Odyssey of the Mind Should Not Be Singled Out Light Agenda for School Board

#### By GERRY MUELLER Statesman Staff Writer

The most significant business at Monday's school board meeting was the recognition of Tom Larsen as "School District Elementary Principal of the Year." Other than that, item action for the board was very light.

The board did approve the budgeted purchase of some replacement boards for bleachers in the field house as well as some coaching assignments. Fran Leider was appointed intramurals person for Farmington Elementary School, Marie Ritger, Wayne intramurals, Steve Ruplinger as 8th grade wrestling coach, Brenda Mueller as 7th grade girls basketball coach and Chris

Kirchner as assistant gymnastics coach.

District Administrator Dr. David Heather was appointed **Deputy School Board Elections** Clerk. He informed the board that school board candidates may take out papers beginning December 5th, with the filing deadline 5:00 p.m., Tuesday January 2nd.

The issue of a district curriculum coordinator, which had been placed on the agenda by board member Clara Trapp, was again addressed by Heather. He stressed that it was his, and the other administrators' feeling that the position of curriculum coordinator was a very critical one. "There is so much going on with state mandates, state

grants, and federal grants that I feel this is a very important position," stated Heather.

Heather advised the board that the duties of the position are presently assigned jointly to Middle School principal Stephen King and High School principal LeRoy Kopecky. He said, however, he considered the coordinator's post a full time job in itself. Heather noted the present solution would only lead to diminished effectiveness down the road.

Board member Perry Ankerson questioned, "Inasmuch as this is Mrs. Trapp's agenda item, I wonder what her position is." Trapp indicated she had no position and had merely placed the item on the agenda for the purchase of further discussion. No action was taken by the board on the issue.

The board discussed a new policy addressed to the 'Odyssey of the Mind' program. Board member Ron Beimborn objected to the program being discriminated against as the object of a policy. He felt that now there was money available, all kinds of restrictions were being set up. Beimborn told fellow board members that, if such a policy is to be instituted, it should address 'all non-sport' extra curriculars.

Board member Ruth Schmitt said she had to take responsibility for development of the policy. Her rationale was that other policies governed activities at the high school level, while students from the elementary level right on through up to the high school level participate in Odyssey of the Mind. She said all she was asking for were some guidelines for Mr. Larsen to follow in overseeing the program. The board directed Schmitt to take the policy back to her committee for further discussion and review. All the board members were urged to attend the next committee meeting to give their input on the policy.






#### FIREMEN RESPOND **TO CHIMNEY FIRE**

### **Excessive Fees Bring** License Suspension

A former Campbellsport lawyer lost his license to practice last week after being found guilty of professional misconduct. By order of the State Supreme Court, Attorney Arthur Guenther, Jr. has been suspended from practice for two years.

# Give Thanks to Caregivers During Thanksgiving Holiday

The week of Thanksgiving is National Family Caregivers Week. This time presents an opportunity to give special recognition to persons who give their time, love and assistance to maintain older loved ones in the community and assure that their various needs are met.

Families, not governmental agencies, provide the majority of care needed by older persons living in the community. In fact, 80% of the care needed by the elderly experiencing limitations with day-to-day tasks come from the family - mainly wives daughters. In fact, and according to a 1987 National Survey of Caregivers sponsored by AARP and The Travelers Companies Foundation, approximated seven million Americans are caregivers.

The time caregivers spend giving care may vary from a few hours a day to many hours. The tasks performed, among others, may include bathing and dressing, cooking, cleaning,

and laundry; handling finances, administering medications; changing dressings and Intravenous tubes; running errands to stores and businesses; and being a source of caregiving information both to the older person and to other friends and family members.

Although many caregivers find the role rewarding, few will say that it is easy. Caregiving can be physically and emotionally stressful for both persons involved. A once independent and proud person may feel helpless; he or she experience anger, may confusion, and fear. For the caregiver, the pressure of a busy schedule can be compounded by feeling inadequate about providing care or preventing pain, by feeling both love and pity for the family member or friend, and by feeling anger at having his or her life consumed by the situation.

Caregivers are part of an increasingly important resource that is meeting the needs of the growing number of chronically ill and disabled older persons in our population. Many public and private organizations are beginning to recognize this important role of family caregivers and offer assistance.

Caregivers need our support and they also need to know that their efforts are important. So as we celebrate this special time of Thanksgiving, let us keep in mind the contributions that caregivers make and express our appreciation to them.



# **HUNTERS:** Don't Store Venison in Garbage Bags

Congratulations on getting your deer. You've got the food of kings, so don't treat your venison like garbage. Keep it out of garbage bags and you'll keep things much simpler for butcher

venison at home, be sure the containers or packages are small enough to allow the meat to freeze quickly. Use several small containers, spaced apart in the freezer. A large quantity

runs through the center of the county connecting the east and west. system is put in and taken out each season. This is done by the Association member clubs.

Plastic garbage bags aren't intended for food use, explains Dennis Buege, University of Wisconsin - Madison extension meat specialist. The bags are often made from recycled plastics, and may transfer hazardous substances to stored meat.

Wisconsin meat inspectors require meat processors to remove colored garbage bags from incoming venison and repackage the meat in approved wrappers, he says. This can be messy, especially if the venison has frozen to the bag.

There are several alternatives to garbage bags. Tightly wrap the meat in several layers of freezer paper, Buege suggests, or place it in clear plastic bags that are intended for food plastic storage. Rigid containers, such as ice-cream pails, are also acceptable.

When freezing boneless

of meat in one big container may spoil at the center before it freezes completely. Turn your freezer down to its coldest setting a day before you put the meat in, and return it to the normal setting when the meat is frozen.

### Saturday Morning Fever to Cool: DEER SEASON OPENS

All the preparation and anticipation more than 650,000 licensed deer hunters have built up will cool with the dawning of Wisconsin's 1988 gun deer season at 6:30 a.m. Saturday, Nov. 19. The season continues through Sunday, Nov. 27.

Department of Natural Resources wildlife managers estimate a population of whitetailed deer numbering more than one million statewide, offering a potential harvest of about 270,000.

Weather, as always, will play an important factor in the deer hunt. It could affect the total harvest especially if it's too wet, too cold, or if heavy snow prevents hunters from going into the woods," said Frank Haberland, DNR big game specialist.

'Last year snow in the north and rain and fog over the rest of the state during the last weekend of the season cut into the harvest totals. But barring weather calamities, hunters statewide should have a good year," added Haberland.

The effect of last season's wet second weekend is that some of those deer are still in the herd and available for the hunt this season. The 1987-88 winter was also a very favorable one for the deer. The mild winter and good fawn production has increased the deer herd.

The fact there are more deer in the state this season is reflected by an increase of 34,400 in the number of Hunter's Choice permits issued. There were 291,865 permits issued this year. In 21 deer management units, many hunters will receive bonus permits.

A Hunter's Choice permit allows the hunter to shoot either a buck or a doe in that specific

unit. With a bonus permit, the hunter is allowed to harvest an additional antlerless deer only.

"Some of the permit numbers might be lower in some areas because deer management goals were met with the 1987 hunt, but generally the number of permits available are up,' Haberland said. "Hunters, especially in the north (north of Highway 64), should be seeing some really good deer populations and hunting conditions."

Hunters bagged 250,530 deer in 1987 during the gun hunting season. The record gun deer harvest was in 1985, when hunters bagged 274,302 deer. This should be the fifth consecutive year of a harvest totalling more that 250,000 deer. Haberland estimated.

Deer harvest results should increase somewhat all across the north, decrease somewhat in the central and western part of the state, and remain the same in the south. In the DNR's Northwest District management area, a record number of deer were taken in 1987, and that number could go even higher this season.

'We have a boom or bust situation in the north," Haberland explained. "When the weather cooperates, hunters have a great opportunity to harvest deer. When the winters are hard, Mother Nature takes the deer.

The drought of 1988 did not affect the deer herd. The dry

weather has enabled farmers to pick most of their standing corn, eliminating a hiding place for deer.

There is one regulation change for hunters during the 1988 season. Handguns, legal for deer hunting, can be possessed along with other firearms legal for the zone in which a hunter is hunting.


