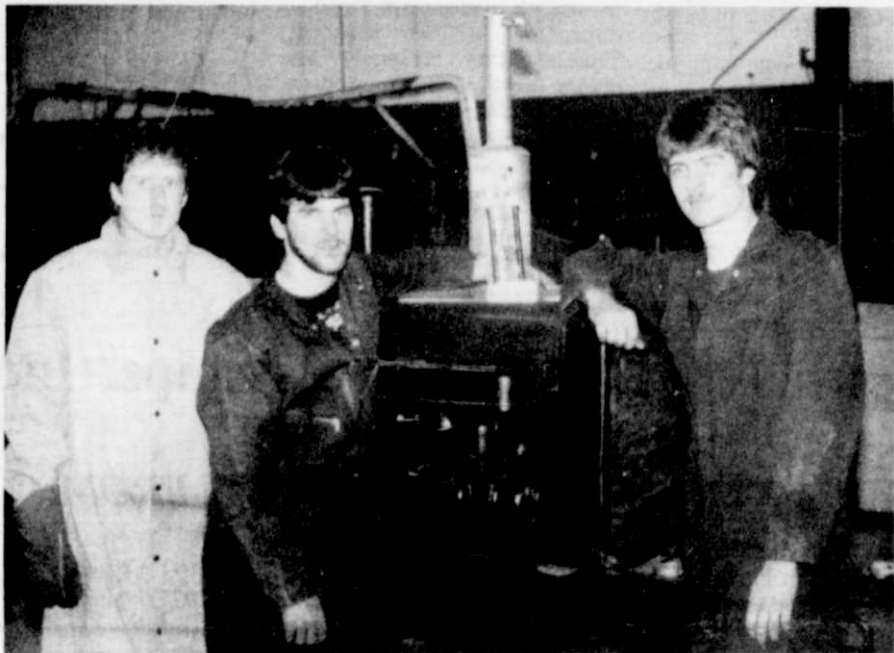

FFA Farm Mechanics Team Takes First at State

The hot streak continues!!! Kewaskum FFA's Farm Mechanics team consisting of Marty Shaw, Brian Oelhafen, and Steve Redig not only took first place at the state judging finals, but captured the two highest scores as individuals. Marty placed first in the state as an individual and Brian, only 3 points behind him, took second place individually, then adding Steve's 13th place score made this outstanding team the winners by a long shot.

The team started its super year at Fox Valley Technical Institute on March 7 where they competed in the regional contest that qualifies teams for state competition. Marty placed first individually and Steve was tied for 4th. Brian placed 13th which placed the team first at

this contest. Onward to the next contest, the MPTI skills Olympics held at the Fond du Lac campus, the team proved worthy again as Brian placed first individually and was awarded a \$100 scholarship. Marty placed 2nd and Steve had honorable mention.

Farm mechanics judging contests cover a very vast area of farm maintenance, repair, wiring, major engine work, construction skills, welding, metalwork, and parts identification. "It's all hands-on experience that really helps us to win," Shaw was quoted as saying. "We always had a lot of confidence going into the contests, I think the vocational classes at school and the excellent teachers are behind our hot streak," Oelhafen said.

"It's been a lot of fun and we're all looking forward to the next contest, that will be the true test of our expertise," Steve Redig explained.

The next contest the team will be participating in will be the National Farm Mechanics Judging Contest held next November in Kansas City, Missouri. One team from each state, the first place team, competes in this contest to find the best mechanics in the FFA and the National States.

KMS Students Shaken Up in Bus Mishap

Six Middle School students and a teacher were treated for bumps and bruises at St. Michael's Hospital, Monday, after a bus accident on highway I-43 in Milwaukee. All the injuries were minor and the seven were released after treatment.

A Milwaukee County Sheriff's Department spokesman said the accident occurred at approximately 9:00 a.m. Seven buses were on field trip to the Performing Arts

Center when traffic began to bog down. The buses slowed down but apparently the driver of the last bus was traveling too close and rear-ended the vehicle in front of her.

The bus driver was cited for traveling too close to another vehicle. The spokesman said traffic on I-43 was tied up for over an hour as ambulances from Milwaukee and three neighboring suburbs removed the injured from the accident scene.

District Administrator Penny Kleinhans said most of the individuals had received bumps and scraps and taking them to

the hospital was a precautionary measure to make sure there were no serious injuries.

The injured teachers, both of Kewaskum, were identified as George Allmann and Mary Reilly-Kliss.

The injured pupils, all of Kewaskum, were identified as Joan Bath, 15; Wendy Fideler, 13; Stacy Kode, 13; Maurice LaPlant, 13; Buffy Reseburg, 14; and Tammy Staehler, 14.

Fire Station Repairs to Be Reviewed Sidewalk Construction Underway

Administrator Dan Schmidt advised the Village Board Monday, that the Capital Improvements Sidewalk Project is under way. Laying of forms began this week in the northwest portion of the village.

Schmidt said after work is completed in that area crews will start in the Bel-Ric area, followed by the areas east of highway 45. Public Works Superintendent Augie Bilgo noted the company was doing a good job and was very neat in

its work. Approximately 1,500 feet a day is being done.

In other business the board went over a report from the village's engineers on proposed repairs at the fire station. Fire Chief Donald Ehnert told the board the engineer's inspection uncovered more problems than had been anticipated. Their report outlined the four problem areas and proposed several alternative solutions for remedying each area.

There will be a joint meeting of the Protection and Public

Communities Asked to Reconsider County Incineration Proposal

Trustee Mary Krueger, who represents the Village of Kewaskum on the West Bend Joint Incineration Committee, told the Kewaskum Village Board, her group has decided to draft a letter seeking a response to the question of whether or not waste disposal needs in the county's municipalities have changed enough to make them interested in reconsidering the idea of incineration for their refuse.

Krueger told the board Monday night, the committee felt that if 60% of the municipalities would show interest, the county would take up the project again. "If 70% to 80% were interested" said Krueger, "it would be almost assured."

Krueger noted that part of the resistance to the county plan had come because some communities still had their landfills, however, in the last year there have been changes. Other communities felt West Bend was not centrally located enough in the county causing longer trips for some municipalities who might want to use the incinerator. More communities have been contacted by the DNR about closing their landfills, and an investigation shows the geographic center of Washington County is Cedar Creek, so West Bend isn't so far off.

Krueger reiterated comments made by Richfield County Supervisor John Kohl at the committee's last meeting. Landfill and garbage collection costs have risen and will continue to do so, some landfills are nearing their closing dates and alternate sources for disposal must be found, and people are becoming more concerned about groundwater pollution from landfill runoff.

Wisconsin Electric has indicated it is willing to purchase any surplus electricity generated by the proposed county plant. In the county plan, the incinerator would generate enough heat to service the county jail, courthouse, county garage, and Samaritan Home.

Krueger said, "One thing you will have to do is recycle. While West Bend does recycle, it is not mandatory, said Krueger, but it looks like they're moving in that direction."

Krueger said Pat and Dianne Horlamus, who run a recycling center south of West Bend told the committee, recycling together with incineration produces a cleaner fuel which is much easier to dispose of.

A refuse data report shows the Town of Farmington has the most ambitious recycling program. It recycles everything except magazines and batteries. The Village of Kewaskum does

not recycle magazines, bottles, non-aluminum cans, plastic milk jugs, other plastic, grass clippings, iron, tires, oil or batteries. Some communities including the Village of Jackson and Town of Barton do no recycling.

The village's cost to dispose of its refuse through its landfill and collection services run \$46,000 a year, and the cost continues to go up.

The committee is giving communities 45 days to discuss the subject and return their responses. If there still is not enough interest in the county plan, the committee will return to its original plan of a smaller, City of West Bend owned incinerator, working with those communities which have continued to show their interest and support.

The committee will hold its next meeting on July 16th.

Safety, Fire Department Committees, and engineers to discuss the report and make the final decisions on what work will be done and which recommendations will be followed.

The board authorized the advertising of bids once the final decisions have been made as to what route will be taken to make the necessary repairs.

Schmidt told the board, depending upon what course the committees take, the cost will run anywhere between \$68,000 and \$102,000. He said the village had set aside \$22,000 for the repairs and it will be looking to finance about \$50,000 of the costs. One source of the money, the Wisconsin Fund, is charging 5 1/4% interest. Trustee Mary Krueger, who chairs the Finance Committee, said the village would be look-

ing into other sources but she did not think they would find any lower rates.

The board approved the hiring of people for summer employment for the Parks Department and Public Works Department.

Trustee Richard Schmidt told the board the library now has video tapes made available through the county system. Every month the library will have six new tapes available for rent at \$1.00 each.

The board approved committee assignments for the coming year, a bartender's license for Marlene Boegel, and a building permit for a garage to Jerome Kuehl.

Trustee Tom McElhatton told the board a tentative pool schedule was being set up and would be announced in the paper.

The meeting was then adjourned.

allow him to go into retail sales.

1. The cost of a bicycle license is now \$5.00.

2. The registration is now Non-Expiring for as long as you own the bicycle.

In other words when you come in to buy a license this year and pay the fee of \$5.00, you will not have to purchase another license for the length of

time you own the bicycle, be it one year or 50 years.

All bicycles OPERATED in the Village of Kewaskum are required to be licensed.

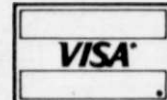

Village of Kewaskum NEWS NOTES

The Village of Kewaskum, under Section 7 of the Municipal Code, has adopted basically all State Traffic Codes.

The Village, over the past few months, has seen an increased number of unlicensed vehicle, trailers and boats parked on Village streets. This is not permitted for it creates a safety hazard and visual nuisance. Any such licensed or unlicensed vehicle remaining on any street, highway or road in the Village for more than 7 days without the written permission of the Chief of Police or his authorized agent shall be an abandoned vehicle within the meaning of this section and taken care of appropriately.

The Village would also

remind those semi-truck owners and operators that those vehicles are prohibited on most streets with exceptions to the rule when deliveries or pickups are being made. It should also be noted that such vehicles create a safety hazard and visual nuisance when parked for extended periods of time in front of residences or businesses. The Village does ask that off street parking is used for semi-trucks and trailers.

Middle School Hosts Folk Fair

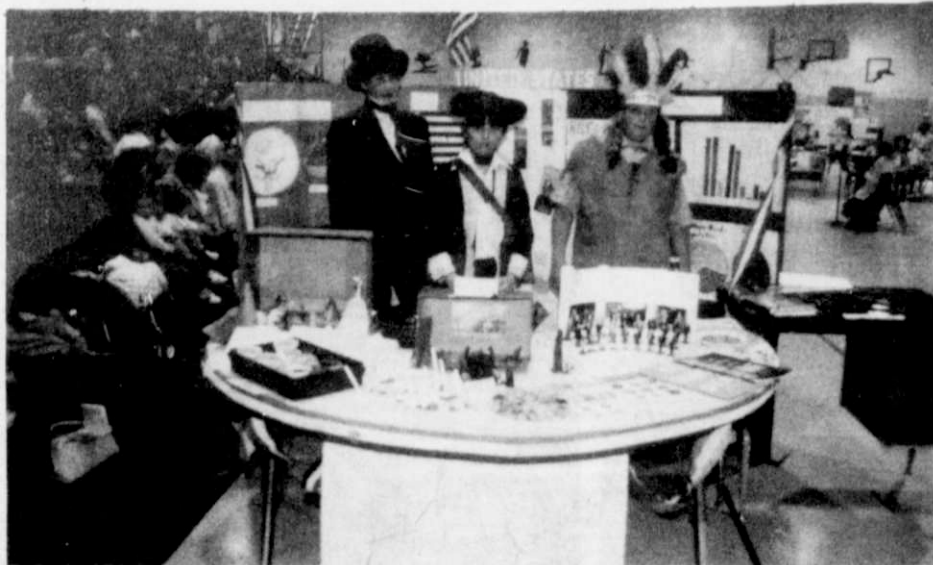
