## Tax Rate Up \$1.06 1989 Village Budget Approved

Taxpayers are apparently satisfied with Kewaskum's efforts to contain operating costs and keep budget increases

as low as possible since no one came to Monday night's public hearing on the proposed 1989 budget. In addressing the board, department heads and the media, Village Administra-

tor Dan Schmidt stated, "We're not spending more, however, the village's assessed valuation has dropped for this year." That statement was made as Schmidt again reviewed the \$1,073,637 budget with the trustees.

A drop in that assessed valuation from \$58,306,570 last year, to \$57,654,500 this year, along with increases in the county, state, school and vocational education taxes are the reasons the village will see its gross tax rate rise to \$27.13 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation for 1988. Less this year's tax credit of \$2.57, which is down one cent from last year, the end result is a net tax rate of \$24.56 for 1988. That represents a 4.5% or \$1.06 increase over the 1987 net tax rate of \$23.50.

On a \$50,000 home the new levy represents an increase of \$53.00, for a \$60,000 home that equals \$63.60, and on a \$70,000 the figure is \$74.20.

A breakdown of the \$27.13 gross tax rate figure shows 26.92% or \$7.30, is all that goes to the village. The remaining 73% or \$19.83, is broken down as follows: 14.77% or \$4.01 to the county, .74% or 20c to the state, 51.49% or \$13.97 to the school district, and 6.07% or \$1.65 toward vocational and technical education funding.

The village's \$7.30 represents only a 3.1% or 26c increase from last year's figure of \$7.08. Of the \$7.30, .01 goes for health and welfare, \$1.09 for police, .67 for fire protection, \$1.90 public works and sanitation, .22 library, .48 parks, \$1.17 insurance, .05 community development, .73 general government and .98 for debt service.

Schmidt felt the drop in the village's assessed valuation was due to decreases in vacant and agricultural land values. In his report Schmidt said the village, over the past several years, had strived to maintain a balanced budget with slight or no increases. He noted no service unit has reflected any substantial increases while continuing to provide quality service to the taxpayers.

Taxpayers have the option to pay their taxes in full by February 28, 1989, or in two installments. On the installment plan, the first payment must be made in person by, or post-marked February 28, 1989, with the second and final payment due to the county treasurer by July 31, 1989. Schmidt noted that by statute, the first installment of a split payment is

## New Sidewalks Done, Repair And Replacement Is Next

In a final review, along with budget discussions, Village Administrator Dan Schmidt advised the Kewaskum Village Board that the third and final phase of the village's new sidewalks capital improvements program had been completed except for some landscaping in a few areas which will be done next spring.

With that project complete, Schmidt noted Monday night, the village will begin looking into developing a program for repair and replacement of damaged existing sidewalks throughout the community. He said that \$36,000 had been placed in the 1989 budget to be used to start the work.

At a previous board meeting Schmidt had indicated that the repair and replacement program would be a much larger and more difficult project to tackle. Before any physical work can be done, the village will have to take a long, hard look at just what the project will entail. The village will have to settle a number of issues related to the program such as setting up some type of schedule and system as to where the work will begin, how it will progress and most importantly, who will be responsible for the cost of the repairs and to what extent.

At that earlier meeting, trustee Mary Krueger said the program, once it was started, would be an ongoing, forever type, project. Because of that, she felt the issue should be thoroughly scrutinized before any actual work was begun.

In other business Schmidt presented 1989 budget requests for the Water and Sewage Departments. The Water Department's budget of \$202,250, represents a 2.5% increase over last year. The Sewage Department's budget represents a 13.4% increase for 1989. Schmidt told the board, however, he did not anticipate any rate increase for residents. "We'll see how we fare in 1989," said Schmidt. A public hearing on the two budgets has been scheduled for December

12.

Schmidt also informed the board that he had been contacted by two representatives of a group which is trying to organize a softball association in Kewaskum. The group would like to set up league play two or three nights a week on the lighted ball diamond at Kiwanis Park.

Schmidt said the representatives also indicated they would like to put up their own shelter for refreshments behind the diamond, similar to the setup at West Bend. Because the association would just be getting started however, the group is asking the village's assistance in providing the 'up-front' money needed to construct the shelter. The money would come from park funds and the work would be done by members of the association. The money would be repaid to the village from income derived from the shelter's operation.

The board unanimously agreed that the village should work with the group and provide whatever assistance it could. Several of the trustees noted the proposal was a good idea. "Anything we can do to help them along would be great," said Krueger.

In other action the board approved Police Chief Richard Knoebel's recommendation to purchase a new 1989 replacement squad from low bidder Ewald Chevrolet of Oconomowoc at a cost of \$13,345.

Because of the holidays, the board moved to change the December and January meeting dates. The December 5th and 19th meetings will be replaced with one meeting scheduled for Monday, December 12th. The Monday, January 2nd meeting will be moved to Tuesday, January 3rd.

Trustee Howard Laubenstein advised the board that a Plan Commission meeting has been tentatively scheduled for December 13, for the purpose of discussing a zoning request for the Ideal Land site which was recently purchased from the village.

The board then adjourned to closed session.

actually due on January 31, however, municipalities have had in the past, the prerogative to extend that due date to February 28th. Schmidt reminded the board that, according to a new tax collection act, after 1989, municipalities will no longer be able to extend the deadline for the first installment. Beginning in 1990, the first installment of a split tax payment will be due by January 31st, with the second installment still due on July 31st.

## Snowmobile Trails in Washington County

### HOW DO THEY COME ABOUT

Each and every trail that is legal and maintained does not just happen. They are obtained through the work of some individual who has taken the time to find out who owns each lot or section of land and has gone personally to that land owner and asked for permission to mark, and maintain a trail across that piece of land. The landowner was told exactly where the trail would go and how it will be marked. At this time, the land owner would be advised of his rights and liabilities. When a person in Wisconsin gives permission for his or her land to be used for recreational purposes, they cannot be held liable for injuries to those who are using this land. If you are using a trail and you go off of the marked trail, you are trespassing and may be

cited for same.

Anyone who has a legally registered snowmobile may ride on these trails. If your snowmobile is not registered, it may not be operated on these trails. Most snowmobile trails are for the exclusive use of snowmobiles only! No other vehicles may be run on those trails that are marked and maintained for snowmobiles. The only exclusions to this are your own personal property and trails that are marked with signs permitting A.T.V.s. Other off road vehicles are not permitted.

When there is at least 6" of snow and the temperature is below 32 degrees, snowmobile trails are considered to be open and useable. In the beginning of each season many people are anxious to get out for their first ride. Many complaints are

registered about snowmobiles after the first marginal snows.

When there is good snow cover 6" or more, and temperatures in the teens or lower, snowmobiles cannot damage the environment. When the snow melts and temperatures are above freezing, lots of damage can and will be done. When all basic rules are followed no one can tell in spring or summer where there were trails. This is how it should be. Careless operation of snowmobiles and the use of those trails by non-snowmobile type vehicles causes irreparable damage to grass and other plant life. Not to mention hot tempers of land owners and those who worked to put the trails in.

People who do not belong to a snowmobile club are out for a free ride. The trails are for all snowmobilers, but they are put in by a very small fraction of owners. This small group of workers are all club members. They do not all belong to the same club, but to many clubs in the county. Just about every town in the county has a snowmobile club. We would like all snowmobilers to ask about the club near where you live.

Clubs are not hard to find. You will find them advertising their events and meetings in local papers.

No one wants to keep you off of their trails but we would like to have a little help now and then. Club members donate their time and efforts to make a place to ride in safety. The equipment necessary to build and groom the many miles of trails in Washington County does not come cheap. The more we have, the more effort it takes.

Find a club in your area and join. Help to make snowmobiling a safer and more enjoyable sport and pastime for the whole family.

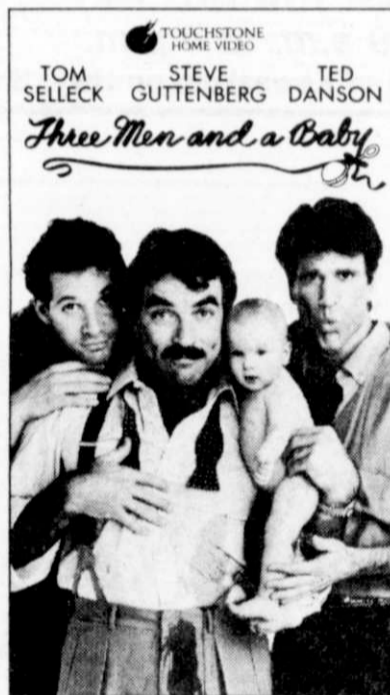
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## Hartford, Germantown Both Want To Be New County Fair Site

When Washington County made it known it was shopping for a new site for its fair, only two communities, Germantown and Hartford expressed any interest.

Those two municipalities now will have until March 31, 1989, to submit their proposals to provide the fair with a new home. Those proposals must allow for multiple use of the site and its facilities.

Hartford presented a preliminary plan when it notified the Fair Study Committee of its desire to become the new site for the fair. The Hartford Area Development Corporation, a non-profit organization, offered an 87-acre parcel of land south of the Hartford Municipal Airport.

Peter Engel, chairman of the corporation, said the site could host a variety of events from arts and crafts fairs to car shows and even large weddings. The site could also be adapted to a multi-use facility by extending the city's sewer system approximately 1/4 mile to the land.

Ken Reimer of the Germantown Chamber of Commerce said his group supports a multi-purpose facility that would be funded by as much private money as possible. Three sites are under consideration in Germantown, with the largest

being about 75 acres.

The chamber said Germantown could offer many advantages including sewer and water, easy access from highways 41 and 45, and drawing power of potential fairgoers from the metro area.

Russ Steiner, past president of the Washington County Skating Association, indicated he would be willing to assist either municipality in incorporating an ice arena in its plans.

Reimer, who is also an officer for the Ozaukee County Fair brought up the possibility of a joint fair between the two counties. The Ozaukee fair has also outgrown its present 20-acre site in Cedarburg and is

looking for a new location. Some Ozaukee fairgoers have suggested Newburg as the new site since it lies within both counties. County Board Committee chairman Reuben Schmahl asked Reimer to look further into the bi-county fair idea and report back to him.

There may be other municipalities or developers who are interested in submitting a plan but they have taken no formal action to advise the committee to that effect. Schmahl indicated that if anyone else came up with a proposal he would have to take it back to the study committee.

Three private West Bend developers have gotten site requirements information but none of them have submitted anything in the way of a proposal.

## Artist Timm Wins Turkey Stamp Contest to Complete 'Grand Slam'

MADISON, WI — Wautoma wildlife artist Samuel Timm has won the 1989-90 Wisconsin Wild Turkey Stamp contest, completing his "Grand Slam" of Wisconsin's conservation stamp contests, Department of Natural Resources turkey season coordinator Ed Frank announced today.

Timm was the winner of the 1988 Wisconsin Waterfowl Stamp competition. In 1985 he won both the Wisconsin Inland Trout Stamp and the Wisconsin Great Lakes Trout and Salmon

Stamp. He is the only artist to have won each of the four stamp competitions.

The 1989-90 Wild Turkey Stamp will be used for the 1989 fall turkey hunt, the first time a fall hunt is being offered in Wisconsin. Purchase of the Wild Turkey Stamp is required to hunt turkeys in Wisconsin.



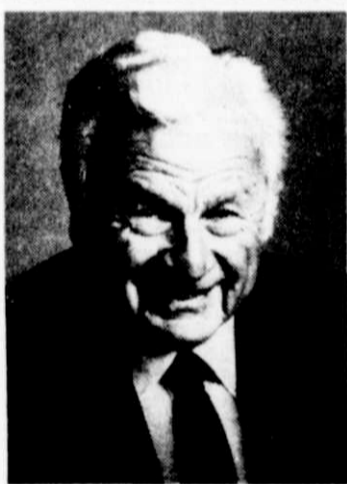

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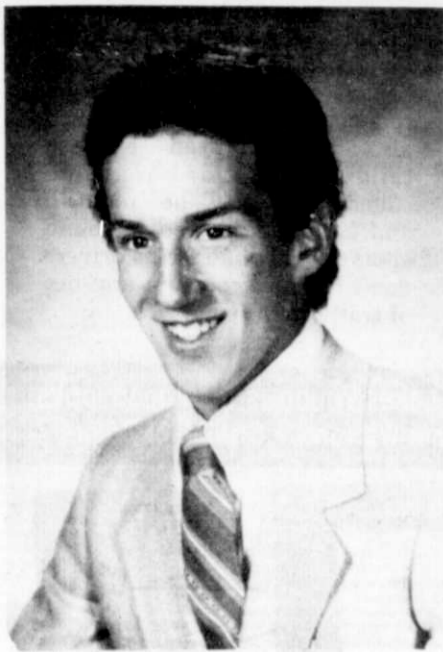


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Doug Mayer

Douglas F. L. Mayer, of the Hi-Lite Happy Workers 4-H Club, will represent Wisconsin 4-H youth at the 67th National 4-H Congress, December 3-9, at the Chicago Hilton. Mayer is one of twenty-nine outstanding Wisconsin 4-H'ers selected for this honor. He will represent Wisconsin in the 4-H Dairy Project. Doug is the son of Richard and Marilyn Mayer of Slinger.

Mayer joined the Hi-Lite Happy Workers 4-H Club in 1979 and is a third generation 4-H'er in the Mayer family. But he got his start in the Dairy project even earlier when he was born into a family involved in dairy farming. Mayer showed his first dairy animal at age eight, a registered Holstein yearling that, Doug explained, "took me four years to pay for." Since then Doug's dairy project has expanded to a herd of sixteen registered Holsteins valued at over \$35,000.

Through out the years Doug has mastered a variety of dairy management skills including herd health, feed rations, breeding, and milk production. "Caring for the calves is my main responsibility," Doug explained, "Sometimes we have as many as forty (calves) on milk at one time. I watch for any health problems among the calves and treat what I can, or call the veterinarian." Doug continued, "I feed milk to the calves and hay and grain before school each morning, that's another important factor one learns in this project, this project is 365 days a year!"

Being selected as a delegate to National 4-H Congress is one of the highest recognitions a 4-H youth can achieve. National 4-H Congress will honor 1700 young people from the 50 states and Puerto Rico for their excellence in 4-H work. The

1988 national theme is "4-H... for Youth, for America" It reflects the basic concept of 4-H to help youth acquire knowledge and develop life skills that enable them to become self-directing, productive and contributing members and leaders of our nation. The theme depicts the broad outreach of 4-H to all youth and reflects the impact of the Cooperative Extension System's 4-H program on American Society.

Mayer commented on some of the impacts 4-H has had on his life. "My 4-H experience has instilled in me many important qualities, I'm a more responsible person, a better citizen." Doug said, "4-H has taught me practical skills, and how to help others." Doug continued, "4-H has also taught me that an idea, a conviction, and an unusual interest are nothing to apologize for. It is some thing to be proud of."

Mayer's other 4-H projects in veterinary science, field crops, and electricity have grown out of needs that he has seen on the family farm and may have influenced his career choice. Doug said, "I've considered being a veterinarian, maybe involved with embryo transplanting and reproduction." Mayer is currently enrolled at UW-Washington County on what he explained is "a budget plan and a slow weaning away from my Holsteins." He hopes to transfer to UW-Madison to pursue a degree program in Animal Science.

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## DOT Kicks-Off 'Road Hog' Campaign Urging Slower Traffic to Keep Right

A statewide 'road hog' campaign to encourage poky drivers in the left lane of freeways to keep right was announced recently by the state Department of Transportation.

DOT Secretary Ronald Fiedler and State Sen. Barbara Ulichny of Milwaukee unveiled a "Slower Traffic Keep Right" highway sign and a life-size "road hog" poster at ceremonies on the I-94 median near Cottage Grove.

"Those drivers who insist on staying in the left lane when they're traveling slower than traffic in back of them act like road hogs, which someone back in the 1920s called 'the most dangerous animal in Wisconsin,'" said Senator Ulichny.

She pointed out that drivers will be able to pass more easily with the left lane less congested. "When slow-moving motorists keep right, they demonstrate courtesy for other drivers and follow the rules of the road," she noted.

In the last legislative session Senator Ulichny, who commutes between Milwaukee and Madison regularly, introduced a bill which would have limited the use of the left lane of rural freeways to passing only. The bill was later withdrawn.

Fiedler announced that the DOT will install an additional 60

new "Slower Traffic Keep Right" signs so that the reminders will be spaced at 7.5 mile intervals along 1,100 miles of freeway throughout Wisconsin. The signs will alternate between the median and the right side of the roadway. Road hog posters will be posted at 25 rest areas beginning Dec. 1.

"Our freeways can move traffic efficiently and swiftly

when traffic in each lane is moving at the same speed," Fiedler said. "When a slow moving vehicle hogs the left lane, other motorists have to slow down to that speed or pass on the right, which may not be possible," Fiedler said.

He pointed out that state law requires motorists to move to the right lane if they are traveling slower than the speed of traffic around them. Violators can be assessed forfeitures of up to \$300 and as many as 4 demerit points.

"Nearly 2,700 motorists were convicted of obstructing traffic in 1987, and most of these were on two lane roads, with a smaller percentage on freeways," Fiedler said.

The transportation chief said the DOT educational campaign would include radio and television public service announcements, posters, brochures, and cinema billboards. The State Patrol is providing information on lane discipline to all troopers.

"We'll be reminding drivers

that they'll get to their destination sooner and less frazzled because congestion will be reduced," he said. "Safety will also be improved because tailgating and rear-end collisions should be reduced and accidents caused by blind spots should diminish as drivers don't have to weave in and out of traffic as often."

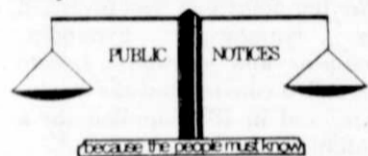

The waste sludge is aerobically digested with belt press thickening.

Through the permit reissuance process, a determination has been made by the Department that seasonal disinfection, May 1 thru September 30, will be required for this discharge. This determination is based on the recreational uses which occur in the receiving water during these months.

In order to assure that disinfection is provided, a fecal coliform limit of 400/100 ml, monthly geometric mean, has been added to the permit. Also to protect fish and other aquatic life from chlorine toxicity, dechlorination is required when chlorine is used for disinfection. A total residual chlorine limit of 0.1 mg/l is included in the permit. Treatment plant modifications will be required as a result of this requirement. A compliance schedule outlining the work which needs to be done is included in this permit reissuance. Improvements must be completed by May 15, 1991.

The Department has tentatively decided the WPDES permit described above should be reissued. Appropriate effluent limitations and special conditions will be included in the permit.

Persons wishing to comment on or object to the proposed permit, or to request a public hearing, are invited to do so in writing to the Department of Natural Resources, Southeast District Headquarters, 2300 Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Drive, P.O. Box 12436, Milwaukee, WI 53212. All comments or suggestions received from members of the public and interested government agencies no later than 30 days from the date of issue of this public notice will be used along with other information on file in making a final decision regarding the permit. Where designated as a reviewable surface water discharge permit, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency is allowed up to 90 days to submit comments or objections regarding this permit determination.

## Kewaskum Man Named to Snowmobile Betting Study Panel

George Lendved, of Kewaskum, has been named as one of the fourteen members appointed to a statewide committee which will study and make recommendations on proposed paramutuel betting on snowmobile racing in Wisconsin.

Lendved, who is president of the Association of Wisconsin Snowmobile Clubs which represents 600 clubs comprised of about 22,000 families in the state has noted that betting could bring a lot of publicity to snowmobiling but he wonders how much money it would mean for the sport itself. Lendved feels the state would probably be the main benefactor.

Snowmobiling in Wisconsin has been basically a family oriented winter sport with racing activities concentrated primarily in the northern portion of the state. Maintenance and construction of the state's 13,000 mile trail system, the youth safety training program and law enforcement has been funded through snowmobile registration fees and gas tax monies from fuel used by snowmobilers.

Lendved noted state snowmobilers were surprised when the state announced it was considering paramutuel betting on snowmobile races. "We're skeptical about racing because of the human element involved," said Lendved.

Lendved, who belongs to two area clubs, the New Fane Kettle Riders and Fond du Lac Blizzard Buzzards, said "we're

basically a trail-oriented family recreational sport, so this is a new hat to wear, but we'll look at it."

Serving on the committee with Lendved will be Loren R. Anderson of Sun Prairie, an administrator in the state's Department of Development and a former snowmobile racer, who will chair the group. The other panel members are, Robert Anderson, Engelwood Colorado, Jack Armstrong of Iron River, Steve Ave from Hurley, Sally Ayers of Eagle River, Russell Davis of Wausau, Audrey Decker of Eagle River, Bob Donahue from Wisconsin Rapids, Representative Margaret Farrow R-Elm Grove, Jerry Korniek of Cato, Representative David Prosser R-Appleton, C. J. Ramstad of Wayzata, Minnesota and Senator Marvin Roshell D-Chippewa Falls.

The panel will meet approximately six times before submitting its report to the Racing Board next spring.

This reporter questioned area snowmobilers about the idea of snowmobile betting, there were mixed reactions. Some people felt you were not 'comparing apples to apples.' "Betting on horses and dogs is definitely not the same as betting on a man and his machine," said one man, "you don't bet on car races so why allow betting on snowmobiles." Some individuals felt betting would place too much emphasis on speed. "That's not what we're about," said a woman who has been a snowmobiler for over 15 years, "we want to promote the image of a winter sport the entire family can enjoy."

During the workshop, participants will assemble their own high quality, durable snowshoes from kits. On snow instruction in snowshoeing will be provided once the snowshoes are completed.

According to Nancy Richmond, Education Coordinator, there is a growing interest in snowshoeing as an enjoyable, practical means of over snow transportation.

Snowshoeing provides enjoyable moderate exercise in the out of doors. Snowshoers have access to areas unreachable on foot or cross-country skis. In addition, many people who are uncomfortable on skis find the stability and controlled pace of snowshoeing more to their liking. It's an ideal form of transportation for any winter wanderer. Plus it's lots of fun."

Richmond advises that the program is limited to fourteen people age 15 and up because of the individual attention given to each participant during the snowshoe construction process. Persons attending from the Eagle River area may commute for the workshop. Those coming from a greater distance may stay at the Trees For Tomorrow Center.

## Deer Registrations During Opening Weekend Total Almost 120,000

MADISON, WI — Wisconsin deer hunters registered almost 120,000 deer during the first weekend of the nine-day hunt, according to figures compiled by Department of Natural Resources wildlife specialists.

Total registrations reported from the six DNR management districts showed 119,713 deer registered opening weekend. That is down some 7,000 from the 126,351 deer tallied in 1987.

First-weekend registrations are a good indication of the numbers of deer hunters are taking, but do not reflect the exact number of deer harvested during that period. Hunters had until 5 p.m. Monday, Nov. 28 to register their deer and, weather permitting, some wait until the season is over to register their game.

Statewide the registration figures varied in comparison to the 1987 totals depending on the numbers of Hunter's Choice permits available and the suitability of the weather to maintain the condition of the venison. Hunter's Choice permits allow hunters to take an antlerless deer.

The biggest increase in registrations was noted across northern Wisconsin, where hunters were having excellent success.

In northwestern Wisconsin, where deer populations have been growing because of mild winters, a total of 13,012 deer were registered over opening weekend this year. That compares to 10,741 in 1987. A total 8,089 bucks and 4,923 antlerless deer were registered.

Although the North Central District opening weekend registration was down two percent from 1987, the total was 22,142, including 12,374 bucks and 9,768 Hunter's Choice deer. Last year's total was 22,666.

In the department's Lake Michigan District of northeast Wisconsin, registrations were up slightly from last year to a total of 26,145, including 13,537 bucks and 12,608 Hunter's Choice deer. The two-day total compares with 25,710 in 1988. Florence County reported a high percentage increase in registrations compared with last season.

Both the Southern and Western districts' opening-

weekend registrations are down from last year. The Southern District reports 24,978 deer registered, down 12 percent from the 28,388 brought in the first two days last season. The Western District total is 32,913, down from 38,846 deer registered in 1987. Both totals reflect that fewer Hunter's Choice permits were available compared to last year. The number of permits issued are based on deer populations and available overwinter range.

The Western District reports big reductions of permits in deer management units 55 and 59C making up most of Jackson County.

Incomplete Southeast District County totals show Sheboygan County hunters registered 277 deer on opening weekend, down 50 percent from 1987. Washington and Ozaukee counties' combined totals are 246. In the seven counties where gun deer hunting is permitted in the Southeast District, hunters registered 2,251 deer for the entire 1987 season.

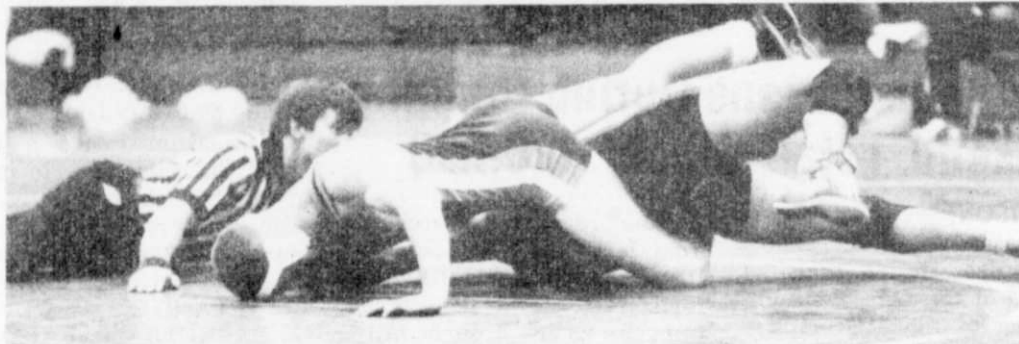

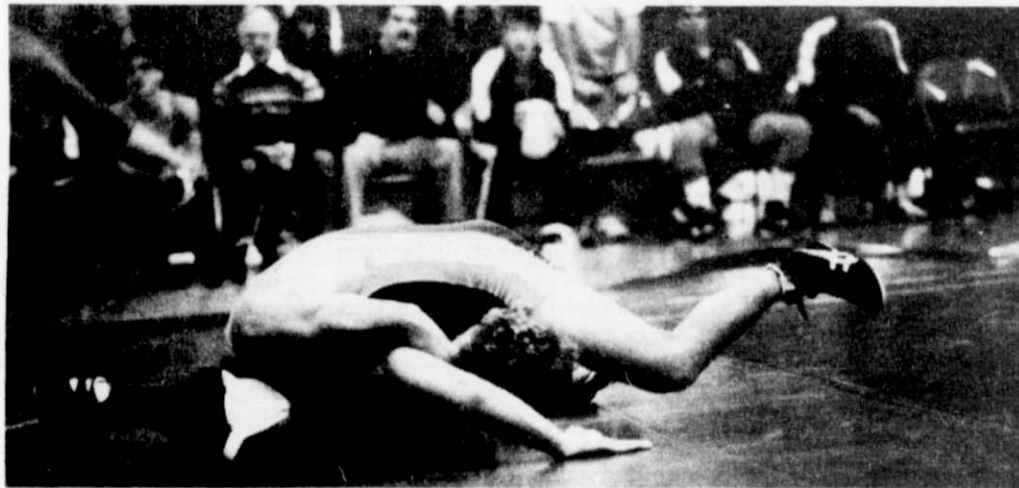

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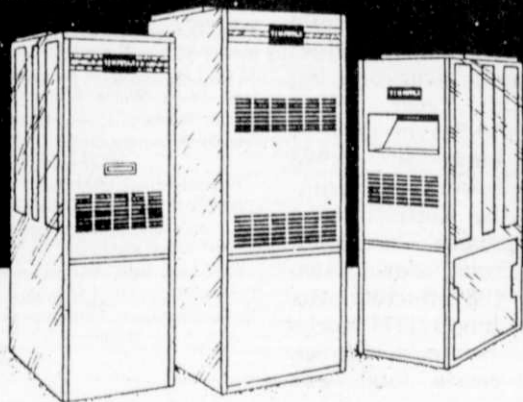
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
