## Highway 28 Reconstruction to Begin July 27

The Village of Kewaskum can look forward to a summer of dirt, dust, and inconvenience as reconstruction and resurfacing of highway 28 (Main Street) is set to begin next month. Work on the project which runs from highway 45, to highway 144, is expected to begin July 27th, with some portions of the work to run into 1988.

Village Administrator, Dan Schmidt, said the contractor, Payne and Dolan, will attempt to keep Main Street partially open to at least local traffic for the three to five weeks worth of roadwork within the village.

Schmidt noted, however, that work on the Main Street bridge over the Milwaukee River will not be done until next year. Because the bridge will be widened by moving the sidewalks to the outside of the support pillars, work will be delayed until 1988.

Schmidt told the Village Board, "you're likely to see more road torn up than laid down for a while," noting that the old blacktop will be recycled and used again. Paving can't begin until there is a sufficient stockpile of the recyclable material at hand.

Highway H will be designated as the official detour

route, but it is hoped Main Street can remain open to at least Highway S, to accommodate vacationers heading out to the Kettle Moraine.

The total cost of the project will be \$886,000, with the village's portion to run \$46,000 plus the costs for manholes, striping, and other related items. Originally that cost had been projected at \$100,000.

Schmidt advised the board that the village's 1987 portion of its Capital Improvements Sidewalk program was completed last week. "The construction crews moved out last week," said Schmidt, "and the landscapers are now finishing their end of the project."

Next year the village will tackle the problem sidewalk areas in the village.

The board unanimously approved the purchase of land from the Kettle Moraine Sportsman's Association, and Roger and August Bilgo. The properties are adjacent to Kewaskum's new Industrial Park and will be used for access roads and the extension of Reigle Drive. The cost of \$13,000 for the Sportsman's and \$2,000 for the Bilgo properties will come from the Open Spaces Fund.

The board approved a resolution which will allow

Riverbend Cablevision to transfer its Kewaskum franchise to its new name, Star Cablevision. Schmidt said there would be no changes as far as the company or its service. It was simply changing its local companies to one uniform name for all its subsidiaries.

Fire Chief Donald Ehert informed the board that this year's parade theme will be celebrating the 200th birthday of the Constitution. Ehert noted he was distressed by the lack of respect people are showing to the American flag. He asked the board to show its support in reminding the people to recognize the flag properly.

The board approved the annual renewal of bartender licenses and a Class 'B' liquor license for Thomas Piwoni at 1257 Fond du Lac Avenue, (Keller's Tap).

The board also approved a maintenance contract for the Municipal Building's heating units at a cost of \$483 per year.

Dave Nigh announced this week that Kewaskum Frozen Foods has purchased the business known as Papa Ron's Pizza. "We took over the business on May 18th," said Nigh. The company was started by Cherrie Isken and her late husband Ron.

"We are maintaining the same routes and customer services as the Iskens," said Nigh. The pizzas will be available at area retail businesses from Fond du Lac to Milwaukee, as well as at the locker plant.

The purchase of Papa Ron's is an expansion of Kewaskum Frozen Foods, noted Nigh. "Our plan for the operation is to become actively engaged in promoting pizza sales for

fundraisers." Any group or organization that would like information on using pizza sales for a fundraiser can call 626-2710.

The pizzas will be made at Kewaskum Frozen Foods in Kewaskum. They will be offering cheese and sausage, cheese, sausage and mushroom, and a deluxe with pepper, mushroom and onions. "We also have a meatless, garden pizza consisting of cheese, green and red peppers, onions and mushrooms on a whole wheat crust. We will be making both the 9-inch and 12-inch pizzas, however, the small pizzas are primarily made for places such as taverns.

People will have an opportunity to try our new products," said Nigh. "We will be offering free samples during Kewaskum Kraze-Daze."

## Former Kewaskum Resident Buys Building

### Rosenheimer's Building Saved From Demolition

The building which housed the Rosenheimer Department Store for over seventy-five years has been saved from destruction and given a chance at new life.

Earlier this year it was decided the building would be torn down after attempts to sell the property had failed. Demolition had begun and it looked like the big red brick building, constructed in the early 1900's, would follow the same fate as the old Kewaskum Bank building, reduced to a pile of rubble.

A strange turn of events, however, has given the building a reprieve. Jeanne (Yeadeke) Griep of Mayville said her husband Tom came home after having passed through Kewaskum not long ago. He casually mentioned to her that the big old department store was being torn down. Griep asked just which building he meant and he said Rosenheimer's.

Mrs. Griep, who lived in Kewaskum until she was 16, said she remembered shopping in the store. "I just couldn't see letting the building be torn down." So, after some negotiating, they managed to halt the demolition and buy the building.

Work actively began last week to give the building a new lease on life and a new name. No major changes are planned for the exterior, however, the interior is being remodeled to house a new business which Griep is starting. She will be selling antiques and collectibles. The building's new name will be The General Store Antique Mall.

Griep expects to have the store open by the end of July. She and her husband also own a painting and decorating business and real estate brokerage office in Mayville.

"Contrary to rumors," said Griep, "we won't be constructing any apartments in the building."



Road construction was expected to resume the week of June 15, 1987 on the reconstruction of CTH 'M' adjacent to the new bridge over

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

# Naturalist Program at the Ice Age National Scientific Reserve

**NORTHERN KETTLE MORAINE STATE FOREST AND THE HENRY S. REUSS ICE AGE VISITOR CENTER**

The Center is administered by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources under review of the National Park Service. It opened in January of 1981 for the purpose of introducing and orienting visitors to the Ice Age National Scientific Reserve, whose goal in turn is "to assure protection preservation and interpretation of the nationally significant values of Wisconsin's continental glaciation." The center is not and should not be considered a museum. The museum is the 40,000 glacial landscaped acres constituting the nine individual units comprising the Reserve.

Upon entering the Center, attention is quickly drawn to a large mural depicting an artist's interpretation of a scene of the area 10,000 - 12,000 years ago when the last major advance of ice was melting. It is suggested before viewing the exhibits, to watch the excellent interpretive film "Night Of The Sun" (20 minutes in length) shown every hour and half-hour. The exhibit area presents some interesting facts and concepts about the Ice Age, while the view from the deck interprets several visible landscape formations.

This area is famous nationally for its internationally glacial features and interesting array of plants and animals. You are invited to learn more about this important part of our heritage by visiting the Henry S. Reuss Ice Age Visitor Center and participating in the Naturalist Program.

During the summer the naturalist program offers nature walks, talks, auto tours, evening programs, visiting guest speakers, etc. These events offered at the Center or the Mauthe Lake and Long Lake Recreational Areas are easy and enjoyable to learn more about the area. During the remainder of the year group interpretive programs are available upon request.

The Center is located one mile south of the Village of Dundee on State Hwy. 67 in the Northern Kettle Moraine State Forest.

A self-guided 40 mile geology tour and short self-guiding nature trail "The Moraine Ridge Trail" originate at the Center. Guidebooks for both are available in the Center. There are also two other self-guiding nature trails within the forest.

The Center is open year-round (except for major holidays) Monday thru Friday (8:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.) and Saturday and Sunday (9:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.). The mailing address is Box 410, Campbellsport, WI 53010. Telephone No. 414-533-8322. Although no admission is



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

## PORNOGRAPHY: A GROWING EPIDEMIC

### Editors Note:

The following essay won second place in a contest sponsored by the "Washington County Citizens for Decency through Law."

Aime Bast, 187 Paradise Dr., West Bend, a junior attending West Bend West High School, received this award for her well written and informative article on the assigned subject, the "Harmful Effects of pornography."

Pornography: a "victimless crime;" harmless literature that keeps a few dirty old men out of mischief. True or false? There are many people who actually believe this statement to be true. Most are ignorant of the fact that every year the pornography industry is rapidly growing. Annually it accumulates over seven billion dollars in profits. It is the third largest money-maker for organized crime, with only drugs and gambling grossing more dollars. It is time for our country to awaken to the impending destruction that is threatening every facet of our society due to national ignorance and naivete regarding the harmful effects or pornography.

Pornography abounds not only in literature, but also in theaters and on home videos. Its content ranges anywhere from seemingly harmless photos or suggestive bed scenes to extremely explicit sex depicting lewd, unnatural acts. Not only do these scenes portray adults, but often young children. In fact, according to a Los Angeles police officer, about thirty thousand children in Southern California alone are being sexually exploited for the sake of pornography. Every week some 780 theaters featuring X-rated movies attract two million viewers. In addition, more than four hundred different pornographic publications are sold in the United States from coast to coast.

All this, and we still wonder why sex crimes are becoming a major problem! In almost every single sex crime, the apprehended offender is found to have been involved in major hard core pornography. More often than not, he is acting out something he has either seen or read. Because the rate of sex crimes is growing, the health of public citizens is becoming endangered. Sexually transmitted illnesses such as venereal disease and AIDS are becoming epidemic in our nation. Could there be a connection? Not only is the physical health of our citizens being jeopardized, but also

their psychological health. Most victims of rape can testify that it has taken them years to get over their emotional and physical degradation. Some never completely recover.

Communities that are plagued by smut shops soon become unsafe for the public and degenerate into high crime neighborhoods. One police officer in Schenectady, N.Y. gave this pointed description. "The bookstores came first. Then came prostitution. Then came street crime." The media is full of accounts of people who have been sexually violated and often killed.

Children especially seem to be the victims of exploitation. According to New York's Women Against Pornography, 25% of all rape victims are children under the age of twelve, and 50% are under 18 years of age. Children who go through this experience often fail to adjust normally when they reach adolescence. Similarly, adolescents in frequent contact with pornographic materials are sexually very immature. Because of intense stimulation through reading and viewing sexually explicit material, sexual growth so to speak, is stunted before normal maturation has a chance to develop. Often males are sated with sex before ideals can be established in their relationships with females. Hence they view women with contempt or disgust or as objects of pleasure.

Young girls who engage in intercourse before they are sexually mature, lose pride in their femininity and fail to develop their female psychology. In short, pornography is devastating to young people who are still a little confused with the mysteries of

their own sexuality.

Not only do people who indulge themselves in pornography harm others, but they often become their own victims. One grieving mother tells of her fifteen year old son who was found hanging. At first the police thought he had committed suicide. However, after an investigation, three pages from a pornographic magazine were found in his room. On them were instructions explaining how to perform a particular method of autoerotism. The person was supposed to hang himself until he had reached the state where he was sexually aroused. When this point was reached, the noose was to be untied. This young man never got to unfasten the noose which he had fashioned from his mother's pantyhose.

Although many people are victimized by pornography, women are most vulnerable because they are often portrayed as objects whose sexual fulfillment is dependent on physical abuse. In fact, new studies are linking pornography to attitudes of violence towards women.

Ultimately, however, everyone falls victim to this pernicious industry. By over-emphasizing sensuality and brutality, pornography reduces love to mere sex. It reveals to the public's eye intimacies once thought private and sacred, resulting in the erosion of morality through long-term exposure which gradually increases in intensity, always leaving the individual with a desire for more.

Divorce is a vivid example of this phenomenon. Up until the mid 1900's, divorce was rare. Those breaking the marriage contract were often

ostracized from community life. As divorce became a popular means of escape or a way out of difficulties in a marriage, it gradually became an accepted practice in our society. The same thing is happening with pornography. It is slowly being accepted as a part of our culture, insidiously corrupting the moral values of our country.

Because many people do not know how much harm pornography can do, they become more and more deeply involved in it and soon find they are hopelessly addicted to its erotic stimulation. As a result, many become victims of this "victimless crime" and are left with physical and emotional scars for the rest of their lives.

Pornography: a "victimless crime;" harmless literature that keeps a few dirty old men out of mischief. True or false? Don't be deceived!





**Governor Thompson's Workfare Proposal Would Offer Necessary Welfare Reform**

There is an old Indian proverb that if you give a man a fish, he eats for a day. Teach a man to fish, and he eats for a lifetime.

That proverb is the basic idea behind Governor Tommy Thompson's workfare proposal. Rather than having the state simply give money to people, Governor Thompson has proposed using some of that money for job training. That way, the people currently on welfare could learn the skills necessary to get jobs and support themselves.

To pay for the workfare program, Governor Thompson proposed cutting welfare benefits by 6% and channeling the money saved into job training. When he presented this plan during the campaign last year, many Democrats supported it. Now that Tommy Thompson is Governor,

however, those same Democrats are criticizing the plan they once supported.

When the Governor's workfare plan came before the Legislature's Joint Finance Committee a few weeks ago, the Democrats defeated the 6% welfare cut and a subsequent compromise amendment of a 3% cut. In fact, those of us in support of the Governor's proposal had all we could do to stop an increase in welfare benefits! In the end, the Joint Finance Committee settled on a 1% reduction in welfare benefits and reduced funding for the Governor's workfare program from \$14.3 million per year to only \$5.3 million per year.

Ironically, those legislators who objected most strenuously to the Governor's workfare proposal were those representing the inner city — those people who would benefit most from a workfare program.

Thanks to the actions of the Joint Finance Committee, the Governor's workfare program appears in jeopardy. That's unfortunate because I believe the vast majority of Wisconsin residents support the Governor's proposal and want welfare reform.

Currently, Wisconsin taxpayers support a welfare system that ranks 6th out of all 50 states in providing the maximum monthly benefit for a family of four. Our average monthly AFDC payment to single-parent households is \$478; to two-parent households, \$588.

Taxpayers want and deserve to know that their money is well spent. Few would begrudge the State offering financial assistance to people who are physically unable to support themselves. But when a family has to receive welfare simply because the parent does not have the training necessary to get a job, the state isn't solving the problem by making monthly support payments to the family. As Governor Thompson

recommended, the state should educate these people so they are able to get jobs and support themselves. Not only would we be saving the taxpayers money, but we would be giving current welfare recipients the self-esteem their lack of training has stolen from them.

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


