St. John's United Church of Christ of Beechwood to Celebrate Centennial



St. John's United Church of Christ, Beechwood, will celebrate its 100th Anniversary of its founding with a morning service and an afternoon program on Sunday, Oct. 16th.

The morning church service will begin at 10:00 with Dr. Rev. Wisconsin Frederick Trost, Conference Minister, as guest speaker. Liturgists for the service will be Rev. Robert Horst, Southeast Association Minister of the Wisconsin Conference, Rev.William Kesting, Jr., present pastor, and former pastors. Special music will be provided by St. John's Sunday School students and the joint choir of Beech-Silver Creek and wood. Boltonville.

Dinner and the afternoon program will be held at the former Beechwood Firehouse at the corner of Highways S and A. For advanced dinner reservations, call 994-4891 or 626-8019. Tickets will not be sold at the door. The afternoon program will include the "Good News Singers" of Lakeland College, "Good News and a message given by Rev. Charles Koch, son of the congregation. A slide presentation of Confirmation classes prepared by the Centennial Committee will climax the afternoon program. Anniversary books have been prepared with a complete history of the congregation, pictures of members and their families, pictures of the various organizations of the church and a statistical listing including all baptisms, births, the marriages and deaths that were recorded in the records of St. John's. These books and the Centennial plates will be on sale that day.

The public is cordially invited to share St. John's Centennial festivities with its members.

ST. JOHN'S HISTORY

St. John's of Beechwood was founded under the direction of the Rev. Julius Frank. The new congregation drew up their constitution in 1887 and worshipped in the former District 10 School House north of Beechwood and then moved to a building located across the road from the present day church. The members of the congregation, recognizing the need for a more permanent church building, organized their efforts toward the achievement of this goal.

Land was donated by Charles Koch and his wife Emelia. Donations for the building were received, not only from the members of the congregation, but from interested persons of various denominations who recognized the contribution this church would make to the Beechwood community. In October, 1888, the building was completed and the congregation holds this date as its birthdate. The charter members listed in the records were composed of the following persons and families: John Krautkramer, Sr., August Butzke, Sr., Henry Berg, Phillip Hammen, Peter Hammen, Henry Glass, John Kraemer, William Lawrenz, Jacob Held, Emil Gessner, Karl Koch and Frank Schroeter.

1603-1908; Rev. Paul Goldstern, 1909-1912; Rev. Kuno Kuenne, 1913-1935; Rev. Richard Gadow, 1935-1939; Rev. Herbert Tetzlaff, 1939-1941; Rev. Albert Meiller, 1941-1944; Rev. Melvin Schroer, 1945-1951; Rev. Bernard Fresenborg, 1951-1957; John Clausing, Summer Supply Student 1957; Rev. Ervin Menger, 1958-1960; Rev. Duane Budach, 1960-1967; Rev. Elmer Becker, 1967-1977. Rev. William Kesting, Jr., is serving the church since 1978.

St. John's has always shared its pastors. At present, St. John's shares with St. Paul's, Silver Creek and St. John's Boltonville.

During Rev. Voight's pastorate, St. John's did extensive remodeling. The interior of the church was given tin siding, the beautiful stained glass windows were installed and the exterior was painted.

The Rev. Goldstern was a talented organist and his love for music led to the organization of a choir at St. John's. The musical program started by him continued throughout the years. Our present organist, Mrs. Carolyn Beimborn, leads our choir. The choir members are: Mrs. Jean Krahn, Miss Ruth Hicken, Mrs. Joyce Gerlach, Mrs. Louise Hafermann, Miss Lisa Krahn, Mrs. Cindy Krause and Miss Jennifer Beimborn. Under Rev. Kuenne's faithful guidance of twenty-two years, the congregation grew in number and spirit.

25% Increase In Health Insurance Costs School Tax Mill Rate Drops

Despite the fact that changes in the School District's budget increased expenditures for 1988-89 by \$17,286, the mill rate for 1988 will drop one cent, from \$13.89 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation as approved at the annual meeting, to \$13.88.

Business Manager Cherna Gorder told the Kewaskum Board of Education Monday night, the addition of over \$23,000 for welding shop improvements and some other small expenditures were being offset by an increase in state aids as projected by the Department of Public Instruction.

In calculating the budget earlier this year, Gorder had based her figures on an anticipated 3% increase in the equalized valuation for the district. A recently released figure for the district, however, shows instead a 3.07% increase which will result in an anticipated \$72,000 more in state aids.

Also, based on the changes, the new figures would reduce the district's fund equity by only \$76,561 as compared to the figure of \$123,059 presented at the annual meeting, for a positive effect of \$46,498, according to Gorder's report.

In other budget related information, the board was advised that, when the district's health insurance comes up for renewal on December 1st, it will be looking at a 25% increase in premium costs.

Health insurance will rise from \$315,231 annually, to \$387,000. Dental insurance costs will increase from \$56,865 to \$61,000. Health insurance is the fourth largest single item in the budget following salaries, benefits, retirement and student transportation. In its efforts to reduce those insurance costs, the board decided place the to responsibility of 'shopping around' for a more cost effective plan in the hands of the Transportation Finance -Buildings and Grounds Committee. A motion to set up a special committee to look into other alternatives, including partial self-funding, died on a 3-3 tie vote (board member Clara Trapp was absent). Some of the board members felt a special committee should be set up to allow the teachers to have some input. Board member Perry Ankerson said the teachers were more than

welcome to attend the committee's meetings and add their comments and give their input. As to having a say in the final decision, that would still rest with the school board, he noted.

Ankerson again stressed he "Was not" trying to reduce benefits or take anything away from the teachers. He said all he was asking the district to do is take the exact same insurance package the district has now and shop around for a better price. "We're not changing any plans" stated Ankerson.

Ankerson also noted that every individual who had appeared before the board had told it that more and more companies, municipalities and school districts were going to some type of partial selffunding.

A request by District Administrator Dr. David Heather to re-institute the full time position of Director of Instruction and seek an individual for the post was denied.

Despite Heather's comments that he and the principals felt there was a definite need for a curriculum coordinator, a motion by board member Neal Weare to post the position died for lack of a second. Weare was upset by his fellow board members lack of action. He asked how some people on the board who profess to be for education could let this item go by.

Board member Ruth Schmitt said she was interested and would be willing to discuss it. Weare said then the motion should have been seconded at least for the purpose of discussion. He then asked board president Ralph Horner to continue on the next agenda item.

Rev. Julius Frank served St. John's from 1887-1892. Pastors serving after Rev. Frank were: Rev. Robert Grunewald, 1892-1903; Rev. Adolph Voight, In 1915, the congregation installed a new lighting system, of gasoline lights with mantles. In 1919, the congregation purchased a building from Mrs. Charles Koch which was moved to the church and

used for a school house.

In 1925 the front of the sanctuary was extended to include a chancel with an altar in keeping with the Evangelical tradition of an altarcentered church. The altar and the pulpit were placed in the chancel and a pastor's room was added on each side of the chancel.

In 1930 the members began the strenuous project of digging out a basement. With horses and dump wagons, the ground was hauled and dumped in the Beechwood Lake forming the pier. This major task was completed in 1931.

During Rev. Gadow's pastorate at St. John's, the congregation purchased the Evangelical Hymnals. A year later, at the January 1937 annual meeting, it was agreed upon to allow the women of the church to vote.

Rev. Herbert Tetzlaff organized the Young People's Society on October 20, 1939, known as the Youth Fellowship.

During the pastorate of Pastor Meiller, the congregation voted to affiliate with the Evangelical and Reformed Church of America. The merger was first effective nationally in 1934 when the Evangelical Churches and the Reformed Church of America, both separate bodies, became one.

During the pastorate of Rev. Schroer, the congregation had the honor of ordaining its first son into the ministry. Charles Koch, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Koch, was ordained on June 13, 1948

During Rev. Fresenborg's pastorate, the present electric Hammond organ was purchased and placed in front of the sanctuary.

In 1954, an entry way from the church to the basement on the south side of the building was completed. In 1956 a well was drilled and a portion on the north side of the church building was dug out for installing restrooms.

During Rev. Menger's pastorate, our congregation joined in the merger of the Evangelical and Reformed Church and the Congregational Christian Church, thus becoming a part of the denomination called, "The United Church of Christ.'

It was during Rev. Budach's pastorate, that certain improvements and additions were made. A public address system was installed; the building was painted inside and out; the floor, woodwork and altar were sanded and refinished; new pews and name plates were purchased by individual members and families of the congregation. In 1961 the congregation sold the school house to the Ervin Krahn family where it is used as a

own identity.

Rev. John Klindt was called and accepted to fill the full-time pastor's position and to assume the duties of Administrative Pastor. He was also responsible for the Random Lake and Fillmore churches. Rev. Elmer Becker accepted the position of the second full-time or Associate Pastor and was responsible for the Beechwood, Silver Creek and Boltonville Congregations. Upon Rev. Becker's retirement, Rev. William Kesting, Jr. was called and accepted the Associate Pastor's position. Rev. Daniel Hummel was hired for the part-time pastor's position. July 1, 1976 marked the official beginning of this agreement which was hereafter referred to as the Five Star Larger Parish.

With new demands and expectations of the various sister congregations, plans for dissolvement began. On May 1, 1981 the Five Star Larger Parish officially dissolved. St. John's, Random Lake became an independent congregation. St. Martin's, Fillmore linked with St. Paul's Waubeka to form a two-point charge, leaving St. John's Beechwood, St. Paul's, Silver Creek and St. John's, Boltonville a three-point charge. Rev. Kesting, stayed and served these three churches.

During Rev. Kesting's pastorate, St. John's congregation did some major improvements to the church. The interior and exterior of the church was painted and two ceiling fans were installed. A 100-amp service was installed and the electrical wiring was updated. Four beautiful Gothic styled hanging light fixtures completed the beautification of the Sanctuary.

On Sunday, Oct. 18, 1987, St. John's began their centennial year with a pre-centennial celebration. The morning order of worship was based on an old Evangelical Service. The old fashion flair was portrayed with all the participants in the service dressed in attire from 100 years ago. Rev. Charles Koch, son of the congregation was the morning guest speaker. A potluck luncheon was served in the church basement and horse drawn hay rides were provided during the noon hour. The afternoon guest speaker was Rev. Wade Schemmel, another son of our congregation. Also a historical skit was presented by members of the congregation.

In Jan. of 1988 recognition was given to Rev. Kesting for having served ten years to the Beechwood, Silver Creek and Boltonville congregations.

At present, St. John's congregation has 112 members. Worship is conducted each Sunday and in conjunction with St. Paul's Silver Creek and St. John's, Boltonville, 9:00 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. services alternate each week. Our Pastor, Rev. Kesting, leads worship at two locations each Sunday. A supply pastor leads worship at the third church. The organization and cooperation of the total church's program is the responsibility of the Church Council. The President of the Council is Sylvester Krahn; Vice President, Eugene Krahn; Secretary, David Strack: Treasurer, Mrs. Jean Krahn; Financial Secretary, Larry Gessner and Trustee Wayne Gerlach. The Women's Guild was organized in 1907 as the Ladies Aid and has an active membership of 12 women.

St. John's amended their constitution to allow female members their right to hold offices; this was adopted February 22, 1970. St. John's also had the privilege of ordaining its second son of the congregation into the ministry. Wade Schemmel was ordained in June of 1971 at St. John's Beechwood. Rev. Schemmel is the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Charles Schemmel.

In 1975, St. John's Congregation along with St. Paul's, Silver Creek; St. John's Boltonville; St. John's, Random Lake; and St. Martin's, Fillmore entered into a cooperative program that would provide ministerial leadership to all the churches. This agreement called for two full-time pastors and one part-time pastor. It also provided that each church would retain its

Pheasant Season Opens Saturday

MADISON, WI - Across Wisconsin, pheasant and other small game hunting seasons open on Saturday, October 15, including bobwhite quail and Hungarian partridge, and cottontail rabbit in the southern half of the state.

"Pheasant prospects are questionable," said Ed Frank, Department of Natural Resources wildlife management specialist. "Spring breeding populations appeared good, but brood numbers are not looking favorable. It could be drought related.'

Early hay cutting and release of set-aside lands for cutting hay because of the drought might have had a greater effect than expected on the numbers of young pheasants, according to Frank. The drought also could have put some birds into other cover types where they are harder to see because there are more weeds and less corn in certain fields.

"Hunters shouldn't panic, though, because numbers have 1987," Frank added. "And last year was an exceptional production year at the State Game Farm.'

The State Game Farm at Poynette has produced some 65,000 pheasants for stocking public hunting grounds in 1988, of which 53,000 are cocks. Production is good even though the total number of pheasants isdown some 4,000 to 5,000 from 1987. In addition, cooperating sports clubs will be stocking more than 60,000 roosters in 37 counties.

The pheasants from Poynette will begin to be stocked on 96 state wildlife areas in 38 counties beginning the week before the season opens. This stocking will continue until the week before the opening of the Wisconsin gun deer season in November on most southern and eastern public hunting grounds.

"Some pheasants will be stocked after the gun deer season in southern and eastern Wisconsin, but not as many as last year because of the return resident raccoon hunting season to normal production," Frank opens statewide on October 15. explained.

dropped only slightly from hunter, season prospects are somewhat brighter than last year. Population densities are not that much higher, but coveys are being reported in areas where there weren't any last year.

> "The southwestern part of the state is the best area for bobwhites," Frank said. "Some of the better counties are Iowa, Richland, Grant, Marquette, Adams, Columbia, Crawford.'' and

Hungarian partridge numbers are steady, showing little change from 1987. Frank explained that he had expected an increase, but there is no indication of that in the brood data survey information.

Other seasons that will open include sharp-tailed grouse and jackrabbit. Sharp-tailed grouse may only be hunted north of highways 64, 13 and 29.

Bobcat season opens for the area of the state north of Highway 64 with a limit of one per season by permit only. The nonresident raccoon The For the bobwhite quail season opens on October 29.
