The fifties and sixties were good times for groups that produced the 'big band' sounds. People danced to Glenn Miller hits such as "In the Mood," "String of Pearls," and a host of Broadway show tunes.

During that period a group called the Harry Rothman Orchestra of Grafton was popular, playing throughout southeastern Wisconsin at country clubs, proms and as the house band at the Eagles Club in Milwaukee, a popular place for weekend dances.

Slowly that sound diminished in popularity. In 1963, Rothman died of cancer at the age of 51, but his orchestra continued to make appearances under the guidance of the group's trombonist Fred Gall. When the group disbanded, Rothman's wife Helen carried out one of the last requests he made, that

she keep all the arrangements he had acquired together. Rothman had the feeling that some day the 'big band' sound would make a comeback.

For over twenty years the collection remained stored and unplayed at the Rothman home. Mrs. Rothman kept her promise and never parted with an arrangement. Last summer Schneider Howard Kewaskum became aware of the collection when he and his fivepiece group were playing at a wedding. Neighbors of Mrs. Rothman talked to Schneider and thought he would be the right individual to assume ownership of the vast library of over 500 arrangements that Rothman had treasured so

After looking over the collection, Schneider decided it contained some excellent arrangements. He purchased



only, with no increases in extra curricular charges. In the second year of the contract, 1989-90, there will be a 31/2 % across the board increase.

The present two-year contact which expires at the end of this school year had carried 7% increases for both the 1986-87 and 1987-88 school years.

In other business the committee reviewed the Wayne Elementary School roofing project. Committee member Clara Trapp questioned the need to re-roof the gym portion of the roof. After some discussion the committee decided not to forward a recommendation but instead take the item to the full board for discussion.

**Buildings Superintendent** Fred Boehlke reported on the status of the asbestos removal and monitoring program. The committee agreed recommend the hiring of Wisconsin Asbestos Advisory Team at the low bid cost of \$10,716 to do an inspection, sight survey, total management and formal reports for the district. Laws governing the program require that the work be done by people who have been certified. The company will also train district employes on how to make inspections.

In other discussions the committee decided recommend the hiring of Del Ponte Brothers to do some cement work projects in the district. They include work at the Wayne well site, the Kewaskum Elementary School southwest entrance, and work on the floor drains in the high school kitchen. The bid was \$2,175.

The committee also reviewed the traffic problem at KES which was brought to the board's attention by the village. The situation will be monitored.

The issue of problems with carpeting installed at the Middle School was again discussed. The committee decided to contact the installer to discuss the situation and get the problems corrected.

The committee tentatively scheduled its next meeting for April 18th, at 7:30 p.m., in the high school library.

For the first time, postal customers nationwide will be able to use their credit cards to buy nondenominated stamps during the transition period to new postage rates.

Milwaukee Division General Manager/Postmaster Norman L. Miller said, "the new program is intended to make the transfer to the new rate structure more convenient for

our customers. Customers will be able to order nondenominated "E" stamps by calling a toll-free number, 1-800-STAMP24, 24 hours a day and can charge

orders to MasterCard or VISA. There will be a minimum order of \$12.50 with a \$2 service

Orders for the new "E" stamps, featuring a colorful design of the Earth, will be taken until such time as stamps specifying the new rate are available. The orders will be mailed when the Governors of the Postal Service approve the new rates.

The Postal Service began testing this program in September 1987 in Sacramento. Since then, eight other cities were added to the test program. To date, the Stamps by Phone program has generated more than \$2 million in stamp sales.







Governor Thompson's proposed budget bill, which purports to reduce property taxes, is a sham for the tax-Wisconsin. payers of Thompson's bill aims to reduce property taxes by increasing the amount of state aid to local school districts. The Governor also intends to freeze local spending and apply permanent statutory limits to spending. This proposal will render excellence and local incentive to improve the quality of a district's educational services obsolete.

The budget places local VTAE districts, school districts and local units of government under a freeze for 1989, but places no cap on the state governmental or university system expenditures. This means that these two units of spending can continue on their merry way unchecked, while school districts and local governments, which provide the majority of services to the taxpayers, have to bite the bullet again.

To: the Voters of **Washington County** Re: Here Come Da Judge------ And Other Old Sayings

Most people don't pay much attention to judicial elections; this seems beyond their comprehension. Then, when their lives are affected by some judicial decision, as their lives increasingly are, they may wonder how that "joker" ever got on the bench, and how he manages to stay there.

But, by then it usually is almost impossible to remove him; the strange forces that put him there, keep him there, unless he is a babbling idiot and sometimes even then.

I think this situation exists in Washington County as we approach an election April 5 for a new, fourth, circuit court judge. The candidates go through a brief "dog and pony show." They are rarely asked tough questions, even by the media. Stupid questions, yet, but not good ones; certainly not any questions that could embarrass them. candidates compete for endorsements from "important people," and whoever, has the best organization - or machine wins. This is the fellow who makes the best deals - and the most of them, in an insiders' game. The public is not really invited, except as rubber stamps to make the process look acceptable.

Because of the "thundering" public silence over campaign, I asked a certain highly opinionated businessman what he thought. How about Patrick Faragher, the county attorney? His response was that those government employees all want more money for government, and to raise our taxes. Maybe so, I replied, but I did not think accurately described Faragher. And how about Atty. Leo Schlaefer? He fumed, those candidates all make promises until they get in office, and then, it's the same old thing again. Perhaps so, I mused.

So why should we bother to vote? Is there much choice between the two candidates? Both are Republican, Catholic, male, white, married, have Kewaskum area connections, and are long time residents of West Bend. Then, I began to see some differences.

There were more important differences. Faragher, who has devoted most of his life thus far to public service, was approachable, easy to talk with, and genuinely wanted to resolve matters decently. He often appears frustrated that he is not in a position to do so. He knows the law well, and shares it with others. While he wants to win his cases, he fights fairly. I came to respect him.

Then, I recalled how, when previous corporation counsel left, Faragher, the assistant, said he could do the job of corporation counsel, and wouldn't even need an assistant. The county board gave him a chance, and he's been doing the job alone ever since. I'm guessing that he's saving the county a lot of money. He has a way of resolving controversy quietly and decently when he can, rather than provoking controversy. This, indeed, has probably saved the taxpayers money. I decided that he might make a good judge.

The opposite appears true of Leo Schlaefer, and associates, at the corner of Sixth and Hickory. These people have devoted most of their lives to making money, and they have made a lot of it. Provoking controversy here pays off. Also, they are heavily into real estate and development, which is a rough, but lucrative business. filled with intrique and trickery.

In considering Schlaefer for judge, I thought, well, maybe it takes one to catch one, as the old saying goes. But I wondered if the will was there to do that. Then I thought of an age-old question: Does a leopard ever change its spots? The answer is,

I mused, then, that Schlaefer is carrying around too much "baggage" to be a judge. Should he reach the bench, he might have to be disqualified

again and again for possible conflicts of interest. numerous former partners, clients, and cronies appear before him. Besides, there already is one judge from the Schloemer, Schlaefer, etc. law firm: J. Tom Merriam.

At this point, I thought of another old saying, the more things change, the more they the same. Electing Schlaefer would mean more of the same old thing in the Washington County courts. Electing Faragher, however, might bring a fresh, wholesome change.

So, then, am I endorsing Faragher for judge? Well, an earlier candidate for judge told me that he is not endorsing either Faragher or Schlaefer, nor asking his supporters to do so. He said that he might pick the wrong one, if he did so, and then a lot of people would be angry with him. He thought it was best to let the people decide for themselves, although they hadn't picked him, and he was 'the best qualified.'

It would be nice if the people did decide, rather than ignoring the election, or voting the way the "boss" tells them to vote, It is with this in mind that I offer my thoughts to you. And now, just one more old saying, remember that a stitch in time saves nine.

#### Men Turning 26 in 1988 Reach an Important Milestone

The Selective Service System has announced that men who will reach their 26th birthday in 1988 and who have not registered with Selective Service may forfeit their eligibility for some federal programs.

Men who were required to register with Selective Service in 1981 will be turning 26 this year. The law requires that young men register with Selective Service within 30 days of the day they turn 18. Although tardy registrations are usually accepted, Selective Service does not have the authority to accept registrations after a man reaches age 26. By failing to register before turning 26, a young man may permanently forfeit his eligibility for federal student aid, job training and most federal employment. Likewise, some states require registration for state student aid, entrance to a state supported college or university, state employment and permission to practice law.

Many of the men who have still not registered may be unaware of the requirement or do not understand the importance of the obligation to register. Some may even have served in the military but failed to register either before entering the Armed Forces or after leaving active duty. Others may have been institutionalized or incarcerated at the time of their 18th birthday and not realized that they were required to register within 30 days if released prior to age 26.

For those men born in 1962 who have registered, 1988 also marks the year that ends their eligibility for selection for induction under present law should there be a return to the draft. Nearly 20 million men, age 18 through 25 have registered with Selective Service since registration was reinstituted in 1980. These men comprise over 90 percent of those required to register.

Men who have not yet registered should do so at any post office. Failure to register is a felony punishable by a fine of up to \$250,000, up to 5 years in jail, or both.





#### 1986-87 Fur Harvest Puts \$8.1 Million Into Circulation

Wisconsin furbearer harvest value for the 1986-87 season jumped 44 percent over the previous season, putting \$8.1 million into circulation in the state economy, Chuck Pils, Department of Natural Resources wildlife furbearer specialist said.

"Muskrat continually comprises the largest number of individual species harvested in Wisconsin, this year making up 67 percent of the harvest total, Pils said. "Raccoon was second comprising 21 percent of the total while topping all of the state's furbearers in dollar value, producing \$2.2 million of the harvest.'

An estimated 662,000 muskrats were harvested with an average price of \$3.39 per pelt. Raccoon averaged \$18.00 per pelt with some 206,000 harvested. Together muskrat and raccoon accounted for \$6.0 million, or 74 percent of the state's total fur harvest value. The total number of furbearers harvested was estimated at 981,000.

"Beaver ranks third as the most valuable furbearer in Wisconsin," Pils declared. "The estimated harvest this year of 48,730 beaver statewide is the highest take of this valuable furbearer ever recorded in Wisconsin's history.'

Relatively high pelt prices excellent trapping conditions were factors creating the high beaver harvest. Generally the increase in furs purchased and prices received are influenced by fluctuations in demand from the fashion market and the strength of the U.S. dollar.

"The harvest level for every species, expect bobcat, was up from last year, which caused the substantial rise in total fur harvest value," Pils added. "Average prices were up for all species except for skunk and weasel. Fisher and bobcat average pelt prices increased substantially, up \$29 and \$21 each to \$109 and \$85 respective-

A fisher season has been provided trappers since 1985. This season ran from December 1 through 11, 1987, to insure rimeness of the pelts. A total of 300 permits were issued within three specific fisher management units and 98 were registered. Mild December weather conditions resulted in better trapping conditions to produce the increase over the 38 trapped in 1985.

Another record was set with 1,588 otters harvested during the past season. This is the highest since 1930 when records were started. The leading counties where otter were taken include Oneida, Sawyer and Price. Pelt prices averaged \$27.

Pelt primeness, individual fur condition and bargaining power affect the variability of prices paid to hunters and trappers for their pelts, Pils explained.

The bobcat harvest for the state totaled 183 with 49 percent taken with the aid of hunting dogs. Another 45 percent were trapped and six percent were hunted without dogs. The

average pelt price was \$35.

The number of licensed Wisconsin trappers in decreased during the past trapping season. The general decline in fur prices over the last few years may have discouraged some trappers from trapping.

Other furbearers harvested, listed with the average price per pelt, include: mink, 30,900, \$19; red fox, 20,500, \$22; gray fox, 3,344, \$20; opossum 3,750, \$1.36; and coyote, 2,500, \$16. There were 279 skunk harvested with an average pelt price of \$2.44 and 293 weasel harvested with an average price just under



Beimborn/Nowak motion to approve policy #2700-Smoking, with the deletion of the last four lines. Motion passed 4-2 with Ralph Horner and Ron Theusch voting no.

Schmitt/Beimborn motion to approve policy #4110.7-Job Description for Secondary Guidance Counselor. Motion passed 6-0.

Schmitt/Nowak motion to approve policy #5113.2-Definition: Full-time Students. Motion passed 6-0.

The next Policy-Legislation-Bylaw Committee meeting will be March 7, 1988 at 7:00 p.m. in the Administrative Building.



### Shaw Sets Mark as Indian **Trackmen Begin New Season**

The Kewaskum boys' track outscored an experienced Random Lake team, 88-21, last Thursday at Kewaskum in the Indians' first track meet of the season.

Senior Miles Shaw vaulted 12'3" to break the school indoor pole vault record which stood for 12 years. The previous record of 12'0" was set by Dennis Bremser in 1976. Shaw also won the 1600 meter run with a time of 5:05.3 and ran the second leg of the winning 1600 meter relay team.
