County Incinerator Possible by 1993

A plan to construct a county incinerator is feasible and its operation could be successful. That's what trustee Mary Krueger told her fellow members at Monday night's Village Kewaskum Board meeting.

According to a report presented by R.W. Beck and Associates at the Joint Committee's Incineration meeting last month, enough waste is generated in Washington County to make the

plant a success.

Krueger, who represents the village on that committee, noted however that figures in the report also include the City of Hartford which has, in the past, indicated it is not interested in being a partner in the plan or hauling its waste to West Bend. Even without Hartford, it is felt could operate the plant effectively.

Kewaskum, along with its neighboring communities, is facing the ever-increasing problem of what to do with its waste and the situation is

Tree Lighting Ceremony Draws Good Crowd In Spite of Weather

becoming more critical as the Department of Natural Resources continues to shut down public and private landfills.

The committee is looking at two options, one unit could handle 90 tons of waste per day, or a larger unit which would burn 110 tons per day. The 90T/day unit would cost approximately \$8 million with a per household cost of \$68.65 per year. The 110T/day incinerator would cost about \$10 million, at a per household cost of \$81.89 annually. "Lets face it," said Krueger, "that's not cheap, but we've got to realize it is not going to get cheaper, only more costly to get rid of our waste.'

Krueger said the report is considering that each person generates 3.5 pounds of burnable garbage every day, with 2.5 people per household, 75% residential waste and 25% industrial and commercial waste. She stressed that to be efficient, the plant must operate 24 hours a day and needed to receive the commercial waste too.

She said it still would be each municipality's own responsibility to get rid of its recyclable materials which include newspaper, glass, aluminum and steel cans. Krueger said the facility would accept plastic because it burns relatively cleanly and produces the high heat needed to burn the other materials.

Krueger said she was surprised to learn that newspapers would not be accepted because they produce paper now being bleached

Board Okays Three-Year Pact With Police Union

It was a first for the Village of Kewaskum Monday night when the trustees unanimously voted to approve a three-year contract with the Kewaskum Police Union. In the past the two groups had negotiated either one or two year pacts.

In the first year of the contract patrolmen will receive a 2.5% increase in wages effective January 1, 1989. For the second year of the contract, patrolmen will receive a 3.0% increase in wages effective

January 1, 1990. In the third year of the contract, patrolmen will receive a 3.9% raise effective January 1, 1991.

Raises for other full and part time village employes were also approved at the meeting. Based on sixteen regular full time village employes, the average increase was 3.18%. On an individual basis the raises were as follows: Administrator 3.9% to \$32,933, Public Works Superintendent 3.2% to \$30,330, Chief of Police 3.2% to \$27,644. Pollution Water

District Administrator Dan Schmidt announced last week that the Village of Kewaskum received a check for \$1,629 from Wisconsin Electric Company.

The check is a rebate for the village's participation in the Money Smart company's

Energy Conservation Program. The program's purpose is to assist and encourage both private and commercial customers of Wisconsin Electric to update and more efficiently use electricity. By replacing appliances and lighting fixtures etc., with more energy-efficient units the company hopes enough energy can be saved to eliminate the need to build new power plants to provide service

to new customers.

Schmidt said the village had updated 70 street fixtures at a cost of \$9,300 for labor and materials. The new sodium lights, which provide more lumens of light than the old mercury vapor lights, are expected to reduce the village's annual energy consumption.

The lights are expected to pay back their cost in savings in four vears

site, the facility would take and resell them and credit the money towards the community's shared cost of the incinerator's operation.

The facility will not accept appliances, brush or yard waste. Village Administrator Dan Schmidt interjected that composting of yard waste will be mandatory by 1991.

Krueger told the board the committee wants the incinerator to be in place and operating by 1993. "That means we're going to have to have compulsory recycling and we can't wait until 1992 to start it," stated Krueger.

Public Works Superintendent Augie Bilgo stated, "It's going to take a lot of training." He noted with the new village regulations, people still try to leave tires for trash pick-up or try to mix grass clippings in with their garbage. He said the village would probably have to go to clear plastic bags like West Bend uses to make sure residents aren't mixing garbage and recyclables.

Representatives from the Towns of Barton, Trenton and Kewaskum and Villages of Kewaskum, Jackson and Newburg attended the Joint Incineration Committee meeting. Krueger said the Town of Kewaskum has officially joined the group.

The Towns of Farmington and West Bend, while not represented at the county meeting, are still expressing an in joining the interest partnership.

Control Superintendent 3.2% to \$27,346, Patrolman 2.5% to \$25,229, \$21,403 and \$20,056. Public Works and Water Pollution Control crews 3.2% to \$21,773, Bookkeeper/RC 5.0% to \$16,539, Head Librarian 3.2% to \$10,514. Secretary 3.2% to \$12,640/\$13,041, and Assistant Librarian 3.2% to \$7,353.

For part time village employes including crossing guards, patrolmen, custodian, public works. zoning administrator and building inspector, the average increase was 2.75%.

In other action the board approved the 1989 budgets for Water and Sewage rtments. The Water the Departments. Department budget of \$202,250 represents a 2.5% increase over 1988, which includes approximately \$27,000 towards the construction of the replacement #1 well. Bids for its construction are expected to be let about February, 1989. The new well is expected to cost about \$50,000 -\$60,000.

The Sewage Department budget of \$327,068, represents a 13.4% hike. The reason for the large increase is directly related to the sewer extension program now under way on the northern end of the village. That work includes sewer line extensions as well as a new lift station. Despite the large increase in the budget, Administrator Dan Schmidt did

Borrow from Kewaskum Police Dept. New Video Available to Educate Parents About Teen Drug Abuse

Parents who want to learn to recognize illegal drugs and the symptoms of drug abuse in their children can obtain a basic education from a new video cassette available from the Kewaskum Police Department.

Chief Richard Knoebel announced today that parents, teachers and community groups can borrow the video, free of charge, from his office.

The 23-minute video features Michael Gross, star of the television show "Family Ties," and includes a brief message from Wisconsin Attorney General Don Hanaway.

Chief Knoebel said that making the video available to all parents, teachers and community groups is a cooperative effort between his department and Hanaway's Wisconsin Department of Justice.

"This film is one of the best available for teaching parents to recognize illegal drugs, drug paraphernalia and the

symptoms of drug abuse in their children,'' said Chief Knoebel. ''I consider it required viewing for every school teacher and every parent.''

"The best defense against drug abuse and drug-related crime in our community is for every parent to become informed," Chief Knoebel said. "Parents who have educated themselves about drugs have the best chance to stop abuse before it begins, or to catch it early."

The video, available in the VHS format for home use, is being circulated statewide by Hanaway's office as part of his effort to encourage drug prevention efforts in every Wisconsin community.

"We now must assume that every one of our children has access to drugs, and every one of our children comes under peer pressure to experiment with them," Hanaway said. "Our kids are often far better educated than we adults are about the drugs in our society."

"It's time for that to change. Parents must educate themselves about what these substances look like, how they are used, and how we can tell if our children are using them."

"That's what this video tells us. I hope every parent and every teacher in Wisconsin will take the time to borrow this video and to watch it carefully. All of us must become involved in recognizing and preventing drug abuse."

Heather Lists Goals **KEA Supports Curriculum Coordinator Post**

By GERRY MUELLER Statesman Staff Writer

The issue of a curriculum coordinator again came up before the Kewaskum Board of Education, this time in a written statement of support from George Allmann, president of the Kewaskum Education Association.

In his memorandum Allmann said the association wanted to express its concern over the board's reluctance to fill the vacant position.Stating absence of an individual in the post was causing serious delays for several committees, Allmann noted that some of the coordinator's seventeen policy listed responsibilities were being delegated to the District Administrator, building principals or teaching staff causing backlogs and delays.

Allmann's letter also cited areas and programs which had been directed under the leadership of the former director of instruction. "As an Association, strongly we support hiring someone to fill the position of curriculum coordinator on a permanent basis.'

In responding to the memorandum, board member Ruth Schmitt told members of the KEA who were present, "We desperately need a curriculum coordinator but I think we were hoping to cut back at the administrative level, that's the only place we have left.'

Schmitt indicated she was reluctant to add another new position to the administrative payroll. Mary Ann Wagner, spokesperson for the KEA, said the association did not consider the position "new" since the duties has been handled by the director of instruction and a job description had been written for the position

Board member Neal Weare voiced his irritation over the fact that the issue was again being re-hashed by the board. "Let's put it (the coordinator position) on an agenda within the next thirty to sixty days so we can take some decisive action at that time or lay it to rest," stated Weare. With that comment, he asked that the item be placed on the January agenda.

Another item that disturbed Weare was a proposed new

policy 9369, which would allow the erasing of meeting tapes 90 days after board approval of the minutes. He questioned whether the policy was a good idea "given the board's past track record." Within the last year situations arose which caused individuals to go back and listen to tapes which were more than six months old.

In responding, Schmitt, chairman of the Policy Committee, stated, "I don't believe a tape would be admissable in court.

Weare also felt the proposed policy conflicted with a similar policy already on the books. He asked that the new policy go back to committee for further review with the present policy governing minutes.

Dr. David Heather addressed the issue of goals he has set for himself as district administrator. Heather told the board there appeared to be some feeling that his goals were subjective rather than objective. He listed six goals. First, Know the community. Heather said he planned to accomplish this through a survey he planned to take later on in the winter. Two, Know board members and minimize board external disharmony. "By that,' Heather told the board, "I plan to learn what trips your trigger, your likes and dislikes." Three, Develop knowledge of the Kewaskum education system. Four, Improved public perception of the district image. think we're making some progress," said Heather. Five, Establish good working relationships with the KEA and KAP. Six, Improve employee morale. "So far what I hear is this is the best year we've had

so far. 'Maybe they (the goals) are subjective for this year," noted Heather, "but I plan to follow through on them.

Board member Perry Ankerson acknowledged that he was the one who questioned the "Whether goals. you



accomplish them will be seen later, that you say they are what you are going to do is objective and that's admirable," said Ankerson. "My position is that the school board had very few goals," said Ankerson. He asked Heather to work with the board in setting goals for itself.

Another item which will come up for discussion in January is the possible sale of the Beechwood Elementary School. That item was put on next month's agenda by Ankerson.

Last month Ankerson asked Heather to look into the legal details and laws concerning sale of a school. A reply to Heather's inquiry was received from the district's legal advisors Quarles and Brady. Ankerson noted Monday night he was not opposed to having the issue placed on the spring ballot as a referendum item.

In other business the board approved two maternity leaves and one resignation.

Stephen King, Kewaskum Middle School principal, gave a report on the sixth grade overnight campout which included a wide variety of seminar-type classes. In a survey of both the students and teachers the response was enthusiastic and very positive. Comments from both groups indicated the experience had been considered a success by everyone.



St. Matthias Mission Listed in National Register of Historic Places

The National Park Service has announced the inclusion of ten Wisconsin properties in the National Register of Historic Places.

The entries bring the list of designated historic properties in the state to 1,294. The newly listed properties are located in Ashland, Dane, Fond du Lac, Forest, Iowa, La Crosse, Rock, Sauk and Waushara counties. Included are a bridge, a campground, a depot, two churches, two homes, an apartment building and an archeological site.

Included in the list is St. Matthias Mission, 1081 County Trunk S, Town of Auburn, Fond du Lac County. Built in 1861, this rural Gothic Revival-style church is significant as the first church building associated with the Catholic German heritages of the area and represents an important historical remnant of the 24 German Catholic families from the Prussian village of Bengel who settled in the area.

"Know the business or individual you're dealing with before you give out your credit card number." That's the advice of Jane Jansen, consumer protection director with the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP).

"We recommend you never give out your credit card number to any firm that contacts you by mail or telephone," says Jansen.

A recent ploy being used by telemarketers involves telling you that the caller is connected with a credit card company's buyers club or some other legitimate sounding name. The person on the phone will give you the first number of your card and then ask for the remaining numbers in order to "verify their records." "Promises of expensive prizes or huge savings may overpower a person's usual cautious approach," Jansen said," and unwise disclosure of your credit card number can have expensive consequences."

Telephone presentations are usually made by experienced telephone solicitors. Their smooth delivery and the usual urgency of 'sign up now for this great opportunity' can overcome a person's good judgement.

Jansen recommends only divulging your credit card number to those companies where you have initiated contact. If you have questions, call DATCP's consumer hotline, 800-362-3020.



Nickle Visits KHS Social Problems Class 25 Years Ago

After spending nearly eight weeks in a criminal justice unit discussing everything from jaywalking to capital punishment, Mr. Dave Rohde's social problems classes had the unique opportunity of learning how justice is served first hand. Tom Nickle, Chief Security Officer of the Waupun Correctional Institute talked to the students for two days explaining to them all the aspects of what goes into being a security officer at a bigger prison like Waupun. Nickle explained to the students how the state of Wisconsin holds citizens accountable for their actions, what happens when the law is broken, and what happens when they're found guilty and end up in jail. He went through the daily routine of institutionalization and stressed to the students, once you go into the system, its likely you'll stay there ... so stay out in the first place!

Displayed on the picture above is various contrabands taken during actual administrative "shake downs." Among the articles taken away from the prisoners include home-made guns, pot pipes, knives and different types of drugs.

Nickle is in charge of every move prisoners make in and out of jail. If a prisoner needs to get out of jail for an emergency, such as a death in the family,

Nickle makes the final decision if the prisoner can indeed go. He also assigns guards to go with the prisoner and proper restraints are used.

Although Nickle pointed out that he enjoyed his job, he related a story in which he almost lost his life when the segregation area of the jail caught on fire. He ended up being hospitalized but went back to his work as soon as he was able.

The State of Wisconsin is currently in the process of building more prisons to house more inmates. Because of the rising crime rates, being a security officer is a good job with good benefits and job "security." Nickle urged the students to think about the job as a career choice as it is definitely a job that will offer no lay-offs with its future.

Nickle held a little ceremony on his second class presentation day and appointed Mr. Rohde as an "honorary Corrections officer" for his many years of working with W.C.I. and high school kids. He was awarded an official prison guard hat in the ceremony in which he exclaimed "I'll wear it proudly!"

The students learned much from his two day experience and it was a very effective way to wind down their criminal justice unit."


75 Years Ago







Washington County Snowmobile Trail Maps

The We hington County Association of Snowmobile Clubs produces a snowmobile trail map as a service to all snowmobilers that ride in our county. They help to promote business to area businesses and help aid the snowmobiler in staying on trails provided in our county and his safety in our county.

As a county association, our membership of clubs makes this a team effort. Each club goes out and sells advertising to local business to defray the cost of printing. At the County meeting, held each month, the members bring their ads in for the area in which their club functions.

At an early-fall meeting, the clubs map out their trails on a large map to be as accurate as possible. We have a network of both Club and County trails. The starting point is the Southeast corner of the county. The trails extend North to Fond du Lac then Southwest to Waukesha county. This county trail loop is about 120 miles of self-funded trail. This does not include privately funded club trails.

After many hours of organizing the ads and marking them with numbers to correspond with the location of their ad on the map itself, the map is ready to be drafted by the printers. He runs a proof which we check over carefully for any ommissions or errors. When all is proof-read by us, the okay is given to print. After printing, the maps are distributed to club representatives at the county meeting. Each representative then sees that the maps are taken to the advertisers to pass out to customers, etc. and the clubs also make them available to snowmobilers.

To receive a map, call your local club. They are also available at the advertisers and snowmobile dealers in the county.

Lake Maps for Ice **Fishermen Available**
