## Odyssey of the Mind Should Not Be Singled Out

# Light Agenda for School Board

The most significant business at Monday's school board meeting was the recognition of Tom Larsen as "School District Elementary Principal of the Year." Other than that, item action for the board was very light.

The board did approve the budgeted purchase of some replacement boards for bleachers in the field house as well as some coaching assignments. Fran Leider was appointed intramurals person for Farmington Elementary School, Marie Ritger, Wayne intramurals, Steve Ruplinger as 8th grade wrestling coach, Brenda Mueller as 7th grade girls basketball coach and Chris

Kirchner as assistant gymnastics coach.

District Administrator Dr. David Heather was appointed Deputy School Board Elections Clerk. He informed the board that school board candidates may take out papers beginning December 5th, with the filing deadline 5:00 p.m., Tuesday January 2nd.

The issue of a district curriculum coordinator, which had been placed on the agenda by board member Clara Trapp, was again addressed by Heather. He stressed that it was his, and the other administrators' feeling that the position of curriculum coordinator was a very critical one. "There is so much going on with state mandates, state

grants, and federal grants that I feel this is a very important position," stated Heather.

Heather advised the board that the duties of the position are presently assigned jointly to Middle School principal Stephen King and High School principal LeRoy Kopecky. He said, however, he considered the coordinator's post a full time job in itself. Heather noted the present solution would only lead to diminished effectiveness down the road.

Board member Perry Ankerson questioned, "Inasmuch as this is Mrs. Trapp's agenda item, I wonder what her position is." Trapp indicated she had no position and had merely placed the item on the agenda for the purchase of further discussion. No action was taken by the board on the issue.

The board discussed a new policy addressed to the 'Odyssey of the Mind' program. Board member Ron Beimbom objected to the program being discriminated against as the object of a policy. He felt that now there was money available, all kinds of restrictions were being set up. Beimbom told fellow board members that, if such a policy is to be instituted, it should address 'all non-sport' extra curriculars.

Board member Ruth Schmitt said she had to take responsibility for development of the policy. Her rationale was that other policies governed activities at the high school level, while students from the elementary level right on through up to the high school level participate in Odyssey of the Mind. She said all she was asking for were some guidelines for Mr. Larsen to follow in overseeing the program.

The board directed Schmitt to take the policy back to her committee for further discussion and review. All the board members were urged to attend the next committee meeting to give their input on the policy.

In other action the board approved expanding the high school course "Pathway To a Career," from a one-semester 1/2 credit course, to a one-year full credit course to provide more time to utilize teaching materials which are available.

The board denied a request to add elective senior physical education classes, Weight Control and Weight Training to the curriculum for next year.

The board also approved maternity leave for Jean

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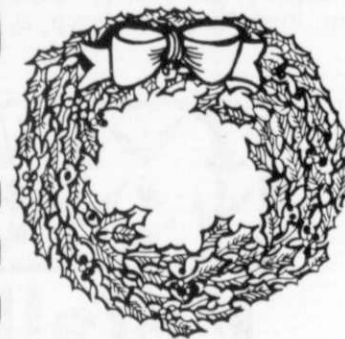

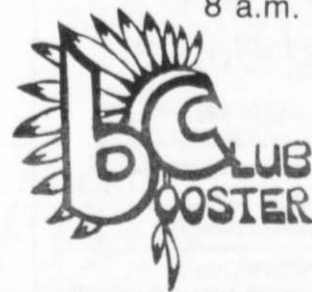

### Excessive Fees Bring License Suspension

A former Campbellsport lawyer lost his license to practice last week after being found guilty of professional misconduct. By order of the State Supreme Court, Attorney Arthur Guenther, Jr. has been suspended from practice for two years.

The suspension is the result of a case in which investigators found Guenther had charged \$30,000 too much for his services to a former Kewaskum couple.

Along with the suspension, which began Friday, Guenther was ordered to pay back \$25,600 plus interest due from the day the fee was paid, to William and

Jane Haack.

Guenther charged his clients \$35,112 for 1982 legal services involving foreclosure on a farm they sold to a son, and for bankruptcy and criminal matters involving that son. An investigation found that a reasonable fee for Guenther's services was \$4,400.

According to the court, Guenther's license had been suspended once before in 1985 for one year. That suspension was also for inappropriate charges for his legal services.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in Regular Session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

President Paul Blumer presided. Trustee Thomas McElhatton and Trustee Charles Boegel asked to be excused and were absent, all other Trustee Members were present. A quorum was present.

The meeting was opened with a Moment of Silence and Pledge of Allegiance.

On a motion by Trustee Richard Schlice, seconded by Trustee Howard Laubenstein, and unanimously carried by voice vote, the minutes of the October 17, 1988 meeting were approved as printed.

Bids for the Police Squad replacement for 1989 were opened:

On a motion by Trustee Mary Krueger, seconded by Trustee Kenneth Bonlender, and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board turned the bids over to Chief Richard Knoebel for review and a recommendation.

On a motion by Trustee Richard Schlice, seconded by Trustee Howard Laubenstein, and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board accepted the recommendation of the Kewaskum Fire Department Equipment Committee on approving the Canopy Crew Cab Modification - 1976 Pierce Tele-Squirt as bid by Bendlin Fire Equipment Co., Inc. (Pierce Mfg.), Milwaukee, WI at a cost of \$22,221.00. It was noted the money to do said work is from the 1988 and 1989 budgets.

On a motion by Trustee Mary Krueger, seconded by Trustee Howard Schlice, and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board approved the building permit application of Michael Geidel, 1130 Roseland Dr. to construct a new single family house. The office was instructed to issue the permit upon proper payment of fees. The permit was reviewed and approved by both the Certified Building Inspector and Zoning Administrator.

Administrator Daniel Schmidt reviewed a variety of correspondence with the Board.

On a motion by Trustee Kenneth Bonlender, seconded by Trustee Howard Laubenstein, and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board approved the payment of bills as recommended by the Administrative Committee. The total of all claims as recommended are as follows:

The Board reviewed the new street lights as installed by Wisconsin Electric Power Co. and acknowledged some areas of poor lighting due to the new lights. The Board will monitor the situation and in the spring of 1989, discuss the matter again, and if necessary, order additional lighting. It was by consensus to have the Administrator request two additional fixtures for Lin de Lane.

On a motion by Trustee Mary Krueger, seconded by Trustee Richard Schlice, and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board authorized switching recycling firms for the disposal of Village recyclables. If Zahn's supply the Village with a letter of guaranty regarding a source of prompt disposal of materials and storage containers for said materials, the Department of Public Works should proceed with a switch.

Trustee Kenneth Bonlender, the Library Board Representative, reported that the Kewaskum Woman's Club again has donated \$100.00 to the Library and that this money will be used towards encyclopedias. Also a book has been donated by the Junior Girl Scouts.

A brief update was held on the Capital Improvements Sidewalk Project and Sewer and Water Project.

Administrator Schmidt reviewed all proposed department budgets for 1989. The

increase varied as follows. Administrative 2.6 percent (\$1,896), Fire 3.2 percent (\$2,687), Library 30.2 percent (\$8,801), Municipal Building 4.2 percent (\$761), Park & Recreation 11.1 percent (\$7,924), Police 2.2 percent (\$3,119), and Public Works 2.2 percent (\$6,442). General Budget in total would reflect an increase of 3.1 percent (\$5,222). It was noted a home assessed at \$50,000 would realize an increase of \$11.10.

Action was taken on Resolution No. 88-17 and 88-18 as attached hereto:

On a motion by Trustee Mary Krueger, seconded by Trustee Howard Laubenstein, and carried by the majority on a voice vote with Trustee Kenneth Bonlender voting no, the Board authorized Mrs. Hlavaty, the Library Director to purchase a computer as reviewed and as she recommended at a cost of \$3,275.00.

On a motion by Trustee Richard Schlice, seconded by Trustee Kenneth Bonlender, and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board approved the contract for 1989 with Bowmar Appraisal, Appleton, WI at a cost of \$3,200.

On a motion by Trustee Richard Schlice, seconded by Trustee Howard Laubenstein and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board authorized the signing of an offer to purchase and counter offer to sell part of a parcel of land V4-23 and V-4-23A, Assessor's Plot (approximately 7 acres) for \$42,400.00 to James A. Wessing.

On a motion by Trustee Mary Krueger, seconded by Trustee Howard Laubenstein and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board changed the date for the November Mid Monthly meeting to November 28, 1988 after the Budget Public Hearing.

On a motion by Trustee Richard Schlice, seconded by Trustee Kenneth Bonlender, to adjourn to closed session under Chapter 19.85(1)(c) and 19.85(1)(e) of the statutes to consider employment, compensation, and performance of public employees over which the governmental body has jurisdiction and to deliberate and negotiate the disposition of public lands. Roll call vote was 5 "Aye," 0 "Nay," 2 "Absent." The motion was carried by the majority.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Six Thousand Four Hundred Seventy Eight Dollars and Zero Cents (\$6,478.00) be added to the budgeted Quarterly Circulation Payments and be moved to the Restricted Fund Account #10912 under Sub-Account #5511-C County Library, noting that the revenue account #44611 Library was understated in the 1988 budget, reflecting an unnecessary increase in the 1988 tax levy. The balance of these funds is to be used to offset future increases or budget expenditures for the Library, unless the extension of library service has warranted Library expenditures to increase in excess as the normal growth of library levy prior to joining the County Library System.

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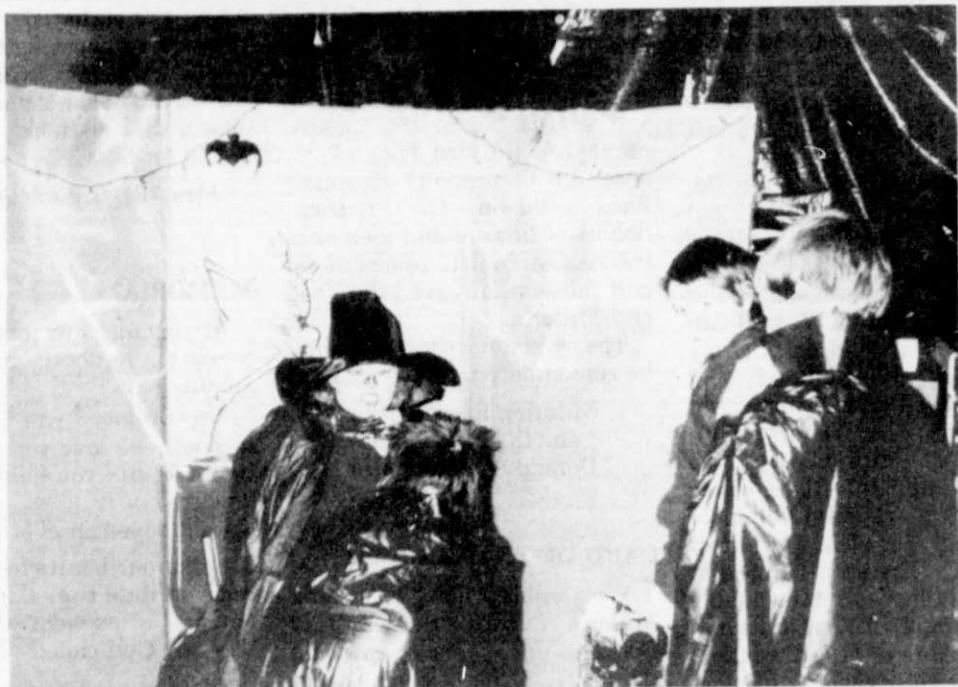

## Give Thanks to Caregivers During Thanksgiving Holiday

The week of Thanksgiving is National Family Caregivers Week. This time presents an opportunity to give special recognition to persons who give their time, love and assistance to maintain older loved ones in the community and assure that their various needs are met.

Families, not governmental agencies, provide the majority of care needed by older persons living in the community. In fact, 80% of the care needed by the elderly experiencing limitations

with day-to-day tasks come from the family — mainly wives and daughters. In fact, according to a 1987 National Survey of Caregivers sponsored by AARP and The Travelers Companies Foundation, approximated seven million Americans are caregivers.

The time caregivers spend giving care may vary from a few hours a day to many hours. The tasks performed, among others, may include bathing and dressing, cooking, cleaning,

and laundry; handling finances, administering medications; changing dressings and intravenous tubes; running errands to stores and businesses; and being a source of caregiving information both to the older person and to other friends and family members.

Although many caregivers find the role rewarding, few will say that it is easy. Caregiving can be physically and emotionally stressful for both persons involved. A once independent and proud person may feel helpless; he or she may experience anger, confusion, and fear. Caregivers are part of an increasingly important resource that is meeting the needs of the growing number of chronically ill and disabled older persons in our population. Many public and private organizations are beginning to recognize this important role of family caregivers and offer assistance.

Caregivers need our support and they also need to know that their efforts are important. So as we celebrate this special time of Thanksgiving, let us keep in mind the contributions that caregivers make and express our appreciation to them.

# HUNTERS: Don't Store Venison in Garbage Bags

Congratulations on getting your deer. You've got the food of kings, so don't treat your venison like garbage. Keep it out of garbage bags and you'll keep things much simpler for your butcher.

Plastic garbage bags aren't intended for food use, explains Dennis Buege, University of Wisconsin - Madison extension meat specialist. The bags are often made from recycled plastics, and may transfer hazardous substances to stored meat.

Wisconsin meat inspectors require meat processors to remove colored garbage bags from incoming venison and repackage the meat in approved wrappers, he says. This can be messy, especially if the venison has frozen to the bag.

There are several alternatives to garbage bags. Tightly wrap the meat in several layers of freezer paper, Buege suggests, or place it in clear plastic bags that are intended for food storage. Rigid plastic containers, such as ice-cream pails, are also acceptable.

When freezing boneless

venison at home, be sure the containers or packages are small enough to allow the meat to freeze quickly. Use several small containers, spaced apart in the freezer. A large quantity of meat in one big container may spoil at the center before it freezes completely. Turn your freezer down to its coldest setting a day before you put the meat in, and return it to the normal setting when the meat is frozen.

# Coyote Season Closed During Gun Deer Season to Protect Wolves

The coyote hunting season in northern Wisconsin is closed during the gun deer season to protect endangered timber wolves, reminds Randy Jurewicz of the Department of Natural Resources.

Wisconsin's 1988 gun deer season runs from Nov. 17 through Nov. 29. Coyote hunting is allowed yearround statewide except during the gun deer season, when it closes in the northern third of the state.

"Deer hunters frequently keep an eye out for coyote while they're in the woods pursuing deer," said Jurewicz, nongame and endangered species section chief for the department's Bureau of Endangered Resources.

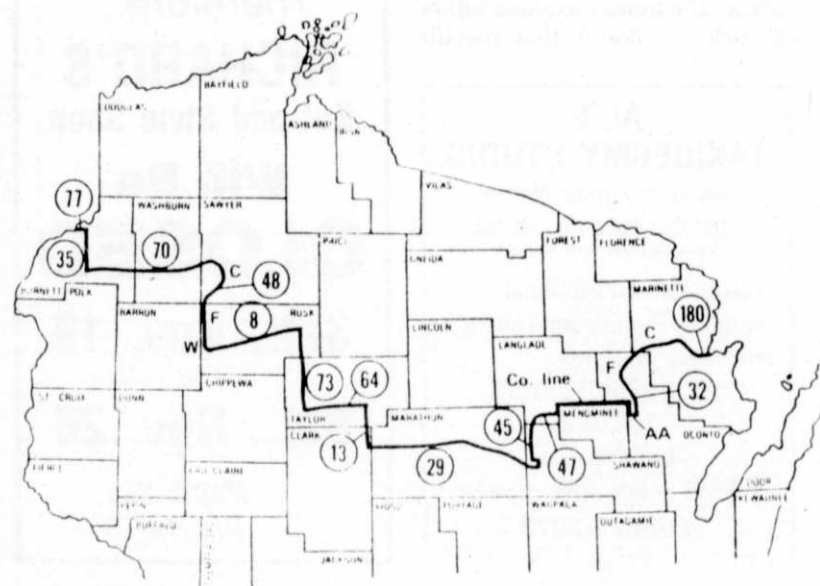
"Coyotes, an unprotected species, look very similar to timber wolves, an endangered species. The coyote season is closed across northern Wisconsin to help prevent hunters from shooting a timber wolf by mistake."

Hunters who do kill a timber

wolf, either intentionally or by mistake, now face stiffer penalties under Wisconsin's new Endangered Species Protection Act.

The new law provides for a fine of \$2,000 to \$5,000, a

nine-month prison term, and a loss of hunting privileges for three years for anyone convicted of intentionally killing any endangered or threatened species. A person convicted of an unintentional violation faces a fine of \$500 to \$2,000 and a one-year loss of hunting privileges.

## Saturday Morning Fever to Cool: DEER SEASON OPENS

All the preparation and anticipation more than 650,000 licensed deer hunters have built up will cool with the dawning of Wisconsin's 1988 gun deer season at 6:30 a.m. Saturday, Nov. 19. The season continues through Sunday, Nov. 27.

Department of Natural Resources wildlife managers estimate a population of white-tailed deer numbering more than one million statewide, offering a potential harvest of about 270,000.

"Weather, as always, will play an important factor in the deer hunt. It could affect the total harvest especially if it's too wet, too cold, or if heavy snow prevents hunters from going into the woods," said Frank Haberland, DNR big game specialist.

"Last year snow in the north and rain and fog over the rest of the state during the last weekend of the season cut into the harvest totals. But barring weather calamities, hunters statewide should have a good year," added Haberland.

The effect of last season's wet second weekend is that some of those deer are still in the herd and available for the hunt this season. The 1987-88 winter was also a very favorable one for the deer. The mild winter and good fawn production has increased the deer herd.

The fact there are more deer in the state this season is reflected by an increase of 34,400 in the number of Hunter's Choice permits issued. There were 291,865 permits issued this year. In 21 deer management units, many hunters will receive bonus permits.

A Hunter's Choice permit allows the hunter to shoot either a buck or a doe in that specific

unit. With a bonus permit, the hunter is allowed to harvest an additional antlerless deer only.

"Some of the permit numbers might be lower in some areas because deer management goals were met with the 1987 hunt, but generally the number of permits available are up," Haberland said. "Hunters, especially in the north (north of Highway 64), should be seeing some really good deer populations and hunting conditions."

Hunters bagged 250,530 deer in 1987 during the gun hunting season. The record gun deer harvest was in 1985, when hunters bagged 274,302 deer. This should be the fifth consecutive year of a harvest totalling more than 250,000 deer, Haberland estimated.

Deer harvest results should increase somewhat all across the north, decrease somewhat in the central and western part of the state, and remain the same in the south. In the DNR's Northwest District management area, a record number of deer were taken in 1987, and that number could go even higher this season.

"We have a boom or bust situation in the north," Haberland explained. "When the weather cooperates, hunters have a great opportunity to harvest deer. When the winters are hard, Mother Nature takes the deer."

The drought of 1988 did not affect the deer herd. The dry

weather has enabled farmers to pick most of their standing corn, eliminating a hiding place for deer.

There is one regulation change for hunters during the 1988 season. Handguns, legal for deer hunting, can be possessed along with other firearms legal for the zone in which a hunter is hunting.
