Bull Injures Area Man

Ervin Lawrenz, 69, of 2754 Mink Creek Road, Town of Scott was seriously injured Saturday by a young bull on the Willard Schroeder farm, 1932 Abbott Drive, Town of Sherman.

According to reports, Lawrenz was checking line fences and apparently did not know there was a bull among the herd of cows in the field in which he was walking.

The dehorned yearling bull apparently charged Lawrenz from behind butting him around then knocking the man into a

Lawrenz was discovered some time later with his feet and legs submerged in the water. He was taken by Random Lake Ambulance to St. Joseph's Hospital, West Bend. His body temperature had dropped very low, apparently due to the time spent in the cold water.

Lawrenz was later transferred to St. Luke's Hospital Milwaukee, where his condition was noted as improved after surgery. Rev. Over a hundred people were on hand Sunday, for the actual dedication of the new Beechwood firehouse which was completed earlier this year. Vişitors, however, continued to come and go as the community held a daylong celebration to mark the culmination of almost five years of planning that led to the construction of the department's new home.

In dedicating the building, Charles Fick, Chairman of the Town of Scott, noted the department and the people of the community represented tradition, dedication, and committment. Tradition, said Fick, was marked by the fact that many members of the department can look back over the past 70 plus years and proudly note that their fathers and grandfathers before them had served as volunteer firefighters. Dedication and committment he noted were shown in times such as the ice storms of a few years ago when members of the department went out to help people of the

community who were without heat, light, and water, even though their own families were in the same situation.

Reverend Kesting, pastor of United Church of Christ, Beechwood, and a member of the Silver Creek Volunteer Fire Department, was asked to describe what it was like to get up at 3:00 in the morning and answer a fire call. He said, no one would ever win any fashion awards, you just grab any clothes that are handy and go out to do a job you've trained to

do, to the best of your ability The new 48 foot x 84 foot building, with over 4,000 square feet of space, now has room for all Beechwood's trucks and equipment plus offices and showers.

Beechwood Fire Chief Roger Vetter gave a short history of organization. The his department was established almost 75 years ago in 1913, with the purchase of its first piece of equipment a hand pumper (which the department still owns). The first firehouse was built on the shores of Beechwood Lake, and though it was unheated, it served the community until 1961. In that year the department bought a building on the corner of Highways A and S, and remodeled it into a garage and hall.

After over twenty years in that building, the department realized it had again outgrown its quarters and the plan to build a new structure began to take shape. The department is now comprised of 35 active members and 20 First Responders.

In his closing comments, Vetter thanked the many people, too numerous to mention, who have donated over \$5,000 to the project along with various items of equipment. He said he specifically wanted to thank the Ladies Auxiliary who have held fundraisers and donated numerous pieces of equipment, the latest being a Cascade system which will allow the department to recharge its own oxygen tanks.

In the future, the department plans to expand the building with the addition of a meeting room and kitchen.



Some Reservations Over DNR Canoe Launch Project Village Moving on Some Firehouse Repairs

The Kewaskum Village Board was updated Monday night, on renovation plans that will hopefully remedy water leakage problems at the firehouse.

Trustee Richard Schmidt said his Protection and Public Safety Committee, Fire Department Committee and the village's engineers had met on May 7th, to review the four problem areas and a list of proposals to eliminate them.

For leakage problems in the high roof and parapet areas it was decided to leave the existing metal roof intact and cover it with $\frac{1}{2}$ inch plywood over $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches of insulation. A layer of single ply roof membrane would then be applied over the plywood.

Water damage caused by leakage through metal roof exposed fasteners will be eliminated by removal of the existing metal roof in the low sloped area and replacing it with conventional fiberglass Schmidt shingles. said. however, before that work is done the engineers would be looking at the problem of removing the sag which has developed in that area of the roof.

The committees are still investigating the problem of water cracks in the exterior masonary walls. Schmidt said they are looking into an insulation system call Dryvit, which is applied in the same general manner as plaster. He said this procedure would provide both waterproofing and insulation. Schmidt said a local example of the Dryvit process application is the Clothes Clinic building in West Bend.

The engineers are still working on the problem of water running off the main roof .and adjacent areas next to the building at the north entrance.

Schmidt said another meeting would be scheduled when the engineers had more information on the remaining problem areas.

In other action the board discussed a Parks Committee proposal to go ahead with the DNR canoe launch project for the west side of River Hill Park. Several of the trustees questioned what the chances were of the DNR deciding to step in somewhere down the line and taking over that area of the park, possibly charging a fee to use the area including the restroom facilities, of which the village would be paying the major portion of the construction cost.

Trustee Mary Krueger asked, are there really that many people who would use the launch. She expressed concern that the village would pay the major share of the bathroom facility's cost which would end up being abused. Look at the damage that has already been done at the shelter building, she noted. "My point is, how many people would use it versus the trouble it would be, is it really worth it?"

Parks Committee Chairman Tom McElhatton indicated a major portion of the lavatory usage would come from people using that side of the park for fishing and picnicing. Krueger noted, would we then be better off to just go ahead with the bathrooms and tell the DNR we're not interested in the canoe launch. She felt that action would allow the village to maintain control over the building and the shoreline along the river.

Several comments were made indicating that the DNR is already trying to obtain shoreline easements in other areas which would then make them open to the public and would be under the jurisdiction of the DNR.

The decision to go ahead with the project was delayed until the board's next meeting. More information will then be presented on the village's Gladys Glam constructing just a bathroom Lac Avenue. facility without a launch.

In other business Administrator Dan Schmidt advised the board he had received three news items from County Horticultural Agent Dan Wilson on alternative ways to use grass clippings. They will be run in the paper in the hope they will help to eliminate the need for the Public Works Department to collect the clippings with the regular garbage.

In other action the board approved some minor revisions

in the Pool and Parks rules, and a Class B beer license for Gladys Glamann, 1536 Fond du Lac Avenue.

Boy Admits Setting Timblin Barn Fire

After questioning by the Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Department early last week, an eight year old boy admitted setting the May 9th fire which destroyed a barn, freestall shed, Harvestore silo, and over 70 head of cattle on the William Timblin farm, 2263 Highway B, Eden.

The youngster told authorities he had also been involved in almost a dozen other fire setting incidents near his home in Fond du Lac. During questioning, the boy said he started the fires because was fun." The youngster, no relation to the Timblins, wasvisiting the farm at the time the fire broke out. The boy said he found a disposable lighter on the property, went into the upper portion of the barn, where he set fire to some hay and cornstalks on the barn floor. He stamped out the fire but it re-ignited and flames shot out. He ran from the barn and later gave the lighter to his mother. Although witnesses told officials they had seen the boy run from the barn, he denied any involvement during initial questioning the day of the fire. Authorities recovered the lighter from the parent.

Firefighters from Campbellsport, Knowles, and Lomira were called to the scene, but they were unable to save a 32foot x 60 foot building used for storage.


The barn, insured for \$35,000 continued wagons, a tractor, old combine, two cars and some lumber.







Establish Planning Committee For Development of Chapter 2 Grant

WI. Julie Kewaskum, Backus, Director of Instruction and Chapter 2 Coordinator, has announced the establishment of a planning committee for the development of the 87-88 Chapter 2 grant. Parents actively involved in the school, PTO and school board representatives will join together with staff and administration from the Kewaskum Schools as well as Holy Trinity and St. Lucas to discuss needs in their schools that can be helped through this special federal grant.

This year, as in the past, the Kewaskum School District, will receive an allocation based on enrollment and special needs to be divided equitably among the public and private schools. A wide number of special projects can be targeted to receive these funds. In the past, computers and computer software, special learning resources such as filmstrips and audio-visual equipment, staff development time, as well as many other items were

purchased with these funds. In 86-87, the project focused on continuing to develop a writing skills lab at Kewaskum Middle School where students had the opportunity to use word processors to improve their basic and creative writing skills both for language arts and other subjects. Another part of the project provided funds for teachers to travel to competency testing workshops and to begin to meet to develop goals for students in the areas of math. language arts, and reading. A portable mini-camera was purchased for use throughout

the district for taping special events and for use in instruction. St. Lucas utilized their funds to purchase additional software to use in the classroom.



Landfills in Kewaskum and the surrounding communities are rapidly being filled up. But if more people take an active role in recycling to reduce the amount of waste entering our landfills, landfill life can be extended and long-range costs reduced.

About 50% of household waste is readily recyclable Newspaper, glass, metals and yard waste). Of these items, vard waste is one of the easiest to put to use. Brush, leaves, grass, and other plant refuse are valuable renewable resources for mulches and composting.

Taking advantage of a mulch may be the most beneficial practice that can be used around your trees or on your shrub beds, flowers, and vegetables. A mulch is a collection of fallen leaves, grasses, or other materials. Mulches are applied to reduce soil erosion, aid in controlling weeds, keep the soil moist and cool, and add essential organic matter to the soil.

There are several types of materials used as mulches. Each material should be accessible, easily applied, and relatively free of weed seeds. Some of these suggested materials include grass clippings, compost, and leaves.

Under normal mowing conditions, clippings should not be removed from the lawn. Lawns benefit by allowing the clippings to remain. Each year approximately one-half of the lawn's nutrient needs are added back to the soil when clippings are returned. This means less fertilizer is needed to keep the lawn healthy. Contrary to popular belief, clippings do not add to a lawn' s thatch layer when the grass is mowed

deficiency in your plants. Add one cup of dried blood or 10-10-10 fertilizer per bushel of chopped leaves.

Compost is perhaps the best mulch you can use and you make it yourself from leftover plant materials from your lawn and garden. (More about composting will be coming in another article).

Once you have chosen your mulching material, it is easily applied. Simply spread a three to five inch layer on the soil around your plants. Additional mulch will be needed later over the old layers to maintain the proper thickness and receive maximum results. Garden mulches should be worked into the soil in fall to decompose by next spring
