Plant Praised for Quality Control Kewaskum's Marigold Foods Named National Production Finalist By Quality Chekd



Kewaskum's Chief of Police Donald Hlavaty officially informed the Village Board Monday night that he will be retiring effective September 7, 1988.

In a formal letter to the board and Police and Fire Commission. Hlavaty thanked all those who had supported him during his 21 years on the force. "I am very proud of the Kewaskum Police Department and the part I played in developing it," stated Hlavaty. He thanked the board for a rich and rewarding career.

Originally from Beloit, Hlavaty came to Kewaskum in

1967 to join its law enforcement staff. He assumed the duties of Chief of Police apon the retirement of the late Roland Pledl as Chief in 1969.

Hlavaty, who will be turning 50 in August, has spent a total of 27 years in the field of law enforcement, 21 in Kewaskum, 2 in Beloit and 4 years in the military.

Hlavaty said he has no immediate retirement plans except to do some fishing. Hlavaty and his wife Kitty will remain in Kewaskum. "My wife is the Head Librarian for the Kewaskum Public Library and she really likes her work," said Hlavaty, "I can't talk her into retiring from her job."

He reminded the board that the village has ordinances against such actions and suggested that they be brought to the public's attention. "If it were my property," said Bilgo, "I'd get a bulldozer and haul those clippings right back to the property they came from.'

In other action the board approved the installation of lights at the Kiwanis Park horseshoe pits. McElhatton said the village would use some existing lights and Steiner would do the Electric installation work at a cost of \$1,200. The money would come from the Parks Development Fund.





Of the three bids, Rennhack Construction of Reeseville at \$57,183.85, was apparent low bidder followed by Quality Concrete and Excavating of Manawa at \$65,685.25, and A.R. Malichar Construction of Grafton at \$68,813. The bids were turned over to the village's consulting engineers for review and a formal recommendation.







Kewaskum residents will have an opportunity to help families move from sub-human conditions into decent homes when they contribute to the Habitat for Humanity counter top displays that are showing up at local businesses.

Betty A. Bettin, a resident of Kewaskum, is distributing the bright yellow Habitat for Humanity displays to local businesses in an effort to raise the community's conscience

about decent shelter.

A photo by Jimmy Carter and Rosalynn, the wife his ecumenical Christian organization's most famous volunteers, appears on the box to show the couple's support of the effort. "We've seen Habitat at work around the world, providing a hand up, not a hand out,' emphasizes the former president.

Habitat for Humanity helps needy families by working with them to build or renovate simple decent homes. Working in partnership with Habitat, the families contribute "sweat equity" hours to help build their house. Habitat sells the house to them at no profit, with a no interest mortgage repaid over a fixed period of time. House payments made by the homeowners are recycled through a local "Fund for Humanity" that goes toward the construction of more decent

homes.

Founded in 1976 by Alabama lawyer and businessman Millard Fuller, a headquartered in Americus, Georgia, Habitat is a grass-roots movement which has grown to 280 affiliated projects in the U.S. and Canada, and 50 sponsored projects in 25 developing countries. Firemen Concerned About Liability for Picnic Beer Sales

Gene Bohn of the Kettle Moraine Insurance Agency told members of the Kewaskum Village Board Monday night that the firemen had expressed concern about the possible consequences of one of them being sued for unknowingly selling beer to underage individuals at this year's Fireman/Legion Picnic.

Bohn said at a meeting last Thursday, between himself, attorney Gerald Kiefer and the firemen, there was a lot of fear and concern over chances of an accident. "We probably scared some people more than we should have, but I would rather do that ahead of time so people are made aware," said Bohn.

Bohn stressed he was not trying to push any insurance nor was he telling the village it did not need the coverage. He also noted he was not even sure if he could secure a policy even if the board decided to acquire one.


Speaking on behalf of himself and other firemen Bob Stoltzman told the trustees," we want to know someone is standing behind us, that we're not on our own. At \$90 an hour for legal fees I couldn't afford to hire a lawyer for myself and neither could any of the other men.'

Former Fire Chief Augie Bilgo told the meeting he could understand everyone's concern and he did not blame them. "I've gone through this situation and I don't know how you're going to control it. I just don't know what the answer is. You might as well say no more picnic, no more parade."

Bilgo conceded there is no absolute way to prevent underage drinking. The kids could even get the beer at a liquor store and say they got it at the picnic, he noted.

Bohn told the board he was able to locate only one insurance company which might consider offering a liability insurance policy. He said in an informal quote over the phone he was told it would cost \$1,000 for \$500,000 of coverage for the three days. The firemen would also be required to put up a double fence to deter the passing of beer out of the tent over the fence.

Bohn was asked what kind of



fencing the company expected. If you're looking at cyclone fence you're talking at least \$7,000 to \$8,000, said Bilgo. Trustee Mary Krueger said the Village did not have that kind of money for fencing. "We'd be better off to just give the department the \$8,000 and tell them to forget the picnic," said

Krueger. Trustee Ken Bonlender told fellow trustees he thought the village could come up with enough snow fence to provide the double fence. "If worse comes to worse, we'll have to close the north stand," said Bonlender.

The firemen said they would tighten up on security by asking for additional police assistance and being extremely vigilant in checking ID's. Fire Chief Don Ehnert told the board, "I don't like this any more than anybody else but we're between a rock and a hard place.

Administrator Dan Schmidt told the board the last time the village had taken the insurance was in 1985. "We paid \$1,545 for \$100,000 worth of coverage at that time," said Schmidt.







Pour syrup over popcorn and nuts, stirring to coat evenly. Bake at 250° for 50 minutes, stirring every 10 minutes: Cool on waxed paper. Makes 6 quarts.

St. Martin's annual outdoor Polka Mass is scheduled for 10:30 a.m. June 12 at the Hilltop Cross south of Hwy. 67 at Ashford.

Last year, an estimated 1000 people gathered on the hilltop, joining in worship at the fieldstone altar near the foot of the huge cross. The present cross is approximately 60 feet high and 25 feet across and is illuminated at night. It is often visible (as a blue glow) for a distance of 10 miles and on a clear evening, can be seen from Hwy. 41 near the Lomira area. The Hilltop Cross continues a European tradition which began when the first cross was erected on the hilltop in 1886 - the same year France presented the United States with the statue of Liberty. The present cross is the fourth cross to stand at this site and was erected in 1966.

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There is also a permanent altar built from fieldstones taken from the stone fence that divides neighboring properties on the hilltop. The alter was built in 1977 by parish families. Members of Lomira's American Legion will open and close the Mass with a flag ceremony. This year's outdoor Mass will again feature music by the Willie Fochs orchestra and will include polka and sing-along selections. A social on the parish grounds will include food, refreshments, games, a bake sale and

entertainment by Willie Fochs and his band. Fun volleyball will be open to all ages at no charge.

Proceeds from the social and donations are used in the maintenance and lighting of the Hilltop Cross.
