Annual Meeting Set for July 27

Wayne School Well Work to Start June 8

Buildings & Grounds Superintendent Fred Boehlke presented the Kewaskum School Board with bids on the second phase of work to construct a new well for the Wayne Elementary School. Work is scheduled to begin as soon as the school closes for summer vacation.

Earlier this year the board okayed the low bid of Tischendorf Well Drilling for the actual drilling of the new well. At Monday night's meeting, the board approved Tischendorf's low bid of \$4,365 to install a new pump, install and connect the necessary wiring and piping to the building and construction of a pumphouse.

Tischendorf will also seal up the old well at a cost of \$20 an hour, plus \$8.20 a bag for the necessary cement to close the

Board member Clara Trapp questioned the DNR's jurisdiction over the new well's construction, noting it will not be started until June 8th. According to meetings she had attended and news articles she had read, Trapp said she was under the impression the DNR would no longer be involved with wells after June 1st, and

control would then be turned over to local county and town governments.

Both Trapp and board member Ron Beimborn questioned whether or not it would be wise to hold off awarding the contract until after the first, on the premise the district might be able to save some money if the standards were revised when local governments take on the job of overseeing well construction.

At a Finance Committee meeting, Fred Zielieke of Zielieke Well Drilling had indicated he felt the old pump would be adequate for the new well. The DNR, however, has required the installation of a new 5 hp. pump. Trapp felt the new larger pump might not be necessary

Board member Perry Ankerson felt the board should go ahead with the work noting bids had been received and he wanted the school to have a new well before school was back in session this fall.

The board voted to go ahead with the work on a 5-2 vote, with Trapp and Beimborn voting no.

The board also okayed Boehlke's request to hire low bidder Mac, Inc., to do some culvert and blacktop repairs at Farmington Elementary at a cost of \$1,700.

Also approved was a contract to Iron Fireman for summer maintenance repairs for the district's air conditioners,

boilers and furnaces at a cost of portunity to speak." \$3,500.

On a 6-1 vote, the board approved the purchase of a new lawn mower from Dairyland Equipment at a cost of \$1,593 plus trade.

The items would come from the 1987-88 budget funds.

The board discussed setting up budget discussion meetings to review the proposed 1987-88 budget. The first meeting is scheduled for Monday, June 1st, at 7:00 p.m.

The board also approved setting the 1987 Annual Meeting for July 27, at 7:30 p.m. Because teacher and support staff contract negotiations still have not been completed, Business Manager Cherna Gorder felt proposed budget figures would not change substantially between July and September. She, therfore, saw no reason to extend the Annual Meeting date on the assumption the administration would have some finalized · figures by then.

The board also discussed the idea of going to a two-meetingsa-month schedule. Board member Ruth Schmitt. who brought up the idea, felt meeting twice a month would help to eliminate some of the lengthy meetings which have dragged on into the late hours of the night. She felt the second meeting could replace Finance Committee meetings.

Board member Ron Theusch disagreed, stating, "I would rather keep it at one. I think it's too much to ask people to attend two meetings. You may be right that attention lags sometimes. but I don't think meeting twice

a month is the answer. Ankerson told Schmitt, "I think the committee meetings are a real good thing. People have more of an opportunity to discuss their ideas and views because it's a more informal setting. If you put all three committees into board meetings, you would allow less time for people to have the op-

Board member Donald Nowak said he would just like to see more board members attending committee meetings as interested citizens in the audience.

Ankerson also addressed the board on the subject of setting up a code of ethics for itself. He read an outline of what he felt the code should contain. "I'm not so tied into the wording but I'm tied into the concept" said Ankerson. He told the board he was not looking for any action at this point, but that he did expect to see the proposal on the Policy Committee's next agenda and that something would be brought back to the board sometimes this summer.

The board approved an Advanced Placement classification for the high school Calculus course. The action would allow students taking the class to apply for college credits by taking and passing a college rated test

Administrator Penny Kleinhans gave the board an update on fall kindergarten enrollment. So far 114 children have been enrolled, resulting in one section of 19 students Wayne, two sections of 19 at Farmington, and three sections at Kewaskum Elementary Kleinhans noted the count is down considerably from last year's enrollment of 150 students.

In other action, the board approved the hiring of seven temporary part time janitors, a school withdrawal, an early kindergarten entrance, the appointment of David Wietor as KHS head basketball coach, the acceptance of Mr. Ed Sleger's retirement resignation, and the resignation of Sharon Blank as cheerleader advisor. The board denied the request of the Administrator to carry over her vacation days from the 1986-87 to the 1987-88 school year.



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Eden Area Fire Claims Barn and Cattle

A fire of undetermined origin destroyed a barn and over 70 head of cattle on the William Timblin farm, Highway B and W, early Saturday afternoon.

According to reports, shortly before noon, Timblin's nephew Todd and another employe were working on a truck when they noticed the barn was on fire. The fire department was called but within about ten minutes the barn was completely gone.

Eden Fire Chief Roger Engel said the barn boards were burned and the fire was through the roof by the time his department arrived. Fire Departments from Campbellsport, Mount Calvary, and the Town of Fond du Lac, helped Eden firefighters battle the blaze. The structure included an older 40 foot by 90 foot barn and a newer, 78 by 218 foot free stall addition. A 25 foot by 90 foot Harvestore silo was severely damaged by the flames. The milking parlor and milkhouse were saved.

Although the barn was lost, firefighters were able to keep the fire from spreading to two homes and other sheds on the Timblin farm and to buildings at the Claude Miller farm across the road. Beside the intense fire, firemen had to contend with high winds which blew sparks over the area causing grass fires,

The Timblin herd consists of about 225 animals, with an average milking herd of about 120 cows.

Although insurance is not expected to cover the entire loss, the Timblins are considering rebuilding.

Timblin also owns and operates Timblin Transit. He is the twin brother of Henry Timblin of Kewaskum, who also owns and operates a trucking firm.



According to Condella, the volunteer Weather Watchers are contacted twice each day for

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their reports on current BENEFIT DANCE temperatures and conditions. Their temperature reports and observations appear daily on TV6 News broadcasts. especially at five and ten o'clock.

During special weather conditions in their areas, Weather Watchers keep in close contact with the TV6 meteorologists. Their observations were especially important during the floods of August and September, 1986. The Weather Watchers reported up-to-the minute rainfall totals to TV6 meteorologists who, in turn, notified the Milwaukee Weather Service to aid in the issuance of the Service's flash flood warnings.








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Arbor Day Observed by Kewaskum Third Graders




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Local FFA Banquet Held Thursday


Award from East Central Select Sires.

Conservancy at Lac Lawrann Announces 1987 Tour Season

The Lac Lawrann Conservancy, 104 acres of naturally landscaped wetland, woodland and open areas all beautifully blended, has again opened its season for guided tours through its trail system. 


