Julie Backus, the Kewaskum School District's Curriculum Coordinator and Middle School Principal, confirmed the fact that she has Tuesday, submitted her resignation to District Administrator Penny Kleinhans effective June 30th.

Backus, who has been with the district since December, 1985, also assumed the duties of middle school principal last year after the resignation of Dennis

Backus is leaving to accept the position of Curriculum Coordinator for the Hartford School District. Her duties will encompass curriculum programming on both the elementary and high school At Holy Trinity levels.

During July, Backus hopes to complete her dissertation for a doctorate in urban education and curriculum instruction.

Backus declined to release any details regarding her contract or salary.

With Backus' resignation, two positions will be left open. Beside the search for a new district administrator, the Kewaskum School Board will be faced with the task of filling two more top administrative positions before the start of the 1988-89 school year, Director of Instruction, and Middle School Principal.

- ½ cup (1 stick) butter, softened 11/2 cup whole pecans
- Caramel topping

2 bars (4 ounces each) sweet baking chocolate

Caramel Topping
½ cup (1 stick) butter 3/2 cup packed brown sugar

Combine flour, rolled oats, brown sugar and butter. Mix until well blended. Pat firmly into ungreased 13x9x2-inch baking pan. Sprinkle with pecans. To prepare Caramel Topping, combine butter and sugar in heavy saucepan. Cook over medium heat stirring constantly until entire surface of mixture is boiling. Boil I minute. Remove from heat; add vanilla. Pour evenly over pecans and crust. Bake at 350° until caramel is bubbly, about 15-18 minutes. Break chocolate into 1-inch chunks. Sprinkle evenly over caramel layer. Bake 1 minute longer to allow chocolate to melt. Swirl chocolate for a marbled effect. Cool slightly, then chill to set chocolate. Cut into bars. Makes 4-5 dozen.





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

PANCREATIC CANCER



A 'Planned' Boating Trip Is a Safer Boating Trip

Early in the boating season, it's better to plan a boating trip than just take to the water and see what happens, Department of Natural Resources boat safety coordinator Dale Morey explains.

'When boaters leave for a day of cruising, they seldom expect to find themselves in the water, but if they do and aren't wearing a lifejacket, their chances of becoming a boating statistic are increased," Morey warned. "Planning for the trip on the water should include making sure everyone has a lifejacket or PFD (personal flotation device).'

Boaters just starting out again for the season and inexperienced boaters seldom realize how vulnerable small, open boats are to hazards on the water, according to the National Safe Boating Council.

"Early in the boating season in Wisconsin when water temperatures are in the mid-40s to upper 50s, hypothermia is a constant danger to boaters making an unexpected dunk into the lake," Morey added.

Hypothermia is the process of loss of body temperature and kills people in cold water by reducing their ability to swim or stay afloat. A person left in cold water eventually will die of cardiac arrest.

"Hypothermia is thought to be responsible for half of all boating deaths," Morey added. "Cold water chills the body 25 times faster than cold air.

Small boats can cause a dunking that might not be the result of anything done wrong by people in the boat. It might be caused by wind, waves, hitting an unseen underwater object, or the wake of a careless powerboater.

Wearing a lifejacket will keep a person afloat while they tend to the urgent business at hand. That business, Morey states, includes climbing back into their boat, getting to shore, or just keeping still in the water and waiting for help.

The first thing a canoeist is taught by the American Canoe Association is that a lifejacket is part of the equipment of canoeing. Experienced boaters and boating professional all wear well-fitting lifejackets everytime they are out on the water.

"Part of planning that boat trip should include making sure everyone onboard wears a lifejacket," Morey concluded. "Another part of the planning is to take a safe boating course offered through the DNR.'

Information on enrolling in a safe boating course is available from any DNR office.

State Park Campers Can Phone In Reservations

Prospective campers are able to phone in their reservations for camping at four state parks in a pilot Department of Natural Resources project developed to increase state park services.

The telephone reservation service is established at Bong State Recreation Area near Kansasville, Rocky Arbor State Park near Baraboo, Interstate Park in St. Croix Falls and Council Grounds State Park near Merrill, according to Norman Pazderski, employee development coordinator for the DNR's Bureau of Parks and Recreation. Mail or in-person reservations will be accepted at all other state parks.

"The ability to make sameday reservations over the phone will enable travelers to call rather than take a chance by driving to a park only to find it full." said Pazderski. Future reservations can also be made by phone.

Campers can make reservations by phone from June 1 through August 31, between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. Monday

through Friday. All reservations must be for a minimum of two days - three days for holiday weekends but may not exceed 21 days

between June 1 and October 31, Phone reservation payment will be by Master Card or VISA credit cards.

PUBLIC NOTICE LEAD AND DRINKING WATER

"Lead is a toxic metal which has been used in the construction of most household plumbing systems in Wisconsin. Water within the plumbing system will continuously dissolve the lead it contacts. The rate can vary greatly with variations in natural water quality and the age of the plumbing system. When water stands motionless for extended periods of time, such as overnight, lead concentrations in the water can sometimes increase greatly. For this reason, the State of Wisconsin is advising all residents to either:

Run your water in the morning for 2 or 3 minutes, or until it gets as cold as it will get before you drink it, and never drink water or make baby formula from the hot water tap.

Find out how much lead your water is dissolving from your house plumbing system. A list of laboratories which are certified to test for lead in drinking water is available upon request.

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) sets drinking water standards and has determined that lead is a health concern at certain levels of exposure. There is currently a standard of 0.050 parts per million (ppm). Based on new health information, EPA is likely to lower this standard signi-

Part of the purpose of this notice is to inform you of the potential adverse health effects of lead. This is being done even though your water may not be in violation of the current standard.

EPA, the State of Wisconsin, and others are concerned about lead in drinking water. Too much lead in the human body can cause serious damage to the brain, kidneys, nervous system and the red blood cells. The greatest risk, even with short-time exposure, is to young children and pregnant women.

Lead levels in your drinking water are likely to be highest:

- If your home or water system has lead pipes, or
- If your home has copper pipes with lead solder and - If the home is less than 5 years old, or
- If you have soft or acidic water, or
- If water sits in the pipes for several hours.

Explanation of the Potential Sources of Lead in Drinking Water

Discussion of Procedures for flushing Water Plumbing Systems.

Necessity of Seeking Alternative Water Supplies, If Any.

For single family residences, flushing should be the only measure necessary to reduce elevated lead levels. There may be instances, however, where large buildings such as schools or factories may have difficulty in clearing the lead from their plumbing systems by short-term flushing. If you have identified any such situations, please contact your Department representative, and we will assist you in determining appropriate advice.

Advice on How to Determine if Materials Containing Lead Have Been Used in Residences or the Water Distribution System.
