Town of Wayne Hardest Hit By Last Week's Storm

While last Wednesday night's rain was more than welcome, the storms which brought it were not. Luckily the destruction, which is estimated to run close to \$1 million throughout, was limited to property only, there were no injuries or loss of life in Washington County.

Hardest hit in our area was a stretch which ran along Highway H, from northwest of Highway 41, through the Town of Wayne, southeast to Badger Road, into the Town of Kewaskum.

Nine barns and at least one

machine shed were destroyed or "I don't care what some people suffered major damage along with lesser damage to homes and trees throughout the area.

Although it was not officially listed as a tornado, those who experienced the fury Wednesday said it was more than high winds. Barns on the farms of Tom Limberg, Highway H, Jerry Herman Highway W, Robert Rauch Sunset Drive and Bill Butzlaff on Badger Road, were among those leveled in the storm which went through about 11:40 p.m. A silo on the Rauch farm was broken off like a snapped match stick, sending the rings flying into fields.

A large tree also went down on the Herman farm, landing on a car parked next to the house.

A machine shed on the Jerry Darmody farm was also leveled. A tree next door at the Kermit Coulter farm was toppled. "We were just lucky it fell the way it said Mrs. Coulter, 'otherwise it would have fallen onto the house into our bedroom.'

Four 100-foot Electric Company poles used to support 345,000 volt lines carrying power to. the northwestern portion of Washington County were knocked down. Several hundred county residents were without power for varying lengths of time as the Electric Company worked through the night and Thursday to restore power.



West Bend Freeway Road Construction Begins

Road construction is expected to start the week of May 29, on the reconstruction of the second roadway on the West Bend Freeway (USH 45), from STH 145 to CTH "D", in Washington County. The work will consist of placing base course, concrete paving, and signing and marking work necessary to complete the fourlane freeway.

The base course and paving work will be performed under two contracts let to Roddie E. Beaudoin and Son, Inc. of Menomonee Falls, at a total cost of \$5,086,140.00. The signing and pavement marking work will be performed under a contract let to Century Fence of Waukesha, at an estimated cost of \$255,330.00.

Financing will be shared on approximately 76-24 percentage by the Federal government and the State of Wisconsin, respectively, from funds provided primarily by gas

USH 45 will remain open to two-way traffic on the existing pavement and temporary pavements during construction operations. Both southbound ramps at STH 60 and the southbound "on" ramp at Paradise Drive will be closed for about one month at each location. The southbound "off" ramp at Paradise Drive and both southbound ramps at STH 33 will remain open to traffic

The construction. during southbound ramps at Pleasant Valley Road will be closed to traffic for the duration of the project. Two-way USH 45 traffic will be directed off of existing USH 45, onto CTH "D," and

back onto USH 45 via the ramps at the CTH "D" interchange. Traffic on CTH "D" will be able to gain access to USH 45 at the ramp intersections. Motorists are urged to use caution in the

construction zone. It is anticipated that this project will be completed by the end of October 1989.



UWWC Professor Cleek Has Article Published in 'Human Biology'

WEST BEND — The journal "Human Biology" has published an article researching possible link between surnames and cancer genes, written by a professor at the University of Wisconsin Center - Washington County.

Richard Cleek, an associate professor of cultural geography and computer science at UWWC, said he was pleased to see his article in the April issue of the publication. "The journal has done a lot on genetics," he said, "and takes innovative approaches in that area.'

Cleek's data was drawn from records of all cancer deaths in the State of Wisconsin from 1979 through 1985 - about 40,000 cases. He used a small grant from the UW Centers, an association of 13 freshmansophomore campuses, to purchase a computer tape from the Department of Health and Social Services.

"Then what I did," he said, "was to compare the frequency of certain names among the cancer patients against a control population of non-cancer deaths. Clearly there are some names which occur much more frequently or much less frequently than you would expect."

Cleek said his initial reflections on the findings indicate that "in the sense that name expresses genes, then it's evidence for a strong genetic component of some of those cancers, especially in male and female leukemia." Male lung another cancer area

displaying strong genetic factors, he said.

And Cleek sees another factor which he said he feels "is going to turn out to be most important - strong evidence for tumorsuppressing genes, which may operate across most cancers.'

In his abstract on the article, Cleek said, "Clustering of across surnames cancers evinces a number of Wisconsin surnames that may be involved in a cancer family syndrome."

Cleek has taught at UWWC since. 1971. He and his wife Margaret, an associate professor of psychology at UWWC, live near Kewaskum.



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Mental Health Center to **Hold Open House June 2**

St. Joseph's Community Hospital in cooperation with the Washington County Mental Health Center invites the public to visit the new Inpatient Psychiatric Program at an open house, June 2 from 10 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. Preceding the open house at 9:00 a.m. there will be an opening ceremony on the Psychiatric Unit. Featured guests include: State Senator Carol Buettner, Fred Bury, Executive Director of St. Joseph's Community Hospital, Dr. Todd Hammer, Medical Staff President, Reuben Schmahl, Chairman, Washington County Board of Supervisors, Gail Johnson, Health Mental Center Administrator, Rev. Richard Hoblin, Immanuel United Church of Christ, and Fr. Charles Walter, St. Frances Cabrini.

The new 19 bed unit is a cooperative venture between St. Joseph's and the Mental Health Center, and will provide acute mental health assessment and treatment and medically supervised detoxification from alcohol and other mood altering drugs. The treatment program will be directed by Dr. Marc Ritsema, Director of Inpatient services for the Mental Health Center, with nursing and other clinical staff employed by the Center. In addition to the new Inpatient Program, the Center operates its outpatient Family Education and Treatment

Program from clinic sites in West Bend, Hartford, and Germantown: Community Treatment Services for adults with need for long-term support related to psychiatric disorders; and the County's 24-hour mental health crisis line. The Mental Health Center is a division of the Comprehensive Community Services Agency (CCSA) of Washington County.

addition of the Psychiatric Program increases the inpatient capacity of St. Joseph's to 128 licensed beds. The cooperative venture is structured through a Hospital/-Center management agreement signed in January with an initial term extending through 1991. In addition to securing the license to operate the hospital beds, the hospital provides necessary support services for the center, including the space for the unit, dietary services, pharmacy, laboratory, medical records, patient billing, laundry, housekeeping and maintenance. Physicians on the hospital's active medical staff will provide consultation services to patients on the Psychiatric Unit to assure that physical health care problems are addressed as needed. Referrals for admission to the Psychiatric Program anticipated for adults living in Washington County and in parts of Dodge and Ozaukee Counties.

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
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Free Fishing Day June 4

MADISON, WI - The toughest decision anglers will have to make on Free Fishing Day, June 4, will be deciding where to fish.

With almost 15,000 inland lakes, 2,674 trout streams, 5,000 warmwater streams and 28 species of game fish to choose from, novice and experienced anglers alike will be able to have their sport and

On Free Fishing Day anyone can fish in any Wisconsin water without a license. Admission is also free on June 4 to Wisconsin's 66 state parks, where more than 20 free fishing clinics and other special events will be held.

Panfish - bluegills, sunfish, crappies and perch - are the bread-and-butter fish of 90 percent of all vacationing families in Wisconsin, say of Natural Department fisheries Resources management specialists. The department estimates the panfish population to be more than 200 million.

"Bluegills are terrific little fighters," says Tammy Peteraquatic resources education coordinator. "Plain garden worms are their favorite bait, but you can use a variety of lures."

Sunfish, also called pumpkinseed, are equally popular fish for catching and eating. Best caught in cooler water, the sixto eight-inch sunfish provides great sport with a fly rod and a variety of flies.

Crappies are considered excellent game fish when taken on light tackle, says Peterson. "Keep the bait moving," she suggests. "Cast or troll along the outer edges of weed beds with small minnows, small jigs, plastic minnows or small streamer flies in early morning or toward evening.

Yellow perch are popular panfish found throughout Wisconsin. "Small ones are easily caught, but it takes a real specialist to consistently land big ones over 10 inches. They'll eat almost anything, but prefer minnows, insect larve, plankton and worms. Perch like cool waters, so fish in deeper water," she says.

Fishing for panfish can also net you small and largemouth bass and walleye.

Wisconsin sells more nonresident fishing licenses (one half million) than any other state in the country. More than 1.5 million licenses are sold annually here.

"More and more people are taking up fishing every year," reports Peterson. "It's not difficult to learn, but for those who don't know how and want get started, especially children, we have established Free Fishing Day and the free fishing clinics."

She urges anyone interested in learning the basics of fishing to attend one of the free fishing clinics. Rods and reels will be provided courtesy of the DNR fishing local conservation clubs, but attendees should bring their own equipment if possible. Clinic times vary; contact the area park directly for details: Kettle Moraine State Forest -Northern Unit, Mauthe Lake, Campbellsport; the Long Lake Fishing Club will teach the clinic (414) 562-9605;

Fish Questions

Each year I answer a lot of questions on the fishing regulations. There are two questions which seem to be asked more than others.

The first question is, "Can I use pan fish for bait to catch larger fish?" The answer is "Yes." The only bait restrictions on Wisconsin Inland Waters are that goldfish, alewife, and live crayfish may not be possessed or used for bait on inland waters. Pan fish or even game fish can be used as bait, but are considered part of apersons daily bag. To give an example, if you had five walleyes in your fish bag and then put a small one on your line as bait for a northern you would be over the daily bag for walleye, for you would be in possession of six.

The second question is, "Can fishermen in a boat keep their fish in the same fish bag or livewell. The answer to this is also "YES." Fish can be kept in the same bag or livewell in a boat or on shore. Each fisherman is limited to his daily bag limit and must stop fishing for a fish species once the limit is reached. There is no group bagging when it comes to fishing. A fisherman can not help his fishing partner catch his daily limit. Each fisherman must catch his own fish.

Spring Wild Turkey **Hunt Biggest Ever**

MADISON - This spring more turkey hunters than ever before took to the woods in Wisconsin and they bagged a record 4,372 wild turkeys, according to Department of Natural Resources turkey season coordinator Ed Frank.

During the turkey season's fourth and final hunting period, which ended May 14, hunters registered 823 birds. With 5,320 permits available for the fourth period, the hunting success rate was 15.5 percent.

The turkey permits were issued in 15 hunting zones, 13 located in southwestern Wisconsin and two in Marinette and Florence counties. The area open to turkey hunting this year expanded from 10 zones in 1988 and seven zones in 1987.

In 1988, 11,070 hunters registered 2,490 wild turkeys, with a success rate of 22.5 percent. In 1987, 6,040 hunters bagged 1,482 turkeys, with a success rate of 24.5 percent.

During the 1989 season's four hunting periods there were 21,280 permits available with 4,372 turkeys registered for a 20.5% success rate.


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
