Village Seeking Bids for Sidewalk Repairs

The Kewaskum Village Board, Monday night, authorized Administrator Dan Schmidt to advertise for bids on the first phase of an extensive rehabilitation program to repair or replace damaged sidewalks throughout the community.

Schmidt told the trustees that he and Public Works Superintendent Augie Bilgo had looked at the entire center section of the village and had targeted approximately 5,600 feet of sidewalk for repair this year.

Based on projected figures, Schmidt said the cost would be about \$55,000 to do the first phase. He said \$36,000 had been budgeted for those repairs. Schmidt did indicate, however, that the shortage could be made up with some of the funds which have been budgeted for curb repair. He said 350 feet of curbing has been marked for repair this year, while money for 450 feet had been allocated. Money from the payment of the first

installment of walk repairs at the end of this year and some fund transfers will make up the remaining shortage.

Schmidt advised the board that no property owners, on Roseland Drive and Fourth Street, have asked to have their walks repaired this year due to their extremely poor condition. He said they would be included after the owners sign consent and release forms.

The question then rose as to whether the three churches, who will all be affected by this year's work should pay 50% or 100% of the cost. Schmidt noted these properties are all tax exempt and the village receives no tax monies from them. After a short discussion, the board voted 6-1, to require all tax exempt properties to pay the full 100% cost of the sidewalk repairs on their properties. Trustee Tom McElhatton voted against the motion.

In department reports Fire Chief Donald Ehnert advised the board that the department's Telesquirt unit was back in service, ahead of schedule,

after renovation of the cab to provide more passenger capacity to comply with state requirements.

Schmidt informed the board that drilling of replacement well #1, had been completed and it is 135 feet shallower than anticipated which should represent some savings in drilling costs. The next phase will be bidding on the construction of the new pumphouse.

Parks Committee Chairman Tom McElhatton reported to date, 523 swim passes had been sold, down 77 from the same time last year, due to the cool weather.

Larry Williams, Chairman of the Public Service Committee, said his group was looking into the possibility of going with mandatory recycling for the village. He noted, however, the committee wanted to review the plan further before making any recommendations to the board.

In other action the board approved a footings and

You Can Lose Your Bike

Crackdown on Bicyclists Who Disregard the Law

A growing number of complaints against bicyclists, both juvenile and adult, has prompted the Kewaskum Police Department to begin a program of strict enforcement with bikers who are disregarding the law.

While cyclists are subject to exactly the same laws which govern motorists on the road, problems have been increasing as bikers have apparently forgotten or chosen to ignore that fact. We've had incidents where cyclists do not stop for stop signs and lights, they ride through intersections without stopping, etc., noted Chief Richard Knoebel, "both by juveniles and adults."

Other problems have included bikers riding on sidewalks and coming off the walks into traffic without stopping. There have also been complaints of pedestrians having to get off the sidewalks to avoid being knocked down by bikers.

Knoebel told the Village Board Monday night, his department had already issued over 20 citations and 100 warnings. He told the board that if an individual receives three citations their bicycle is confiscated for two weeks. If they continue as repeat offenders, the bike will be confiscated for up to six months. That includes both juveniles and adults. If the offender is a juvenile, the parents also receive a copy of the citation. Knoebel also noted fines can and will be levied since many of the incidents are also traffic violations.

Knoebel hopes his department's action will draw attention to the fact that bicyclists "are not" exempt from obeying traffic laws which also govern motorists and motorcycle operators who share the roads and highways with bicyclists.

Lehman Notified Of Highway 28 Improvements

MADISON...The Department of Transportation has announced that the Highway 41/Highway 28 interchange will be included in the first phase of the highway 41 freeway improvements, stated Representative Michael Lehman (R-Hartford).

Lehman said that through the efforts made by himself and the residents of Lomira and Kewaskum the Department of Transportation was convinced that this intersection was one that needed to be accelerated and was included in the first phases of the 41 improvements.

The consultant firm will soon be hired to work on the design of this section of road and, hopefully, with the funds available, we will be able to see progress made for construction in the 1991-92 season.

Lehman said he would like to thank all residents for their views on this situation, as their help was vital in getting this project included in the first phase.

Isolated Storm Brings High Winds, Rain

An isolated storm which popped up shortly after noon Monday, brought gale type high winds, lightning and slightly over a half inch of rain to a small portion of the Kewaskum area.

While the village received a good rain, a narrow path of farms north and east of St.

Michaels, near the Washington, Fond du Lac, Sheboygan County borders were buffeted by the storm which traveled out of the northeast producing high gusting winds which snapped off trees and overturned hay wagons. After the storm had passed, rain gauges in that area measured approximately 1/2

inch of rain. Other local areas reported varying amounts from a trace to 1/4 inch of rain.

Storms were also reported in areas of Sheboygan County. A line of storms which developed later in the afternoon in Waukesha County also reportedly produced some high winds and hail.

foundations only building permit for the 24-unit apartment building being constructed by Tom Timblin at 112 Timblin Drive, just north of the Kewaskum Shopping Mall.

A question of the need for another storm sewer in the area of the proposed complex was brought up. Schmidt said he would look into the matter.

On the request of Police Chief Richard Knoebel, the board approved an official list of "No Parking" zones throughout the village. The list was established as the result of some problems arising with cars parking in restricted areas. Knoebel indicated he could not enforce action against violators until the list was established. Action to eliminate some parking on the southwest corner of Main Street and Parkview was tabled for further review.

Gary Gavin, a village property owner, asked the board to consider his suggestion that the village go to an odd/even, rather than full street parking ban during the winter months.

President Paul Blumer told Gavin the idea had been tried a few years ago. However, it created more problems for the village crews having to plow around vehicles as well as extending plowing operations from one to two days. Blumer also said the plan did not work because many people were confused as to which side of the street they were to park and when.



The pellets are a ceramic of Yttrium oxide, Barium carbonate, and cupric oxide that when cooled with liquid nitrogen to about 70 Kelvins will offer no resistance to an electric current and will levitate

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a Samarium Cobalt magnet. The project indeed was a sight to see.

Other interesting projects included a plasma ball built by Don Iwen and Dave Prunty and an air-track timing device constructed by Mark Clements, the timing device used a home-built photogate and an original timing program for a commodore computer. Other students researched lasers and holography, optics, and aerodynamics. Mr. Soller was quite pleased with the over-all effort of the class.

The Medicine Man

In a recent skit on "Little House on the Prairie" a medicine man was featured. Now, you might say; What is a Medicine Man? Not a doctor in this case, or a native American, who conjurs up a healing potion with the help of roots and herbs. No, this is a traveling salesman who tours the country side with his little side show, trying to promote his elixir which he claims is a cure all. As I've heard it said: "If you haven't got it, you'll get it."

This incident takes me back to my youth when we experienced just such a visit by a medicine man. They used to travel from one rural community to another. It was a source of entertainment in the area when the only other gathering was a local band concert or annual picnic. They would seek permission to set up in an empty pasture, or better

yet in a hall not being used at the time.

People would flock to the performance which was usually free-or a minimum charge of 10c. After a few songs or dance, the medicine man would produce his concoction or cure-all as the case may be. If they stayed several nights, a contest was usually held for the most popular girl in town. With the purchase of his medicine, you were allowed a certain number of votes. At the end of his stay, the results were announced as to which lady received the most votes. My oldest sister, Helen, was the recipient of a brocaded fringed bedspread.

The name of this particular medicine was Qua-lax. It was in a bottle similar to Mother's bottle of Vanilla from the McNess man. One day while making a cake, I poured a

spoonful out ready to put in the batter, and thought it didn't smell like vanilla, I had the wrong bottle by mistake. I averted what could have been an interesting situation.

It didn't do any harm, but usually didn't do what it claimed to.

Today's generation will probably never experience those exciting days when the "medicine man" came to town. He goes down in the books with the great funny papers like: Jiggs and Maggie, Tillie the Toiler, Captain and the Kids, Barney Google, etc.

Weren't those really the "good old days?"




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Sculptures Dedicated at Cedar Valley

WHOLE WHEAT

When milling white flour, the kernel's heart [wheat germ] is discarded - also the bran casing. The germ, only 2.5% by weight, contains 67% of the thiamin and 25% of the riboflavin and vitamin B-6. The bran, 14% by weight, has most of the fiber, contains 3/4 of the B-6, 1/2 the pantothenic acid and riboflavin, and 1/5 the protein. 'Enrichment' restores thiamin, riboflavin, niacin and iron, but many vitamins and minerals are lost in enriched flour, which also lacks fiber. For health, emphasize whole wheat.

NEWS NOTES**

The Village of Kewaskum Municipal Code addresses a particular hazard or public nuisance the Village Board wishes to review with all property owners. This hazard or public nuisance is in reference to TREE LIMBS. As stated in Chapter 10.05(5), all limbs of trees which project over and are less than 10 feet above any public sidewalk, street or other public place are considered a public nuisance. Any property owner in violation of this section is asked to correct the situation to alleviate any further action

required by the Village.

In Section 10.06(9) of the Municipal Code it indicates all trees cut down shall be cut into lengths no greater than 3 feet and placed, in an orderly fashion, in the usual area where garbage is picked up for removal and disposal by the Village.

It should also be noted that bicycles are considered recreational vehicles and fall under the Village Traffic Code Chapter 7, which in turn adopts and places enforce all State Traffic Codes. What this means to bicyclists is that all regular traffic laws are to be followed as to stop signs/lights, signalling, traveling on the right side of the roadway and operating the bicycle on the roadway adjacent to the curb (not on the sidewalk).

Everyone's cooperation is appreciated in the maintenance of safety for all residents.

competitions, evening lectures, and social and recreational activities. The program for high school students has been offered by the UW System for the last 32 years, and has been permanently established at UWSB since 1974.

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

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin met in Regular Session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

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


