Sisons Plan 47-Unit Complex Kiwanis New Turkey Shoot at NE Sportsman's Club Sunday **Construction Behind**

Dr. Cesar Sison is moving ahead with plans to construct a new residential facility on land east of the Sison Medical and Professional Building on S. Fond du Lac Ave.

Final plans are expected to be completed within five to ten days and forwarded to Madison for state approval.

The three-story building will contain fifteen community based residential care facility rooms, six one-bedroom and

two two-bedroom apartments on the first floor with two of the units designed for disabled individuals. The second and third floors will have four twobedroom and eight onebedroom units. The building will have a common entrance for all the apartments which leads to an elevator.

Dr. Sison said his project will be directed towards providing housing for adults who desire

living independence but they. their spouse, or older adult child may need some assistance with their medical or personal needs which makes it difficult for them to live alone.

This will not be a nursing home facility or setting, noted Dr. Sison, but rather a homelike residence where medical and professional assistance is at hand if needed.

School Board Okays Borrowing \$200,000 for Capital Improvements

The Kewaskum School Board has given the green light to an administration request to borrow \$200,000 for district capital improvements, most of which would be completed during the 1989-90 school year.

None of the nine projects, on a list presented to the board at its meeting Monday, are currently figured into the 1989-90 budget. Of the nine items, only two drew heated and lengthy discussions among the board members. They were construction of walls to enclose classrooms in the open concept areas of the Kewaskum Middle and Farmington Elementary schools.

Ankerson agreed with Schmitt. "I've never had a parent at KMS," said Ankerson. He said he did not feel they were a good investment. "I think there are other things we should look at ahead of \$35,000 for walls."

Board member Paul Seymour strongly disagreed with the two, noting he had attended an open concept elementary school and he could see the need for the walls.

To get things moving, it was agreed that each of the items should be voted on individually. approve the KMS wall construction was defeated 4-3, voting no, Seymour, John Schulte and Neal Weare voting yes. A motion by Seymour to approve the Farmington walls, however, passed on a 5-2 vote, with Schmitt and Beimborn voting no. The remaining projects were approved by majority board votes. They include \$80,000 for repairs of the 1966 section of the high school roof, \$25,000 for asbestos removal at Kewaskum and Farmington Elementary schools, \$10,000 for computer software and hardware for KHS student records (the district presently pays CESA 6, \$6,300 annually for this service), \$5,000 for replacement of the district's maintenance van, \$19,000 for two Risograph copiers, \$14,000 for an air exchanger in the Welding Shop, and \$2,000 to rebuild the baseball infield (this figure was dropped from \$5,000). With the removal of the KMS walls at an estimated cost of \$35,000, the board considered other items which could be done with those remaining funds. It

approved two additional items for funding with the loan address me on the issue of walls money. The first was \$5,000 for a new gymnastics mat which had originally been on the list but replaced by the ball field repairs and second, the completion of one each additional girls and boys bathroom at the middle school at a cost of \$4,500. Beimborn, who has been pushing this project for several years, told fellow board members the rooms were already roughed in, including plumbing and all that is needed to complete the A motion by Seymour to bathrooms is the installation of fixtures.

Administrator Dr. David with Schmitt, Ankerson, Ron Heather said the KMS Beimborn and Don Nowak bathrooms had already been included in the 89-90 budget. Ankerson noted, however, that moving that item to the Capital Improvements program would lower the budget by that amount.

Arkansas Man Killed In Town of Wayne Accident

An Arkansas man became Washington County's 19th traffic fatality as the result of an accident which occurred at approximately 12:09 a.m., Thursday, Sept. 7, at the intersection of Highways 41 and D, in the Town of Wayne.

The victim, Arthur C. Paul, 81, of Fort Smith, Arkansas, had been involved in a minor non-injury accident at the same location just prior to being struck by a northbound vehicle on Highway 41, driven by Whitney S. Hakes, 24, of Fond

du Lac.

According to the Sheriff's Department, it appears as if Paul had walked out into the righthand, northbound lane of Highway 41, possibly to pick up some debris or to flag down a passing vehicle when he was struck by the Hakes vehicle.

The report noted that the accident occurred in an area of very dense fog which undoubtedly was a contributing factor. The release stated Hakes attempted to avoid striking Paul, but was unable to do so. No citations are anticipated.

KHS Class of 1980

Because of the strong views for, and against the proposed wall projects, the board was unable to approve the list as a package and ended up voting on each of the items separately.

As for the walls proposal at Farmington, Schmitt said she would like to see divider type portable walls which would allow the area to be opened to provide large open areas for special events and functions.

The approximately \$30,000 remaining will be left open while the board looks at other items on the district's five-year capital improvements list.

In other action the board approved several coaching and advisor assignments. The board also approved a 50 percent kindergarten teaching contract for Carol Zoreb to cover a child care leave and Christine Berens for an early childhood-exceptional education needs position.



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


4-H enrollment forms were handed out. If anyone is interested in learning more about 4-H, come to the October 5th meeting at the community center at 7 p.m.

Neumann and Staehler family volunteered for refreshments for the month of October. Following the meeting Joann Lemke gave a informative slide presentation of her trip to Japan.



Drugs are front page news in America. President Bush's recent prime time address to the nation focused national attention on the issue of drug abuse in our society like it has never been focused before.

It is none too soon. It is time to tackle the nation's No. 1 domestic problem — drug abuse.

As a recent report by the United States Department of Justice indicates, drug abuse is no longer confined to the largest urban areas in the United States. Drug abuse is alive and pervasive right here in Wisconsin from Milwaukee to Madison, from Racine to Superior, and from LaCrosse to Kewaunee.

Almost a half a million Wisconsin residents have used drugs. Approximately 40,000 report regular cocaine use. Onehalf of them are addicts. Ten thousand support their habits by committing crimes.

Drugs have a dramatic impact on crime in Wisconsin. In 1988, almost 9,000 people were arrested in Wisconsin for the sale and/or possession of drugs. Between 1986 and 1988, the number of cocaine-related arrests more than doubled.

We need help in Wisconsin and I believe that the President's drug strategy represents a significant first step in the drug battle.

In the past, the federal government did not have such a strategy. Now we have one. It is not perfect. It is not complete. It is not the ultimate solution. But it is a significant improvement. It begins to shift the emphasis from international scene to the streets of our communities.

The biggest commitment is in enforcement. The President announced a \$350 million increase to local law enforcement agencies. Preliminary reports indicate that Wisconsin could receive \$3.9 million for a variety of state and local needs.

Will that help? Absolutely. There is no secret to combatting the drug epidemic. It requires dedicated personnel. It requires supportive resources. It requires inter-agency coordination.

But as anyone in law




enforcement will readily acknowledge, the cops can't fight the war alone. I fervently believe that education and community programs are the most effective tools we have in fighting this war. Street level law enforcement is good and we welcome the additional assistance. But we need to increase attention to street level drug prevention efforts as well. That is where the problems are, and that is ultimately where the solutions will have to originate.

More police, more arrests, and more prisons are not the ultimate solution. The ultimate solution lies in reducing the demand for drugs in our neighborhoods and providing realistic alternatives to drug dealing for those living in substandard economic conditions.

We have come a long way in this effort. What was once tolerated is now intolerable. We are changing our attitudes. We are changing our priorities. We can win.

I look forward to working with you in order to insure that victory.



Past Turkey Shoots Have Benefitted Entire Community

For the past 36 years, the Kewaskum Kiwanis Club held an annual Turkey Shoot at the Bar-N-Ranch. Many individuals and organizations through the years helped with this event and the Club extends appreciation and thanks to them and especially to the former owners of the Bar-N-Ranch, Wally Timmerman, Agnes and Elmer Kittel of the Bar-N-Ranch Tavern, the Heberer Brothers, the Boy Scouts, Key Club and spouses of Kiwanis.

On September 17th, the Kiwanis will hold the Turkey Shoot at a new location, the New Fane Sportsman Club. Some events have changed and some new events added. Hopefully with your support, the Kiwanis Club can continue this tradition. With this annual fund raiser and other programs, the Kiwanis Club has done much for the community since their charter in September, 1947.

In 1948, the Club was instrumental in getting the Village to erect street signs, worked to improve the telephone service in Kewaskum, raised funds for high school band uniforms and purchased rain coats for safety patrols. For the next 30 years and recently they sponsored Christmas parties for the small children in the community.

In 1950 a clock was purchased for the Holy Trinity church steeple. In 1953, funds were contributed to the library to purchase books. Since 1954 and into the early 70's the club provided and sponsored prizes for the Christmas decoration contest in the village, purchased bleachers for the high school athletic field, and made donations to the village in excess of \$1,000.00 through the years to purchase Christmas decorations.

the Kiwanis 1952, In organized and held the first "Turkey Shoot" at the Bar-N-Ranch as the main fund raiser that continued to provide funds for the next 36 years.

In 1958, they began the

Milwaukee River.

In 1959 and several years thereafter, the Club purchased playground equipment for the village park near the river beach area amounting to over \$1,000.00.

In 1961, they provided funds for a record player and shelter for the ice skating rink at the river. In 1962 two tennis courts were built at the Kewaskum High School and two more in 1975 at a total cost of almost \$19,000.00, and on several occasions funding purchased Auxiliary Police uniforms. Constructed road signs welcome visitors to Kewaskum.

In 1968 and several years after the club contributed over \$500.00 per year for equipment to supervise summer recreation programs sponsored by the village of Kewaskum, and spent \$150.00 for park benches and \$500.00 for architect fees for a proposed swimming pool to be enclosed at the high school.

In 1971, they purchased 300 brochures for a drug alert program at school. In 1972 \$77,000.00 went to the village for the new village park and swimming pool on the west side of the village. In 1974 \$200.00 purchased a sight machine, and \$150.00 for flower boxes on the bridge over the Milwaukee River plus maintenance and plants.

1976 and 1983, Kiwanis donated \$100.00 to the Chamber of Commerce for their advertising brochure, donated \$1,000.00 toward a "Resusci Annie" for the Kewaskum Rescue Squad, donated \$250.00 in late 60's and mid 70's for playground equipment at St. Lucas Lutheran School Church. In 1976, the Kewaskum Historical Society Museum received \$200.

In 1982, \$5,200.00 went for repair and resurfacing the tennis courts at the high school. In 1983, they assisted the Junior Women's Club with \$300.00 to plant trees in the new Kiwanis park. 



For the past 36 years, the Kewaskum Kiwanis Club held an annual Turkey Shoot at the Bar-N-Ranch. Many individuals and organizations through the years helped with this event and the Club extends appreciation and thanks to them and especially to the former owners of the Bar-N-Ranch, Wally Timmerman, Agnes and Elmer Kittel of the Bar-N-Ranch Tavern, the Heberer Brothers, the Boy Scouts, Key Club and spouses of Kiwanis.

On September 17th, the Kiwanis will hold the Turkey Shoot at a new location, the New Fane Sportsman Club. Some events have changed and some new events added. Hopefully with your support, the Kiwanis Club can continue this tradition. With this annual fund raiser and other programs, the Kiwanis Club has done much for the community since their charter in September, 1947.

In 1948, the Club was instrumental in getting the Village to erect street signs, worked to improve the telephone service in Kewaskum, raised funds for high school band uniforms and purchased rain coats for safety patrols. For the next 30 years and recently they sponsored Christmas parties for the small children in the community.

In 1950 a clock was purchased for the Holy Trinity church steeple. In 1953, funds were contributed to the library to purchase books. Since 1954 and into the early 70's the club provided and sponsored prizes for the Christmas decoration in the village, contest purchased bleachers for the high school athletic field, and made donations to the village in excess of \$1,000.00 through the years to purchase Christmas decorations.

In 1952, the Kiwanis organized and held the first "Turkey Shoot" at the Bar-N-Ranch as the main fund raiser that continued to provide funds for the next 36 years.

In 1958, they began the sponsorship of the Little League Baseball program, purchased

Milwaukee River.

In 1961, they provided funds for a record player and shelter for the ice skating rink at the river. In 1976, the Kewaskum Society Museum Historical received \$200.

In 1982, \$5,200.00 went for repair and resurfacing the tennis courts at the high school. In 1983, they assisted the Junior Women's Club with \$300.00 to plant trees in the new Kiwanis park. In 1985, \$500.00 was contributed to the Neighborhood Watch Program. In 1981, \$5,000.00 was donated to the village Fire Department for 56 uniforms, bats, and "Jaws of Life." 


Last year over 400 hikers, representing Washington County church groups, service clubs, youth groups and as individuals, earned more than \$20,000 to be used to fight hunger.



Kewaskum School District Receives Handicapped Education Flow-Through Grant

State Superintendent Herbert J. Grover has notified the Kewaskum School District that it will receive \$40,500 to fund this year's project.

The grant is made available under part B of the Education of the Handicapped Act, formerly known as Public Law 94-142. Administered by the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction, the act requires states to provide a free, appropriate, public education for children between the ages of 3 and 21 who have exceptional educational needs (EEN).

The grant to Kewaskum will serve about 150 handicapped children in the district schools.

Statewide, all local educational agencies will share the more than \$25 million available under this program during the 1989-90 school year. Seventyfive percent of the federal funds will flow directly to local school districts.


Commenting on the grant award, project director Richard E. Zarling said, "The flowthrough grants provide a broad

range of services for handicapped children. Our funds are being used this year to pay some salaries of instructional and support staff, purchase special materials and equipment, arrange for specialized evaluations, support vocational education programs as well as inservice training activities and a classroom remodeling project. As one can see, these funds continue to play a major role as the district provides for handicapped pupil programming."

Bear Hunting Season Opens

MADISON, WI — A mix of favorable habitat conditions and good overall population points to a potentially fine opening Saturday for the 1989 Wisconsin bear hunting season, Department of Natural Resources officials said today.

Hunters with dogs opened the season across northern Wisconsin at 5:51 a.m. Saturday, Sept. 9. The area open to bear hunting with dogs is north of a line running east and west bounded by Highways 64, 45, 8, 13, 64, 27 and 8. Bait sitters will begin their hunt at 6:02 a.m. Saturday, Sept. 16.

"Statewide the bear population is estimated at 6,100 animals," Bill Creed, DNR northern wildlife research group leader said. "It (the population) has recovered very rapidly since the season closure in 1985. In fact, it has recovered to a level higher than it was at before the large kills in the early 1980s forced the closure."

The permit system is programmed for a harvest of about 1,000 bears. The harvest in 1988 was 1,125, but that was

Archery Deer Season Opens Saturday; Conditions Great

MADISON, WI — Wisconsin bow hunters will be in pursuit of a white tail deer herd numbering more than one million following several very favorable winters when the bow deer season opens at sunrise Saturday, Sept. 16.

"The northern deer management units are above individual unit goals for deer populations, while the southern farmland units are generally at desired goal levels," said Keith McCaffery, Department of Natural Resources northern forest research group biologist. "Some areas are below and some over goals in the south, but generally, Wisconsin's deer herd is too healthy."

Given the deer herd population and expecting generally the usual number of hunters and favorable hunting conditions, DNR wildlife biologists are predicting a potential harvest of between 42,000 and 45,000 deer.

The 1988 bow season harvest of 42,393 deer was just shy of the record registration in 1987 of 42,651 deer. Archers last year bagged 37,951 deer in the early season (prior to the start of the November nine-day gun deer season) and 4,442 in the late season (following the gun deer hunt).

Bow hunters in 1988 again showed a preference for bucks, with 52.01 percent of the harvest being antlered bucks (22,125). The antlerless bow deer harvest was 20,100. A total of 210,518 archery licenses were sold, showing a harvest success rate of 20.1 percent.

The winter severity index for 1988 averaged near 80, which is just on the edge of being severe. The winter severity index is the total of the number days with of below-zero temperatures or snow depth of 18 inches or more. Days where both snow depth and below-zero temperatures occur count double. An index of 60 to 80 is moderate, 80 to 100 is severe and over 100 is rated as very severe.

The combination of cold temperatures and snow stresses deer, causing mortality. The far northwest counties of Douglas, Ashland and Bayfield were the most severely impacted, according to McCaffery.

Following an above-average

1988 fawn production index and generally poor hunting conditions during the gun deer season, DNR biologists estimate the Wisconsin deer herd somewhere between 1.1 and 1.2 million animals.

Bow deer hunters will have some new rules for 1989, including additional time to register their deer. Archers will have three days to register their deer (rather than by 5 p.m. the next day as in past years.) Bows no longer have to be unstrung or cased after shooting hours end, but hunting hours apply to all archery hunting during the bow deer season.

As in past seasons, archery licenses bought during the season will not be valid for three days. For example, if the license is bought on Monday, it won't be valid until Thursday.

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attributed to the drought, which made baiting bear easier because of a lack of natural foods.

"This year is a much more normal fall statewide because of the acorn mast, berry crop and farm crops," said Ed Frank, DNR wildlife biologist. "After the one-year closure of the season, people are seeing more and bigger bear in the harvest."

The woods in the north are lush and still green, but have no real surplus of water anywhere, according to Creed. The berry crop in north central Wisconsin is better than 1988, but in some areas acorn production is spotty.

Hunters using dogs must possess a bear-dog permit, a valid state bear hunting license and a bear harvest permit valid for the zone being hunted, or they may assist a person possessing a valid bear harvest permit for the zone being hunted.
