Communities Asked to Reconsider County Incineration Proposal

Trustee Mary Krueger, who represents the Village of Kewaskum on the West Bend Joint Incineration Committee, told the Kewaskum Village Board, her group has decided to draft a letter seeking a response to the question of whether or not waste disposal needs in the county's municipalities have changed enough to make them interested in reconsidering the idea of incineration for their refuse.

Krueger told the board Monday night, the committee felt that if 60% of the municipalities would show interest, the county would take up the project again. "If 70% to 80% were interested" said Krueger, "it would be almost assured."

Krueger noted that part of the resistance to the county plan had come because some communities still had their landfills, however, in the last year there have been changes. Other communities felt West Bend was not centrally located enough in the county causing trips for longer some municipalities who might want to use the incinerator. More communities have been contacted by the DNR about closing their landfills, and an investigation shows the geographic center of Washington County is Cedar Creek, so West Bend isn't so far off.

Krueger reinterated comments made by Richfield County Supervisor John Kohl at the committee's last meeting. Landfill and garbage collection costs have risen and will continue to do so, some landfills are nearing their closing dates and alternate sources for disposal must be found, and people are becoming more concerned about groundwater pollution from landfill runoff.

Wisconsin Electric has indicated it is willing to purchase any surplus electricity generated by the proposed county plant. In the county plan, the incinerator would generate enough heat to service the county jail, courthouse, county garage, and Samaritan Home.

Krueger said, "One thing you will have to do is recycle." While West Bend does recycle, it is not mandatory, said Krueger, but it looks like they're moving in that direction.

Krueger said Pat and Dianne Horlamus, who run a recycling center south of West Bend told the committee, recycling together with incineration produces a cleaner fuel with better quality ash which is much easier to dispose of.

A refuse data report shows the Town of Farmington has the most ambitious recycling program. It recycles everything except magazines and batteries. The Village of Kewaskum does not recycle magazines, bottles, non-aluminum cans, plastic milk jugs, other plastic, grass clippings, iron, tires, oil or batteries. Some communities including the Village of Jackson and Town of Barton do no recycling.

The village's cost to dispose

The village's cost to dispose of its refuse through its landfill and collection services run \$46,000 a year, and the cost continues to go up.

The committee is giving communities 45 days to discuss the subject and return their responses. If there still is not enough interest in the county plan, the committee will return to its original plan of a smaller, City of West Bend owned incinerator, working with those communities which have continued to show their interest and support.

The committee will hold its next meeting on July 16th.

Safety, Fire Department Committees, and engineers to discuss the report and make the final decisions on what work will be done and which recommendations will be followed.

The board authorized the advertising of bids once the final decisions have been made as to what route will be taken to make the necessary repairs.

Schmidt told the board, depending upon what course the committees take, the cost will run anywhere between \$68,000 and \$102,000. He said the village had set aside \$22,000 for the repairs and it will be looking to finance about \$50,000 of the costs. One source of the money, the Wisconsin Fund, is charging 534% interest. Trustee Mary Krueger, who chairs the Finance Committee, said the village would be look-

ing into other sources but she did not think they would find any lower rates.

The board approved the hiring of people for summer employment for the Parks Department and Public Works Department.

Trustee Richard Schmidt told the board the library now has video tapes made available through the county system. Every month the library will have six new tapes available for rent at \$1.00 each.

The board approved committee assignments for the coming year, a bartender's license for Marlene Boegel, and a building permit for a garage to Jerome Kuehl.

Trustee Tom McElhatton told the board a tentative pool schedule was being set up and would be announced in the paper.

The meeting was then adjourned.

Dr. Darin Honored





Village of Kewaskum NEWS NOTES

The Village of Kewaskum, under Section 7 of the Municipal Code, has adopted basically all State Traffic Codes.

The Village, over the past few months, has seen an increased number of unlicensed vehicle, trailers and boats parked on Village streets. This is not permitted for it creates a safety hazard and visual nuisance. Any such licensed or unlicensed vehicle remaining on any street, highway or road in the Village for more than 7 days without the written permission of the Chief of Police or his authorized agent shall be an abandoned vehicle within the meaning of this section and taken care of appropriately

remind those semi-truck owners and operators that those vehicles are prohibited on most streets with exceptions to the rule when deliveries or pickups are being made. It should also be noted that such vehicles create a safety hazard and visual nuisance when parked for extended periods of time in front of residences or businesses. The Village does ask that off street parking is used for semi-trucks and trailers.


