Village Board Reviews Rough Draft Of Concession Stand Agreement

Both the village's attorney, Gerald Kiefer and insurance agent, Eugene Bohn were on hand at Monday night's village board meeting to go over the rough draft of a letter of agreement between the village and Kewaskum Softball Association for the proposed construction of a concession and multi-purpose building in Kewaskum Kiwanis Park.

The agreement lists ten points stipulating procedures and requirements which the association will be required to meet as part of the building's construction.

The village has been asked, by the association, to come up with the necessary funds to purchase building materials. As its part of the agreement, the association will provide and donate all labor necessary to completely construct the building which will be located near the northeast softball diamond.

Kiefer advised the trustees that this agreement covers only the actual construction and does not address leasing of the facility. Basically, this agreement stipulates the type of building and materials to use along with safety and insurance procedures that must be adhered to during the building's construction, he noted.

In addressing the issue of insurance coverage, Gene Bohn said the village will provide Builder's Risk insurance for the construction stand's and liability insurance. He stressed that this coverage would only be in place during the building's actual construction. The liability insurance will not cover any injured workers. Since their time will be donated, the village also will not provide any workmen's compensation.

Bohn told the board the Builder's Risk insurance need only be in effect during the actual construction since it insures the building should anything happen to it during its construction.

Once the building is completed, noted Bohn, it will be up to the association to provide annual liability insurance for the stand. He said such a policy would cost \$596 a year and would provide \$500,000 in combined single limit coverage including product liability but excluding any liquor liability.

Bohn noted two points made in the agreement are extremely important. First, that the construction area be enclosed to restrict unauthorized people from coming onto the site and secondly, that no one under the age of 18 be allowed onto the construction site. "We don't want the volunteers bringing their youngsters along with them when they come to work on the building, that's just inviting problems," said Bohn.

After reviewing the agreement with the trustees, Kiefer and Administrator Dan Schmidt said they would meet with members of the association and go over the agreement with them. A final draft will then be brought back to the board for approval.

Several of the trustees asked about guidelines for leasing the building once it is completed. Kiefer said a second, separate, agreement should be drawn up covering procedures and requirements for leasing of the building.

Schmidt noted that while the building will be the sole property of the village, the responsibility of operating and maintaining it will be the associations. Kiefer Schmidt suggested following West Bend's lease contract as a guide to writing up an agreement for the village. In reference to the finished product, noted Schmidt, the village will still maintain control. During weekdays, scheduled use of the building would be handled by the association while weekend scheduling would be done and under the control of the village. The village will set aside two weekends during the summer to be used by the association for their baseball tournaments, said Schmidt.

The board directed Kiefer and Schmidt to take the next step, drawing up of a rough draft leasing agreement for review at a future meeting.

In other business the board discussed the installation of additional street lights along LinDe Lane in the Bel-Ric subdivision. Trustee Howard Laubenstein asked that action on the item be postponed. "I would like to see it tabled because we have to discuss some problems about lights," said Laubenstein. The board agreed to table the item until its next meeting.

Ken Bonlender, Countywide Library Committee representative, advised the board that the village had received \$3,000 in funding for the last quarter of 1988. The village also received \$367 in continuing education funds, \$1,500 in grants and aids plus, an additional \$600 through

the reading service which allows the village to purchase \$2,000 in books through the Fond du Lac Library system.

Trustee Mary Krueger, who represents the village on the County Incineration Committee, advised the board that the incineration feasibility study had been completed. She noted that a representative of the firm which did the study also addressed the committee's last meeting about composting as well as recycling.

Schmidt said, because of the involved nature of the discussion, he was getting a video of that meeting which he hoped to show the trustees after some future board meeting. "The video can answer all your questions a lot better than I can," said Krueger.

The village's 1989 Capital Improvements Project of replacing damaged sidewalks was addressed by Schmidt. He asked the trustees to look at the village and prepare a list of

County Looking at '911'

Washington County is moving closer to becoming a member of a continually growing group of municipalities and counties to establish a "911" Emergency Response system for their communities.

The County Board has agreed to coordinate law enforcement agencies which would participate in the system that automatically gives dispatchers the number and location of persons making the emergency call. The system would also automatically route calls to the proper law enforcement agencies.

A Wisconsin Bell Telephone Company representative advised the board's Public Property and Safety Committee that it would cost \$176,710 to purchase and install a fully enhanced emergency response system. Monthly maintenance costs would run \$7,262.

For the county's 35,000 potential users, that would represents a cost of 35c per month for the first three years of operation until the equipment and installation costs were paid off. After that, the cost would drop to 21c a month.

The system has been on the county's drawing boards for the past year and if the board

decides to go ahead with the program, it could be in place and operational by 1991.

The only problem with the proposed system arises in the eastern area of the county where Washington and Ozaukee Counties share telephone exchanges in Cedarburg, Grafton and Thiensville. The system, however, has an option called Selective Routing which would allow computers to separate residents within an exchange by their addresses.

Before the system can become a reality however, the county must pass an ordinance exhibiting its intent to install the system. The county and telephone company would then have to come to a contract agreement and user fees would have to be established. Lastly, communities that wish to have dispatch centers would also have to pass ordinances accepting the system.

Currently there are dispatchers in the Washington County Sheriff's Department as well as the West Bend, Germantown and Hartford police departments.

Sheboygan County already has an operating '911' system, with Milwaukee County joining the system this year and Waukesha County expected to have its system functioning by

"Jail and Bail" will run from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Wednesday and Thursday, with area radio stations and local newspaper support.

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UWWC's \$2.1 Million Expansion, Remodeling Project Could Get Underway by Month's End

work could be underway before the end of February on a \$2.1 million expansion and remodeling project at the University of Wisconsin Center - Washington County.

The UWWC Board of Commissioners voted unanimously on Wednesday to recommend the acceptance of a low bid of \$1,801,663 for the project, from A. Guenther and Sons contractors of West Allis. In a separate resolution, the commissioners recommended that Washington County and the City of West Bend pass the required resolutions to authorize borrowings for their share of costs for the project.

Total costs for construction and fees for architects and contingencies were set at \$2,072,663. Architect's fees were established at 10 percent of the construction costs;


We have five food items to distribute in February. They are butter, flour, cornmeal, peanut butter and canned pork. Various other foods will be available in the future.



CAP Fund Announces \$100,000 Initiative To Prevent Child Abuse and Neglect

Milwaukee - Officials of the CAP (Child Abuse Prevention) Fund have unveiled a \$100,000 initiative to help fund effective child abuse and neglect programs in Wisconsin.

Community organizations throughout the state are being invited to submit proposals for programs to be funded from the \$100,000

Calling the new program "Reach & Teach," CAP Fund officials said dollars from the initiative will be targeted towards communications and educational programs. "Reach & Teach" seeks to provide an educational link between parents, especially first-time parents, and community resources aimed at helping those individuals deal with the pressures of parenting.

"We want to make 1989 go down in history as the year the people of Wisconsin made the family their top priority," said former Milwaukee Brewer star Sal Bando, CAP Fund Advisory Board co-chairman.

"What we're really talking about is making an investment inour own future. We must all recognize the critical importance of growing up in a safe, healthy environment."

Bando noted that there is "no magic cure for child abuse and neglect, but through education we can reduce the number of young victims while strengthening the family.

"Being a parent is a tough job under any circumstance. The CAP Fund's objective is to let parents know the need for advice and help is natural, that help is available in their community and that we expect them to take advantage of these resources," Bando said.

All community groups in Wisconsin, who are concerned about the health and welfare of children, are invited to learn more about the CAP Fund's "Reach & Teach" initiative.

The deadline for proposals for "Reach & Teaching" funding is March 1. Funding awards will be announced in April.





UWWC's Dean Thompson Honored

WEST BEND - Dean Robert O. Thompson was honored at West Bend Saturday by more than 40 persons who have served over the years on the Washington County Campus Foundation and the University Council at the University of Wisconsin Center - Washington County.

And after listening to their praises for his 16 years of service at UWWC, Thompson turned the tables and commended the community leaders for their role in campus

Thompson, 63, who retires in mid-February, told the group, "We've come a long way, baby. All of you are to be congratulated on that."

James Bowerman of West Bend, president of the Foundation - the group that oversees UWWC scholarship funds, said Thompson has "taken UWWC to the top" of the list of the 13 UW freshman sophomore centers and has made it "one of best educational institutions in the state."

Ray Werhand of West Bend, president of the Council, cited Thompson for his role in the education of more than 7,000 individual students since arriving in 1973. Many former students, he noted, have made their homes in Washington County and are "contributing" members of companies and the community.

"When you speak of the campus," Werhand said, "you speak of Bob Thompson.'

Dion Kempthorne, professor of English at UWWC and master-of-ceremonies for the evening, described Thompson as having "the heart and mind of a poet-philosopher-teacher.'

Thompson reviewed the histories of the Foundation and

The Foundation was formed in March 1974, he said, after "it occurred to me that if anyone wanted to give us a gift, we ought to have an organization to receive it."

By September of 1974, the Foundation treasury had \$16.01, Thompson said. A year later, there was \$28.01, "after expenses."

This spring, the Foundation is overseeing a scholarship program that totals more than \$37,000 annually, including five \$1,500 scholarships awarded directly by the Foundation. "You've come a long way, Baby," Thompson said.

According to Thompson, the idea for renewing an earlier version of the Council surfaced early in his administration. "I felt our first need was to build a bridge between campus and community. We were seen as being remote and on a hill outside town. I wanted to build strong community support for the campus."

praised Thompson Council for its efforts in expanding the campus, providing an advisory group that represented the entire county, acting as ambassadors and even "turning around" a short-lived legislative attempt to close the campus.

He credited the Foundation and Council with helping the "stronger, campus achieve healthier and better community support" that at any time in its 21 year history. He said, "You are a very special group of people. Together we have done a great deal to advance the cause of higher education in

Washington County because we worked together to achieve a common goal.'

Thompson concluded by commenting on his decision to retire. "Now it is time for new leadership," he said, "a new dean, new perspectives, a different vision for the future.

"We've barely begun to realize our potential for serving educational needs community.'

ASTHMA RELIEF

Vitamin B6 [pyridoxine] is under study for symptomatic relief of asthma. A USDA study of the effect of vitamin B6 on sickle cell anemia surprisingly showed the beneficial effect of taking 100 mg of B6 daily among members of the control group who happened to be asthmatics but otherwise healthy. They had a reduced frequency and duration of asthmatic attacks. Researchers then found low levels of B6 in the blood of both the asthmatics and those with sickle cell anemia who had responded favorably to B6 treatment.







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\$1,628,833 Recovered by State for Consumers

MADISON - According to General Don Attorney Hanaway, the Wisconsin Department of Justice's Office of Consumer Protection and Citizen Advocacy recovered \$1,628,833 for state consumers in 1988.

The office received complaints from 21,539 consumers, 11,183 of whom filed complaints in writing. Hanaway said his office recovered \$946,839 for them through mediation and an additional \$681,994 in courtordered restitution.

Hanaway said the totals do not include the \$6 million in insurance premiums and finance charges returned to

state consumers last March as a result of the 1984 consent judgment the department received against the Thorp Finance Co.

The Attorney General said the office initiated 24 new lawsuits in 1988. Twenty-three completed cases resulted in \$1,182,140 in civil forfeitures. Forty injunctions and 60 voluntary assurances of discontinuances were obtained.

The office distributed more than 60,000 brochures through its information and education programs and handled an estimated 70,000 phone calls in 1988, he said.

Sheriffs Department Offers Video on Drugs and Youth

Washington County Sheriff Robert H. Schulteis invites interested community groups and schools to borrow a new videotape that has been provided by the Wisconsin Attorney General, Donald J. Hanaway. The tape "Drugs and Youth...The Challenge" is designed to give parents and teachers a basic education about illegal drugs and drug abuse.

The 23-minute program shows parents how to recognize illegal drugs, drug paraphernalia, and the symptoms of drug abuse in their children. It would

also be very helpful for teachers so they can recognize the danger signs in their students.



The University of Wisconsin-Whitewater wrestling team, ranked sixteenth in the latest National Collegiate Athletic Association Division III poll, narrowly lost a pair of home dual meets last weekend to nationally ranked opponents. Friday UW-W was defeated by defending Wisconsin State University Conference champion UW-River Falls 24-21 and Saturday UW-W dropped a 24-17 decision to tenth ranked Wartburg College (IA).

UW-RF used some last minute lineup switches to edge the Warhawks. After the programs were printed, after the lineups announced to start the match, as the wrestlers were walking out on the mat for the match UW-RF coach Byron James, well within the rules, inserted a new wrestler at 126 pounds (who went on to win by a pin). 




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
