


Peace Church Recognizes the Commitments of Its Members



1989 Arts World Program




The summer program for students talented in creative writing, dance, music, theater, or the visual arts will be held at Lakeland College near Sheboygan. Arts World was established in 1984 after a twoyear pilot project. Billy E. Kirby National Commander (1988-89) The Disabled American Veterans

Every time I see our flag, I see the blood of our soldiers, airmen, sailors and Marines blood spilled for freedom yet caught within its blazing field. I see their valiant spirits reflected in its many stars. On Memorial Day, I see in our flag what I can never forget - their sacrifice.

Yet, more than a symbol of their deaths, it stands for their fighting spirit. It is the spirit of men I served with. They are men who didn't come home - a sergeant, a commanding officer, a friend — men who I'll never forget. It's a fighting spirit so valiant, so unbreakable, it inspires poetry and song.

Now, I'm no poet - but inside, I too, feel the pride which inspires a poet to write a tribute to our fighting men - a poet like Francis Scott Key.

In 1814, Francis Scott Key watched as the hopelessly outgunned and out-numbered men of Fort McHenry, Baltimore, were bombarded by the British Fleet. The battle raged through the night. It wasn't until the morning sun broke through the mist that he knew our men had survived the vicious attack.

There, caught in the gleam of dawn's early light - as if to mock the enemy - was the American flag still flying high and proud over the fort. Francis Scott Key was so inspired, he wrote a poem in tribute to the brave men of Fort McHenry. It's a poem in which he stated:

". . . And the Star-Spangled Banner in triumph shall wave...

These words are as true today as they were when he wrote them. Thousands of young men and women wear the uniform of our Armed Forces. They too are prepared to defend this country and all that it stands for. And tragically, they too, have spilled their blood.

A month ago, 47 sailors aboard the Battleship Iowa paid the ultimate price for our freedom. Do not let their sacrifice be for nothing. Help our young to understand that the flag is not just an interesting exhibit in a museum. Help them to see that the power and beauty of our flag extends beyond an abstract idea.

Past or present, those we

honor on Memorial freedom. It's purchased important that we mourn them, I know I will. But it's more important that we honor their service and the lessons they

Francis Scott Key understood this, to make his voice heard he wrote a poem. It speaks of the American flag and how it embodies the American spirit.

Twohig, vice president manufacturing, Kempthorne said, "We were facing a considerable unanticipated expense in this project, one which would have sorely strained our supplies and expense budget; so your contribution has brought much needed relief to us.

About 40,000 books weighing about 100,000 pounds, plus collections of periodicals, records, audio-visual materials, reference books, pamphlets, microfilm and equipment must be packed and moved and then returned after construction is is completed.

Library renovation is part of the \$2.1 million construction project now underway at UWWC and scheduled for completion by January 1990. When library work is finished, more study areas will be available for students along with more work and storage area for staff and additional shelving to expand collections of books and periodicals.

During the 1989 summer session, which begins June 12, Main 222 and 223 will serve as an interim library, housing a small collection of materials including materials needed by summer students. Several other rooms will be set aside for quiet

Governor Thompson Congratulates Police Agencies, Motorists in Safety Program

Governor Tommy Thompson has sent letters of congratulation to 5,481 parents, and thank you notes to 83 law enforcement agencies for participating in the Protect a Life (PAL) program during Child Passenger Safety Awareness Week this spring.

The law enforcement agencies were thanked for noting license numbers of vehicles they observed with children secured in safety seats and running license plate checks to find the names and addresses of the owners.

Maynard G. Stoehr, director of transportation safety in the Department Transportation, said the high level of participation by law enforcement shows that child passenger safety is of major concern. "I think it's terrific that 83 agencies and several hundred officers participated this year, and believe that it shows a positive awareness of the value of safety belts and child restraint systems," he added.

Stoehr said a good share of the credit for the state's child restraint successful program must go to the more than 200 local rental/loaner child restraint programs which

participate in informational programs as well.

Cheryl Forbes, occupant protection program manager for the DOT, said the PAL program is designed to provide a positive incentive to parents and others who transport young children, to make sure they are safe and secure.

"We have seen positive results of Wisconsin's law requiring drivers to make sure that children under the age of two are in approved safety seats, and that those between the age two and four be in safety seats or securely held by the vehicle's regular safety

belts," she said.

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

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Centers Put Students on Paths to Success

"I feel better about myself now," says Linda Albertson, 36, of Neosho, Wis. "I don't feel so stupid. I wish I had been told about these places when I graduated from high school."

The places Albertson is referring to are the GOAL Skills and Career Exploration Centers at Moraine Park Technical College's West Bend campus. The GOAL Skills Center offers free open lab instruction in reading, writing, math, spelling and study and test taking skills. It also offers pre-technical writing.

The Career Exploration Center helps people explore their interests and abilities and choose careers to match these areas. The center also offers instruction on career decision making processes and job seeking skills.

Albertson admits she was not familiar with the services available at the college until a friend told her about the Women's Reentry Project. (The Reentry Project provides training, employment and support services for displaced homemakers.) Albertson enrolled in the project in January and was introduced to the GOAL and career labs by her instructor.

"I've learned so much in the centers," says this mother of two children, ages 18 and 12. "I now have a better understanding of the things I read, and I can help my daughter with her homework. I've also learned how to study."

The study skills Albertson has gained will come in handy next fall when she begins attending school full time in the office assistant program. "With the help of the GOAL lab I've been able to ease into school - I know what to expect in my courses," she says.

Albertson says she is coming back to school because she needs a change. "I've been working as a volunteer for the last couple of years and I'm getting burned out," Albertson explains. "And I know I can't

handle being a full-time homemaker - so school is a natural option."

Currently Albertson is enrolled in the GOAL pre-technical writing class and this summer she will take study skills and concerning learning classes.

According to Dan Deniston, 31, of West Bend, the GOAL and Career Centers are the West Bend Campus best kept secrets. "My wife went to school here and she wasn't even familiar with all the things that could be done in the centers," he says. (His wife, Sally, was recently chosen as Moraine Park's 1988 Star Student).

Deniston came to the Career Center when an accident forced him to make a career change. "I want to become a certified public accountant, so I've taken all the career assessment tests to reassure myself. When times get tough in college, I'll be able to look back on the test results and know that I am headed in the right direction. I think these tests are a good thing to do every three or four years because people change. I plan on repeating some of the assessments."

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

Actually, we know better, but like most accidents, a lot of them result from being hasty or just plain careless and not using common sense. For an example, how many times have you stepped in between the rear and front wheels of a tractor to talk to the operator while the engine is still running?

Now that spring is here (we hope), you are doing field work and operating farm equipment more often. There are five dangerous situations you should try to avoid.

1. Always use the steps made for mounting the tractor. Never climb up the lugs of the tire which may be wet and slippery.

2. Never operate drive levers from an off seat position even to move the tractor backward or forward for a hitch-up. A little too much pressure on the lever could cause the machine to lurch and run over the driver.

3. Wear safety goggles and protective rubber gloves when working with pesticides.





Buettner, chairperson of the Administrative Affairs subcommittee of the State Building Commission, said that \$155,500 was approved to cover the cost of purchasing three acres of land, including closing costs, an environmental audit and appraisal fees.

"Currently, the Driver Licensing Bureau is in the basement of the Washington County Courthouse without enough space for any expansion of services," Buettner said.

"Also prompting the need is the fact that Washington County has requested that the DOT vacate the premises as soon as possible, no later than June 30,

The Department estimates that the West Bend facility will provide both driver licensing and vehicle registration services to approximately 67,700 customers annually within the service area.

The property is located on the North side of Paradise Drive, in the Paradise Mall area.

"The building of this facility will go a long way toward helping the DOT better serve the needs of area residents," Buettner added.





President Paul Blumer presided. All Trustee members were present. A quorum was present.

The meeting was opened with a moment of silence and the Pledge of Allegiance.

On a motion by Trustee Richard Schlice, seconded by Trustee Mary Krueger and unanimously carried by voice vote, the minutes of May 1, 1989 were approved as printed.

President Paul Blumer extended a welcome to the two new Trustees, Vincent Groh and Larry Williams.

The public hearing on the request of the Herro Company (Sison Property Project) for a conditional use permit to allow for an exception to grant the establishment of a CBR Facility within 2,500 feet of each other and a proposed CBR Facility as per §62.23(7)(i)(1) for the parcel of property located at 1040 Fond du Lac Avenue (known as Sison Property), Kewaskum, W1. No one spoke either for or against Mr. Lew Herro indicated he would be a few minutes late and did arrive at the close of the public hearing.

On a motion by Trustee Kenneth Bonlender, seconded by Trustee Thomas McElhatton and unanimously carried by roll call vote, the Board closed the public hearing. Roll call vote was 7 "Aye," 0 "Nay," 0 "Absent."

The public hearing on the application for a Class "B" Fermented Malt Beverage License for a period commencing May 16, 1989 and ending October 1, 1989, as noticed for the Kewaskum Athletic Club, Bilgo Lane, Kewaskum, WI. No one spoke either for or against and the police had no objection. On a motion by Trustee Thomas McElhatton, seconded by Trustee Richard Schlice and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board authorized the preparation of plans and specs and the advertising of bids for the sidewalk repair and replacement program.

President Paul Blumer acknowledged the number of people in attendance for the discussion and possible action on the request for rezoning by Wisconsin Elder Care, Inc. as heard at public hearing. Ordinance N. 89-10. Mr. Scott Hayes had seven other people present either family members or association. Including Attorney Daniel Sargeant. President Blumer indicated he would open the matter up for general discussion and questions seeing two new Trustees were now seated on the Board. Also, in attendance were Richard Laubach, a neighbor and Gary Gavin, an area businessman.


