# Village Board Approves Annexations

On a 6-0 vote, with President Paul Blumer absent, the Kewaskum Village Board, Monday night, approved the petition for annexation presented on the behalf of approximately fourteen Town of Kewaskum property owners who live along Bonnie Lane and the southern village limits.

The board's action now clears the way for the village to begin discussions with the owners regarding installation of sewer and water utilities to the affected homes, several of which have been experiencing septic problems. Village Administrator Dan Schmidt was asked if the village would be picking up any of the engineering or construction costs. He told the board all costs involved with the project would be born by the landowners. The village's only responsibility now would be to work with the

residents and engineers to get the work laid out, bid and started.

The board also took action on awarding the bid for the village's first phase of its sidewalk repair and replacement program. The village received three bids on the work, with apparent low bidder Quality Concrete of Manawa at \$61,159.20, Rennhack Construction, Reeseville, \$79,292.10, and high bid A.R. Melichar of Grafton at \$85,294.50.

On the village consulting engineer's recommendation, the board voted to award the contract to Quality Concrete for \$60,159.20, having removed \$1,000 from the contract for stump removal which will be done by a local contractor at a lower rate.

Engineer Ken Ward said the cost to do the 5,093 feet of sidewalk repair broke down to \$10.72 per foot. With the village paying a "one-time only" cost

sharing split of 50%, the final cost to residential, municipal and industrial property owners will come to \$5.36 per foot, which can be paid for in either a one-lump payment or spread out over a six-year period with an interest charge of 8%. The 449 feet of curb and gutter work came out to \$15.61 a foot.

Schmidt again noted that institutional properties would be required to pay the full 100% of the sidewalk repair costs or \$10.72 per foot, because they are tax-exempt and the village receives no tax money for services provided to them.

Schmidt also noted that because the bid came in at a good price, it will also include landscaping restoration. At a previous meeting Schmidt had indicated property owners would be responsible for that work. "Taking that (restoration) out of the costs would have only dropped the price by about 20c a foot," said Schmidt. With the

Kreif distinguished himself in the performance of outstanding service to the United States as Propulsion Systems Technician and KC-135 Propulsion Superintendent and Program Manager, Aircraft Systems Division, Directorate of Aircraft Maintenance, Deputy Chief of Staff, Logistics, Headquarters Strategic Air Command, Offutt Air Force Base, Nebraska, from 28 June 1983 to 15 July 1988.

During this period, the outstanding professional skill, leadership, and ceaseless efforts of Sergeant Kreif resulted in major contributions to the effectiveness and success of Air Force and Strategic Air Command Propulsion Maintenance programs.

Under his guidance, leadership, and technical tutorage the F108 engine has become the most reliable engine in the Strategic Air Command inventory. # Fire Causes Heavy Damage to Town of Farmington Barn

A fire late Monday night severely damaged a Fillmore area barn, injuring six volunteer firefighters who were fighting the blaze.

The fire at the Chuck Spaeth and Carl Turner farm, 890 Highway A, was discovered by several people including Fillmore Fire Chief Cal Steinert and several of his officers who were just leaving their department's building just north of the Turner farm. Neighbors also called in the fire at approximately 11:10 p.m.

"When we arrived on the scene we could see flames shooting out of both eaves and the north dormer," said Steinert, "we immediately called for assistance from the Boltonville, West Bend, Waubeka, Newburg, Silver Creek and Fredonia Fire Departments."

Heaviest damage was sustained by the 40 x 80 foot upper main barn which was destroyed. Thirty feet of a newer 36 x 90 foot addition was heavily damaged when the upper barn's east wall collapsed crushing the lower roof and milkhouse.

Three firefighters were

injured and trapped for a time when the east wall fell. Three other firemen suffered heat exhaustion. Steinert said two men were from the Waubeka Department, two from Fillmore one from Boltonville and one from Newburg. The names of the injured, who were transported to St. Mary's Hospital, Port Washington and St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend, were not available.

Several of the departments remained on the scene throughout the night. Firefighters from the Fillmore department were still at the site at 9:30 a.m., Tuesday. Steinert said no cause for the fire had been determined yet and no damage estimate was available.

The Turners who live on the farm, were able to save all the animals which were in the barn. Firemen were also able to save another wing of the structure which had been the original barn.

contractor doing it, all the work will be completed at the same time. The sidewalk repairs are expected to begin the week of August 21.

Schmidt also advised the board that the 1990 phase of the sidewalk program would be directed at finishing repairs in the central part of the village.

A contract was also issued to low bidder Mueller Excavating of Campbellsport to install sewer and water utilities to four lots on Edgewood Road at a cost of \$40,268.20. Those costs will also be assessed to the property owners. Sidewalk and road work will be held off until next year, noted Schmidt.

In other action the board approved the issuance of a Class "A" retail liquor license for A.G. Koch, Inc., at 355 Main Street (formerly JN Liquor), commencing August 8.

A building permit was issued for a single family residence at 349 Knights Avenue (Creekview Estates), to Tim and Karen Miller. Schmidt noted, however, the permit would not be released until road work in the subdivision had been completed.

Trustee Ken Bonlender advised the board that the

Kewaskum Public Library had received a grant of \$863 from Mid-Wisconsin Grants and Aid to be used for any type of library materials. He also noted the library had received its Countywide System quarterly payment which amounted to \$2,870.

Trustee Larry Williams informed the board his Public Services Committee was still reviewing several options for mandatory recycling and it did not have any recommendations to make as yet. Williams said there was a possibility some grant money could become available for a recycling program. "We still have to encourage people to keep recycling though," said Williams.

Schmidt informed the board that forms for the 1990 U.S. census would be coming out this fall. "It's important that everyone fills out that form accurately with every person in a household being counted" said Schmidt. With a drop in Wisconsin's population over the last few years, noted Schmidt, we're one of the states which could lose a person in the House of Representatives to one of the southern states which are seeing population growth.

The board then adjourned to closed session.



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

**FRUIT vs CANCER**


Eating raw fruit tends to prevent oral and pharyngeal cancer, reports the National Cancer Institute. People who average 4 fruit servings a day have one-half the cancer risk of those eating less than one fruit serving daily. Vitamin C, carotene, and fiber in raw fruit is helpful. 

## Shelfond Mobil Mart Is Kewaskum's Only Megabucks Lottery Outlet

MADISON...Ceremonial activities at the Wisconsin State Fair in West Allis and at the Wisconsin Valley Fair in Wausau marked the start of sales for Wisconsin's MEGABUCKS Lotto\*America game Thursday, Aug. 10.

Wisconsin Governor Tommy G. Thompson and Lottery Executive Director William F. Flynn, Jr. were featured at the West Allis event, which began at 10:30 a.m. at the International Amphitheater at the State Fair.

Governor Thompson bought the ceremonial first ticket at the State Fair and declared the official start of MEGABUCKS sales at 1,440 retail locations across the state.

Shelfond Mobil Mart in Kewaskum has joined twenty-one other Washington County retailers in selling the Megabucks tickets.

"Wisconsin will be one of only three lotteries in the United States that has been able to go from start-up to on-line lotto games in less than one year," Flynn remarked.

The MEGABUCKS game will be part of Lotto\*America, a group which will grow to eight lotteries with Wisconsin.

Lotto\*America gives states with smaller populations a way to pool playership to create one large jackpot prize, instead of several smaller ones.

"Being in Lotto\*America means Wisconsin residents will be able to play for a jackpot of \$2 million or more every Wednesday and Saturday night. If Wisconsin had run its own lotto game, I would estimate our minimum jackpot would only have been in the \$500,000 range.

"Lottery players have made it clear that they want to play for large jackpots. With Lotto\*America, Wisconsin will be able to offer a game that is competitive with larger neighboring states such as Illinois and Michigan," Flynn explained.

Lotto\*America's largest jackpot to date was \$39.86 million, won by a Rhode Island player July 15, 1989.

Wisconsin will be the third

state bordering on Illinois to join Lotto\*America. Iowa and Missouri also sell Lotto\*America tickets, as do West Virginia, Rhode Island, Kansas, Oregon and the District of Columbia. Montana is expected to begin selling Lotto\*America by the end of 1989.

"Lotto\*America is operated by its member states. Wisconsin will pay its MEGABUCKS winners with Wisconsin Lottery checks."

"Our computer network is not linked with any other state's. The participating lotteries transmit sales and other data to Lotto\*America headquarters in Des Moines, Iowa," Flynn continued.

Lotto\*America members play the same game with drawings broadcast to all states from Des Moines at 9:59 p.m. CDT Wednesdays and Saturdays.

Wisconsin's MEGABUCKS Lotto\*America players will have two chances to select six numbers from 1 through 54 for \$1. Players may either choose their own numbers or have the computer randomly select numbers by asking for "quick picks."

The drawings will be broadcast on a statewide television and radio network live each Wednesday and Saturday night. Winning numbers will also be posted at MEGABUCKS retail locations and will be available by calling 1-800-242-7777 (toll free).

"We also expect most of the state's daily newspapers and radio and television stations will carry the winning numbers as a service to their readers, listeners and viewers," Flynn added.

Television station WISN-TV channel 12 and radio station KFIZ 102.5 FM will cover this area.



## Kewaskum Post Office Opens Job Register

Postmaster Frank Beesten has announced that the following examination will be given and urged that all those interested apply between August 14 and August 18, 1989 to take the job-related test that can lead to Postal Service employment:

### CLERK/CARRIER

Clerks work indoors and have to handle sacks of mail weighing as much as 70 pounds. They sort mail and distribute it by using a complicated scheme which must be memorized. Some clerks work at a public counter or window doing such jobs as selling stamps and weighing parcels and are personally responsible for all money and stamps. Clerks may be on their feet all day. They also have to stretch, reach and throw mail.

Carriers have to collect and deliver mail. Some carriers walk; other carriers drive. Carriers must be out in all kinds of weather. Almost all carriers have to carry mail bags on their shoulders; loads weigh as much as 35 pounds. Carriers sometimes have to load and unload sacks of mail weighing as much as 70 pounds.

For positions requiring driving, applicants must have a valid state driver's license. They must demonstrate a safe driving record and must pass the Postal Service Road Test to obtain the required type of Government Motor Vehicle

Operator's Identification Card. Eligibility from this examination will be limited to two years unless, after eighteen months, applicants request to have their eligibility extended for an additional year. Applicants whose eligibility has expired must reapply to compete for a standing on the new register.

"I do not want to give the impression that we will be hiring great numbers of people in the coming months," the postmaster said. "I anticipate approximately four to five vacancies will occur in the next two years that will be filled by hiring people from the Clerk-/Carrier register from Fredonia, Kewaskum, Newburg and Random Lake. We need qualified people who will be willing to accept employment, and we want to offer people in the local community the chance to compete for these openings by signing up for and taking this examination."

Postmaster Beesten explained that those wishing to take the examination could apply by completing an application card at the Kewaskum Post Office, between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 5 p.m., August 14 through August 18, 1989.

The postmaster further explained that applicants need only apply at one office within an AREA as the exam may be taken only ONCE per area.

Among those attending was Frances (Raether) Van Blarcom, Kewaskum, the oldest known living graduate of Holy Trinity, from the Class of 1913. Marie also wrote she used to get Friday afternoons off to scrub floors in the Sister's house, as the house sister, Sister Euladia was very old.

Dolores (Stoffel) Du Pont, Class of 1938, remembered the time a nun was going to hit someone's hand with a yardstick. The child pulled the hand away and the yardstick hit the desk, broke and hit the light fixture. She also recalled the good memories of Mass in the small chapel above the nun's living quarters and how pretty her blue rosary looked against her white Communion dress.

Lucille (Schoofs) Nigh, Class of 1938, wrote, "In order to keep our legs warm on our long hike to school, my mother bought snowpants for me and my sisters. Father Vogt announced from the pulpit, 'The girls are not to wear pantaloons to school!'"

Many other humorous anecdotes were recalled about the two-room school, known as the "little room" and the "big room."

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## 50th Anniversary of A.A.'s Textbook 'Alcoholics Anonymous'

The General Service Office of Alcoholics Anonymous in New York recently announced the Fiftieth Anniversary celebration of the publication of its book "Alcoholics Anonymous." To date, more than seven million copies have been sold in the United States and thousands of translations in fifteen other languages have been purchased abroad.

According to an A.A. staff member, this book has played a crucial role in the success and expansion of the A.A. program of its present world-wide prominence. It describes the hard-won principles which early members discovered could lead to sobriety, and which are the basis of the recovery of millions of alcoholics who otherwise would have been doomed to the physical and emotional toll that is exacted of the alcoholic by his or her illness.

"Alcoholics Anonymous," or, as it is affectionately known by A.A.'s the "Big Book," has appeared in sixteen languages - Afrikaans, Dutch, English, Finnish, Flemish, French, German, Icelandic, Italian, Japanese, Korean, Norwegian, Polish, Portugese, Spanish and Swedish. It is ranked among the hard-cover, nonfiction best sellers of all time.

It did not, however, have an auspicious beginning. The A.A. Fellowship numbered fewer than 100 members in 1938 when these pioneers decided to write down their experiences in recovery from alcoholism. The first printing was done on less than a shoestring and, for the next two years, the book attracted little attention and few sales. The financial picture was stark; only loans from sympathetic friends kept the publishing venture alive. Then in March, 1941, following publication of an article on A.A. by Jack Alexander in the *Saturday Evening Post*, demand

from desperate alcoholics put the sales on an accelerating curve which has continued for fifty years.

Originally priced at \$3.50, the so-called "Big Book" retails today for only \$3.60, despite skyrocketing book publishing costs. This is because it is published by a not-for-profit organization whose administrative costs are largely covered by contributions from A.A.'s more than one and three quarter million members. ## Vietnam Era GI Bill Benefits Will End This Year

The most widely used GI Bill in history is in its final year and the Veterans Administration is alerting thousands of Vietnam Era veterans that their eligibility is about to end.

Jon Baker, Director of the VA Regional Office in Milwaukee, said education benefits will expire on December 31 for some 750,000 veterans the VA estimates are still potentially eligible, some of whom are enrolled in schools and receiving assistance.

Under the law, Baker said, the VA will stop sending GI Bill payments to veterans attending school or in training programs resulting from qualifying active-duty service between January 31, 1955 and January 1,

1977.

Nationally, some 60,000 currently enrolled veterans will receive periodic reminders of the December 31 deadline with their VA educational checks this year.

Baker said the VA encourages veterans to take advantage of their remaining eligibility by enrolling in classes before the end of the year. However, all VA assistance will end on December 31.

Not affected by the expiration date are veterans enrolled in the VA's other current education programs, including the Veterans' Educational Assistance Program and the Montgomery GI Bill for active duty, reserve and national

guard members who served after June 30, 1985.

Baker asked veterans in doubt about their eligibility for education benefits to contact the Milwaukee VA Regional Office either in person or by phone at 383-8680 in the Milwaukee area, or toll-free at 1-800-242-9025 for the rest of the State.

The Vietnam Era GI bill has so far provided benefits to 8.1 million veterans, which exceeds the 7.8 million using the original World War II bill benefits. Korean Conflict veterans who participated in the GI Bill totaled 2.8 million.

Since 1944, the VA has delivered \$69.7 billion in educational and training assistance to more than 20 million veterans, dependents, active duty members and reservists, Baker said.

## Deadline Nears for Taxpayers Who Filed For An Extension

The Internal Revenue Service was pleased to learn that people have been listening to their encouragements to "file early," fewer taxpayers asked for extensions of time to file their individual income tax forms this year than even the IRS had hoped. But for those of you who found it necessary to file an extension form, the Internal Revenue Service reminds you that August 15 is now the deadline for filing your return.

Still find it difficult to make that August 15 deadline? The IRS does offer an additional extension. Be aware, however, that the additional extension is not automatic. It is subject to the approval of the IRS and is generally granted only to people who can show some reasonable cause or undue hardship that prevents them from meeting the four-month extended deadline. Such situations include the death of a family member, serious illness, unavoidable absence, and the inability to find the records necessary to determine the proper tax due. If the IRS approves your request for the additional extension, you will have two additional months to file your return, or until October 15.

To ask for the additional extension, you must file Form 2688, "Application for Additional Extension of Time to File." The application must state in detail the reason you need an extension and should be filed enough in advance of August 15 so that the IRS will have

the chance to review your application and notify you as to whether it was approved. To obtain Form 2688, call the IRS, toll-free, at 1-800-424-3676 (FORM).

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## Sensenbrenner Holds Informational Meeting On Upcoming Census

(Cedarburg, WI) — At an informational meeting sponsored by Rep. F. James Sensenbrenner, Jr. (R-Menomonee Falls) the Bureau of the Census today announced that six management positions and 750 to 800 enumerators and crew leaders will be hired in the Ninth Congressional District to help complete the 1990 Census.

Community leaders from Milwaukee, Ozaukee, Sheboygan and Washington counties attended the meeting at the Cedarburg City Hall in which officials from the Bureau of the Census outlined the procedure for the 1990 Census and how it will affect area communities.

"It's important that each Wisconsin resident be counted in the Census," Sensenbrenner said. Preliminary work, such as this meeting, and the cooperation of area communities will help ensure the accuracy of the Census."

## Beneficiaries Should Review Earnings

Midsummer is a good time for working Social Security beneficiaries to review their earnings to be sure their actual earnings are in line with the estimate of earnings they gave to Social Security. Earnings are wages and net earnings from self-employment. In 1989, beneficiaries under 65 can earn \$6480 and beneficiaries between 65 and 69 can earn \$8880 before benefits are affected. These amounts do not apply to disabled persons or people on Supplemental Security Income (SSI), who should report all earnings promptly.

Although the Social Security Administration will send reminders to those beneficiaries who said they would make more than the allowable amounts, the beneficiary is responsible for monitoring his or her earnings. If the estimate should change during the year, he or she should notify Social Security at once. Prompt reporting will mean the beneficiary will not be overpaid.

Some things do not count as earnings. These include:

- Interest, dividends, or royalties
- Pensions
- Rental income
- Gain from the sale of capital assets
- Worker's compensation benefits
- Unemployment compensation benefits
- Sick pay paid more than 6 months after the employee last worked.

Other types of income may also not count as earnings.

## Buettner Authors Runaway Bill

(Madison) State Senator Carol Buettner (R-Oshkosh) introduced today a bill which would make it a crime to harbor runaway children.

"There's currently a gap in state law which allows an unauthorized adult to assist a child in hiding out as a runaway or a truant," Buettner said.

"While there are some kids who need legitimate respite from a home situation, what this gap allows is for very young adults — 19, 20, 21 — to help out their friends by providing a place to stay and telling no one. If a child is running from a problem at home and legitimately needs help, there are numerous places to which they can turn which will be exempt from this law," she added.

The bill would require any person other than a child's relative or an approved or licensed home or facility to immediately notify a law enforcement agency, social services or juvenile intake if offering shelter to a runaway. Upon notification, the individual taking in the runaway might be subject to investigation with a possibility the child might subsequently be removed. Persons found guilty of violating this new law would be guilty of a Class B misdemeanor, which is punishable by a fine of not more than \$1,000 or imprisonment for not more than 90 days, or both.

In October 1988, Valley acquired the \$150 million-asset Colonial Bancorporation, Inc., Thiensville. This acquisition was accounted for as a pooling-of-

interests and all financial information prior to the date of merger has been restated. In December, 1988 the cash acquisition of the \$22 million-asset First State Bank of Edgerton was consummated. This bank was merged into the Valley Bank, Janesville, a wholly owned subsidiary of Valley, and is now operating as a branch office.



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

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## Local Government's Receive Share Of Fuel Tax, Registration Fees

The state Department of Transportation has mailed quarterly checks to all 1,267 town treasurers, as well as 653 municipal and county treasurers. Over the course of a year, the quarterly checks will account for nearly 30 percent of state fuel tax and registration fee collections.

"These state aids help communities maintain their local transportation network," said DOT Secretary Ronald Fiedler. "Wider streets, fewer potholes, and safer roads will improve travel in their area for both residents and visitors, which helps sustain a healthy local economy."

During 1989, local governments will receive \$205.6 million from the state transportation fund to help pay the cost of building and maintaining local bridges and roads.

The 1,920 quarterly checks mailed July 3 totaled \$51.5 million. The largest check, for \$5.8 million, went to the city of Milwaukee, while the smallest, for \$267, went to the Sauk County village of Lime Ridge (pop. 191).

## Farm Fences

Washington County farmers do not pasture cattle or other farm animals as much as a few years ago. Most animals are fed in feedlots or indoors.

Questions do arise periodically on what types of fences must be built to adequately and legally contain livestock. The Wisconsin statutes do define legal fences and the procedures to resolve disputes over the building and maintenance of fences. The following is a listing of what is considered a legal fence in Wisconsin.

A fence of strong woven wire not less than 26 inches wide with three barbed wires above.

A fence of strong woven wire not less than 30 inches wide with two barbed wires above.

A fence of strong woven wire not less than 46 inches wide with one barbed wire above.

A fence of strong woven wire not less than 50 inches wide.

A fence of boards firmly fastened to posts well set, no more than eight feet apart, the space between the boards to the height of 30 inches to be not more than six inches and at no point to be more than 10 inches.

A fence of two boards with three barbed wires above, firmly fastened to sufficient posts well set not more than eight feet apart, the space between the boards to be not more than six inches.

A fence of three or more wires not less than No. 12, with pickets not less than four feet long properly woven in or fastened thereto, and set not more than six inches apart.

All fences consisting of rails, boards, wires or walls, or any combination thereof, and all brooks, rivers, ponds, creeks, ditches or hedges, which shall in the judgement of the fence viewers, be equivalent to either of the fences before mentioned.

A fence not less than 48 inches high, of four or more barbed wires spaced evenly on a steel post of any diameter, or on a wood post at least three inches in diameter. The posts are to be spaced one rod (16.5 feet) or less apart. Existing fences of a lesser standard are

legal until they are rebuilt, repaired or replaced.

An electric fence is to be considered to meet the minimum requirements only when its use is agreed to, in writing, by the adjoining property owners. Such a fence must consist of two strands of strong, tightly stretched wire. The top wire may not be higher than 36 inches, nor lower than 34 inches. Posts-with insulators - may be no more than two rods apart.

## Milwaukee River Watershed Sign-Up Program Underway

The final plan for the East-West Branch of the Milwaukee River Watershed has been approved by the county boards. The Milwaukee River Watershed Program is a voluntary project to improve the water quality of the river and its tributaries.

The next stage of the project is the sign-up stage. Over the next three years the Land Conservation staff will be contacting eligible landowners to explain the project and go over the options available to them. Land Conservation staff will determine what practices are needed on each farm. Some of the practices which are eligible for cost sharing are contour strips, terraces, grassed waterways, reduced tillage and barnyard runoff systems. In order to obtain this cost sharing, the landowner must sign a cost share agreement. State cost-sharing on most practices covers 70% of the total costs, with the landowner picking up the remaining share. As part of this process a conservation plan will also be developed for the entire farm.

Once a cost share agreement has been signed, the landowner has five years to install all of the recommended practices. After the practices are established they must be maintained for 10 years.

The conservation practices installed on each farm will reduce the amount of sediment reaching the river. With less sediment reaching the river, the water quality will improve making better habitat for fish and wildlife. This will improve fishing and hunting along the river. ## UWWC Selected to Test Computer Hardware, Software

The University of Wisconsin Center — Washington County has been selected as the pilot UW freshman-sophomore center for testing computer hardware and software for the first phase of a statewide computerized transfer information system (TIS).

Initial approval for TIS came from the UW Board of Regents in 1986 as part of its report on the "Future of the University of Wisconsin System." The board called for developing a system to help students transfer into and between UW System institutions and complete their degree programs without unnecessary delay.

The Wisconsin State Legislature provided funding for the initial TIS pilot during the current biennial budget. Legislators stipulated that Vocational, Technical and Adult Education (VTAE) transferable courses should be included in the system.

If TIS is completely implemented, students at any campus will be able to sit at a computer terminal and find out how their individual academic records and planned courses apply toward the completion of a UW System degree program at any UW System institution.

Along with students, the primary users of TIS may include advisors, faculty and campus admissions offices.

Phase one of TIS involves developing a course equivalency matrix matching courses throughout the system. During the 1990 spring semester, the matrix should enable students at UWWC, the other 12 UW centers and the VTAE campuses, to match their courses with equivalent courses

at all degree-granting campus.

By the spring of 1992, the matrix will be expanded so that students at four-year campuses also can match their lower division courses with those at any other school.

Phase one ends in the fall of 1992 when selected junior-senior courses will be added to the matrix along with vastly expanded information on all courses.

Implementing the entire program would involve four phases, each involving pilot schools. Further funding would be needed from the Legislature to carry out the last three phases.

Pilot four-year campuses involved in phase one are UW Whitewater and UW Eau Claire. In addition, a pilot team of UW Centers administrators will work on the matrix in Madison.

The entire project is being directed by a staff made up of three UW System administrators from Madison: Larry Rubin, project administrator; Gail Bergman, project coordinator; and Steve Heller, technical coordinator.

Pilot groups will be linked on a computer network and provided with special hardware and software.

In a March 9 report on the phase one pilot project at UWWC, the project staff explained that the participating institutions will be testing "the hardware configuration and the system design" for the matrix.

The project staff said, "It is conceivable that state high schools may eventually obtain access and that other colleges and universities may be included in the system."

Early next fall, the phase one pilot project should be underway at UWWC. In August and September, equipment is scheduled to be delivered and installed on campus at no local cost.

Planning, training and orientation sessions will be held this spring and summer.

UWWC is forming a volunteer campus site team and selecting a campus coordinator to oversee the project.

The team will act as a liaison between the System project staff and UWWC in the development and ongoing use of TIS.

Among team responsibilities

are ongoing evaluations of the project, campus staff training, gathering and formatting data, developing a campus implementation plan, establishing communication linkages to support TIS and verifying the accuracy of course equivalency information.

A number of institutions were nominated as pilot centers and campuses. Criteria used in the selection of UWWC and the others include:

— An interest and willingness by staff to participate in the project;

— An institutional commitment to providing staff and computer support;

— A significant number of transfer students and a desire to improve the transfer process;

— Development of computerized information showing course equivalency information.

According to a report from the TIS project staff, the UW Board of Regents decided to develop TIS because of large number of transfers within the UW System.

The report said, "The undergraduate student body is very mobile. A significant number of students transfer into and between UWS institutions each year. Students at UW Centers must transfer to complete their

## Buettner to Push for Welfare Fraud Amendment

The State of Wisconsin will lose up to \$1.7 million in enhanced federal funding and counties could lose tens of thousands of dollars to investigate welfare fraud, unless the state implements federal AFDC (Aid to Families with Dependent Children) sanctions, State Senator Carol Buettner (R-Oshkosh) reported.

Buettner and others in the State Senate have vowed to push for an amendment to the state budget that adopts the federal suspension penalties for persons who commit welfare fraud. The investigation of such cases is done by county welfare fraud units, known as "front-end verification programs."

"Recently, the Joint Finance Committee voted not to adopt these federal sanctions on an 8-8 vote. This was a serious mistake because of the thousands of federal dollars that counties stand to lose," Buettner said.

Under current law, the federal government requires that states receive federal funding for their AFDC fraud control programs at a reimbursement rate of 75% federal and 25% state. If the state does not adopt these federal sanctions, counties will be forced to pay for a full 50% of their fraud investigation costs, forcing many counties to drop their anti-fraud programs altogether.

"These fraud detection programs have proven enormously successful in saving taxpayers money by identifying ineligible individuals before they become AFDC recipients," Buettner continued. "Similar programs are already in place to detect food stamp fraud. In fact, in Fond du Lac County alone, last year the fraud investigation unit recouped over \$51,000 in food stamp benefits from ineligible recipients. And in the first 5 months of 1989, they have collected over \$65,000."

Buettner also pointed out that, not only do fraud prevention programs keep ineligible recipients from receiving state money, they also keep the state's federally monitored error rate down. Federal quality control staff review samples of the state's AFDC cases. If they determine that any cases are inappropriately receiving AFDC, they count these towards the state's error rate. Error rates exceeding 3% result in large federal sanctions for Wisconsin. "Falsely claiming state AFDC benefits is not a victimless situation," Buettner noted. "It is a crime and Wisconsin needs to send a message that it's not O.K. to steal from the state."

Buettner further noted that the average burglary results in a loss of approximately \$900 to the victim, yet the average welfare fraud perpetrator steals as much as \$2,100.

"Welfare fraud is common theft and there needs to be a mechanism in place to investigate fraudulent claims and to save the taxpayers money."

"Fond du Lac County could lose nearly \$10,000 in federal funds, not to mention lost benefits from undetected fraud, and Winnebago County would

lose even more federal funding; nearly \$22,000 and Washington County will lose over \$6,000."

## To Induct Seven Into Rock River Hall of Fame

In the distinguished, 60-year history of the Rock River Baseball league, there's no more colorful a nickname than the one hung affectionately on Ray "The Old Goat" Messer.

The 81-year-old Burnett resident will be honored, along with five other league alumni, on Nov. 4 when the six are to be inducted into the Rock's Hall of Fame.

baccalaureate degrees."

In addition, the report said, TIS is an acknowledgement of transfer problems and their impact on students.

"Because of varying curricular requirements within academic programs at each UWS institution," the report said, "courses and/or credits that apply to a student's degree at one institution may not apply at the receiving institution, even in similar programs. Transfer students must plan their course work according to the curriculum and requirements of the receiving institution."

"When courses do not apply toward requirements at the transfer institution, students may spend extra time and money to earn a degree. To avoid this, they may elect to transfer early. For example, students may decide to attend a center for one year rather than for the potential two-year curriculum."

Mike Murphy, director of student services at UWWC, helped lay the groundwork for

the TIS system. During 1987 he was on special assignment by the UW Centers to begin negotiations on developing improved transfer procedures including joint-admissions agreements between freshman-sophomore centers and degree-granting campuses.

## Fall Turkey Hunting Season Applications Due August 11

MADISON, WI — Applications for Wisconsin's 1989 fall wild turkey hunting season are due August 11, reminds Department of Natural Resources turkey season coordinator Ed Frank.

Applications for the 7,260 turkey hunting permits are available at DNR and county clerk offices; they must be received or postmarked no later than Aug. 11. A valid Wisconsin hunting license is required to apply for a turkey permit. Hunting licenses can also be purchased at DNR and county clerk offices.


Permits are issued to individuals for only one hunting period and for one of only eight zones open for fall turkey hunting in southwestern

Wisconsin.

Wisconsin's first fall turkey hunting season runs for three consecutive Wednesday - Sunday hunting periods: Oct. 11-15, Oct. 18-22 and Oct. 25-29. Turkeys of any age or sex are legal. Hunting is allowed from one-half hour before sunrise to one-half hour after sunset.

A 1989-90 Wisconsin Turkey Stamp is also required to hunt turkeys; stamps cost \$13.75 each. Frank noted that the 1988-89 stamp for last spring's season is NOT valid for the 1989 fall season. However, the 1989-90 turkey stamp will be good for fall 1989 and spring 1990 turkey hunting.

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
