Annual Meeting Set for July 24th

1989-90 School Budget Proposal Totes Double-Digit Levy Increase

Lengthy discussion again centered around the proposed 1989-90 budget during Monday night's regular Board of Education meeting. The third draft of the document received mixed reviews as there were as many opinions of the budget as there were board members. For a while it even looked as though there would be no budget approval in any form.

Most of the board, however, agreed that the proposed budget, while increasing only about 3.5% in expenditures over last year, carried too high a price tag in the area of tax levies. The third draft showed a proposed budget of \$7,810,677, \$269,791 or 3.58% over 1989-89.

The figures would result in a total levy, including debt

service, of \$4,083,161, a 14.42% increase over this year's levy. To taxpayers, that would have represented an increase of \$2.00 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation in the mill rate, from \$13.88 for 1988-89, to \$15.88 for 1989-90, based on the assumption the district would not see any increase in its equalized value.

Business Manager Cherna Gorder noted, however, that was the district's dreariest picture. If the district were fortunate enough to see some increase in equalized values, there was a chance the mill rate could come in at between \$14.84 and \$15.27 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation.

Gorder had forewarned the board at past meetings that losses in state aids could seriously affect the district, and that, apparently is coming true.

Losses in aids are resulting for two main reasons, declines in student enrollment, on which the aids are based, and general cutbacks by the state as more and more funds are directed to the Chapter 220 program.

Gorder told the board the district, in a way, was penalizing itself by trying to maintain a tight budget. 'We're working on a 4% budget increase," said Gorder, while other districts are looking at 7%, 8% and even higher increases." The more you spend, the more you get back in state aids, she noted. Board member Ruth Schmitt asked Gorder if there was any "I just hope it doesn't get worse," stated Gorder. She said from present indications it is very likely the district will lose

Beechwood School Questions On Annual Meeting Agenda

The issues of the Beechwood School and its future were again discussed by the Kewaskum School Board at its meeting Monday night.

member Board Perry Ankerson asked that the question of either leasing or selling the property be placed, as resolutions, on the agenda for the July 24th Annual Meeting to get input from the electors.

indicated the Ankerson district should be looking to derive some money from the school to ease the district's financial problems through leasing or sale of the property which has been vacant for two years.

In looking for other ways to cut costs and reduce the budget, board member Ronald Beimborn made a motion to eliminate the three administrative positions of business manager, buildings and grounds superintendent and food services supervisor.

Ankerson questioned how Beimborn planned to fill those positions. He stated the district -could possibly take someone from within to fill new, nonadministrative positions of head bookkeeper, head janitor and head cook. Positions whose salaries would be considerably less than those presently being paid.

When Ankerson Beimborn how much money he felt could be saved by such a move, Beimborn said he did not know, but "guessed" about \$60,000. Ankerson felt that Beimborn, in making such a motion, should have had some actual figures as to how much would be saved and, how much the new positions would cost so the board members would have had some basis on which to

Board president Neal Weare told the meeting, because both the business manager and building superintendent are under contract until 1991, there was little action it could take at this time. Beimborn's motion was defeated 6-1.

Among other items addressed at the meeting was a recommendation by the Finance - Transportation Buildings and Grounds Committee to secure some form of long term borrowing, either through the Wisconsin State Trust Fund or other sources to carry out approximately \$200,000 in capital improvements for the coming year.

As part of the recommendation, the board was presented with a three-year plan costing \$600,000, roughly which everything covered from asbestos removal to equipment replacement.

After discussing the recommendation, it concluded the district, in all probability, would not make the deadline for this Wisconsin Trust Fund application. Business Manager Cherna Gorder noted that besides running out of time, the fund itself, is rapidly running out of money for this year.

In checking with other financial sources Gorder said she had been advised to wait until next spring when both the

funds would have new monies available and the chances of getting lower rates from other institutions were better.

In the audience to visitors portion of the agenda, the board heard from Mrs. Diane Norman, the parent of a Wayne 5th grade student, who spoke against the board's decision to transport that class to the Kewaskum Elementary School next semester. The board said it would take her comments and the petitions she presented, under consideration.

another \$100,000 in state aids next year.

Gorder was asked if there was anything the district could do to turn the situation around. Not much, she noted, unless it wanted to join the Chapter 220 program. "That's where all the aid is going."

Board member Don Nowak said he could and would not vote to pass on the budget as presented, to voters at the Annual Meeting. After a motion to recommend the budget to the Annual Meeting as presented was defeated, Nowak proposed a motion which included taking \$100,000 out of the district's Fund Equity to reduce the levy. Both Gorder and District Administrator Dr. David Heather spoke against such a move. Gorder told the board if it continued to draw on its Fund Equity, it will be completely gone within two years.

Board member John Schulte was the lone dissenter as far as budget reductions. "Maybe the budget shouldn't be kept so low," said Schulte. He felt that to continue to provide quality education, the board would have to look at hikes of this size and possibly even more. Schulte

indicated he did not think the district's residents were as concerned with the tax increase other board members seemed to think. "I haven't heard any comments from anyone about taxes," Schulte. Nowak replied, well you've heard me say it here at this meeting.

After Nowak's motion too, was defeated, it appeared the board had come to a stalemate, neither approving a proposal or making any recommendations for change. Schmitt, in an effort to resolve the situation again moved to approve the budget as presented. That motion failed again. Finally a third motion by Schmitt to pass on the budget with the recommendation to take \$50,000 from Fund Equity was passed on a 5-2 vote, with Schulte and Paul Seymour

That revised proposal, which will now be passed on to the electors at the July 24th Annual Meeting, represents a total levy of \$4,033,161, (an increase of

13.02% as compared to the original 14.42%).

That proposal would drop the mill rate to \$15.69, which still represents an increase of \$1.81 over the 88-90 levy of \$13.88.

Gorder is hoping, however, that the district will see at least a 5% increase in equalized valuation which would reduce the 1989-90 mill rate increase to 7.64% or \$14.94 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation.

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



Kewaskum Post Office Opens Job Register

Postmaster Frank Beesten has announced that the following examination will be given and urged that all those interested apply between June 19 and June 30, 1989 to take the job-related test that can lead to Postal Service employment:

Rural Carrier

The Rural Carrier register is used to fill Rural Carrier Associate (RCA) vacancies. An RCA employee is entitled to employment and compensation only in the absence of a career regular rural carrier. This could involve working one day each week, one day each two weeks or only filling in for the regular Rural Carrier when that carrier is on leave, depending on the classification of the route. The hourly rate of pay for RCAs is \$10.51. RCAs are not eligible for health or life insurance or the Federal Employees Retirement System (FERS). RCAs with service in excess of one year as an RCA will be eligible to bid on full-time Rural Carrier vacancies at the offices where they are employed and for vacancies posted within the Management Sectional Center. **Position Requirements**

Washington County to Receive \$105,000 DNR Grant to Improve Milwaukee River Water Quality

MILWAUKEE, WI — June 8, 1989 - Four counties have been offered money from the Department of Natural Resources to assist them in improving water quality within the East-West Branch of the Milwaukee River.

Washington, Ozaukee, Fond du Lac and Sheboygan Counties received \$220,000 from the Nonpoint Source Pollution Abatement Program, according to John Pfender, a Planning Analyst for the Department's Nonpoint Source Program. The monies will be used by the counties to help rural landowners and renters pay the cost of installing management practices designed to reduce the amount of animal waste and eroded soil from reaching the streams within the watershed. Those management practices are identified in the recently completed A Nonpoint Source Plan for the East and West Branches of the Milwaukee River Priority Watershed. The goal is to improve surface waters for recreation, fish and

of the watershed, they will also have a positive impact on the water quality in the lower Milwaukee River and the Milwaukee Harbor Estuary." The individual grants are Washington - \$105,000; Fond du lac - \$52,000; Sheboygan -\$23,000 and Ozaukee - \$40,000. The grant given to Fond du Lac County will also be used to pay for practices to landowners in neighboring Dodge County.

Monies are also available to areas within the watershed to assist them in implementing the recommendations in the Plan. Municipalities eligible for grants include the City of West Bend and the Villages of Kewaskum, Campbellsport and Newburg.

The East-West Branch of the Milwaukee River Watershed is one of five watersheds within the 268 square mile Milwaukee River Basin were urban and rural nonpoint source needs are being identified and where financial aid will be available from the state for cleanup. The other watersheds include the North Branch, Cedar Creek, Milwaukee River South and the Menomonee River. The the counties," said Pfender. Grover Announces 1989-90 Chapter 2 Grants

MADISON – Wisconsin's school districts and other education providers will share more than \$7 million in federal Chapter 2 grants, according to an announcement by State Superintendent Herbert J. Grover. The Kewaskum School District's 1989-90 allocation is

The state's allotment is down about 4 percent from last year's award of \$9,231,810. For 1989-90, Wisconsin will receive \$8,851,135, of which local education agencies will share \$7,080,908. Twenty percent of Chapter 2 funds remain with the Department of Public Instruction to provide state-level activities.

The Hawkins - Stafford Elementary and Secondary Improvement Amendments of 1988 made several changes in the Chapter program. The U.S. Department of Education lists six targeted assistance programs eligible for Chapter 2 funding. Activities under those six areas are similar to those from the original block grant They include program. programs to:

 meet the educational needs of children at risk of failing in school or dropping out or students for whom providing an education exceeds average

· acquire instructional or educational materials

 provide schoolwide improvements, including effective schools programs

 provide training and professional development for school staff members

enhance the personal

excellence of students or student achievement

· develop other innovative projects that would enhance school's educational programs or climate

The DPI computed grants using a distribution formula approved by the Wisconsin Chapter 2 State Advisory Committee in May. The formula, modified slightly from that used in previous years, distributes funds based 50 percent on enrollment, 47 percent on the number of families receiving Aid to Dependent Families with Children, and 3 percent on a sparsity factor calculated from the number of students per square mile.

School districts apply to the DPI for Chapter 2 funds. Private schools can receive Chapter 2 money by participating through public schools.

The DPI uses its Chapter 2 funds to provide technical assistance to school districts; to improve the planning, management, and implementation of educational programs; to administer the Chapter 2 program; and to support educational improvement projects.

"The Chapter 2 program is one of the best offered by the federal government because it supports creative and innovative activities on the state and local levels," Grover said. "The Academic Decathlon, Arts World, Science World, Early Identification Program, several Families in Education activities, and other special activities would not have been possible without Chapter 2 support."



School Principals, Administrators To Attend Leadership Academy

maddison — Forty-seven principals and 25 school district administrators from throughout the state will sharpen their leadership skills this summer during an intensive leadership training program in Green Bay. Dr. David Heather of the Kewaskum School District will participate in the 1989 Superintendents Academy.

The second Ollie Berg Administrator Leadership Academy will be held at the Radisson Inn, Green Bay. The administrators' session runs June 25 to July 1, followed by the workshop for principals, July 10 to 16.

Named for Ollie Berg, who retires June 30 as executive director of the Wisconsin Association of School District Administrators (WASDA), the academy provides leadership training and growth to mid-career principals and superintendents to assist them in promoting school improvement and excellence in education. The first academy in 1988 trained 25 principals and 25 administrators.

"The academy has long been a dream of mine," State Superintendent Herbert J. Grover said in naming the 1989 participants. "Ollie Berg of WASDA, the people with the Association of Wisconsin School Administrators, and staff from the Department of Public

Instruction have worked deligently to create this academy. We will continue to work with these leaders of Wisconsin's schools to meet the challenges facing education today and in the future."

Doug Ritchie and Don Hafeman, former principals and superintendents who now work as education consultants, will co-direct the 1989 superintendents' academy. Faculty include Sandra Davis, an industrial psychologist, and Shirley McCune, author of the "Guide to Strategic Planning for Educators." Administrators also will take part in a technology demonstration.

Kent Peterson of the University of Wisconsin Madison, will direct the principals' academy. Presenters include Louellen Essex, a management consultant specializing in team building and conflict resolution; Bruce Wilson, author of "Successful Secondary Schools"; H. Dickson Corbett, author of "School Context and School Change"; and the University of Indiana's Bruce Barnett, who will talk about the principal as an instructional leader.

Follow-up sessions for academy participants will be held throughout the year. The academy receives federal funding with a 50 percent match from the state. Participants pay

for tuition and lodging.

"Educational research consistently shows that quality administrative leadership is the single most important factor in the success of elementary and secondary education," Grover said. "This academy provides principals and administrators an opportunity to enhance their skills which will be good for education in Wisconsin."

A Father's Day Message From Community Church

Someone said, "If American families are to survive the incredible stresses and dangers they now face, it will be because husbands and fathers provide loving leadership in their homes, placing their wives and children at the highest level on their system of priorities."

May this prayer as parents be at the top of the list: that God keep your family unbroken. Help you to compensate for your mistakes and failures as parents, and counteract the influences of an evil world that would undermine the faith of your children. Ask the Lord for His involvement when your children or grandchildren stand at the crossroads, deciding whether or not to accept the risen Christ as their personal Savior, walk the christian path and receive eternal life with Him. As you seek to make Jesus Christ Lord of your life and home, search the Bible daily for guidance in your family life and attend a Bible believing church together.

We had a great time meeting and trading with people from other teams. There were teams from China, Russia, Mexico, British Columbia, and the other 47 U.S. competing states.





It was so noted there is a need for such an agreement due to the fact the Village and the Library Board are desirous to establishing appropriate arrangements for coordination of Library operations.

On a motion by Trustee Mary Krueger, seconded by Trustee Richard Schlice and unanimously carried by roll call vote, the Board approved the Cooperation Agreement and authorized the signing of same. Roll call vote was 7 "Aye," 0 "Nay," 0 "Absent."

On a motion by Kenneth Bonlender, seconded by Dorothy Blumer and unanimously carried by roll call vote, the Library Board approved the Cooperation Agreement and authorized the signing of same. Roll call vote was 7 "Aye," 0 "Nay," 0 "Absent."

A brief discussion was held on items to be included in a Library personnel policy. Job descriptions, delegation of duties, personnel and Library hours, ability to assist patrons, lunch time, use of and responsibility of microfische, computer, typewriters, fax and any other equipment, as well as any other points to be suggested by the Library and Village Boards. It was noted that a follow-up meeting just on personnel will be scheduled later after the policies and descriptions are drafted.

The Boards reviewed past and present Library Budgets as well as related Village resolutions pertaining to Library Financial Matters. After the review, the concensus of the two Boards was that all financial matters have been resolved and appropriate action taken as approved by the Corporation Counsel and County Auditor.

A recently completed study indicates there may be a genetic basis for the chronic arthritis found among people with Lyme disease, and as a result, gives greater evidence for what may be the cause of rheumatoid arthritis, according to the Arthritis Foundation's Wisconsin Chapter.

"Lyme disease is caused by bacteria that enter the body through the bite of a deer tick, said Joseph Bretza, MD. "The disease can affect many systems of the body, including the joints, skin, heart and nervous system. Since it was first identified in 1977, Lyme disease has been reported in more than 33 states.'

The two-year research study, conducted by the scientist who first identified Lyme disease, found that although 80 percent of people with Lyme disease experienced joint pain at some time during the course of the disease, only 10 percent develop chronic, or long-lasting arthritis.

When different people with Lyme disease were compared, it was found that an increased frequency of HLA-DR3 and DR4 genetic markers were present in people with chronic Lyme arthritis. The same genetic markers are also more commonly found among people who have rheumatoid arthritis, the most severe form of arthri-

The researchers, supported by the National Institute of Arthritis, Musculoskeletal and Skin Diseases, suggest that the discovery of the same genetic markers among people with both diseases, combined with the knowledge that an infectious bacteria causes Lyme disease, gives greater credibility to the idea that one or more infectious agents may be responsible for triggering rheumatoid arthritis genetically predisposed individuals. "Other research is being conducted to determine exactly what the infectious agents triggering rheumatoid arthritis might be," Bretza said.

This new information is only the latest in progress being made against the various forms or arthritis. The Arthritis Foundation spent nearly \$8 million on arthritis research during 1988, all of which was supported by public donations. Over \$90,000 of last year's national research budget was awarded to Wisconsin researchers. Locally, Wisconsin Chapter will award \$25,000 to individual investigators and research centers in 1989.

The Arthritis Foundation supports research to find the cure for and prevention of arthritis and to increase the quality of life for those affected by arthritis. It is the only national, voluntary health

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



Lou Gehrig was called the "Iron Man." With boyish enthusiasm and quiet humility, he played Hall of Fame - caliber baseball for an incredible 2,130 consecutive games, leaving a mark on the game and its fans that will never be erased.

Statistics are as much a part of baseball as gloves and bats, high fastballs and home runs. In this dusty, sweaty game of numbers, only one record is secure - Gehrig's. After 150 years of baseball, Boston Red Sox shortstop Everett Scott place holds second consecutive games played. With 1,307, Scott falls some five years short of the "Iron Man." The only modern marathon men to break a thousand games are Steve Garvey (1,207) and Billy Williams (1,117).

The "Iron Man" drove in 100 or more runs 13 seasons in a row and bettered 150 RBI on seven occasions, setting an American League record with 184 in 1931. The following year, he became the first 20th century player to hit four consecutive home runs in one game. His lifetime batting average? .340!

On July 4, in his famed farewell address, Gehrig said he "may have been given a bad break," but he was "the luckiest man on the face of the earth." On June 2, 1941, 16 years to the day after entering the Yankee lineup, he died in Riverdale, New York.

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


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
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
