Village Board Tables Action On Ball Diamond Lighting

On the recommendation of Parks Committee chairman Tom McElhatton, the Kewaskum Village Board decided Monday night, to table action on the purchasing of lights for the Kiwanis Park ball diamonds until his committee had a chance to discuss the plan with the Softball Association. Two bids were received on the project, Statz Electric with the low bid of \$27,300, and Page Electric at \$35,700.

There has been no use of the park's ball diamonds by adult softball teams since 1982. And, at the present time, the village has received no commitments for use of the facilities by any adult teams, either women's or men's, to use the diamonds for the coming year.

The board is reluctant to spend \$27,000 - \$36,000 on a project whose limited use at this time would not warrant such a large expenditure. There is presently \$4,132 in a baseball lighting account, however, the remaining \$23,177, of the initial lighting cost would have to come from Park Development

funds.

There would also be an estimated \$1,137 in additional annual costs for electricity, light and field maintenance, insurance and supplies.

In other business, the board approved a recommendation to amend the village's trash pickup ordinance to exclude the pick up of discarded vehicle tires.

The action came after Public Works Superintendent Augie Bilgo brought the issue to the board's attention. Bilgo said the problem of disposing of unwanted tires is growing and may soon become a very big issue. He noted some landfills are already refusing to accept them, or are charging anywhere from \$2.00 to \$14.00 per tire, depending upon size, when they do take them. He said taking tires to a landfill could shorten its lifespan as well as open the door for problems later.

Bilgo told the board the village had received its application from the DNR for its landfill license. "Come spring," said Bilgo, "we'll have several hundred tires from local businesses and residents." He

wanted some direction from the board as to whether or not his department should continue to pick up tires. He felt the board should take some action to decide on how to handle the problem.

Both Bilgo and Village Administrator Dan Schmidt told the trustees there is now an alternative solution. There is a company in Barton which is accepting unwanted tires for a nominal fee. They are shredded and made into recyclable materials to be used for road construction and as fuels.

The board unanimously voted to direct Schmidt to draw up an amendment disposal of tires by the Public Works Department. When the change goes into effect, it will become the responsibility of the businesses and residents to dispose of their unwanted tires.

In other action the board approved advertising for the hiring of part-time summer employes for the Parks, Public Works, and Water Pollution Control Departments.

The board also approved an addendum to the developer's

Schuenemann, Mayer to Face Off Again Faragher, Schlaefer Are Judgeship Primary Winners

Voter turnout was fairly light for Tuesday's primary election. For the major portion of the Kewaskum area, the only race before the electors was narrowing the field for the new Washington County Circuit Court judgeship.

Leo Schlaefer, a private practice attorney from West Bend, won a slot on the April ballot. He topped the field of five candidates receiving 3,697 votes, leading his closest competitor by more than 2,600 votes.

Patrick Faragher, County Corporation Counsel, came in a distant second with 1,091 votes but it was still good enough to win the remaining spot on the April ballot.

Behind Schlaefer and

Faragher, were Roland Pieper with 780 votes, Robert Deters 518, and Henry Renard 518.

In the primary race for Washington County Supervisor of District Eleven, incumbent Hilbert Schuenemann and former supervisory candidate Francis Mayer knocked newcomer Roy Peterson out of the running.

Schuenemann garnered 188 votes, Mayer 77, and Peterson last with 57 votes.

Schuenemann and Mayer have faced each other before. In 1986, both men challenged former incumbent Norbert Dettmann for the District Eleven post, with Schuenemann defeating Dettmann. This year it will again be Mayer the challenger, but it is now Schuenemann who is the incumbent.


agreement for the Timblin apartment project which will allow for the issuance of occupancy permits. Schmidt said anticipated occupancy has been targeted for March 1st.

Walter Ray Williams Jr. Featured In Miller Lite Championship Tour

There are few people around who can compare with Walter Ray Williams Jr. when it comes to throwing things for accuracy. Williams has used his throwing skills to win seven world horseshoe pitching titles and five Professional Bowlers Association (PBA) titles.

Williams, the most dominant player on the PBA tour during the last two years, will be demonstrating his skills throughout the state of Wisconsin and in Chicago from Feb. 21-26 in a 20-stop Lite Beer Championship promotional tour.

Williams was the 1986 PBA Player of the Year when he won three tournaments and led the PBA in earnings with \$145,550. Last year he won twice and was fifth on the PBA money list with \$144,593. During the last two years he has earned more money (\$290,143), won more titles (five) and posted

more top-five finishes (14) than any other player. Williams also has averaged better than 214 for almost 2,000 games to compile those statistics.

He started off the 1988 tour with three straight appearances in the televised finals, finishing third in the ARC Alameda Open, fifth in the Showboat Invitational and second in the AC-Delco Classic.

Williams beat Marshall Holman, 277-205, to win the 1987 Miller Lite Classic in Miami. A few weeks later, he finished third in the Miller Lite Championship, losing to Randy Lightfoot in the semifinal game, 268-258. Williams needed to win two of the three Lite-sponsored events in the Winter Tour to win the Lite Mini-Slam, worth \$50,000.

In addition to the Milwaukee and Miami events, Miller Lite also sponsors a winter tour stop in Cleveland. The brand is once again offering \$1 million, the Lite Slam, to any bowler who can win all three of these events, or \$50,000 for two victories.

For the second straight year, Miller is sponsoring the \$50,000 Lite Performance Cup. Bowlers will receive points for top 24 finishes at all of the stops on the national PBA tour. Double points will be awarded at Lite events.

Williams finished in a tie for second place in the first Lite Performance Cup competition, behind Holman, the 1987 PBA Player of the Year.

Record Bow Deer Harvest Set; Gun Deer Season Down; Bear Up

Bow deer hunters had a record harvest in 1987, while gun deer hunters recorded the fourth highest harvest in Wisconsin history, according to figures compiled by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources. Bear hunters in 1987 had a successful season, recording an increase in the harvest compared to 1986.

The bow deer harvest was 42,651, up 5 percent from 40,490 deer taken by bow in 1986. The gun deer harvest totalled 250,530, down 3 percent from the 259,240 deer taken in 1986. The gun deer harvest consisted of 116,881 antlered deer, 133,393 antlerless deer, and 256 deer with type unknown due to incompletely filled-out registration tags.

The 1987 bear harvest was 824, an increase of 64 percent from the 503 bear harvested in 1986. The increased bear harvest follows from an increase to 1730 the number of permits issued to bear hunters in 1987, more than double the number of permits issued in 1986.

"I'm not surprised that the gun deer harvest was down this year," said Frank Haberland, DNR forest wildlife specialist. "Our deer population goals call for reducing the deer herd in the agricultural areas of central and southern Wisconsin. We've been successful in doing that over the last four years."

The record gun deer harvest was 274,302 in 1985. Although the total gun deer harvest has now fallen slowly for the past two seasons, hunters in northern Wisconsin had good success, according to Haberland.

"Gun deer hunters in the northern third of Wisconsin had an outstanding season," noted Haberland. "It was their best

season since 1964."

The top ten gun deer harvest counties in the state were Marinette Co. (11,083 deer), Jackson Co. (10,578), Waupaca Co. (8,891), Marathon Co. (8,388), Clark Co. (7,886), Shawano Co. (7,816), Iowa Co. (7,487), Sauk Co. (7,109), Adams Co. (6,748) and Oconto Co. (6,584).

The record bow deer harvest most likely resulted from good weather conditions, according to Haberland.

"There was excellent weather throughout most of the bow hunting season," said Haberland. "It was a drier fall than usual, so bow hunters had good hunting conditions and more opportunities to be out in the woods."

The top ten bow deer hunting counties were Waupaca Co. (2,527 deer), Marinette Co. (2,128), Marathon Co. (1,998), Wood Co. (1,746), Portage Co. (1,493), Shawano Co. (1,419), Waushara Co. (1,297), Adams Co. (1,275), Jackson Co. (1,210) and Clark Co. (1,169).

The top ten bear hunting counties were Price Co. (111 bear), Sawyer Co. (89), Bayfield Co. (86), Iron Co. (62), Douglas Co. (55), Ashland Co. (53), Rusk Co. (53), Taylor Co. (46), Marinette Co. (34) and Washburn Co. (31).



Minutes of School Board Meeting

January 28, 1988

Note: The regularly scheduled meeting for Monday, January 25, 1988 was cancelled due to the weather and was rescheduled for Thursday, January 28, 1988.

The meeting was called to order by President Ralph Horner at 7:05 p.m.

Members present: Perry Ankerson, Clara Trapp, Ruth Schmitt, Ralph Horner, Ron Beimborn, Don Nowak, Ron Theusch.

Members absent: none
Also present: Attorney Mike Spector
Clerk Schmitt led the Pledge of Allegiance.

President Horner asked if the meeting had been noticed as required by the open meeting law. Superintendent Kleinhaus replied that it had been.

Audience to visitors: none
Student government representation: reports or questions: none

Schmitt/Nowak motion to approve the agenda. Discussion followed. Perry Ankerson questioned why F.3. Discussion of administrator's contract, was a closed-session agenda item. Ruth Schmitt stated that the item dealt with the removal of the automatic renewal clause in the contract. District Administrator Kleinhaus said she had no problem with the legal aspects of discussing the matter in open session. Attorney Mike Spector said it would be in the Board's best interest to discuss the matter in closed session. Motion passed 6-1 with Perry Ankerson voting no.

Schmitt/Trapp motion to correct the December 14, 1987 closed minutes in a properly noticed future closed session. Motion passed 5-2 with Perry Ankerson and Ron Theusch voting no.

District Administrator Kleinhaus suggested that someone be appointed to take the minutes at closed session meetings. Clerk Schmitt said she would consider it.

Schmitt/Nowak motion to approve the January 11, 1988 open and closed minutes as written. Perry Ankerson commented that it was unusual for someone to approve the minutes of a meeting which they did not attend. For this reason Ruth Schmitt withdrew her motion and Don Nowak his second. Ron Theusch questioned the status of the vote to adjourn into closed session. Attorney Mike Spector determined that a quorum was present and the vote was valid. Nowak/Beimborn motion to approve the January 11, 1988 open and closed minutes as written. Motion passed 6-0-1 with Clara Trapp abstaining.

Chairman Ron Theusch reported that due to the lack of a quorum the last Finance-Transportation-Buildings and Grounds meeting was cancelled. The next meeting will take place February 16, 1988 at 7:30 p.m. in the high school library.

Ankerson/Theusch motion to pay legal fees incurred by the District Administrator which were not paid by the insurance company and to pursue with the insurance company the reimbursement for those monies that were not paid. Discussion followed. Perry Ankerson felt that the board should take a stand and let employees know that the board is behind them. Business Manager Gorder reported that the request for fees filed under the Errors and Omissions policy was refused under an exclusion. Attorney Spector stated that it was a most unusual law suit because there was no notice of injury claim. He said he takes responsibility for telling the Board not to become involved and he regrets that error. He stated that he was in contact with Attorney Doyle and after receiving the facts he contacted the insurance company and is hopeful that an agreement can be made so that they pay from the first dollar on. Attorney Spector explained the whole process of a lawsuit. Ron Beimborn expressed his concern that if the Board paid the legal fees it could have a bearing on the outcome of the case, meaning that the Board was taking sides. Attorney Spector did not think it would have any bearing. He advised the Board to wait to see if Wausau Insurance would agree to pay the fees. Motion failed 2-4-1 with Ruth Schmitt, Ron Beimborn, Don Nowak and Ralph Horner voting no with Clara Trapp abstaining.

Beimborn/Nowak motion to allow Attorney Spector to pursue with Wausau Insurance the payment of \$1903 in legal fees. Perry Ankerson said he could not follow the logic in paying more legal fees to have the attorney seek payment of legal fees. Motion passed 5-1-1 with Perry Ankerson voting no and Clara Trapp abstaining.

Superintendent Kleinhaus asked to make a statement to the Board regarding the mat-

ter. She pointed out that several times the phrase has been used that the District Administrator "threatened to sue the Board," and this is not true. She explained that at a previous meeting Mr. Nowak asked the Business Manager what actions would result if the errors and omissions insurance did not cover the fees and Ms. Gorder responded by saying that legal counsel had explained to her a "notice of injury" would be filed with the Board and an action for payment of fees be commenced under that. It was pointed out that this is what the state statutes call for in the indemnification laws. Ms. Kleinhaus indicated she would only protect her rights under the law and not give up her right to support from the Board and District as their employee. She further pointed out that the lawsuit has been filed by Mr. Trapp for actions that are at this time considered by the insurance company to have taken place in the line of duty and acting as Superintendent for the District. She reaffirmed that it is her belief that all actions relative to this case did arise while she acted as an administrator on behalf of the District.

Ms. Kleinhaus further stated that she is "deeply saddened" by the amount of time, money, energy and resources the lawsuit is taking away from the district, but the Board needs to remember that she did not initiate it, but rather Mr. Trapp did.

Nowak/Theusch motion to pursue the hiring of a local attorney for day to day operations and retain Quarles and Brady for negotiations. Don Nowak's reason for making this motion was due to exorbitant legal fees. Attorney Spector stated that he was sympathetic about the costs, but the bills reflect the work actually done. Discussion continued with Ron Theusch saying most of the bills arise from internal disputes because the Board does not have confidence in each other. Clara Trapp commended Quarles and Brady for their services. Don Nowak said he only brought the subject up to have discussion and he also agreed that if the Board had more confidence in each other the bickering could come to an end. District Administrator Kleinhaus remarked that she and Attorney Spector have a good working relationship and she has respect for his ability. Motion failed 1-6 with Perry Ankerson, Clara Trapp, Ruth Schmitt, Ralph Horner, Ron Beimborn and Ron Theusch voting no.

Schmitt/Beimborn motion to pay the Farmington cooks their present wages for the janitor work that they do and at the end of the year have the money for these wages be charged back to the General Fund and put back into Fund 50. Motion passed 6-1

with Clara Trapp voting no.

Director of Instruction Backus informed the Board and public that Chuck Engelhardt will present programs to students and staff relating to AODA throughout the day on February 15. A meal will be served from 5:30 - 6:30 and at 7:00 Mr. Engelhardt will speak to parents and other community members.

Ms. Backus reported that two SAP groups have begun at the High School led by trained staff members. One group will be starting at KMS. More details will follow in February and March.

Theusch/Ankerson motion to approve the bills in the amount of \$704,426.48. Motion passed 7-0.

Ron Theusch, representing the Kewaskum Athletic Club Incorporated, requested permission for concessions, including beer, to be sold during Land O' Lakes baseball games held on school property during the summer. He stated that it is the Athletic Club's turn to host a tournament this summer. The Village will issue a picnic permit to the Athletic Club. Ankerson/Schmitt motion that the school district authorize the Kewaskum Athletic Club Incorporated to sell concessions, including beer, at games played on school grounds. Motion passed 5-1-1 with Don Nowak voting no and Ron Theusch abstaining.

Theusch/Ankerson motion to approve the 7 percent increase in dental insurance. Single coverage \$13.60; Family coverage \$41.46. Motion passed 7-0.

Business Manager Cherna Gorder informed the Board that the district has received a dividend check in the amount of \$9,544 from the WASB Insurance Plan. The dividends from the Wausau Insurance plan consist of Worker's Comp \$3,706, Automobile \$1,996, and General Liability \$3,842.

Ms. Gorder presented the Board with audit bids from five different firms. Schmitt/Trapp motion to accept the bid from Chester Wucherpfennig, CPA, for \$3,200 each year for three years. Motion passed 6-1 with Perry Ankerson voting no.

The Board reviewed a tax collection report prepared by Business Manager Gorder. To date all municipalities with the exception of the Town of Mitchell have made their January 15th installments. 21.7 percent of the levy has been collected as compared to 22.4 percent at the same time last year.

Trapp/Theusch motion to approve a contract for Mary Stephan for the high school art position. Motion passed 7-0. Ms. Stephan will also be the junior class advisor.

Food Supervisor Kathy Robinson was present to explain the need for a part-time cook to work 3-4 hours per day at the high school. Additional help is needed to give the food supervisor time to perform supervisory functions. Discussion followed. Schmitt/Ankerson motion that three hours be added to the cook's schedule for one semester and that the food supervisor be responsible for the following duties: 1) continue to provide a nutritious meal at low prices; 2) ensure that sanitary conditions are met; and 3) do a thorough investigation of the efficient use of the cook's time at each school. 
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Matmen Runners-Up At Laconia Regional
