More Money Needed for Countywide Library System

While the Washington County Board recently recommended a 10% increase in its financial support of the countywide library system next year, one of the member communities, West Bend, has already indicated it is seeking \$260,000 or a 44% increase for its library's services.

County Supervisor Daniel Stoffel, who is chairman of the County Library Services Board, feels the county will have to make some increase in its support of the system if it is to survive. The board's recommendation, however, would only see funding increased from \$180,000 to \$198,000 for the entire program next year, far below the amount West Bend officials alone are seeking to provide services to county residents.

It is calculated that costs range between \$1.23 and \$3.00 for each item checked out of a county system library. Officials of these communities furnishing the services contend they are subsidizing these services to the non-residents because the

county only pays 87c of the cost per circulated item. The proposed increase would raise the county's share closer to \$1.00.

West Bend's Library Director, John Reid, has indicated the new system is costing the city more than it is getting. His library served more than half or 51,460 of the nonresident patrons who used county libraries during the first six months of the system's existence.

The City of Hartford has also made a request for more funds. It has requested \$210,000 to help it fund the services it provides to county library users.

The system is a little better than half way through the first year of a three-year trial program in the county. Along with West Bend and Hartford, libraries in Germantown, Kewaskum and Slinger have also been providing library service to residents living outside their communities. In exchange for that service, the county taxes users living outside those communities and distributes that money to the libraries, based on the usuage each receives from those nonresident patrons.

Stoffel acknowledges that a compromise is necessary to keep the system alive, however, he feels library officials know the county is facing the same budgeting problems as everyone else, and it is unlikely that the county will come up with the kind of money being requested.

County residents who have not previously had the services of a library, except through the purchase of non-resident cards. are expected to use 200,000 pieces of library material this year. Earlier, that usage had been projected at 175,000.

Village of Kewaskum trustee Richard Schmidt, who serves on the federated system board, has told the Kewaskum Village Board that it must look into ways of attracting more rural patrons to use its facility. The more people who use the library, the more funding it will receive, noted Schmidt. We have to keep bringing it to everyone's attention that we can provide the very same materials found in West Bend, Hartford, etc.

JBJ Contractors of Menomonee Falls submitted a bid of \$114,879, HIS Corporation, Hartford, bid \$110,475, and Eagle Construction of Kewaskum came in with a bid of \$103,200. The bids were turned over to Bob Skatrud of Reukert & Mielke for his firm's review and recommendations.

The bid is expected to be awarded at the board's next meeting on August 31st.

In other action the board approved a liquor license, running to June 31, 1988, to Valera McDonald, 215 Main Street, and a bartender's

license for Gordon Wilhelmi. The board also approved the hiring of Kitty Hlavaty as Library Director. Hlavaty had been assistant librarian. She will replace Evangeline Teeselink who is retiring. The position of assistant librarian will now be advertised.

Police Pursuit Ends in Crash

Keith D. Bauer, 20, of 13-101, Route #1, Adell, sustained severe head and internal injuries as the result of an accident when he tried to elude a Sheboygan County police car Sunday evening.

A Sheriff's Department spokesman said the accident occurred at 8:47 p.m. at the intersection of Highways S and A, in Beechwood.

Deputy Inspector John Hoffmann said the report indicated a patrol car traveling down Highway 28, noticed two motorcycles pull off to the side of the road. One bike appeared to be having mechanical

problems.

As the squad pulled up behind the motorcycles, one of the riders looked back, seeing the squad he (Bauer) started his machine spinning gravel and stones at the car and then taking off. The second cyclist pulled to the shoulder and stopped.

The sheriff's deputy pursued Bauer for approximately six miles in the direction of Beechwood. Witnesses at the crash scene said Bauer was traveling between 50 and 60 miles per hour and accelerating rapidly when he went through the stop sign on S, crossing A. willing to help.

The item of additional restroom facilities at the Middle School was discussed. When Boehlke told the committee the cost would run close to \$5,000 plus the cost of mirrors, dispensers, etc., District Administrator Penny Kleinhans questioned whether there really was a need to justify the large cost

Kleinhans noted both she and Director of Instruction, Julie Backus, had to talked to the teachers and had not gotten any comments that would indicate there was an actual need for the additional facilities. "No one seems to think there is a shortage of restrooms'' said Kleinhans. She suggested Backus watch the situation for the first nine weeks and report back with her findings.

The committee discussed disposition of the remaining State Trust Fund loan money. Business Manager, Cherna Gorder, said after the Wayne well repairs were paid for, there would be approximately \$9,000 left. Some projects suggested exceeded the funds left.

Kleinhans said she would rather see the money used to cover the cost of some unexpected repairs and equipment replacement such as the possibility of having to replace a problem water softener at WES. She also suggested that a portion of the money be used to replace curtains at Farmington which are in very poor condition. The committee agreed to recommend the curtain

In reference to carpet replacement at KES and KHS. Boehlke advised the committee

that the carpeting was being done in special education rooms and the funding was coming out of government special ed grant money.

Boehlke also went over bids received for restroom repair at the high school. The committee had some questions on items included in the bids so they directed Boehlke to go back for clarification on the cost and some of the materials being furnished.

The committee also directed Boehlke to go ahead with necessary playground repairs at Beechwood School in compliance with an inspection report submitted by Wausau Insurance Company

Gorder informed the group that she had been contacted by a company which offered to do an energy study at no cost to the district related to Wisconsin Electric's Smart Money Energy program.

The committee felt that if there was no cost to the district, she should go ahead with the offer and see what kind of recommendation the company comes up with which could earn the district a rebate from Wisconsin Electric.

Trapp asked whether the district had looked into resurfacing the tennis courts. Boehlke said the cost to do the work was estimated at \$34,000 two years ago. Kleinhans noted, when we found out how exhorbitant the cost would be, we just felt we could not justify spending that kind of money when we have higher priority needs.

The committee will present all its recommendations at the next regularly scheduled meeting of the school board.

ORDINANCE NO. 87-6 ORDINANCE CONCERNING GARBAGE AND REFUSE DISPOSAL

THE TOWN BOARD OF THE TOWN OF WAYNE, WASHINGTON COUNTY, WISCONSIN, ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. GARBAGE AND REFUSE DISPOSAL REGULATED. It shall be unlawful for any person to dump, transfer or deposit garbage or other refuse of any kind in the town except as provided in this ordinance. Beginning September 19, 1987, the refuse transfer station and collection facilities established at 6030 Highway H shall be the only authorized garbage and refuse disposal facility in the town.

Section 2. USE OF TRANSFER STATION. The use of the transfer station is limited to residents of the town and its use by all others is prohibited.

Section 3. PERMIT REQUIRED. (1) Application. Application for a transfer station permit shall be made on a form provided by the town clerk and shall list the name and address, vehicle description and vehicle license number of the applicant. Upon receipt of an application and verification of the information contained in it, the clerk shall provide the applicant with a sticker which shall be attached to the windshield of the vehicle to be used to transport garbage and refuse to the transfer station.

(2) Fee. The fee for dumping garbage or other refuse at the transfer station shall be \$.50 per bag of garbage or refuse or bundle of newspapers of comparable size, to be collected by the town attendant on duty. Burning barrels will also be accepted at a fee set by the attendant on duty.

Section 4. HOURS OF OPERATION. No dumping or admission to the transfer station site shall be permitted except on Saturdays between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. When a particular Saturday falls on a legal holiday, the transfer station shall be closed and an alternate day and time for dumping shall be posted at the site.

Section 5. MATERIALS RESTRICTED. Any holder of a permit granted under this ordinance may dispose of any acceptable material at the transfer station site in a manner directed by the town attendant on duty at the site.

2. Acceptable material which may be disposed of at the transfer station site is limited to the following:

(a) Household garbage, rubbish and refuse, provided it is contained in plastic bags suitable for that purpose.

(b) Newspapers and other waste papers, provided they are contained in plastic bags suitable for that purpose or tied into bundles.

(c) Such other materials as the town attendant on duty at the site shall determine, in his sole discretion, to be acceptable.3 It shall be unlawful for any person to dispose of any unacceptable.

table materials at the refuse transfer station site. Unacceptable materials include, but are not limited to the following:

(a) Materials which do not comply with sub. (2) above.
(b) Building materials, including debris resulting from

construction or demolition.

(c) Dead animals.

(d) Motor vehicles or parts thereof, machinery or parts thereof and related equipment.
(e) Stones.

(f) Tree limbs, shrubbery, brush, wood materials, grass or leaves.
(g) Toxic and hazardous wastes such as explosives, acids, pathological wastes, radioactive materials, flammable materials and other chemical or liquid waste which require special handling and disposal to protect the environment.
(h) Large household appliances such as refrigerators, stoves, washers and drvers, etc.

Section 6. PENALTY. Any person who shall be found guilty of violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be required to pay a forfeiture of not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$200.00 together with the costs of prosecution, and, in default of the payment of such forfeiture, shall be incarcerated in the Washington County jail until such forfeiture and all costs, including subsequent costs, have been paid, but not for a period exceeding 30 days.

Section 7. EFFECTIVE DATE. This ordinance shall, in accordance with sec. 60.80(2), Stats., take effect the day after its publication as a Class 1 notice under ch. 985, Stats.

Peter Ayer Seeking National Masters Outdoor Diving Championship

Six years ago, a motorcycle accident had left Peter Ayer as what he describes as "a bag of bones in a hospital.

At that time, he recalls, doctors had assessed his shattered ankles and massive injuries and "figured if I could get up and walk over to change the knobs on a TV set, that was all I could expect."

From Aug. 28 to 30, Ayer will be at Orlando, Fla., seeking to become the National Masters Outdoor Diving champion in the men's 60-to-69 age bracket. In 1981, several weeks before his accident, he finished first in the 50-to-59 division.

Ayer, who turns 60 on Aug. 20, is associate professor of vocal music at the UW Center - Washington County. He has taught at UWWC since 1969. On Sept. 14, his Moraine Chorus begins its 19th year of rehearsals on campus. On Oct. 16 his Ayer Ensemble opens its ninth year of performances with a concert for the UWWC Fine Arts Series.

During the competition at Orlando, Ayer is scheduled to make 25 dives: seven dives on Friday in each of two competitions - one from the threemeter board and the other in a special contest between all former grand masters in the 50 through 69 age groups; seven on Saturday from one-meter high; and four on Sunday from the seven -and-a-half meter platform.

'This is the first time I've ever competed at that height," he said of the 25' platform. "I had practiced at that height, but the accident cut it short.

This summer Ayer has been traveling to Milwaukee to resume his preparations. In addition, he has been bike riding and playing handball for aerobic conditioning and diving in his home pool and at the West Bend YMCA.

Ayer's inspiration in his return to competition has been retired diving champion Cecil Bush of Akron, Ohio, who turned 82 this year.

Since the accident, Ayer said, Bush had urged him in letters and by phone to return to competition. "Even though you don't think you are as good as you were, you've got to get back in again," Bush told Ayer.

Despite his layoff from competition. Aver has worked on his diving. The most difficult obstacle to overcome has been his legs. His right is a half-inch shorter than the left. He has six screws and a plate in his right ankle and a long screw in his left.

"That makes it difficult to

six-or seven-year-old has to do his first dive backwards." He calls that "the big psychological barrier for beginning divers.

Ayer said, "I've seen some kids pick it up in two or three sessions. Some I've had for three summers that still can't do it because the instincts against it are so strong.

You're asking your body to do three things that we're born instinctively not to do for our own self-preservation - to hurl yourself into space, to hurl yourself upside down and to do it backwards.

For Ayer, the courage is in-keeping with the nature of diving. "It's a mental sport," he said, estimating that 90 percent of what he does involves things like "thinking of the sequences" involved.

Many of the satisfactions are mental. Ayer said, "I can't explain the feeling to you of taking off a seven-and-a-halfplatform, turning meter one-and-a-half sommersaults and going in the water right. There's no feeling like it.

Ayer began diving competitively in college. "But most of my dives I've learned since I got out of college," he said. 'I'm doing a couple of dives now that I hadn't heard of in the early Fifties in college. Olympic divers are doing dives now that were unthinkable even 15 years ago like the three-and-a-half reverse.

Ayer expects about 70 divers to be competing at Orlando. The one he wanted to see most won't be among them. Cecil Bush died Aug. 11 after a massive heart attack.

"He was always after me," Ayer remembers, saying, 'You've gotta come to the next meet.' But for two years, I was just trying to learn how to walk. Then last summer, for the first time, I thought it might be possible.

Recovering, like diving, he said, "is 90 percent mental, too.

Ayer said, "An accident like mine could be a great excuse to quit. I could have said, now I can never be world champ because of the accident."

Peter Ayer chose another route. "I think people are too willing to accept defeat," he said.

point my toes," he said, "and it also makes it hard to hurdle to take the last step before the spring.

Along with his own diving, he has continued a YMCA diving class for kids that he started before his accident. "I had 45 kids this year," he said. Last week they threw an early 60th birthday party for him on the pool deck at the end of the eight-week summer class.

Ayer sees diving as "a good confidence and self-image builder for young kids." He said, "It gives them a good feeling of having accomplished something that is challenging and requires hard work and skill and courage.

He finds that "the big courage thing" comes when "a
