Kewaskum School District to Receive Federal AOD Grant

District Administrator Penelope Kleinhans has announced that the Kewaskum School District will receive a \$5,316.00 grant to fund an alcohol and other drug (AOD) program aimed at increasing awareness of the problem, preventative measures and providing support to affected or concerned persons.

According to Superintendent Kleinhans the Kewaskum project has four aspects designed into it: 1) continuation of the implementation of a developmentally based K-5 guidance program promoting good self-concept, communication skills, self awareness and drug prevention skills; 2) development and presentation of puppet-based shows by the KHS Peer Listening group on issues related to family, peer and individual AODA problems, (in grades 4 and 5); 3) integration of two three-hour sessions related to family, peer and individual AODA for KMS students and; 4) attendance by staff at Quest program inservices to obtain and develop middle school drug prevention curriculum into existing health and home economics units for 7th graders and add a new Quest related 9-week program for 6th graders, all to be supplemented by parent sessions.

Kleinhans stressed that the district will continue to work with the local Lion's Club in the area of the Quest program and with the Washington County Council on Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse for Peer Listening training and sharing staff resources.

The grant is made available under the federal Drug-Free Schools and Communities Act of 1986 to promote the development of effective AOD prevention and education programs in the nation's schools. Wisconsin school districts are eligible to receive approximately \$2 for every student between 5 and 17 years of age residing within district boundaries for the 1987-88 school year. Additional funds may be appropriated for the 1988-89 and 1989-90 school years.

"These funds will enhance the services provided by the many excellent AOD prevention and education programs across Wisconsin," said State Superintendent of Instruction Herbert Grover. "Too, they will help new and innovative programs get off the ground."

Missing Farmington Man Located in Illinois

After almost a week had passed since he was reported missing, a Town of Farmington man was located Tuesday, in an Illinois restaurant.

Washington County Sheriff's Department Detective Lt. Robert Schulteis, who has been investigating the case, said late Tuesday morning that Karl W. Fickler, 53, of 681 Highway 84, was located in a Randy's Restaurant in Des Plaines, Illinois.

According to preliminary information, Fickler had been at the restaurant since last Saturday. After talking with Fickler, the restaurant-owner contacted Hydraulic Gear, Inc. and informed them where the man and his truck were.

Arrangements were being made to bring Fickler and the truck, load in-tact, back to West Bend.

Schulteis said details were still sketchy and there was no information available at this time as to where Fickler had been from the time he was reported missing until Saturday when he showed up at the DesPlaines restaurant.

Local and national authorities had been searching for Fickler after he had failed to make a delivery last Wednesday at a Franklin Park, Illinois company and was reported missing.

Investigators had been seeking information on Fickler's disappearance. According to Schulteis, Fickler, a part-time employe of Hydraulic Gear, had left the West Bend firm about 9:00 a.m. last Wednesday with a flatbed loaded with hydraulic

components for a company in Franklin Park, Illinois. Fickler never arrived at his destination nor was he heard from.

According to Hydraulic Gear's owner Carl Johnson, Fickler had been expected back in West Bend about 5 or 6 p.m. that same day. A missing persons report with Fickler's and the truck's description was entered into the nationwide law enforcement computer system notifying agencies across the country to be on the lookout for Fickler and the truck.

In a phone conversation Tuesday morning, Fickler's mother with whom he lived, feared for her son. "He was always glad to get home after he made that trip to Illinois." She had felt that if her son was able, he would have tried to contact her.

Student Assistance Program Becoming a Reality

One of the goals of the A.O.D.A. (Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse) program as outlined in policies adopted by the Board of Education last spring was the development of SAP (Student Assistance Program).

The program is based on the understanding "that students can experience a number of personal, behavioral / medical problems which can have an adverse affect on their behavior, conduct, or academic performance in school."

One successful method for dealing with students experiencing problems is utilization of support groups. To help achieve that, a group of teachers, counselors and administrators received special training this past summer during an intensive series of two 3-day workshops designed to help them act as group facilitators. The training was provided by a nationally recognized agency from Madison, PICADA (Prevention and Intervention Center for Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse).

Beginning second semester the first support groups will be organized and begin operation

for grades six through twelve. Eventually groups will also be available for younger students.

The groups are for any student who wishes more information on how alcohol and other drug abuse affects them and, as noted above in the quote from Board Policy #5142.2, to provide support for students experiencing other personal, behavioral or medical problems. Groups can also include "concerned persons," those not experiencing a problem themselves but trying to cope with someone who is.

The groups will meet during the school day and include from six to eight interested students. The trained facilitator, who will promote development of a safe atmosphere for each meeting, will be in attendance. In order to create a safe atmosphere, the basic ground rule in the groups will be strict confidentiality.

Students will be able to choose to enter groups voluntarily, (self-referred) or may in some cases be referred by a staff member or other family member.

The members of the AODA committee and administrators will be sponsoring a meeting or two in January for all interested

persons to explain more in detail about support groups. Watch for information giving exact dates and times.

We are very excited about finally getting started actively in this most critical area of student need. We hope you'll join us for the upcoming informational meetings on the SAP and support groups in particular. The program needs a joint effort involving support from the home and community.

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UWVC Expansion to Carry Estimated \$2.1 Million Pricetag

An estimated \$2.1 million pricetag has been established as the bottom-line cost for meeting all space needs at the University of Wisconsin Center - Washington County.

City and county officials are scheduled to receive a detailed report on costs in December from Strang Partners, Inc., a Madison architectural firm.

Strang developed its estimates in conjunction with the UWVC Board of Commissioners, the county-city group that oversees the construction and maintenance of campus facilities. On Nov. 20, the commissioners voted 8-0 to endorse the architects' report and send it on to the Dec. 7 Common Council and Dec. 8 Washington County Board meetings.

In endorsing the report, the commissioners agreed unanimously to recommend that expansion be carried out as a

single project rather than in phases. A three-step construction program had been presented as a possible alternative by the architects. The additional costs of such a phase-in were estimated at \$221,100.

No action was expected at the December meetings by either body. The commissioners agreed that more time will be needed for officials to study the architects' report.

According to the architects, the major costs are \$1.3 million for building construction to provide more space for classrooms, computer labs, offices, meetings, storage, the cafeteria and kitchen, library activities, the bookstore, lounge and recreation activities and maintenance.

Another major category is \$351,000 for maintenance construction including \$86,000 for rehabilitating the heating -

ventilating system, \$124,000 for reroofing the original campus buildings and \$141,000 for expanding the parking lots.

UWVC Dean Robert Thompson said that carrying out the expansion plans laid out in the report would "complete the campus" through the end of this century. The freshman-sophomore center was opened in 1968.

A 1981 expansion was designed to accommodate 540 students. This fall, 784 students are attending UWVC.

Cost estimates are based on a space-needs evaluation conducted in January 1987 by Douglas King, director of the Bureau of Technical and Informational Services of the UW System. Dean Thompson worked with the UWVC Campus Planning Committee to refine the evaluation.

At this time, UWVC has 61,038 assignable square feet of space. The proposed addition would increase this by 17,630 assignable square feet, an increase of 28.9 percent.

Costs of any expansion work at UWVC would be split, with

the county picking up 69 percent of the bill; the city, 31 percent. On a \$2,114,000 project, the county would pay \$1,458,660; the city, \$655,340.

During discussion at the Nov. 20 meeting, county commissioners indicated that county funds for any expansion probably would be financed through the 12-year borrowing.

County Supervisor Jerome Board of Commissioners that the annual tax cost for expansion to a county resident would be about \$9 on a \$100,000 home. "That's a very nominal cost," he said.

Gresenz called UWVC "a valuable resource." He said, "This is where we're training our future leaders of the city and county. If there is no place to train them, then they will leave the area and not return."



Sign Vandals Cost State's Taxpayers \$150,000 This Year

Traffic sign vandals cost Wisconsin taxpayers at least \$150,000 so far this year, according to Department of Transportation officials. About 1,966 signs were vandalized in the first 10 months of 1987 at a cost of about \$75 per sign, said Chuck Spang, DOT traffic control engineer. In recent years, the number

of vandalized or missing signs has declined slightly, Spang said. "We're hoping that our signs are becoming purely functional and losing their flavor as art objects," he said. Missing signs have on more than one occasion jeopardized lives. A missing stop sign in Madison was blamed for a two-car collision last year in which people were injured. In 1976, stickers warning potential vandals or thieves of the consequences for removing or tampering with highway signs — a \$25-\$100 fine or

imprisonment — were placed on all traffic signs. That was the year when a fatal accident occurred because of a missing sign. Since then, the law has increased penalties to a \$10,000 fine or two years in jail — or both — if the damage to or removal of a sign results in a death. "Vandalizing traffic signs is a serious crime — we want the public to remember that before a prank is considered," Spang said.

Students at the Kewaskum Elementary School were recently introduced to the wide and wonderful world of art through a program sponsored by the West Bend Gallery of Fine Arts. The program, entitled AWARE (Art With Aesthetic Resources for Enrichment), was initially introduced into the Kewaskum School District last year by Mary Ann Peterson who has worked as a volunteer in the program.

The object of AWARE is to focus upon the history as well as an appreciation for all forms of art. The program provides children with experiences in recognizing art forms in the environment, feeling inherent qualities in works of art, as well as recognizing elements and principles of design as they function in works of art. The

program is also designed to increase the enjoyment and understanding of works of art in the context of its history and educate students in talking intelligently about art using an expanding art vocabulary. The children are made aware of the different media, techniques, and craftsmanship. Volunteers make regular visits to classrooms talking with students about works of art and how to recognize the creative or inventive qualities in art and how to apply the art concepts in enriching daily living.

Last Friday KES students were visited by two of the AWARE volunteers, Mrs. Joan Albers of Kewaskum, and a guest artist Dan Gerhartz. During the two-hour program, students were able to watch Dan as he created a pastel portrait of KES principal Richard Zarling. The youngsters were able to observe Dan as he worked and ask questions about the methods he used in developing the likeness.

While he works with all the media types, Gerhartz told the students he enjoys working with oils the most. The children were encouraged to try their hand at the various art forms. Gerhartz told them not to be afraid to make mistakes that even the most talented artists find they make mistakes and have to go back to make adjustments or corrections in their work.

Gerhartz is also a Kewaskum native, having grown up in the area and attended the Kewaskum District schools. He is a 1983 graduate of Kewaskum High School who went on to continue his education in the field of art. After two years of study at the Academy of Art Chicago, Dan worked in Milwaukee as a freelance illustrator. He presently lives in Kewaskum and teaches adult art classes at the West Bend Art Gallery. Dan has exhibited his works throughout Wisconsin and recently opened his own studio in Kewaskum.

Besides accepting painting commissions, Gerhartz has sold several of his works through galleries in the southwestern United States.

There will be a showing of Dan's works at the West Bend Art Gallery during the month of January with a reception scheduled for January 10th, from 1:30 to 4:00 p.m.



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
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SCHOLARSHIPS AND FELLOWSHIPS

The Tax Reform Act of 1986 made major changes in the treatment of scholarships and fellowships.

Under prior law, a candidate for a degree could exclude from taxable income a scholarship or fellowship grant received from a college, university, or other educational institution for payment of tuition and other fees, as well as regular living expenses such as room and board. The exclusion also applied to allowances received to cover expenses for travel, research, clerical help, or equipment.

An individual who was not a candidate for a degree could exclude, to a limited extent, such a grant only if the grantor of the scholarship or fellowship was a tax-exempt organization, international organization, or a federal, state, or local government agency.

The term candidate for a degree means a full time or part-time student who receives a scholarship for study at an educational institution that provides an educational program that is acceptable for full credit toward a bachelor's or higher degree, or offers a program of training to prepare students for gainful employment in a recognized occupation.

Beginning in 1987, only a candidate for a degree may exclude from taxable income amounts received as a qualified scholarship. A qualified scholarship is defined as any amount received that is used according to the conditions of the grant for: 1) tuition and fees to enroll in or attend an educational institution, or

2) fees, books, supplies, and equipment required for the course of study at the educational institution.

Other amounts received for

room and board, or travel, must be included in income.

As a general rule, compensation for teaching or research is fully taxable. But under prior law, that part of a scholarship or fellowship grant received as payment for teaching, research, or other part-time services was excluded from taxable income, as long as all degree candidates were required to perform such services whether or not the candidates received scholarships or fellowships. The new law ends this special exclusion. Amounts received for teaching or research are fully taxable whether the compensation takes the form of a paycheck or a tuition reduction.

Prior to 1987, federal grants for tuition and related expenses were excluded from gross income if the recipient was required to perform future services as a federal employee. The Tax Reform Act of 1986 contains no such exclusion.

The new law changes apply to scholarships and fellowships granted after August 16, 1986.

Tips On Choosing A Tax Preparer

Because of the sweeping changes to the tax system made by the Tax Reform Act of 1986, more Americans may choose to have a professional prepare their 1987 tax return. If you are one of these taxpayers, the Internal Revenue Service offers

some guidelines for choosing a preparer.

Choosing a tax preparer is important because you, not the tax preparer, are responsible for the accuracy of your tax return. To protect yourself, do not sign a blank return or one which is only partially filled out. You should be furnished a copy of the completed return for your records. The tax preparer is required by law to sign and date the return and to enter an identification number.

Be particularly cautious of a tax preparer who promise a refund, boasts of ways to beat the tax system, or claims to have a special relationship with the IRS. You should use as much care in choosing a tax preparer as you would be in purchasing any other product or service.

Sensenbrenner Makes U.S. Flags Available

(Washington, D.C.) — REP. F. JAMES SENSENBRENNER, JR. (R-WI) announced that 3'x5' and 4'x6" nylon United States flags are available at cost to Ninth District residents through his Washington office. Each flag comes with a certificate showing that it has been flown over the U.S. Capitol.

A 3'x5' flag can be purchased for \$6.64 and 4'x6" can be purchased for \$9.59. Due to House of Representatives regulations, only checks and money orders can be accepted. These prices are good until December 31, 1987, and you can expect to wait 4-8 weeks for delivery.

Q. The same candy recipe is completely different on a rainy day than on a dry sunny day. Why is this?

A. Heat, humidity and altitude each affect candy. A cool, dry day is optimum. When conditions outside are damp, cook candy to a temperature a degree or so higher than the recipe directs.

A. Cook gravy over low heat. Stir it constantly with a wire whip or in a figure-eight motion using a wooden spoon. Take the pan off the heat when you add the milk or water. Then return pan to the heat, stirring until gravy is smooth and thickened.

Q. What's the difference between brown rice and regular white rice?

A. Cook brown rice with only the outer hull removed. White rice is further milled to remove the germ and most of the bran. One cup of uncooked brown rice will yield about four cups of cooked rice while one cup of uncooked white will become three cups of cooked rice.

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Deer Harvest Up in Northern, Down in Southern Counties

Preliminary registration figures from around the state show that the gun deer harvest is up considerably over last year in the northern counties of the state.

Harvest totals in the southern counties, where the preliminary count is not yet available, are expected to be lower than they were in 1986.

The season was particularly successful for hunters in the northwestern and north central counties. The preliminary registration total this year is 38,053 in the northwestern counties, about 7,300 above the final tally of 31,773 for the 1986 season. And, in the north central counties of the state, the preliminary registration count is 47,340 an increase of about 7,300 over the final harvest total of 40,091 for 1986 in that area of

the state.

In the northeast, the harvest was up in the Marinette area, but down in both the Green Bay and Oshkosh areas, with the expected harvest for the northeastern counties estimated to be between 53,000 and 54,000 deer. The 1986 harvest total was 56,642. In the west central counties, the preliminary harvest figure is 61,507. The final harvest in that area of the state last year was 67,951.

Preliminary registration totals are not yet available in the southeastern and southern counties of the state. In 1986, 58,358 deer were taken in the southern counties, and 4,425 were harvested in the southeastern counties.

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


