Career Advancement Considered in Taking New Position

Kleinhans' Tenure Brought Progress and Change to the Kewaskum School District

When opportunity comes knocking at your door it sometimes brings along some uninvited guests in the forms of doubt, reservation and second thought. Those were some of the things School District Administrator Penny Kleinhans had to contend with when she was recently informed that she was a finalist in contention for the Menomonie School District's administrative post.

When Kleinhans was officially offered the position she was faced with the difficult task of deciding whether to remain with the Kewaskum

School District, which she had seen through some difficult times, or move on to accept a position which would offer both career and financial advancement. While many people in the district will be unhappy over her departure, they can also understand her decision to leave. She is leaving, however, with the knowledge that under her guidance many progressive and positive changes have occurred in the district.

In a conversation this week, Kleinhans said the tough decisions and controversial issues she has dealt with during her three-year tenure as administrator have been ex-

ceptional opportunities to exercise her administrative capabilities and promote educational excellence.

Kleinhans will be leaving the end of June to become superintendent of the Menomonie School District which is located in Dunn County between Eau Claire and the Wisconsin - Minnesota border. The district is comprised of eight elementary schools, one junior high school and one high school and has an enrollment of approximately 2,800 students. The Kewaskum School District has an enrollment of 1,700 students attending three elementary schools, one middle school and one high school.

"The move is an advancement in my career," stated Kleinhans. "It offers a chance to use my administrative abilities in new ways and to sharpen those skills." Kleinhans' starting salary at Menomonie will be \$57,500, a difference of almost \$10,000 over \$47,790 she is receiving with the Kewaskum School District. Her previous positions were as staff auditor for the Legislative Audit Bureau, teacher in Lac du Flambeau, Rosendale and Minocqua, elementary school principal at Manawa and superintendent of the Deerfield School District.

In reflecting back on her affiliation with Kewaskum Kleinhans stated, "As far as I am concerned, Kewaskum has turned the corner." "I just see so many positive things now that it made it hard to make a decision." Kleinhans said she also sees the school board coming together after years of infighting.

Kleinhans said she was proud

Light Agenda for Village Board

The biggest item on Monday night's Kewaskum Village Board agenda was the approval of several building permits and confirmation of committee and commission assignments for the coming year.

Although the entire project had been approved last year, the board again gave approval to the construction of the second and final phase of the Timblin, Rustic Timbers, apartment project. Construction of the last sixteen units is expected to begin some time this month.

The trustees also approved a building permit for Richard Schmidt for construction of a new house, Ron Will for a kitchen and garage addition, and Darlene Walls for construction of a storage shed.

The board approved the signing of a Joint Incineration Committee Intergovernmental Agreement. That agreement confirms the village will financially support a incineration feasibility study.

Trustee Mary Krueger, who represents the village on that committee, informed fellow board members Kewaskum's cost share for the study would be between \$1,798 and \$1,829, depending upon whether or not Newburg decides to join the seven other communities which have already committed themselves to the project. So far the City of West Bend, Towns of West Bend, Barton, Farmington, Trenton, and Villages of Kewaskum and Germantown have formally committed themselves to the project.

In other action the board approved committee appointments for the coming year, and the hiring of part time summer help for the various village departments.

Trustee Ken Bonlender, chairman of the Library Committee, informed the board that the Kewaskum Library has seen a substantial increase in patronage during the last year. To date this year, 9,957 pieces of library material have circulated compared to only 3,600 items for this same period last year.

Because of the big increase in usage, the library's quarterly funding from the countywide system also rose. For the first quarter of this year that funding increased approximately \$1,000 over last year to \$3,078. Both Bonlender and Administrator Dan Schmidt credited much of that increased usage to the efforts of Library Director Kitty Hlavaty in publicizing the library and the various materials and programs it has to offer.

Bonlender also informed the board that the library will be offering a summer reading program for kindergarten through fourth grade youngsters.

In other discussion Schmidt presented the board with Ordinance 88-3, which is related to a proposed policy for recycling within the village. Schmidt asked the board to review the proposed ordinance and get back to him with any comments on changes or corrections. If approved at the next board meeting, the recycling program could go into effect next month.

BREAST FEEDING

More women are choosing to nurse their babies because of evidence that it's better for the child's well being. Scientists at State Univ. of NY-Buffalo report that for women before the age of menopause, those who nursed their first or second child for 1 to 6 months, reduce their breast cancer risk by 10 to 25%. Those who nursed for 7 or more months reduced risk by 50 to 75%. Breast feeding is healthful for mother and child.

of some of the accomplishments which occurred during her tenure including creation of a five-year curriculum plan, establishment of a summer school program after a decade without one in the district, bringing the tax rate down to the 1984 level, and establishing a fund balance. Kleinhans also worked with the in-service committee to establish a health and wellness program for the staff. She recalls as most significant, however, the many opportunities that were created to allow for teacher and citizen input into the system.

In October, 1987, Kleinhans

was named in a lawsuit by Charles Trapp, husband of board member Clara Trapp. That suit alleged that Kleinhans defamed his character when she called police and reported to the school board that Trapp had threatened to appear at the School District Office with a gun. Trapp's lawsuit sought \$110,000 in damages. (It has been reported, but it is yet unconfirmed, that the lawsuit was dismissed based on the sworn statements and depositions by chief witnesses.)

This summer Kleinhans will also be finishing her dissertation for a doctorate in education from the University of Wisconsin - Madison.



Workshop for Parents Of Handicapped Children Slated at Cedar Ridge

A workshop for parents of children who are handicapped is slated for May 13 and 14 at the Cedar Ridge Campus, West Bend.

"Special Play for Special Children" is being presented by the Cedar Haven Rehabilitation Agency (CHRA) a not-for-profit division of the Cedar Lake Home Campus, West Bend.

CHRA has had a pediatric program for years in addition to its out-patient clinic for adults.

"With appropriate toys and play, parents can make a dynamic impact on the development of a child's potential," explains Jan Clapp, Occupational Therapist at CHRA and workshop coordinator. PUBLIC NOTICE LEAD AND DRINKING WATER

"Lead is a toxic metal which has been used in the construction of most household plumbing systems in Wisconsin. Water within the plumbing system will continuously dissolve the lead it contacts. The rate can vary greatly with variations in natural water quality and the age of the plumbing system. When water stands motionless for extended periods of time, such as overnight, lead concentrations in the water can sometimes increase greatly. For this reason, the State of Wisconsin is advising all residents to either:

1. Run your water in the morning for 2 or 3 minutes, or until it gets as cold as it will get before you drink it, and never drink water or make baby formula from the hot water tap.

OR

2. Find out how much lead your water is dissolving from your house plumbing system. A list of laboratories which are certified to test for lead in drinking water is available upon request.

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) sets drinking water standards and has determined that lead is a health concern at certain levels of exposure. There is currently a standard of 0.050 parts per million (ppm). Based on new health information, EPA is likely to lower this standard significantly.

Part of the purpose of this notice is to inform you of the potential adverse health effects of lead. This is being done even though your water may not be in violation of the current standard.

EPA, the State of Wisconsin, and others are concerned about lead in drinking water. Too much lead in the human body can cause serious damage to the brain, kidneys, nervous system and the red blood cells. The greatest risk, even with short-time exposure, is to young children and pregnant women.

Lead levels in your drinking water are likely to be highest:

- If your home or water system has lead pipes, or
- If your home has copper pipes with lead solder and
- If the home is less than 5 years old, or
- If you have soft or acidic water, or
- If water sits in the pipes for several hours.

Explanation of the Potential Sources of Lead in Drinking Water

The language in the draft brochure (How Can Lead Get Into My Drinking Water?) may be used verbatim for this section.

Discussion of Procedures for flushing Water Plumbing Systems.

Again, language in the draft brochure (How Can I Reduce My Exposure to Lead in Drinking Water?) may be used verbatim, and may be modified to suit your system characteristics.

Discussion of Any Steps Your System is Taking to Reduce Lead in the Water.

At this point you can discuss the results of lead testing which you may have performed. Bear in mind, however, that the past routine lead monitoring performed by the Department was performed on samples of flushed water, and do not tell you what the "first-draw" sample results might be.

Necessity of Seeking Alternative Water Supplies, If Any.

For single family residences, flushing should be the only measure necessary to reduce elevated lead levels. There may be instances, however, where large buildings such as schools or factories may have difficulty in clearing the lead from their plumbing systems by short-term flushing. If you have identified any such situations, please contact your Department representative, and we will assist you in determining appropriate advice.

Advice on How to Determine if Materials Containing Lead Have Been Used in Residences or the Water Distribution System.

Again the language in the draft lead brochure (Does My Homes Age Make A Difference? And My House Is New. What Should I Do?) may be used for this section, and may be modified to suit individual system conditions.

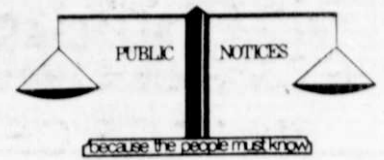

Statewide Fishing Season Opens May 7

An average winter and only light amounts of spring rain, snow and runoff have left Wisconsin's lakes, streams and rivers in good to excellent shape for the opening of the statewide fishing season at 5 a.m., Saturday, May 7, say Department of Natural Resources fishery specialists.

"In lakes, anglers will probably target walleyes and crappies early in the season, then go after other types of panfish and bass that become more active when water temperatures rise," said John Klingbiel of the Department's Bureau of Fisheries Management.

In trout streams, recent cold weather has delayed insect hatches and slowed trout movement, but warmer weather will enhance both, said Department fishery specialist Larry Claggett.

"Both natural and stocked trout survived well over the winter, but water will be low and clear because we haven't had much runoff or rain to muddy streams and raise water levels," he said. "Low clear water makes trout skittish, so anglers will need a delicate approach and presentation to avoid spooking fish."

Bass fishing in lakes normally subject to winterkill will be better this year because ice and snow covers were light, Klingbiel said. Winterkill occurs when thick snow and ice prevent sunlight from penetrating lake water. Aquatic plants, which normally give off oxygen as they grow, die from the lack of light and use up dissolved oxygen already present in water as they decay. Fish often suffocate under these conditions.

"Wisconsin has several hundred shallow lakes where winterkill occurs from time to time, but this

year most escaped and fishing in those lakes, especially for bass, will be all the better for it," Klingbiel said.

Department fishery crews are stocking trout now in streams statewide where natural reproduction of trout doesn't occur, Claggett said. For a slightly different trout fishing experience, he suggested that anglers try stocked lakes in northwestern and north central Wisconsin. The Department stocks yearling trout in cold, deep lakes there to provide an alternative to stream trout fishing.

Both fishery specialists recommend that anglers release smaller trout, bass, walleyes and other gamefish.

"People will enjoy better fishing next year and in years to come if they release small gamefish and let them grow larger," Klingbiel said. "Growth potential of a lot of our gamefish gets cut off when anglers keep the small ones."

Releasing large fish is also important because they are more scarce and can be caught again by anglers that practice catch-and-release.

"Future trout fishing regulations, more than present ones, will probably emphasize higher size limits or mandatory catch-and-release in select streams so fish have a chance to reach trophy sizes," Claggett said.

Wisconsin fishing licenses and inland or Great Lakes trout stamps may be purchased at most Department offices statewide and at more than 2,500 Department-certified bait shops, sporting goods stores, marinas and similar outlets.

Annual licenses for individuals cost \$9.10 for residents and \$24.10 for nonresidents. A variety of other fishing licenses are also available to suit the needs of vacationers, resident married couples and other types of anglers.

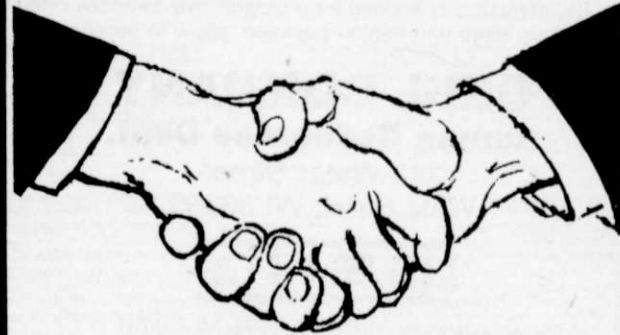
