1989-90 School Budget Could **Be Taxing for District Residents**

By GERRY MUELLER

At Monday night's School Board meeting, Administrator Dr. David Heather asked for some direction and guidelines from the members for working up a budget for the 1989-90 school year. What he got, however, was a lot of generalized comments including one that the board would "not" like to see a double-digit tax increase.

Heather told the board he and the business manager wanted some information on increasing the levy. "Can we go up 0%, 1%, 2%, what?"

Business Manager Cherna Gorder noted that last year's mill rate had increased approximately 4% with the levy up by approximately 7%. "This (1988-89) is a deficit budget that is eating into our Fund Equity," said Gorder. She noted expenditures have already exceeded revenues by \$90,000 and it was very likely that the deficit would increase by

another \$50,000-\$60,000.

board member comments, Perry Ankerson said, "If we do absolutely nothing, no increases in any expenditures for next year, we will have to increase the 1989-90 levy by at least 4.5% just to meet this year's

budget."

In addressing Gorder's Ankerson asked Gorder, "If we held expenditures to 5%, a \$370,000 increase over this year, do we know how much we will get back from the state?" "We don't," said Gorder.

Grover Challenged in State School Superintendent's Race

A spring primary election Tuesday, Feb. 21st, will narrow the field of candidates seeking the post of State Superintendent of Public Instruction.

Two-term incumbent Herbert J. Grover, 52, who has held the position since 1981, is being challenged by Arlyn Wollenburg, 67, a writer from Whitewater and I.W. Poehlman, 76, a semi-retired farmer from New London.

Wollenburg has made a second career out of running for public office. He has made four previous successful bids for the superintendent's job, in 1961, 1965, 1973 and 1977. He has also campaigned unsuccessfully four times for U.S. Senator, two times for Lieutenant Governor, once for State Senator and four times for State Representative.

Poehlman has also made two unsuccessful bids for the new term in July.

superintendent's position in 1981 and 1985.

Statewide, there seems to be little concern over the outcome of the election. Should Wollenburg, however, move on to the general election and be elected superintendent, there is some question as to whether or not he would be allowed to serve in that post. According to the Wisconsin State Constitution, anyone convicted of an "infamous crime" is prohibited from holding a public office.

Wollenburg was convicted in 1964 of disorderly conduct and in 1974 of assaulting a police officer. A lawyer with the State Elections Board said it would not be decided whether those crimes were "infamous" until and if Wollenburg was elected.

Board Delays ActionOn KHS Strength Coach

By GERRY MUELLER Statesman Staff Writer

The request of Athletic Director Perry Koth that the district hire a Strength Coach, an extra curricular position, at the high school, was tabled until more information and details are presented to the board on the specific duties and the need to have such a position.

Board member Neal Weare stressed he was not against the recommendation, however, he did feel the board should be more informed as to just what the job entailed and what the coach's responsibilities would be.

Board member Ruth Schmitt, who made a motion to approve the position, told Weare, after the job was approved, it would go to the Policy Committee for the purpose of writing a job description. Weare indicated that was basically his biggest objection. He felt a job description should come first, then the hiring of an individual to fill the position.

Basically the position would be designed to oversee the use of equipment by the general student population in the high school's weight room through supervised and properly structured training programs.

"On the face, its a good idea," said Weare, "I just don't feel comfortable in some aspects of the proposal."

Fran Charland, who voiced his support of the proposal, said he could understand Weare's concerns about some of the various points, such as the district's liability. Charland noted several other schools in Kewaskum's conference and in the area have strength coaches and it would not be difficult to gather more detailed information on those programs and how they are working out.

Schmitt's motion was defeated and the issue tabled until more information and a job description is presented to the board

In other action, the board accepted the resignation of Perry Koth as Athletic Director. The board also acknowledged the announcement of the retirement of science teacher Walt Bade at the end of the school year.

Administrator David Heather

advised the board that the district had received a donation of \$2,700 from the Kewaskum Elementary School PTO for the purpose of enlargement of a playground area adjacent to the administration offices building.

The Kewaskum Middle School also received approval to purchase new volleyball standards and equipment from student activity money.

Schmitt asked the board to support a resolution she was presenting directed to the Department of Transportation, requesting that a Highway 28 overpass over Highway 41, be constructed in the near future. Schmitt said the Village of Lomira had indicated its willingness to back Kewaskum on the resolution.

Schmitt said the intersection was extremely dangerous for school busses which must transport approximately 39 students daily from the west side of Highway 41, to school in Kewaskum.

George Allmann, who serves on the Washington County Jurisdictional Highway Committee, which was recently reinstated, suggested that the board and Schmitt direct their request to the committee. Allmann indicated it was the committee's duty to review, and make recommendations on such problems to the county.

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

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

salaries administrative increasing \$200,000, health insurance costs up \$100,000 and half-time administrative position at about \$12,000-\$15,000, that 5% increase is already gobbled up without any discretionary spending for materials and equipment," stated Ankerson. "We'll have to get half from God and the rest from the taxpayers which means a tax levy of 10%," said Ankerson.

In discussing the budget, Gorder told the board, "not many districts pay for large expenditures such as major repairs and equipment purchases through their budgets, long-term loans are used for those projects.' Gorder said the district's present debt breaks down to about \$62 on a \$70,000 home "and that's very little debt for a school district.

Gorder told the board, "you could take roofing projects out of the budget and go with longterm debt.

"I'd be elated if you could keep the levy increase to 5%, but I don't know how you're

going to do it," said Ankerson, 'and I'm not going to vote for a deficit budget."


Board member Clara Trapp commented, "three years ago the levy was about 20% and nobody said much about it.' Gorder clarified those figures, noting the actual 1985-86 levy was 14.35% after a new formula to calculate tax credit payments was used.

Trapp asked Gorder how much was left in Fund Equity. Gorder estimated about \$1.150 million. "I don't think you want to go below \$1. million," said Gorder.

Board president Ralph Horner said he would be interested in looking into some alternatives. "Let's see what we could do with a State Trust Fund loan.'

Heather again reinterated that he and Gorder would like some specific direction. "I wouldn't want to see a 10% increase," said Trapp.

Heather said he and Gorder would put some figures together for the March meeting on projects that could be undertaken by a long-term loan program. Preliminary figures for the rest of the budget should be together by the April meeting, he noted.

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

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

Kewaskum High School has vocational areas. four departments that comprise the vocational area, agriculture, education, and technology education departments. Each department undergoes an evaluation every five years, which is monitored by the Vocational Coordinator and the department heads. Kewaskum's vocational area is eligible for federal funds through the Carl Perkins Act. Last year the act provided about \$18,000 to help update the present

The agriculture department in recent years has modified business, family and consumer and expanded the curriculum. The strong traditional approach to studying agriculture has been preserved while including new areas such as wildlife, genetics, mechanics and computer usage. The department has a strong student organization in the Future Farmers of America (FFA), with about 120 members. Various teams representing Kewaskum have done quite well at the state and

national levels. They have several fund raisers during the year which includes the fruit sale, the rabies clinic and don't forget to stop in the dairy building at the state fair to purchase a sundae from their booth.

The business department has undergone quite a few changes in recent years. Most notable would be the replacement of typewriters with computers. All classes in the business curriculum utilize the computers in some form or

The department strives to develop competent, aggressive business skills within each individual enrolled. In recent years the department has offered a co-op for individuals interested in furthering their skills in the world of work. The student organization (FBLA) Future Business Leaders of America is an active part of the business department. The Key Club (Kiwanis) is another student organization that is offered through the business department.

Family and consumer education department has undergone a name change from the traditional home economics department. The department is attracting more and more males as the curriculum expands. A variety of lifestyles in today's world requires a variety of skills, which can be acquired in our family and consumer education department. This department also offers a co-op which serves the advanced students. The student organization which serves the high school is Future Homemakers of America and Health Education Related Occupations. (FHA-HERO).

The technology department trains the young people interested in learning a skill or understanding the many advancements in our industrial world. The curriculum has expanded to include transportation, power, energy, mass production, with computer utilization in each class. The construction class has constructed many different projects in the school - the display cases, the storage area for the gymnastics equipment, the new graphics room, the pole shed next to the middle school and much more. The technology department also utilizes the co-op approach to serve their advanced students.

A video tape is available expanding on each vocational area, through the Kewaskum High School guidance department.



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



Turkey Permits Mailed; Special Hunting Clinics Underway Soon

MADISON, WI — The 1989 Turkey Hunter Education Clinics are underway throughout Wisconsin as hunters prepare for the seventh wild turkey season in the state, Ed Frank, Department of Natural Resources wildlife specialist said.

The free clinics, numbering some 69 statewide, are jointly sponsored during February and March by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources and the Wisconsin Wild Turkey Federation. These clinics are not to be confused with 16 seminars for experienced turkey hunters being presented in early March by the authors of the book Turkey Hunting Secrets.

First-time hunters and those interested in becoming turkey hunters are urged to attend the free clinics, which last from three to four hours. The clinics will teach hunters how to hunt wild turkeys in a safe, ethical and successful manner. Each person attending will receive a Wisconsin Turkey Hunter's Guide, which summarizes information presented at the clinics. Advanced reservations are not required to attend these free clinics.

Clinics will be held in Washington County on Saturday, Feb. 18, 11 a.m. at the Kettle Moraine Bowl, Slinger and on Wednesday, Feb. 22, 6:30 p.m. at the UW Center - West Bend, 400 University Dr., Room M201, Lecture Hall. For more information, contact Dale Katsma, 414-892-8756.

Turkey hunting in Wisconsin is allowed by permit only. All the successful applicants have been selected and their permits were mailed by February 3.

"The department got more that 33,000 applications for the 21,280 turkey permits available for the 1989 spring hunting season," Frank said. "The four hunting periods run April 19-23, April 26-30, May 3-7 and May 10-14. There are 16 hunting zones."

The majority of land within turkey hunting zones is privately owned. Wisconsin landowners have been very considerate of sportsmen who ask permission to hunt.

"All hunters are encouraged to scout their hunting territory well in advance of the season and obtain permission to hunt on private lands," Frank added. "Pre-season scouting is strongly correlated with success in bagging a wild turkey in Wisconsin."

A current year Wisconsin Wild Turkey Stamp (\$13.75) is required to be attached to the individuals hunting license and must be in possession while hunting turkeys. Senior Citizen Recreation Card holders, first-year Wisconsin hunter education course graduates and military licensees do not need this stamp.



The names of the candidates for each office to be voted for, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office, each in its proper column.

INFORMATION TO ELECTORS

Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall give his or her name and address before being permitted to vote. Where ballots are distributed to electors, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth or machine and cast his or her ballot except that an elector who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the elector's minor child or minor ward. An election official may inform the elector of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

At the nonpartisan primary, the elector shall make a punch or a hole at the right of the candidate's name, or, depress the button or lever next to the candidate's name for each office for whom he or she intends to vote, or insert or write in the name of the candidate of his or her choice on the ballot envelope provided or in the space provided.

The vote should not be cast in any other manner. If the elector spoils a ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one elector. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the elector shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place. Not more than five minutes time shall be allowed inside a voting booth or machine. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in punching or marking his or her ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

After an official ballot is punched, it shall be inserted in the envelope provided so the punches do not show. After casting his or her vote, the elector shall leave the booth or machine, deposit the envelope containing his or her ballot in the ballot box, or deliver the envelope to an inspector for deposit, and shall leave the polling place promptly.

An elector may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the elector declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing or understanding English or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the elector's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the elector.






