On behalf of the Kewaskum Village Board and Kewaskum Historical Society which joined together to form Kewaskum's United States Constitution Bicentennial Committee, Dan Schmidt, Village Administrator and former president of the Historical Society, presented Bicentennial flags to representatives of Kewaskum's area school systems.

Flags marking the 200th birthday of the Constitution were presented to District Administrator Penny Kleinhans who accepted the gifts on behalf of the Kewaskum School District, Sister Phyllis Wirtz, principal, accepted for Holy Trinity Catholic School, and Mr. Rod Bollinger, principal, received a flag for St. Lucas Lutheran School.

Along with the flags, Schmidt provided informational

materials which will allow the schools to apply for various grants related to the bicentennial celebration of the Constitution.

The Village of Kewaskum was also recognized with an official plaque as one of the first seven communities in Wisconsin and one of the first two hundred communities in the United States to establish a United States Constitution Bicentennial Committee.

Smart Energy Program May Save District \$56,000 a Year

Board Okays School Roof Repairs

The Kewaskum School Board, Monday night, approved the recommendation of the Finance - Transportation - Buildings and Grounds Committee to go ahead with a two-year program to repair school roofs at Wayne Elementary, Kewaskum Elementary and the High School.

According to Buildings Superintendent Fred Boehlke, the total cost of the project is estimated to be about \$184,000. Boehlke told the board the recommendations cover areas which date back to 1966 or earlier, except a portion of the Wayne roof which dates back to 1975.

Finance Committee chairman Ron Theusch said his group had

no specific recommendations as to how the district should pay for the work. One suggestion was to take some of the money from the district's fund equity. Theusch noted there was still time to make a decision on the financing of the project. The urgency was on getting board approval of the project so the district could begin to get bids on the work. Both Boehlke and District Administrator Penny Kleinhans noted that it had taken several months to procure bids on past roofing projects.

According to the proposal, work would be done on the Wayne and Kewaskum schools in 1988 and on the high school in 1989.

The board also approved the committee's recommendation to replace stall dividers and outer doors for the boys and girls main hall restrooms at the high

school at a cost of \$4,336.

The committee's third recommendation was for the construction of additional parking space at the Farmington Elementary School at a cost of \$1,950. That recommendation also received approval.

Board member Clara Trapp, who is also a member of the Finance Committee, brought up the fact that repair of the high school tennis courts had been discussed at the committee's last meeting. "I want Mr. Boehlke to get bids on finishing those tennis courts and I want it put on the October agenda," said Trapp. At that same meeting Kleinhans had indicated that the issue of the tennis courts had been sidelined. She had indicated that because of the high cost, between \$35,000 to \$40,000,

In addition to advance sale tickets being accepted at all events, there will be many cash prizes awarded through special drawings. Ticket holders will not have to be present to win.

There will be trout fishing with the angler keeping the fish he catches. There will also be a grand prize for the person catching the largest fish.

Trap shooting contests are conducted throughout the day. Sportsmen may bring their own shotguns and ammunition if they wish. There will be a compound bow shoot. Archers who want to test their skills

should bring their own bows and target arrows. Successful marksmen will win a frozen turkey. There will also be archery and pistol ranges. In addition, there will be games for every member of the family.

Brats, hamburgers, hot and cold beverages will be available.

Kewaskum Woman Charged With Sexual Assault of Teen

Bonnie Zurn, 27, of 802 Memorial Drive, Kewaskum, has been formally charged with two counts of Second Degree Sexual Assault of a minor after a secret John Doe investigation revealed the woman had sexual contact at least fifteen times since February with a fourteen year old boy.

The first charge covers incidents which allegedly occurred between February 27th and March 4th. The second charge covers incidents which ended about April 12th. The second degree sexual assault charge was made because the boy is between 12 and 16 years of age.

Zurn was freed last Thursday on a \$5,000 personal recognizance bond. According to the complaint, Zurn had intercourse with the youth 15 and 16 times. The incidents are alleged to have occurred in her home. On April 12th, an unidentified third person reportedly interrupted Zurn and the boy while they were caressing and kissing each other.

Because of the nature of the charges, Assistant District Attorney Carol Petersen may ask that a preliminary hearing requested by Zurn's lawyer be closed to the public. According to the District Attorney's office, no decision has been made as yet on that point.

The charges against Zurn stem from testimony given during a July 16th secret John Doe hearing before Circuit Court Judge Richard T. Becker. Petersen requested that hearing on July 15th to allow additional facts to be brought forward which could aid in the investigation. The need to protect juvenile witnesses was cited as one of the reasons to keep the proceedings secret.

Zurn is scheduled to appear Monday, September 21st, before Reserve Circuit Judge David Dancey. The boy will be called upon to testify during that preliminary hearing.

Each count of second degree sexual assault carries a maximum penalty of a \$10,000 fine and a prison term of ten years.

The American Legion Post #384, of Kewaskum recently dedicated a plaque in memory of the post's namesake Robert George Romaine. Romaine was the first Washington County casualty of World War Two.

He was the eldest child of the late Ellwyn and Edna Romaine of Kewaskum. Romaine joined the Navy early in 1942, graduating from the Great Lakes Training Station, Illinois, in June 1942, as a signalman.

Romaine had been in service eight months when he was killed on October 29, 1942, along with fellow crewmembers while they were serving as an armed guard crew aboard an armed merchant cargo vessel. He was reportedly assigned as a gunner on the ship S.S. Pan. The ship was lost somewhere in

the North Atlantic Ocean when it was torpedoed and sunk by an enemy submarine. Romaine's body was never recovered.

Because there was no gravesite, the post requested the plaque and installed it in a place of honor at the base of the post's flagpole, alongside another plaque in memory of other servicemen who have faithfully served their country.

Seaman Second Class Robert G. Romaine was 24 years old when he died. He is survived by his brothers Richard of Sheboygan Falls, Curtis of Sarasota, Florida; sisters Lucille Hopkins of Bayfield, Colorado, Charlotte Faulkner, Stratford, New Jersey, and other relatives.

Clayton Stautz, Post Commander, was master of ceremonies for the dedication and Richard Stefanovic, Post Chaplain, read the prayer.

and limited use, previous committees had felt there were higher priority items where the money could be spent.

The committee scheduled its next meeting for October 19th.

Ruth Schmitt, chairman of the Policy-Legislation Committee went over the reading of several new and revised policies. As part of the legislative information, Kleinhans informed the board that the district had received an opinion from its legal counsel regarding the question of whether two proposed referendums would be binding on the school board. According to a letter from Mr. Michael Spector, a similar question is now being tried in the courts. However, since there has not been a decision handed down in such a matter, there is no precedent to which he could refer.

According to the letter, a school board may not delegate its duties, therefore, the results of any referendum would be strictly advisory and not binding on the board.

Theusch told the board that while he was not in favor of referendums, the issue of moving the sixth grade students and the Beechwood School closing had gotten to the point where the electors want to have their say. He moved to place the two issues on the spring ballot as advisory referendums. The motion was unanimously approved.

Business Manager Cherna reported on the possibility of the district participating in Wisconsin Electric's Smart Energy program. An energy audit done by Mr. Gene Bogard of Badger U.S.A., Baraboo, indicates that with various electrical and lighting modifications such as energy efficient ballasts and light bulbs, the district could realize approximately \$56,000 a year in energy cost savings.

The total cost of the project would be \$145,845.50, less a 56% or \$80,488 rebate from Wisconsin Electric, for a net cost to the district of \$64,357. The program could result in a yearly savings of \$56,000 in energy costs with full payback of the expenditure within less than two years.

Gorder was asked if the district could really realize such savings. She said the proposal would be sent to Wisconsin Electric for its review and approval of the district's rebate application. If we're not going to save any money I'm sure

Wisconsin Electric will tell us, that's what the whole program is about, she noted. Gorder was asked if she knew of any other areas who were involved in the program. She said Appleton had begun one and West Bend was also working on a similar program.

A motion to follow through on the program and rebate application was approved 6-0-1, with Trapp abstaining. The deadline for the program is December 31st.

The board also approved the purchase of a digital read-out for a high school shop milling machine at a cost of \$1,750, including installation.

The board and building principals discussed three options for setting up a smoking policy for the school district. High School Principal LeRoy Kopecky told the board, "we, (the principals) are not in a position to back one option more than another." He told the board more research is needed to make sure a policy is developed that can be enforced. "I think we really have to sit down with a few more folks and get their input. Before a policy goes into effect, we want to make very sure we have one we

can enforce" said Kopecky.

It was brought up that the West Bend schools have instituted a smoking policy. Kopecky said that was correct, however, he noted that West Bend also has a municipal code to help enforce their policy. "Then what we need is the cooperation of the village, police department and community" said board member Don Nowak.

The proposed policy was sent back to committee for more research and discussion.

In other business Kleinhans gave each principal a U.S. Constitution Bicentennial flag for their building. She thanked the village and Bicentennial Committee for their generosity in presenting the flags to the schools.

Kleinhans also thanked Dr. Edwards for his continuing efforts to the district in providing various types of health related information.

Kleinhans then congratulated Assistant High School Principal Roy Esser on his being selected to receive the national Honorary American Farmer Degree. It is the highest honor awarded by the Future Farmers of America. He will receive the award at the FFA's national convention in November.

The board then adjourned to closed session.

Surplus Food Distribution to Eligible Households on Saturday

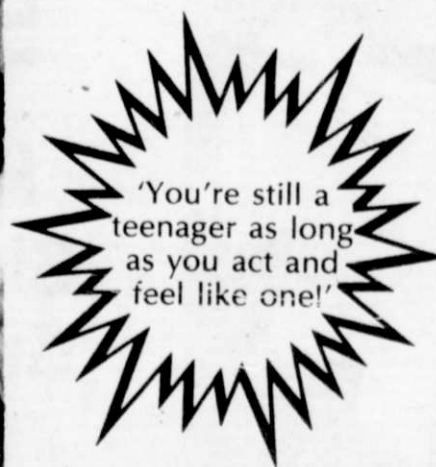

Main St.; Germantown, Senior Activity Center, W162 N11960 Park Ave.; Slinger, Village Hall, 220 Slinger Road; Allenton, Addison Town Hall, Village of Allenton; Kewaskum, Kewas-

kum High School, north entrance; and Jackson, Jackson Fire Department, S. Jackson Dr.

Eligibility is based on the current monthly gross income (before taxes) of all household members with the following limits: Household size 1, income limit \$688; 2, \$925; 3, \$1,162; 4, \$1,399; 5, \$1,636; 6, \$1,873; 7, \$2,110; 8, \$2,347; 9, \$2,584; 10, \$2,821.

naturalist Adlo Leopold at the forest's Ice Age Center.

Popular activities in the Northern forest this time of year, according to Forest Superintendent Walt Adams, are drives along the Kettle Moraine Scenic Drive and apple, plum, and hickory nut gathering. A few species of mushroom also draw out collectors in fall.

In the Southern Unit-Kettle Moraine State Forest near Eagle, the hike-a-thon will start at 10 a.m. from Scuppernong hiking trail. Participants can park in the Scuppernong trail parking lot. They will walk south on the forest segment of the Ice Age Trail for 10 miles to the Southern Unit headquarters where a shuttle system will be available to return them to their cars. Nature films and slide shows will be shown during the day at the headquarters building.

Kettle Moraine State Forest Plans Free Open House Oct. 3

Northern and Southern units of Kettle Moraine State Forest are planning a free-admission open house October 3. It will coincide with an Ice Age Trail fundraiser scheduled the same day at the forests and elsewhere around the state.

Visitors also will be admitted without vehicle admission stickers October 3 at two other Kettle Moraine state properties: Lapham Peak Unit - Kettle Moraine State Forest and Pike Lake State Park near Hartford. Camping fees will remain in effect at all state recreation sites.

The Kettle Moraine fall open house, enabling visitors to view early fall colors, is intended to promote "good will and

neighborliness," according to Edgar W. Trecker, Jr., Southeast District DNR parks supervisor.

"It's our way of saying thank you to our regular guests," said Trecker. "Also, there is the opportunity for others who are unfamiliar with the Kettle Moraine area state parks and forests to sample what these have to offer."

In addition to the Ice Age Trail event, special activities are being planned for the day at Kettle Moraine recreation sites. Pike Lake State Park will offer a fall-color nature hike at 1 p.m. October 3, starting from the picnic area. Lapham Peak Unit will conduct guided hikes at intervals during the day.

On 11 Ice Age Trail segments in Wisconsin, including those in the Kettle Moraines, hikers will walk as much as 16 miles to earn pledge funds to be used to complete the 1,000-mile Wisconsin Ice Age Trail. The fundraiser is sponsored by the

Ice Age Park and Trail Foundation.

The foundation hopes to raise \$500,000 this year, \$400,000 from the hike-a-thon and the remainder from business contributions. This is the first year of what sponsors expect to be a 10-year annual hike-a-thon event.

Each participating Ice Age Trail chapter around the state is seeking 200 hikers for simultaneous outings. Hikers are signing up sponsors who will contribute \$1 for each mile walked. Three-quarters of the proceeds will be divided between the chapters for trail projects and the stewardship fund of the trail organization for advancement of the Ice Age Trail.

In southeastern Wisconsin, participants can contact these trail coordinators: Waukesha County, Dave Hock, (414) 367-8141; Washington and Ozaukee Counties, Kathy and Jim Vortagel, (414) 377-8456, and Sheboygan County, David Rautmann, (414) 786-4210 or (414) 784-4588.

In the Northern Kettle Moraine, near Campbellsport,

the hike will begin at 9 a.m. at County Highway P in Glenbeulah. It will cover about 10 miles of the forest's Glacial Trail which coincides with the route of the Ice Age Trail, ending at State Highway 67.

Other activities planned in the Northern Unit that day are a nature hike, a geology tour, and a slide program on Wisconsin

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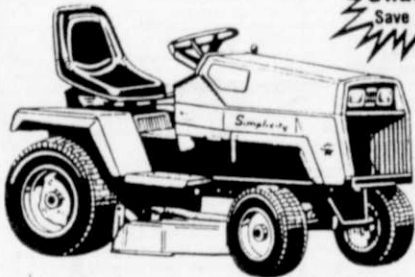

1987 Kewaskum Area United Way Kicks Off; School District Employees Pledge Over \$3,800

Last Thursday, Sept. 10, the Kewaskum Area United Way kicked off the 1987 campaign. At the meeting the board and the division captains watched a United Way promotional film. Kim Peterson and Jerry Gosa, co-chairmen for the drive, then introduced the board and the division captains and presented each with a United Way volunteer pin. After the introductions, another film on how to conduct a successful drive was shown. Much discussion

followed and strategies were developed to ensure that the goal of \$32,000 would be reached.

The Division captains and their respective areas are as follows: Jim Moran and Mark Meister, industrial; Sue and Ron Schmitz, professional; David Nigh, retail; Paul Behring, restaurant; Ruth Ramel, rural mailings; Tom Larsen, outlying businesses; Tom Herriges, transportation; William

Jerry Gosa reported that the drive had already gotten off to a very good start. The teachers, administrators and support staff, including secretaries, cooks, and maintenance personnel of the Kewaskum School District, pledged over \$3,800 at the annual breakfast held at the start of the school year. The percent participation of these employees exceeded 70%.

Teachers of Kewaskum School District Seek Contract Settlement

The teachers employed by the School District of Kewaskum engaged in a "work to rule action" from August 26 through September 8, 1987. In this action, teachers did not stay in their buildings beyond their assigned hours in order to demonstrate their unified desire for a voluntary contract settlement.

The "work to rule" action has been successful in that it has alerted school board members and the public to teacher dissatisfaction over starting yet another year without a contract settlement. Further actions are currently under consideration.

The Kewaskum staff members have not begun the school year with an agreement for approximately 10 years, with

the exception of the one year which was part of a two-year package. This lack of a stressful situation for those under contract with the district.

The Kewaskum teachers continue to give 100% of themselves and their professional expertise to the district's students. They seek community support of their desire for an agreement, and ask that members of the public contact their elected officials regarding a speedy settlement. The KEA is presently awaiting a reply from the school board regarding a date for the first negotiation session.

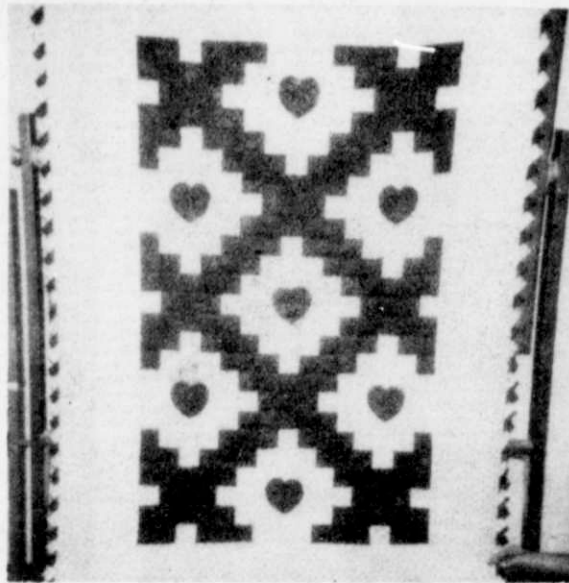

A flag-raising ceremony and U. S. Constitution Bicentennial opened the 13th annual Early Farm Days celebration sponsored by the Kewaskum Historical Society. The event took place Sunday on the Society grounds in River Hill Park.

The flag and flagpole were presented to the Society in memory of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Hepe by their daughter, Ruth Held; by their granddaughters Nancy Harwood and Colleen Messana, and by family and friends.

Kewaskum was home to the Hepe's for many years. Mrs. Hepe was a native daughter, and her roots ran deep, for her ancestors were among the early settlers of the village of Kewaskum. Before her marriage, she was a teacher in one-room schools in the area. A lifelong Kewaskum resident, she passed away in 1982 at the age of 91.

A native of Hartford, Mr. Hepe came to Kewaskum in

1912 to be employed by the H. J. Lay Lumber Company as a bookkeeper. Later, he and Mrs. Hepe owned and operated Hepe's Delicatessen on Main Street. Tucked in one corner of the business was what was known then as "an ice cream parlor."

In 1934, he was appointed postmaster of Kewaskum by President Franklin D. Roosevelt, a position he held until his retirement on Dec. 31, 1956. During his 22-year tenure, he served under Presidents Roosevelt, Truman and Eisenhower.

Through the years, Mr. Hepe was active in community affairs. He served on both the village board and the election board and he was a sports enthusiast. In his younger years, he was a baseball pitcher; later he sponsored a basketball team known as "Hepe's Pirates." He passed away in 1978 at the age of 89.

Although it started out on a very wet, dreary note, the celebration ended up with the

brisk cool air and sunshine of a true autumn day in the country.

People from throughout the area toured the restored log house, looked at exhibits in the museum and watched tactical maneuvers performed by members of the Second U.S. Cavalry Reenactment Group.

After walking around the various exhibits, which ranged from a working blacksmith at his forge to youngsters shelling corn, one's appetite could be satisfied with a good helping of the society's traditional fall

harvest stew followed by delicious homemade desserts.

Visitors were also entertained by members of the Kettle Moraine Square Dancers club.

A special attraction at the museum this year is a miniature reproduction of the Norbert Heise home in Beechwood. The replica was constructed by Mr. Heise and his late wife and is furnished in detail.

The original home in Beechwood is now occupied by Heise's son Mark and his family.

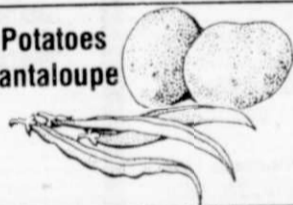
Jan Ford, associate director of student services, said, "We have some real hot-off-the-press type films this year."

Carl S. Pick Plaque to Be Dedicated at UWVC

A plaque commemorating Carl S. Pick will be dedicated at 4 p.m., Thursday, Sept. 24, between the entrances to the University of Wisconsin - Washington County and Ridge Run Park.

The plaque will be located on the west side of University Drive in a landscaped area.

An inscription on the plaque will recognize Pick for his vision in preserving the land where the 87-acre campus and county park are located.

Pick owned the land from 1939 until his death in 1959 at age 70. In 1967, the land was purchased by Washington County for the campus and park.

Discussions on placing a plaque began on Feb. 25, 1986, when Carl's son, Robert B. Pick, Sr., asked the UWVC Board of Commissioners to consider a campus memorial. The board agreed unanimously to recommend the action to the Washington County Board and West Bend Common Council.

On March 10, the county board voted to authorize "a suitable memorial" to Pick. The city added its endorsement on April 6. Both votes were unanimous and noted that the memorial would involve no cost to either county or city.

At a July 21 meeting, the Washington County Historical Society gave its unanimous approval to the concept of the memorial.

The plaque will be similar to those in front of the Washington House, Old Settlers Park and the old courthouse park. A Marietta, Ohio, firm began work on the plaque in July.

Speaking at the dedication will be UWVC Dean Robert Thompson, Washington County Board Chairman Reuben Schmah, West Bend Mayor Mike Miller and William Oelhafen, president of the historical society. Acting as master of ceremonies will be

Jack Anderson, director of public information and continuing education coordinator at UWVC.

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Bow Deer Season To Open Saturday

The 1987 bow deer season is scheduled to open on Saturday, September 19 according to Bill Ishmael, Wildlife Manager for the Department of Natural Resources at Pike Lake.

"It should be another excellent year," Ishmael said. He commented that last winter's mild weather brought the herd through in good shape and that fawn production and antler growth should be very good. Also, Ishmael noted that this year's acorn crop is abundant and deer will likely weigh a few more pounds than average from feeding heavily on acorns.

Dale Katsma, Wildlife Manager at Plymouth pointed out that recent rains and warm

temperatures have brought out the mosquitoes in droves and unless a frost occurs before the 19th hunters should prepare to deal with them.

The season will run through Sunday, November 15; close for the gun deer season, then reopen on Saturday, December 5 and continue through Thursday, December 31.

Ishmael reminded archers that deer killed during the bow season must be registered by 5 p.m. the day after it was killed. Until it is registered, deer can't be removed from the county or adjoining county in which it was killed, he added.
