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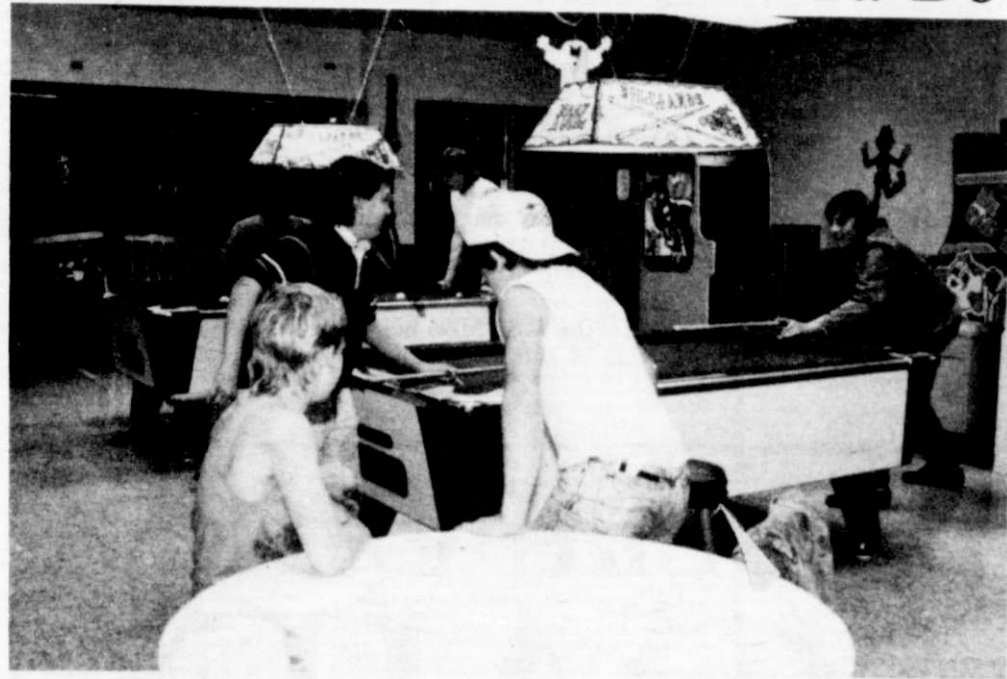

Kewaskum's newest business is directed toward the area's younger clientele. "Somethin-Ta-Do" opened last Saturday in the former Steiner Electric store on Main Street and its emphasis is aimed at giving young people a place in town to meet and have things to do.

Somethin-Ta-Do Arcade offers video games, pinball, darts and, within the next few weeks pool teams.

Proprietors Sherry and Randy Kemp said this week a business like theirs was needed in the area. They noted that before they opened the kids really had nowhere to meet in town where they could just hang around and play games and music.

Early in November the Kemps hope to start pool leagues. Youngsters are asked to sign up so they know how many people are interested. The teams will be broken down into three age groups, 10-14, 15-17, and 18-21.

Beside the games, the arcade offers soft drinks, ice cream, sandwiches and pizza. The games and music will be changed regularly so the kids will not get bored with the same old thing.

"We're also going to let the kids decorate one of the windows as each new holiday comes up," said Sherry Kemp. "Right now we've got a contest going to find a mascot," said Kemp. Anyone is eligible to submit an entry but each drawing must be original and the youngster's own idea. The winner will be selected at the arcade's grand opening on Saturday, November 12th which will also feature reduced prices

and prizes.

"So far the kids have been very well behaved," said Randy, "they even clean up after themselves when they have something to eat."

If the youngsters have any requests as far as games and music, the Kemps said they would take them into considera-

tion.

Sherry and Randy said they want to assure parents that there is adult supervision in the arcade at all times. Somethin-Ta-Do is open Monday through Thursday from noon to 8:00 p.m., Friday and Saturday noon until 10:00 p.m. and Sunday noon until 6:00 p.m.

1989 Fire Contracts Go Out Work Begun On '89 Budget

The Kewaskum Village Board began its annual task of reviewing departmental budgets for the coming year. On Monday night's agenda were preliminary budgets for the Police and Fire Departments.

In a brief run through, Village Administrator Dan Schmidt pointed out areas which reflected any significant changes for each department.

Preliminary figures for the Police Department show an anticipated budget of \$146,661 for 1989, an increase of 2.17% over the 1988 budget of \$143,542.

One of the increases noted in the Fire Department's budget was a 6½% increase in the cost of liability and vehicle insurance. The overall shared total of the budget, however, reflects only a 3.17% increase from \$84,752 in 1988, to \$87,439 for 1989.

Schmidt noted budget preparations were somewhat behind last year's schedule, however, he hoped to have all the departmental budgets formulated in time to hold a general budget hearing on November 28th.

In related Fire Department budget data, Schmidt submitted the proposed fire service contracts for the coming year. He again noted the village was using the same formula as had been used for the past few years. That formula is based solely on equalized value figures for the year and the number of firecalls each township had over the past three years.

For the 1989 contracts, firecall counts from 1985, 1986 and 1987, were used.

The Village of Kewaskum had 15 calls, with an equalized valuation of \$58,029,600, which worked out to a 1989 fire contract cost of \$55,216, down 3.9% from the 1988 contract of \$57,451.

The Town of Kewaskum had 20 firecalls over that same three-year period with an equalized valuation of \$30,492,400. That brought their 1989 contract's cost to \$45,721, up 11.6% over 1988's figure of \$40,949. Schmidt noted the township's large increase was due in part to the significant change in equalized valuation.

For the Town of Auburn, which is partially served by the Kewaskum Fire Department, there were 10 firecalls during 1985-87 and an estimated equalized valuation of \$17,213,035, for a 1989 contract cost of \$23,985, up .6% over 1988's

cost of \$23,836. Schmidt noted that while the township's calls had decreased, there had been an increase in the equalized valuation of 3%.

Schmidt noted there is always some questions as to the equity of the formula. He noted it is, in fact, a very fair way of calculating each community's portion of the fire service costs. "Next year the village will get hammered, that's what makes the formula a fair method of calculating contracts," stated Schmidt. He referred to the fact that when the 1988 figures are included in the formula and 1985's dropped, (should there be no more calls in 1988) the village's three-year count will jump significantly from 15 to 25. From January through September of this year, the village had 13 firecalls.

Trustee Mary Krueger asked Schmidt what portion of the costs the townships pay for ambulance and rescue services. Schmidt said, "none." The village picks up the entire cost of insurance, he noted. The only thing paid is the cost of the actual run and mileage and that is paid by the individual being transported, said Schmidt.

Fire Chief Donald Ehert noted the townships should realize that portion of the department's service isn't costing them anything.

Krueger and some of the other trustees felt the townships should also share that cost. Schmidt told the board it was too late for this year but he could work up a formula to prorate insurance costs for ambulances for the next contract.

After completing a review of the contracts the board moved to submit them to the respective townships.

In other business bids for the cab modification of the Fire Department's Telesquirt truck were opened. Of the three responses, only one company submitted a bid to do the work, the other two companies declined to bid on the job. A bid of \$22,221 for the canopy modification was received from Pierce Manufacturing Company who originally built the truck. The bid was turned over to the Fire Department for further review.

The board also approved the hiring of a new replacement secretary for the Municipal Building, and the proposed snowmobile route in the village for 1988-89.

Action on a request by the library to purchase a computer was tabled so the data could be reviewed further.

A Flu and Pneumonia immunization clinic will be offered by the Washington County Community Health Nursing Service, October 25, 1988, at: West Bend Seniors, Court House Auditorium, 12:30 - 2:30 p.m.

Both vaccines are available to persons over 65, and those under 65 who have a chronic disease. There is a charge of \$3.00 for the flu vaccine and \$8.00 for the pneumonia vaccine.

a building expansion project.

The greatest part of the expansion project will be to the northwest of the west building. It will include a new emergency unit, ambulatory surgery unit, patient admitting offices and a new maternity unit.

An addition on the east side will include new space for the radiology department in order to add computerized tomography (C.T. scanning) and a new laundry. The total cost of the project will be in the range of \$7 million. The project will be paid for with reserves and earnings, contributions and some borrowing.

A special campaign is now in progress to raise a minimum of \$1,200,000 in donations. "The expansion and remodeling are necessary due to the increase in population in the hospital service area, advances in

technology and changes in how health care is delivered in the last 10 to 15 years," Bury said. "The emphasis has changed from impatient care to outpatient care. Since 1983, for example, outpatient visits have increased from 27,875 to 41,874 and outpatient surgeries went up from 1,130 to 1,876.

The last major expansion at St. Joseph's was in 1972. Although equipment has continually been updated and many small changes were made to the building, some areas of the hospital are in need of major renovation now.

The Durrant Group has been hired as architects and C. G. Schmidt as construction manager. Final plans are being prepared. The target date to start building is Spring, 1989.

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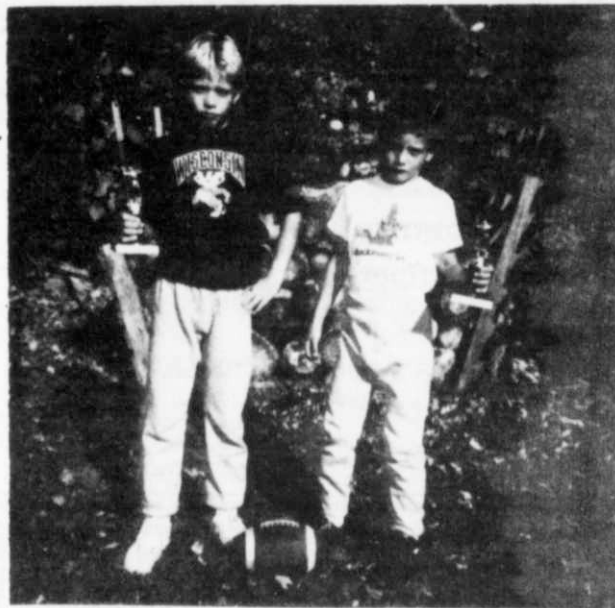

A new company has been formulated in the Kewaskum area with its headquarters right at Kewaskum High School. The company, "Sit 'n Pin," the personnel; fifteen high school students all taking part in the business concepts class, under the direction of Mr. Dale Schatz.

On the other side of the cushion is the logo of the Kewaskum Indian with the word "Indians" printed across the top. It also features a convenient handle for carrying to and from sporting events.

The cushions were supposed to be here for the Homecoming game but didn't make it in time. Still, you can receive your cushion for the low price of just five dollars by using the order form printed with this article.

The "pin" part of the company name comes from the other product manufactured and sold, that of Homecoming pins. There were five different pins to choose from, all designed "in-house" by Art teacher Mrs. Mary Steffen. They were then put together by the students who sold them during lunch hours at the school store during Homecoming week. True to business sales technique, Sit 'n Pin, by the end of the week had to put their pins "on sale" to move the

merchandise and even wound up making a profit.

Its symptoms range from blurry vision and poor coordination to complete paralysis. Multiple sclerosis affects more people than cystic fibrosis, hemophilia, muscular dystrophy and myasthenia gravis combined. As of yet, there is no known cause, universally effective treatment or cure.

VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM NEWS NOTES

A reminder to all Village of Kewaskum Utility users.

All water bills that have accrued and remain unpaid on November 7, 1988, shall be placed on the tax roll by the Village Clerk for collection. A late payment charge of three percent (3%) but not less than 30c will be added to the unpaid balance. (PSC of WI Rate File, Mg-1).

All sewer bills that have accrued and remain unpaid on November 7, 1988, shall be placed on the tax roll by the Village Clerk for collection. The owner or user of the real estate being served by the Wastewater Treatment Facility shall be liable for interest upon all unpaid balances at a rate of six percent (6%). (Municipal Code - Chapter 15, Section 6.0 Penalties).

All special assessments that have been billed for services or installation of improvements, such as sidewalk, curb/gutter, water and sewer mains, etc. that have accrued and remain unpaid on November 7, 1988, shall be placed on the tax roll by the Village Clerk for collection. (With the exception of the 1988 Capital Improvements Sidewalk and Curb & Gutter Project affected properties, which will be subject to tax roll placement with the 1989 tax bills.) The owner of said real estate receiving those services or improvements shall be liable for interest upon all unpaid balances at those specific rates as pre-determined at the time of the implementation of the special assessment or as so mentioned in the Municipal Code or Wisconsin Statutes. 10-21-2t

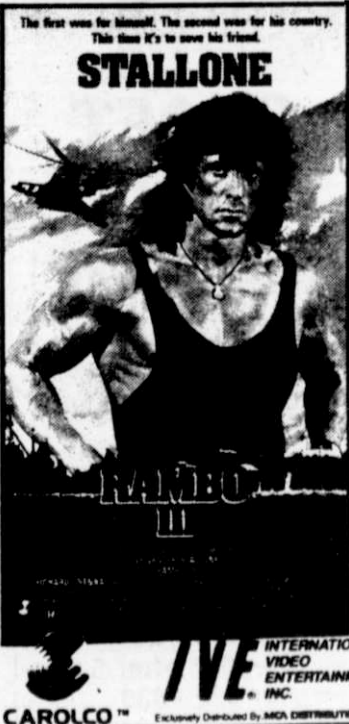

Catherine, whose host family is Mr. and Mrs. Tom Radmann

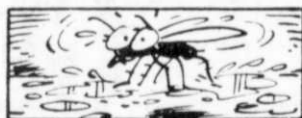

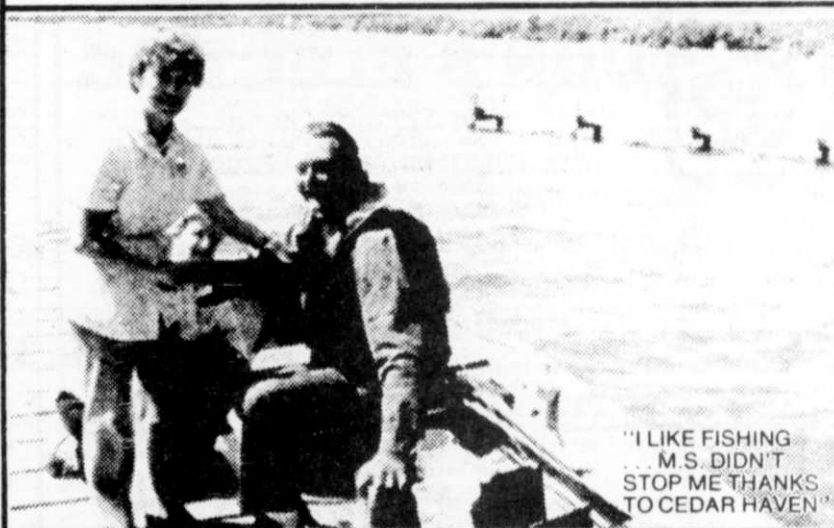

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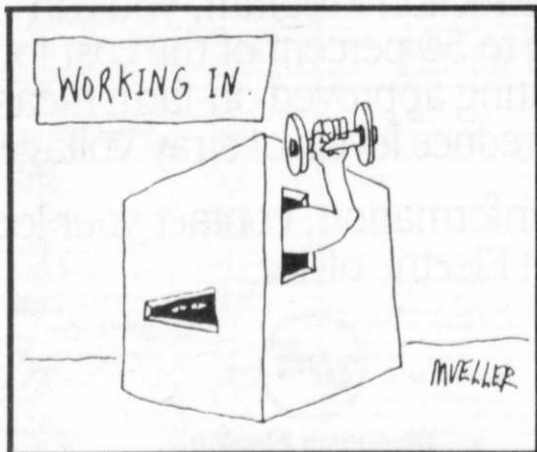

Our Flag Born Through Valor

Out of the travail of our nation's birth, in the mist of a bitter war for independence, there emerged on June 14, 1777, our National Emblem, a beautiful flag combining the blue of vigilance, perseverance and justice, with the white of purity, and the red of hardiness and valor, in a symbol of freedom that has lifted the hearts of Americans down through the years.

History tells us that the stars and stripes are a development of an earlier flag, authorized by the Congress in the fall of 1775, known as the Congress Colors, the Grand Union Flag, and the Cambridge Flag. The Congress colors included the same red and white stripes, signifying separation from the mother country, but had the Union Jack of Britain instead of the blue field and white stars.

It has been said that our stars and stripes is a "living" flag. It

breathes vitality as it ripples in the breeze. It has exemplified vigor and endurance, in proclaiming man's freedom and his right to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness through two centuries. It grows as our nation grows, adding a star for each new state taken into our union.

The name of John Paul Jones is also closely linked to our flag. Jones raised the flag on the USS Ranger in Portsmouth, N.H. on July 4, 1777 and may have been the first military commander to have flown it. He had requested a group of patriotic ladies of Portsmouth to gather in a "flag bee" and sew together the Navy's first stars and stripes flag.

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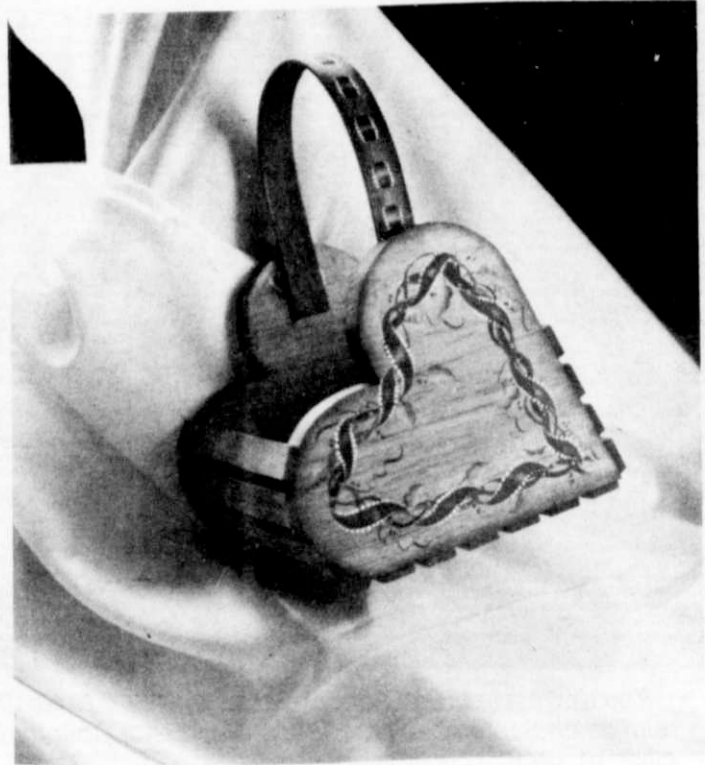
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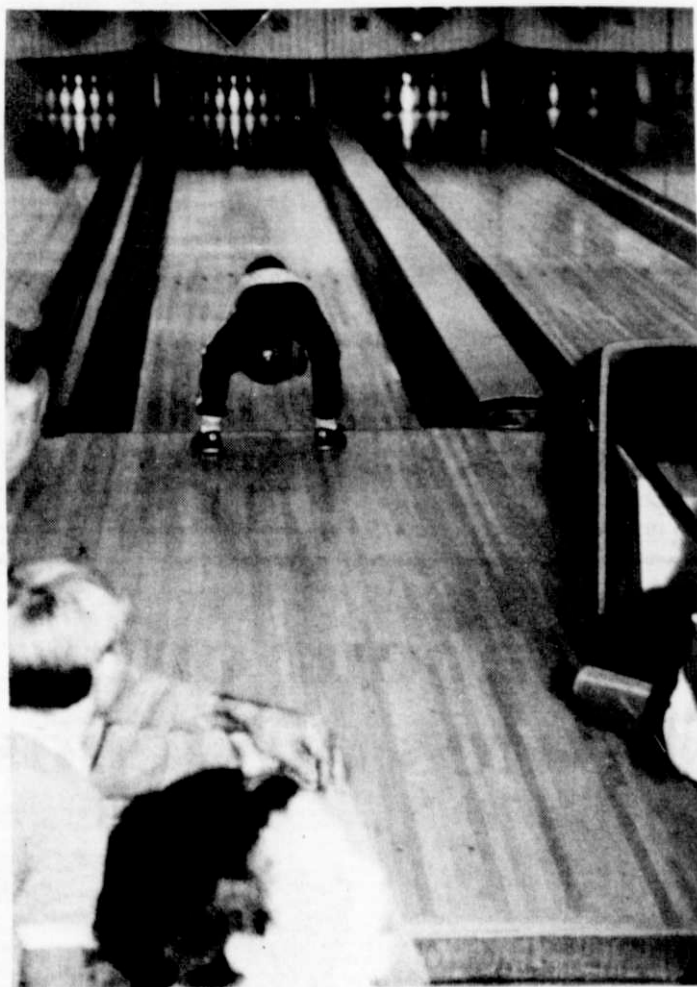

Winning a third place was Joanne Stautz.

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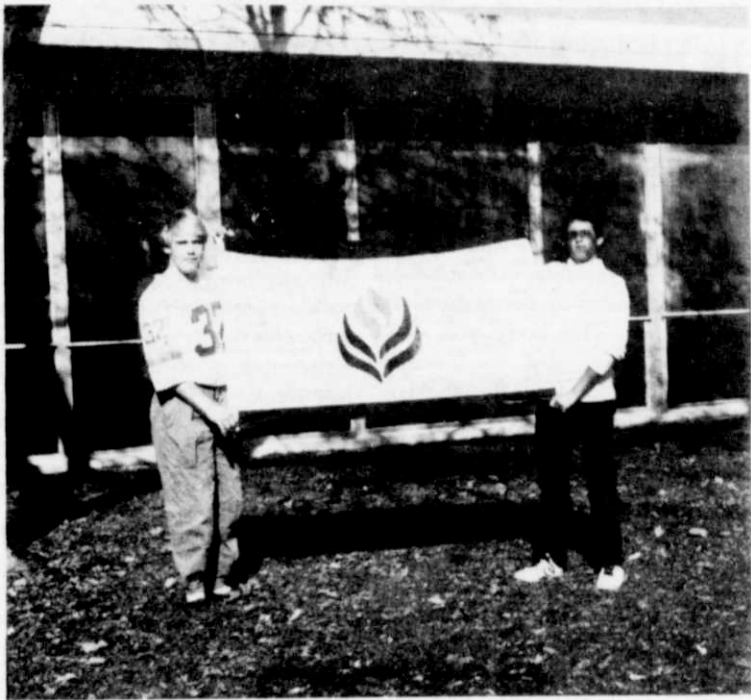
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New Flag Flies Over KHS

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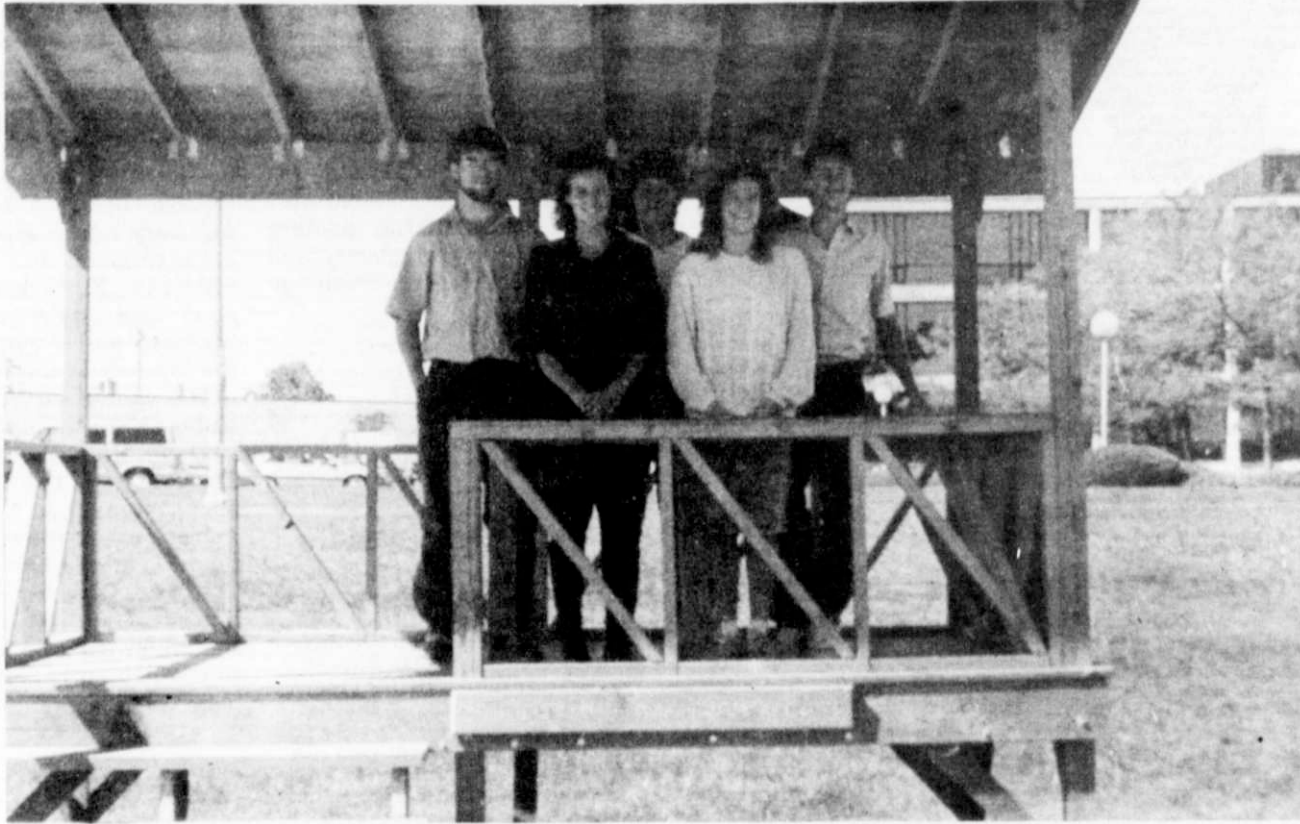
