Rain Didn't Keep Buyers Away

Bidding War Helps Set Record Prices at Fair's Animal Auction

Despite the heavy rains which plagued the area Thursday, buyers were out en masse at the Washington County Junior Fair's 20th Annual Junior Livestock Sale. Because of the threatening weather and wet conditions of the show ring, the auction was moved under cover into the beef barn.

Bidding started off hot and heavy with bidders falling by the wayside as Pick N Save and Royal Ford, both of West Bend, headed into a bidding war battling down to the wire to purchase the champion hog of Steve Janz from West Bend. When the verbal smoke cleared, the victor was Royal Ford with a whopping record high bid of \$12.50 a pound, bringing a price of \$3,187.50 for the 255-pound animal.

Later the approximately 150 bidders at the auction were to witness another duel as the bidding again heated up for the

champion beef steer, also owned and shown by Janz. Pick N Save was not to be outdone this time and took the 1,190-pound animal with another record setting high bid of \$10.50 a pound, for a price of \$12,495.

The 106-pound champion lamb of Kimberle Shelmidine of West Bend, also went to Pick N Save for a high bid of \$5.00 a pound, bringing \$530.

The hog sale continued with the reserve champion of Vicki Janz, West Bend, going to Enders Construction of Hartford for \$3.25 a pound. The homebred and raised champion of Ryan Herman, of Wayne, went to Pick N Save for \$3.25 and the HRB reserve champion of Keith Herman, Wayne, going

to The Escape for \$3.00 a pound.

In the sheep category, the lamb of Carrie Tischer, Cedarburg, which won both reserve champion and homebred and raised champion ribbons, went to M & I First National Bank for \$2.50 a pound. County Clerk Art Degnitz purchased the HBR reserve champion of Chris Schultz of Hartford for \$2.00 a pound.

In the beef sale, Pick N Save also purchased the reserve champion beef steer of Matt Gahns, West Bend, for \$2.75 a pound. The HBR champion beef steer of Kris Rauh, Slinger, went to Strupp Implement for \$1.50. The HRB reserve champion beef steer of Bill Butzlaff, Jr., Kewaskum, sold to St. Lawrence Equipment for \$1.85. The champion dairy steer of Benji Michaels, West Bend, went to Bob Fish for \$1.75. Bob Fish also purchased the reserve dairy champion of Brian Butzlaff, Kewaskum, for \$1.50 a pound. The HRB dairy reserve champion of David Schulz of West Bend was sold to St. Lawrence Equipment.

After the record bidding, prices dropped off but remained good in comparison to the Fond du Lac County Fair where, last week, the champion steer sold for only \$1.50 a pound, the champion hog brought \$1.95 a pound and the champion lamb went for \$2.50 a pound.

Accident Claims Life of Area Man

A rural Campbellsport man became Washington County's 18th traffic fatality for 1989. According to a Washington County Sheriff's Department release, the accident which took the life of Jeffery A. Harter, 22, of 882 E. Auburn-Ashford Drive, Campbellsport, occurred about 4:13 p.m., Tuesday, August 1st, in the Town of Jackson.

A Sheriff's Department spokesperson said the incident happened on Highway 143, approximately 3/10ths of a mile east of Highway M, when Verlyn Krueger, 63, of 982 Pleasant Valley Road, who was traveling east on Highway 143 attempted to make a left turn into a driveway.

As Krueger began his left turn, he hit, head-on, a westbound motorcycle driven by Harter.

The victim was transported to

St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend, where he was pronounced dead a short time later of massive head injuries. Harter was not wearing a helmet.

The Sheriff's Department report said Krueger was cited for failure to yield the right-of-way while making a lefthand turn.

"I'm very pleased with the enthusiasm and experience of this year's campaign cabinet," said Torinus. "With the addition of Kewaskum and

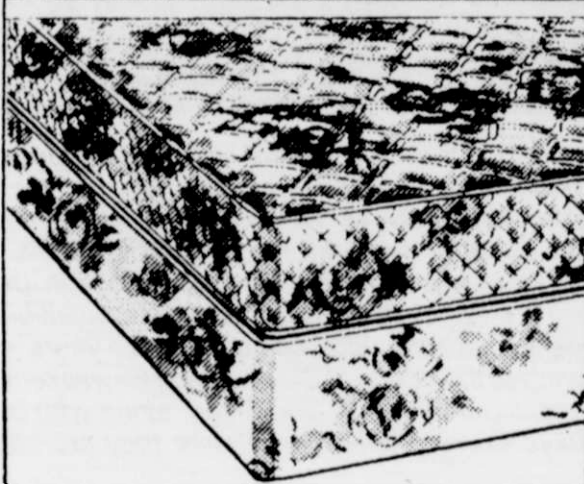

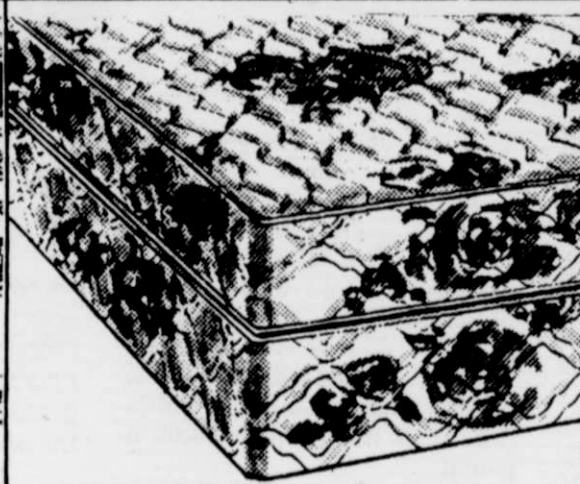

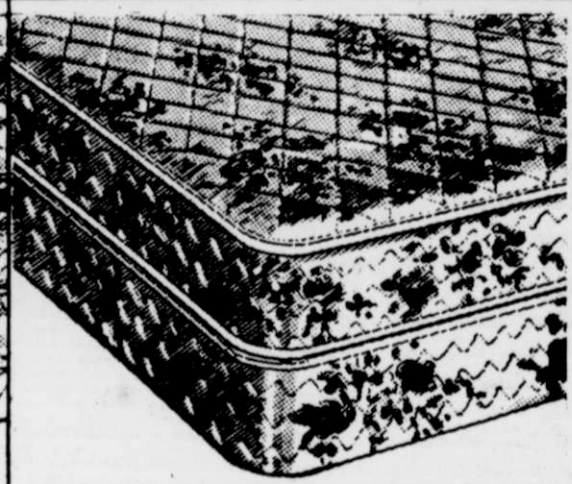

ICE CREAM ROLL

Barba Breitag

4 eggs, separated
½ c. cake flour
¼ cocoa
1 tsp. baking powder
¼ tsp. salt
¾ c. sugar
1 tsp. vanilla
2 T. water

Beat egg whites stiff and add ½ of sugar. Beat egg yolks and add remaining sugar. Add salt to yolks beating constantly. Add water and continue beating. Gently fold in beaten egg whites. Gradually add in sifted dry ingredients (flour, powder and cocoa). Bake in shallow jelly roll pan lined with waxed paper at 375° for 15 to 20 minutes. Don't overbake. While hot, turn onto towel sprinkled with powdered sugar, remove paper and roll like jelly roll. When cool, unroll, fill with ice cream, reroll and freeze. Wrap in foil.

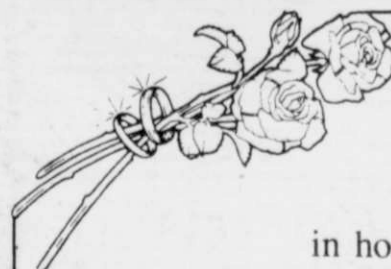

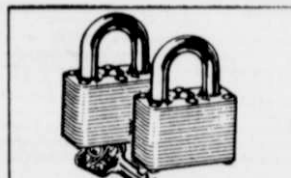

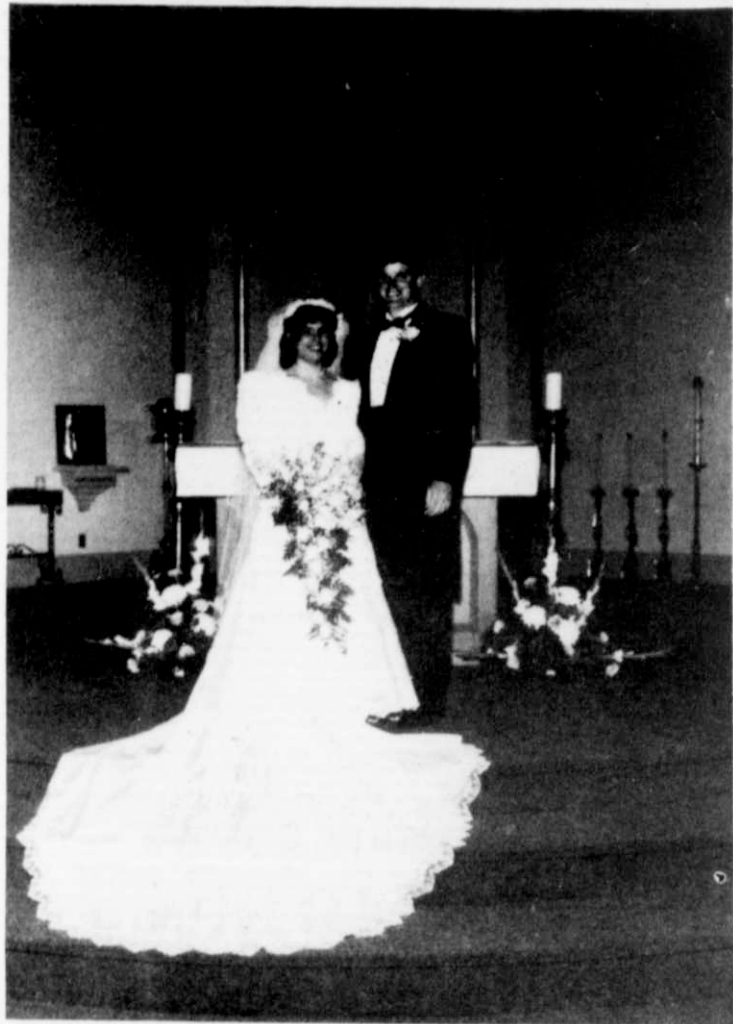

U.S. Senator Bob Kasten, R.-Wis., has won another round in his fight to continue development of the Ice Age Trail across Wisconsin.

Kasten, a member of the Senate Appropriations Committee, won committee approval this week of an additional \$69,000 to fund management of the trail and assist volunteers who are building the trail. Total funding for the Trail will be \$129,000 next year.

"There will be an exceptionally high return of funds invested because of the contributions of volunteers made possible by this additional support," Kasten said.

The trail, which follows the terminal moraine across Wisconsin, is a mixed use primitive trail primarily designed for backpacking and cross-country skiing. It is one of only two national trails in Wisconsin, the other being the North Country Trail.

It is being constructed across

Nurse Returns to Profession

Since April of this year, things have been looking up for Martina Hartwell of West Bend. For the first time in three years she has been able to work in her profession.

In 1986 Hartwell and her husband moved to this country from West Germany, where she had worked as a registered nurse. She called the Wisconsin State Licensing Board to find out how many years of schooling she would need to

meet U.S. requirements; regulations prevented her from working as a registered nurse without further certification.

She had completed a year program in Germany and thought she needed one

additional year of school. She incorrectly assumed that she could only be certified as a licensed practical nurse.

Before taking the board exam for practical nursing licensure, Hartwell brushed up on her English proficiency. Despite the three or four years of instruction she had in high school, she didn't pass the test because of her language scores. She passed on her second attempt but was then informed her education was more suitable for a career as a registered nurse. The state board then informed her of the two-year registered nursing program available at several technical colleges in Wisconsin.

"The state board had all of my work from Germany and they didn't realize that my education was for an RN rather than an LPN," she recalls. "This was very disappointing, because I wasted a lot of time and money working toward the LPN. I could have been working in my field much sooner."

In order to take the state boards for the RN, Hartwell needed to obtain a general equivalency diploma (GED) and take a pediatrics clinic course. It was then that she came to Moraine Park Technical College in West Bend and talked to Josephine Roehrborn, instructional manager for health occupations.

"Josephine helped me with the reviewing and set me up in the pediatrics class in February of last year," Hartwell says. "The class was not really difficult, but it was more specific than I was used to. Plus, I had been out of school since 1983 - I had to spend a lot of time studying and writing

papers. It was also difficult doing everything in English."

"She did well in the pediatrics clinical," said Pat Hrobsky, a nursing instructor for Moraine Park, "even though she didn't understand our medical abbreviations. This course helped her realize how different things are in this country."

"Pat was very helpful," Hartwell says. "All of the instructors worked with me so I could meet the requirements." By completing the class and obtaining her GED, Hartwell had met the preliminary requirements, so she went to Chicago last October and took the Foreign Nurses boards. Passing those tests enabled her to take the state boards for registered nurses in February. In April she was notified by the state that she passed.

"A lot of time, money and work went into this," she says. "I think it was worth it, because I can work in my profession again. I just wish the paperwork hadn't taken so long."

Now Hartwell is employed by St. Joseph's Hospital in West Bend on the Medical/Surgical floor. She had a baby in March and plans on working three days a week after her full-time orientation period.

She sees a number of differences between St. Joseph's and the hospital where she worked in Germany: "Here I am assigned a certain number of patients and I don't worry about the others on the floor. In Germany the nurses worked together so we got to know the patients - we didn't have nursing assistants so we had to do all the work ourselves. I liked

getting to know every patient, but here it is nice because I get to know a case better."

Hartwell says she has thought about getting her bachelor's degree, but she is not sure how many credits from Germany an American college would except. "For now my goal is simply to get back to nursing."

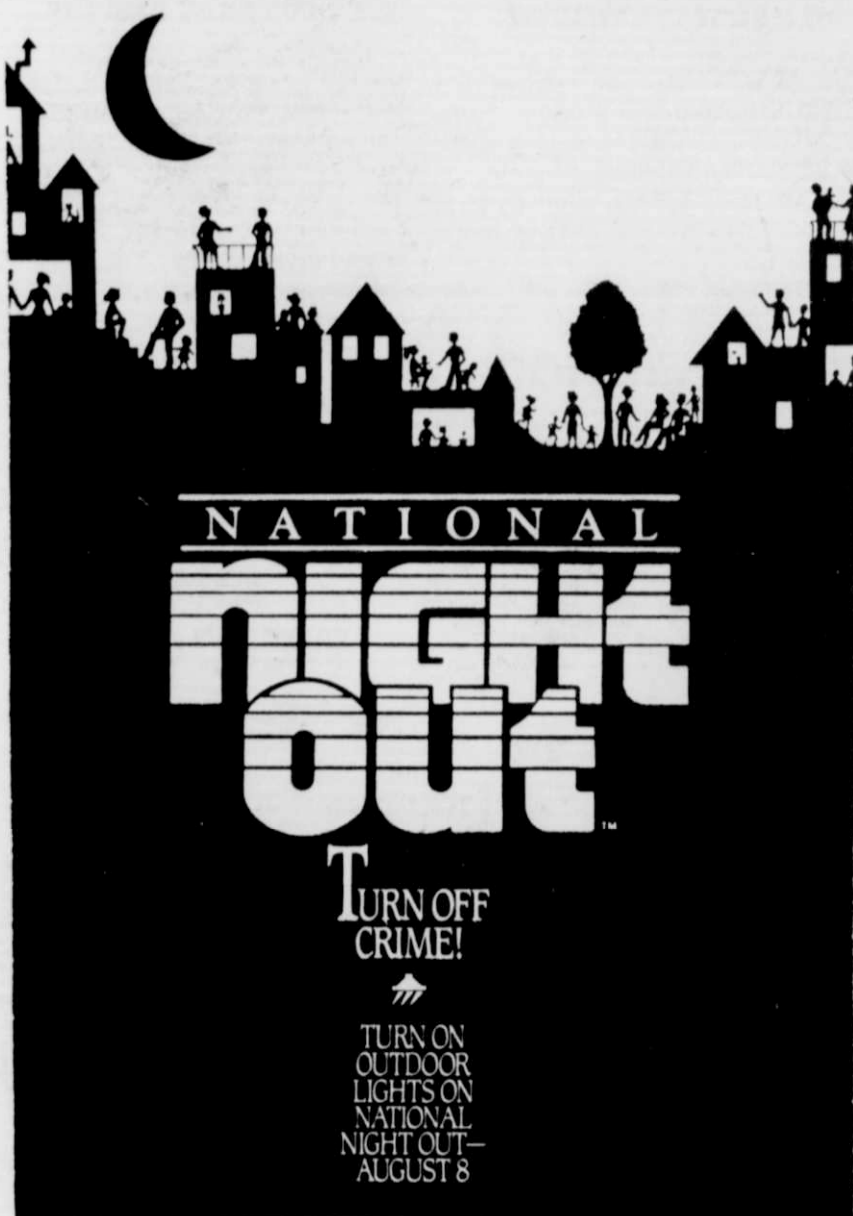

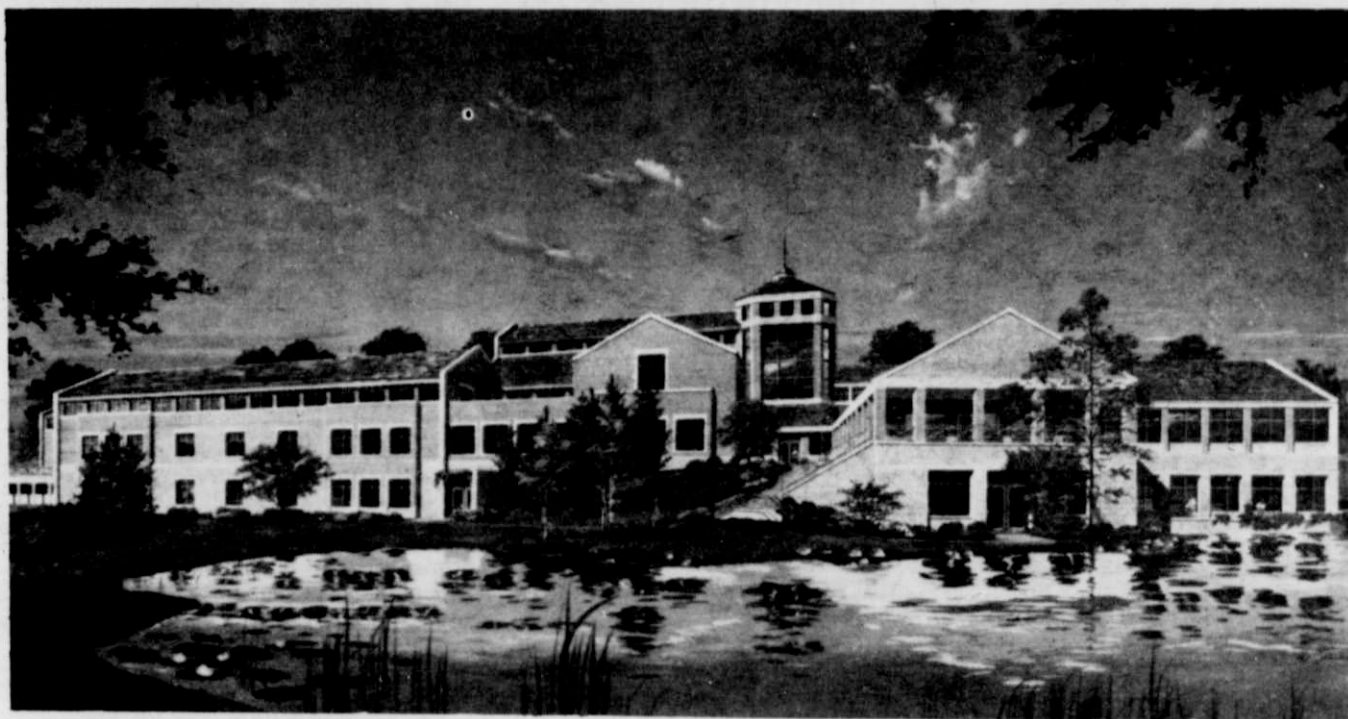

Plans Approved for West Bend Mutual's New Corporate Headquarters

Last year, PRO's across the nation helped more than a half million Americans with tax problems ranging from misapplied payments and lost refunds to scrambled social security numbers, garbled surnames, address changes, and Taxpayer Assistance Orders. But the PRO's do more than just put out fires; they prevent them too, by spotting glitches in the system and correcting them before they cause trouble for everyone.

If you have a problem with the IRS and haven't been able to solve it through normal channels, call the IRS toll-free at 1-800-424-1040 and ask for the Problem Resolution Office.

Tele-Tax, an automated system of prerecorded tax information, can also provide more details on the Problem Resolution Office. Call toll-free 1-800-554-4477 any time of the day or night and request tape number 104.

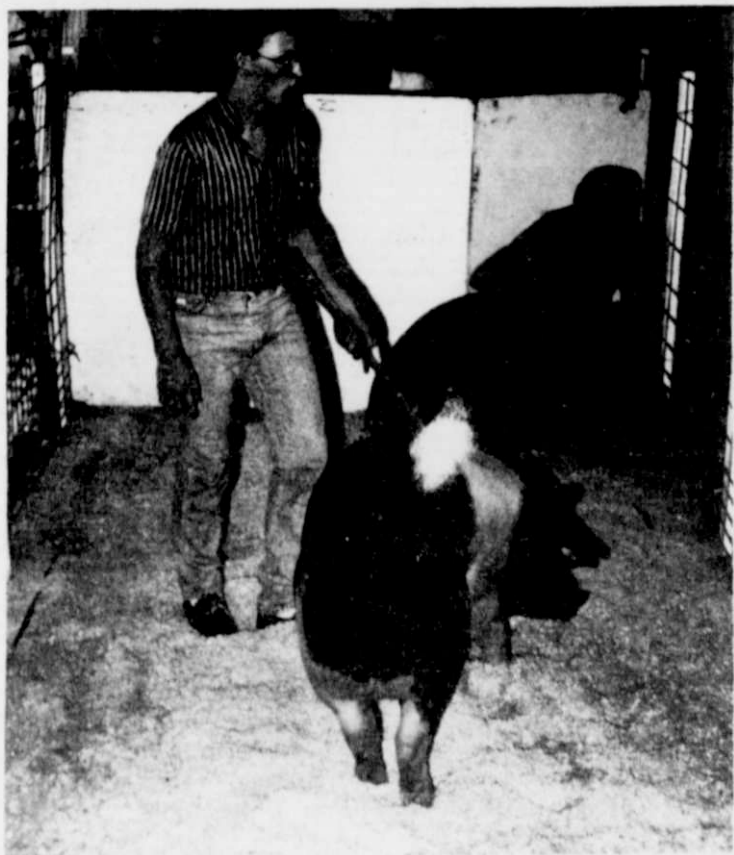

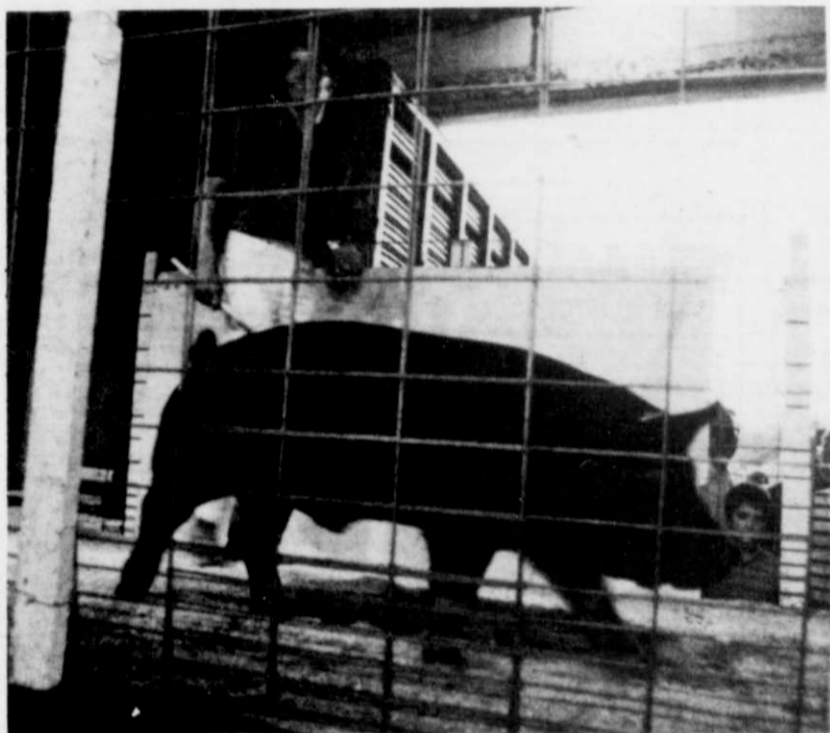

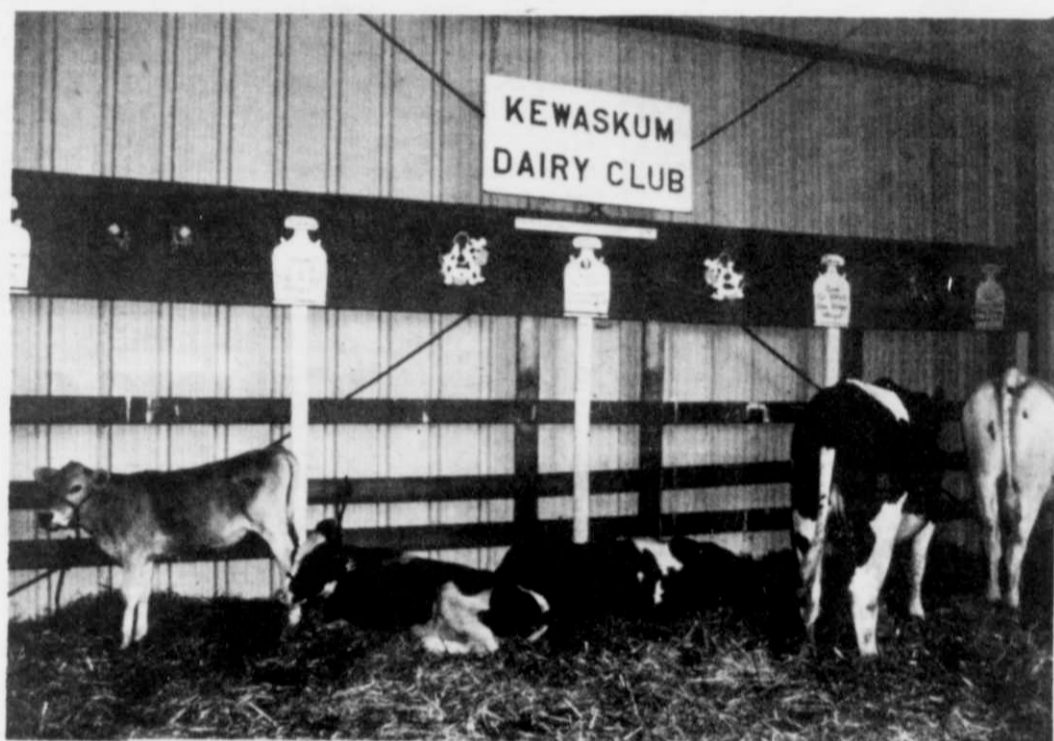

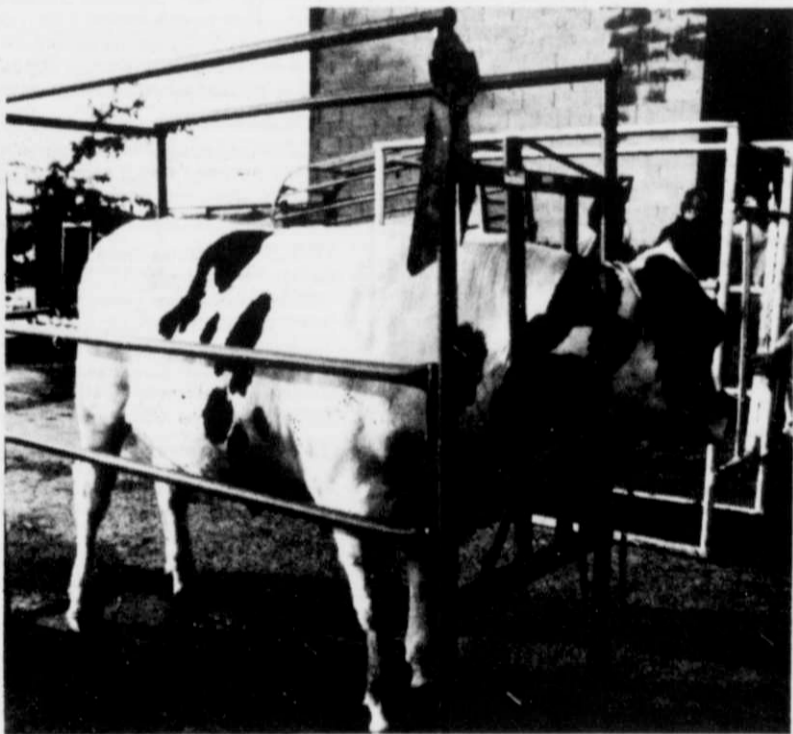

Warden Answers Questions About Velvet Deer Horns

Midsummer is the time of year when it becomes more noticeable that the deer have grown new horns for the season. During this time Conservation Wardens receive questions about possessing deer horns which are in velvet. You can not possess horns in velvet unless you have received a permit issued by a Conservation Warden.

If you accidentally hit and kill a deer with your car, you can keep the deer if you have a Conservation Warden or a law enforcement officer tag the deer with a car killed deer tag. The car killed deer tag allows you to keep the deer, but a special permit is required to possess a deer head in velvet or a deer skin in the red or spotted coat. You must contact a Conservation Warden and request a permit. Therefore, two tags are necessary, one for the deer and one for the horns in velvet. If you do not obtain a permit you must dispose of the velvet horns.

If you find a dead deer, you can not cut the velvet horns off and keep them. Again, you must contact a Warden and request a permit for the horns.

One quick reminder as the fall hunting season approaches - if you plan to apply for a 1989 fall turkey hunting permit, the permit applications are due

August 11, 1989. Before you apply for a permit you must have a valid hunting license. The 1990 licenses are available throughout the area at this time.

The 1989 fall turkey hunting season does not include the Kettle Moraine Area. A spring 1990 turkey season is scheduled for the Kettle Moraine Area.

Temporary Rest Areas Opened on US 41

Because of unforeseen delays in opening the new safety rest areas on US 41 in Dodge County, the state Department of Transportation has moved a mobile rest room facility onto nearby lands at the UW 41/WIS 67 junction in northeastern Dodge County.

Theodore Stephenson, state highway maintenance engineer, said the temporary rest rooms will serve travelers on the busy route until the new safety rest areas can be hooked up to the Lomira sewage system and opened for public use.

The temporary facilities are air conditioned, and provide 14 flush toilets, plus hot and cold running water.

Although the new rest areas are nearly completed, Stephenson said the DOT decided to move the temporary mobile comfort station to the location because it will not be possible to open the new rest areas until next spring.

"The DOT encountered problems in obtaining easements to connect the new rest areas to Lomira municipal utilities," Stephenson said. "Now we have the easement, but it won't be possible to get a contractor on the job soon enough to have the new rest areas opened this fall."

"The basic problem with the old rest areas is that they were too small, in poor condition and not hooked into municipal utilities," Stephenson said. "They had only pit toilets and no running water at all, to serve traffic on one of the state's busiest highways," he added.

"We know that this has been a hardship for some travelers, but feel certain that the mobile comfort stations will serve the purpose until we can get the new rest areas opened," Stephenson said.

Minutes of Annual School District Meeting

July 24, 1989

The Annual Meeting of the School District of Kewaskum was held in the Kewaskum High School Rose Hall on Monday, July 24, 1989, beginning at 8:04 p.m. The meeting was called to order by School Board President Neal Weare. There were approximately 50 electors present.

Mr. Weare proceeded with introductions: Jeanne Jacak-Secretary, Dr. David Heather-District Administrator, David Kerne-Legal Representation, Paul Seymour-Board Member, Ron Beimbom-Board Member, Donald Nowak-Board Treasurer, John Schulte-Board Vice President, Perry Ankerson-Board Member, Ruth Schmitt-Board Clerk, Cherna Gorder-Business Manager.

Nominations for the purpose of selecting a temporary chairperson were requested. Clara Trapp nominated Ruth Schmitt. Ron Beimbom seconded the motion. Jan Hubbell moved to close the nominations and Clara Trapp seconded the motion. Motion passed on a voice vote.

Ruth Schmitt appointed Jeanne Jacak as secretary.

Jan Hubbell moved to dispense with the reading of the minutes. Neal Weare seconded the motion. Motion passed on a voice vote. The minutes were accepted as presented in the Annual Report.

Neal Weare moved to waive discussion of the financial report for the past year. Don Nowak seconded the motion. There was no discussion. The motion passed on a voice vote.

OLD BUSINESS:

Chairperson Schmitt asked if anyone wished to discuss any old business. There was none.

NEW BUSINESS:

Dr. David Heather highlighted the 1988-90 school year focusing on the many achievements of the students and successes of the educational program. Dr. Heather commented on the need for the district to develop educational programs to serve the needs of all the students. Dr. Heather thanked those in attendance for their continued help and support of the Kewaskum School District.

Cherna Gorder presented a detailed review of the 1989-90 budget. There was no discussion.

Ron Beimbom moved that resolutions be voted on with a secret ballot. Lee Rammer seconded the motion. The motion passed by a show of hands 26-20.

Richard Zarling moved:

Resolution A: Be it resolved by the electors of the School District of Kewaskum that the salary of the School Board members be set at \$800 per member per year and to authorize the payment of actual and necessary expenses as well as for actual loss of earning, not exceeding \$15 per day. Jan Hubbell seconded the motion. Motion passed 44-yes; 7-no; 1-abstention.

Maurice Hovland moved that Resolutions B-C-D and E be combined and voted on together. Charles Voge seconded the motion and it passed on a voice vote.

Charles Voge moved:

Resolution B: Be it resolved by the electors of the School District of Kewaskum that the School Board be authorized to sell or dispose of obsolete or unused furniture and equipment which is no longer needed for use by the district. Jan Hubbell seconded the motion. Motion passed 49-yes; 3-no; 3-invalid.

Charles Voge moved:

Resolution C: Be it resolved by the electors of the Kewaskum School District that the School Board provide for a school lunch program and appropriate funds for that purpose. Jan Hubbell seconded the motion. Motion passed 49-yes; 3-no; 3-invalid.

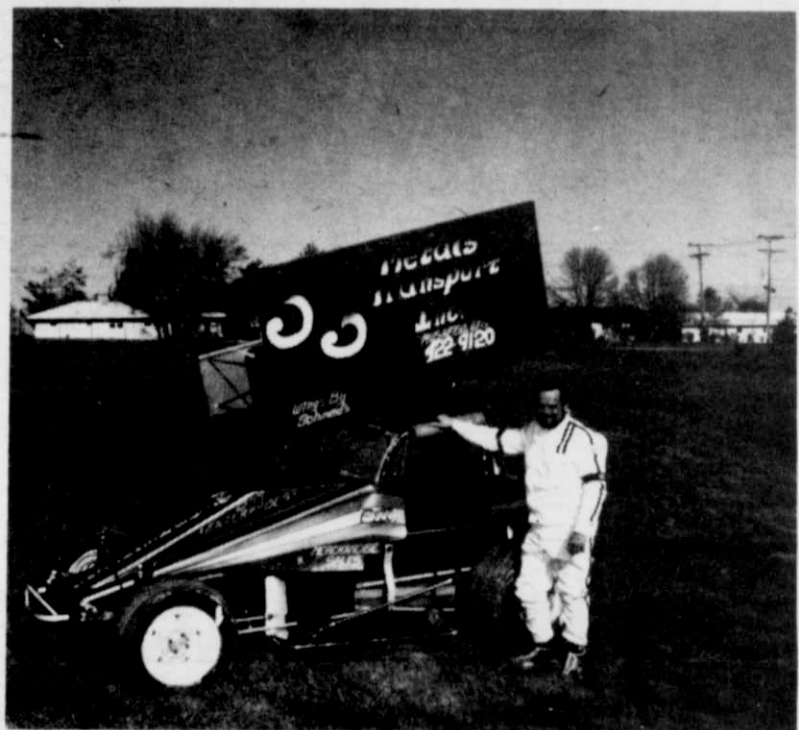

Watercraft Operators Should Be Sure To Practice Courtesy on the Water

MADISON, WI — Personal watercraft operation is one of the fastest growing sports in Wisconsin based on the 1988 registration of these water vehicles, Dale P. Morey, DNR boating law administrator said. The personal watercraft described are the individual or dual rider water bikes, wave jumpers or sea scooters similar to snowmobiles on snow or motorcycles on land. They are exciting to watch and even more exciting to ride, or operate.

"These water vehicles take athletic skill and coordination to operate these pieces of equipment," Morey said. "Running one will provide fun, enjoyment and freedom as you skim across the water, but there are some problems associated with the fun."

All operators of personal watercraft do not consider themselves to be boaters and do not understand, or follow the "rules of the road," or courtesy on the water. It's this lack of knowledge and demonstration of courtesy that has created a new brand of conflict between personal watercraft operators and traditional boaters and lakeshore property owners, Morey explained as he outlined some operating tips.

1. To reduce noise (the most common complaint about personal watercraft) leave and approach shore slowly.
 2. Vary operation area on the water to spread out the impression of usage.
 3. Avoid early morning riding near residential or campground areas especially on weekends.
 4. Jumping boat wakes is dangerous to watercraft operator and irritating to boaters.
 5. Do not make noisy exhaust system modifications.
- "Powerboating is a big sport in Wisconsin and ranks the Badgerstate sixth in the nation in the total number of

registered boats even with the relatively short boating season," Morey said. "This high-numbers game makes for crowded waterways on weekends with all types of boaters competing for open water space."

Operators of sailboats, ski boats, fishing boats, personal watercraft, canoes and kayaks all have different interests and needs. These needs are not always compatible and conflicts seem inevitable.

"Of course there are many solutions to this, the first is to become a knowledgeable and courteous boater," Morey stated. "The best way is to take a safe boating course and learn all the basic boating skills and 'rules of the road'."

DNR Reminds Anglers of 14 Inch Size Limit on Bass

EAGLE, WI — (July 24, 1989) — The Department of Natural Resources reminds bass anglers that a 14 inch size limit on both large and smallmouth bass has been in effect since January 1, 1989 on most waters in the southern two-thirds of Wisconsin. The northern one-third, known as the "Northern Bass Zone" as described on Page 11 of the 1989 fishing regulations pamphlet, has a 12 inch bass size limit. The bag limit in both zones remains at five bass per day of each species.

"These regulations were developed to allow both large and small mouth bass to live an additional two years before being caught" says Area Fisheries Manager Randy Schumacher. "We hope the large bass will be better panfish predators, yielding better bluegill and crappie populations by increasing growth rates and average panfish size. The regulation will also provide larger bass — if it is followed."

"We are not seeing enough compliance with the new bass regulations," said Ron Preder, Area Conservation Warden. "Most of our field wardens have reported checking many anglers with mostly under-sized bass. Some anglers say they

were not aware of the new regulation."

The new bass size limit regulations were enacted following strong statewide support from anglers at the 1988 spring conservation hearings. Through several studies, such as a 1982 survey on Golden Lake, in Waukesha County, the Department discovered that anglers can harvest over half the bass population from May through October. "This extremely high harvest or exploitation," says Schumacher, "resulted in a bass population averaging only about 10 inches in length, with few fish over 14 inches."

Both Preder and Schumacher emphasize that the regulation must be accepted in order to work. Results will not be visible for at least two years - even longer if acceptance is not 100%.

The bass size limit is being enforced by conservation wardens. Preder and Schumacher ask that you take a few minutes to read your 1989 fishing regulations pamphlet and call them if you have any further questions. Regulations pamphlets are available free from any Department field station and most sporting goods stores.
