are 36 local clubs in Washington County with 365 members. The 36 clubs are divided into seven centers, Germantown, Hartford, Kewaskum, Richfield, Slinger, Trenton and West Bend.

The Kewaskum Center has seven clubs, they are:

Wayne Willing Weavers -Started in 1951, the Wayne Willing Weavers is the oldest club in the Kewaskum center. They have 13 members and meet on the third Thursday of the month. Their members come from the Kewaskum, Wayne, West Bend, Allenton and St. Kilian areas. Some of the activities they enjoy most are, food projects, countries, crafts, fall and spring council meetings, and they like to volunteer for finger printing. Two of their members, Pearl Terlinden and Theresa Bruckert have been with the club since its start

Farmington Handi Maids -The Farmington Handi Maids have been in existence for "thirty-five rewarding years." They have averaged 12 members through the years. Their favorite projects have been anything on food, clothing, family living, health, and last but not least, crafts. They have donated food and clothing

to needy families for many years, and also donated money to the Ronald McDonald House and the March of Dimes. 
## May Fellowship Day Planned By Church Women United

# Trip to Chicago Museums May 2

Reservations are being accepted now for the annual Chicago Museums Trip at the UW Center -Washington County.

Forty-five seats are available on the chartered motorcoach which leaves UWWC at 6:30 a.m. on Saturday, May 2, and returns to the campus at about 11 p.m. The cost is \$9 for transportation plus museum admissions and meal costs.

Mike Cahill, assistant professor of physics at UWWC and chairman of the sponsoring Fine Arts Committee, said the trips have been going on for about seven years. "We get a full bus every time," he said.

Cahill said the 1987 trip is "the most ambitious we've ever tried" because of an effort to give participants a variety of choices as to what they will see. The bus will swing past five museums at the beginning of the morning and repeat the run at noon, picking up people and dropping them off enroute.

Museums on the route are the Field Museum of Natural History, the Shedd Aquarium, the Adler Planetarium, the Art Institute and the Museum of Science and Industry. Special exhibits on view in May include 'Intruders from Outer Space'' at the Planetarium - featuring

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meteorite impacts with the "Renaissance Master earth. Bronzes" at the Art Institute and the new Henry Crown Space Center at Science and Industry

Participants can bring a brown-bag lunch. The bus will travel to both Chinatown and the Art Institute area to offer eating alternatives for the evening meal.

Cahill said the public is welcome on the trip, which usually draws a 50-50 mix of students and community people. A broad range of ages participate, he said, ranging from children with their parents to senior citizens. Travel, he emphasized, "should be very comfortable" with a bathroom and air-conditioning provided.

"This is not a school bus," he said.

Cahill said participants should be prepared to be at bus pickup points promptly because of the extra "shuffling" to provide more museum choices. But, he said, the trip should go smoothly, adding: "We've never lost anyone yet."







## WTA Warns: **Check Property** Assessments

Property owners should check their 1987 property assessments to see if there are any changes, according to the Wisconsin Taxpayers Alliance (WTA), Madison.

The WTA, a privately supported government-research and citizen-education organization, pointed out that assessments are made annually, and it is the property owner's responsibility to check the assessment.

According to the WTA, the first step is to contact the assessor to find out when the assessment roll will be open for inspection. Although owners of property whose assessments have increased should be notified by the local assessor, failure to receive the notification does not make the new assessment invalid.

An owner who feels the assessment on the property is too high should ask the assessor to explain the procedure used in establishing the value. If the explanation is not satisfactory and the owner feels the property is assessed at a higher level than comparable property in the municipality, the property owner may wish to appeal to the board of review.

The WTA said that in the appearance before the board of review, the property owner must establish the fair market value of the property and also show that the property is overassessed in comparison with the general level of property in the town, village or city. This assessment level is shown in the assessor's affidavit attached to the assessment roll.

Important dates to remember for 1987, the WTA noted, are:

Monday, May 4, assessment rolls will be open for inspection in most towns, villages and cities.

Monday, May 11, local boards of review will convene.

However, there are different dates in Milwaukee and Madison, both of which have a board of assessors as a first step in the appeal process. Taxpayers in these cities should check with the assessor's office.


