Farmington PTO Buying Playground Equipment

The Kewaskum School Board gave its formal approval for the purchase of playground equipment which will be paid for by the Farmington PTO.

Marcia Theusch, representing the group, told the board Monday night, the PTO has been working on fundraising projects which will enable it to buy over \$5,000 in new equipment for the school. Theusch said bids had been received and the PTO already has \$3,000 set aside for the purchase. She asked that the district go ahead with the purchase of all the equipment now so it can be installed by the time school begins. Theusch noted buying all the equipment at one time would also allow the group to take advantage of discounts offered by the dealer.

With the \$3,000 it already has and another fundraiser set for September, Theusch said the PTO would be able to reimburse the district fully for the cost of the equipment by fall.

Theusch said the equipment purchase was the second phase of a two-year project to improve playground facilities at the school. The first phase, which is already complete, was the blacktopping of additional space to provide a large play area for the students.

Board member John Schulte commended the group, stating he was glad to see an active PTO take this action. Buildings and Grounds Superintendent Rustic Drive Bridge Fred Boehlke also commended effort put into the project. "They did an excellent job of researching everything, from the manufacturers to insurance coverage.'

In other action the board approved the purchase of six IBM computers and a census program. Business Manager Cherna Gorder said the funds for the purchase, \$9,450, were included in the budget and a portion of the cost would be reimbursed through a Carl Perkins grant.

Five of the computers will be for student use and the sixth kept for administrative use.

The board also approved the spending of \$8,555 for furnace repairs needed above the high school library.

District Administrator Dr. David Heather asked for and received approval to institute a staff development plan for the district's faculty. He told the board the program, consisting of seven 21/2 hour sessions, is designed to help teachers improve their abilities to teach. September, 1989.

Heather said it would take about three to four years to get the entire staff through the program. He anticipated getting 30 individuals into the program this year. He noted that while the district has a good teaching staff, it needs to get moving on some kind of instruction improvement which will help the faculty update and improve on its teaching techniques and performance in the classroom.

As part of the district's meeting upcoming mandates set up by the Department of Public Instruction, the board approved the setting up of an "Education For Employment Plan" and appointed Dan Wangerin as the program's coordinator. The program is one of the "20 Standards" the DPI is requiring be implemented by all school districts.

Service contracts with CESA #1 and #6, for the 1989-90 school year were also approved by the board.

In contract negotiations, Negotiations Committee Chairman Ron Beimborn advised the board the last meeting with the KEA had been on June 14th. He noted the two sides have now agreed on an individual to serve as mediator.

Beimborn also indicated further discussions with the KAP have been scheduled for July 20th.

Road construction expected to start the week of July 10, on the reconstruction of the Rustic Drive Bridge over the West Branch of the Milwaukee River. The work will consist of replacing the existing structure with a wider two-span bridge and widening and straightening the approaches.

The work will be performed under a contract let to Lunda Construction Co. of Black River Falls, WI, at an estimated cost of \$130,816.00. Financing will be shared on approximately a 80/20 percentage by the Federal government and the Town of Ashford, respectively, from funds provided primarily by gas taxes.

Rustic Drive will be closed to through traffic during construction operations, with access only to local property owners. It is anticipated that the road will be closed during the week of July 10, 1989 and will be reopened by the end of



LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Voters of the Kewaskum **School District:**

I know that the Beechwood School issue has been a very controversial item in the past few years. I would like at this time to be able to explain 2 very educational and worthwhile programs that are held in the Beechwood School building at this date. I also want to give you some history on them.

I have been the summer library coordinator since its 1983. In conception in September of 1982 a few volunteers, Colleen Narbatovics, Carolyn Beimborn and myself, set up the library at the Beechwood School. Before that time, each teacher just ordered whatever books they wanted to for their classrooms. In the fall of 1982, volunteers from the P.T.O. organized and catalogued all the books and made a library for the children. We did get some advice from Kathy Roerhig, Arnie Dittbrenner and George Allmann. However, we never had paid aides for the library like the other schools did. It never cost the school district money except for library books. The P.T.O. bought 3 wooden bookshelves and approximately 250 books for all age levels to supplement whatever books were there from the classrooms. The P.T.O. spent over \$4,000 setting up this educational experience for the children of our area.

As the volunteer library aide at Beechwood, I would spend Tuesday afternoon checking out books and the multitude of other duties librarians do. I was never paid nor did I ask for compensation for these duties.

In the spring of 1983, I consulted the librarian at the Random Lake Public Library, Darla Jean Kraus, about having a summer reading program at the school like the public libraries do. She thought it an excellent idea for the area children and so our summer library program was started. We have a volunteer staff of 4 people and we each put in 2 hours on Tuesdays for the program to run smoothly. We receive our materials through the Random Lake Library. I will bring samples of these materials to the July 10th school board meeting where they can be seen. I do run copies of mazes, coloring sheets, etc. at Farmington School before the end of the school year so we have these to hand out to the children for them to do and bring back for display if they choose to. I chose these handouts from a manual I loan from the Random Lake Library.

After our program and Farmington's were running the School Board did implement a policy on having all the school libraries open during the

summer months.

that children who read during the summer months retain a lot of the skills they learned the year before in school. They start out with an advantage over children that do not read at all in the summer. With an organized program like these, it provides the incentive the rewards need to motivate children to read and keep up their skills in the summer.

Over the last 6 years, our enrollment has ranged from 40 to 65 attending. This year we have 58 students signed up. I can assure you that of these 1 to 16 year old students that attend over the summer would not have this opportunity if they could not walk or have easy access to this library. The closest library is in the Farmington School some 20 miles round trip for most of these children and their program is not set up like ours. We have 10 middle and high school students that attend and check out books. This age group is unusual to find reading books in the summer because of their

activities elsewhere. However, It has been proven in studies they show up each week, check out books, and then move on to their weekly ballgame or rap session. For these older students we have gotten bulk book loans from the Random Lake Public Library to supplement our books so we keep their interest level. These students have contracted to read their 3 book minimum this summer and most have surpassed this goal with ease. And yes, we do spot quizzes on all the kids to see if they did indeed read their books.

We also have a "Read-To-Me" program for the youngest children, who range in age from 1 year on. These early years are so important so they learn to love reading- face it- without reading you can go nowhere in this world.

This year we hope to reach our goal of 1500 books read this summer. We run this year for 6 weeks. For every child fulfilling their contract they receive a free sundae from any Sheboygan Dairy Queen and a free pass to the Milwaukee County Zoo. This year the library program is

being supported by the D.P.I. (Department of Public Instruction). Our Preschool Storytime Hour is run on Tuesday

evenings during the school year when the Princess Twirlettes have baton practice. This program is run by Carolyn and Jenny Beimborn. It is mainly designed for the preschool children but on many occasions, older students are seen leaving the building with research materials in hand or a book they remembered reading once and enjoyed. There are approximately 40 kids that attend this program. It has been in

existence for the last 4 years. This program also is run with no funding from the school district. The children enjoy songs and do plays for the holidays. This also is a very educational program unlike any elsewhere in the district. Funding for both these programs is through the Beechwood Concerned Citizens.

As you can see, this is not just an empty building, it is still a place of learning for these students of ours. We would like the educational value of these to continue as long as possible. Thank You.





Boaters can help prevent the spread of this unwanted lake weed, according to Department of Natural Resources lake management specialists, by removing all aquatic plants from boats and trailers before launching and after leaving the water. Also check for and clear plants from the wet wells of trailered boats, board of sailboats and the interiors of car-top boats and canoes.

Native to Europe and Asia, Eurasian water milfoil was brought to North America in the 1940s, presumably as an aquarium plant. Since then it has spread to 37 states, including Wisconsin.

Once introduced into a lake, milfoil grows quickly - up to two inches per day. It often forms thick mats that interfere with boating, swimming and fishing.

Milfoil can also bring about changes in the natural lake environment by forcing out more beneficial native plants. Unlike native plants, Eurasian water milfoil is not used as food by most waterfowl, fish or insects; dense milfoil beds are also unsuitable habitat for fish spawning.

With no natural controls to keep it in check, Eurasian water milfoil thrives in almost any apply for a fall turkey permit," type of lake. It grows on silty, sandy or rocky bottoms.

Milfoil spreads rapidly as small pieces - broken from Wisconsin Hunter Education plants by waves and boats sink to the bottom, root and grow. Just by taking a few minutes to remove all aquatic plants from boats and trailers, boaters can help prevent the spread of Eurasian water milfoil.

Wisconsin's First Fall **Turkey Hunt In October**

MADISON, WI - Permit applications for Wisconsin's first fall wild turkey hunt are due August 11, reminds Department Natural Resources turkey coordinator Ed Frank.

The fall turkey hunting season runs for three consecutive Wednesday Sunday hunting periods: Oct. 11-15, Oct. 18-22 and Oct. 25-29. Only eight zones are open to fall hunting.

"Since this is Wisconsin's first fall turkey season, it's hard to predict what the total harvest will be," said Frank. "I would expect that about 20 percent of the permit holders will bag a turkey, which is the success rate we see during the spring season.'

Turkeys of any age or sex are legal. Shotguns or muzzle loading shotguns are the only legal firearms for hunting wild tur-

Applications for the 7,260 hunting permits available must be received or postmarked no later than August 11.

Permit applications are available at DNR and county clerk offices. Individual permits are issued for one hunting period only and for one of eight hunting zones in southwestern Wisconsin.

You must have a valid Wisconsin hunting license to said Frank. A 1988-89 or 1989-90 small game, sports, patron or achers license is required. A Certificate issued after Sept. 1, 1988, or a senior citizen Remember that 1988-89

hunting licenses expire Aug. 31, so a valid 1989-90 license will be required to hunt turkeys in October. The 1989-90 hunting licenses will go on sale July 31.

"Deer, bear or trapping licenses do NOT qualify as valid licenses to apply for a turkey permit or to hunt turkeys, added Frank.

A 1989-90 Wisconsin Turkey Stamp is also required to hunt turkeys. Stamps cost \$13.75 each and are also available at DNR and county clerk offices.

"The 1988-89 turkey hunting stamp for the spring 1989 turkey season expires August 31 and is not good for the fall season," said "However, the 1989-90 stamp you purchase for this fall's season will be good for the 1990 spring turkey hunt.'




