Hope for Kewaskum's 911 Service

The chances of Kewaskum, Allenton and Waubeka becoming a part of Washington and Ozaukee Counties' 911 emergency systems before 1994 are improving and the possibility of the three communities being included in the initial startup could become reality.

If Washington and Ozaukee Counties take affirmative action on a proposal presented at a closed meeting last week between county officials and

representatives of GTE and Wisconsin Bell telephone companies, Kewaskum, Allenton and Waubeka will have their exchanges modified to make them compatible with Wisconsin Bell equipment and thereby able to handle the enhanced 911 system.

David Cooper, 911 Coordinator for GTE, told this reporter at a media conference in Kohler, last Thursday evening, his company was concerned that it was being pictured as the "bad guys" in this situation. He said GTE was

anxious to work with the county to come to an arrangement which would make everyone happy. Cooper did concede, however, that while GTE was willing to expand the system to include the communities, it was also looking for the county to pick up the cost involved to modify equipment that is not scheduled for routine updating until 1994.

Cooper said he and Steven Frensz, 911 Account Executive for Wisconsin Bell met with Washington County Board Chairman Reuben Schmah and Ozaukee County Clerk Harold Dobberpuhl last Friday afternoon. "We told those gentlemen, yes, we can modify those exchanges. We presented our proposal, there are no alternative plans, no other options."

Because the county has to take the presentation back to committee for discussion and action, Cooper declined to release the specific costs involved. In a phone conversation Monday morning however, Schmah said he had no problem releasing those costs. According to state regulations, the cost cannot exceed 40c per month.

If Kewaskum and Allenton are included in Washington County's 911 system, the initial county user fee will be 37c per month for the first three years to cover installment costs, and then it will drop to 18c per month for the normal routine maintenance fee. (Waubeka would be included in Ozaukee's 911 system).

If Kewaskum and Allenton are excluded, the initial county user fee would only drop about 12c, to 24c for the first three

Sixth Local Site Being Shut Down

Town of Kewaskum Closing Its Landfill

The Town of Kewaskum's Solid Waste Committee decided Monday night, to add its landfill to the growing list of municipal landfills that are being or, are already closed.

The township felt it had no other recourse except to close the site effective January 15, 1990, before new and more stringent Environmental Protection Agency regulations governing landfill operations go into effect early next year.

According to Town Chairman George Allmann, the EPA is making it almost financially impossible for small communities to keep the landfills open.

Last month the committee, comprised of the Town Board and residents Mike Lettow, Charles O'Meara, Donald Stern and Al Voigt toured several neighboring townships who have already shut down their landfills and contracted for disposal service to handle their refuse.

If the town opts to go with a refuse hauler, dumpsters will be stationed at the end of Hickory Drive. Allmann said the town would be bidding out the

refuse removal next month, noting one contract offer had already been received. No decision has been made on what the cost will be to residents although it is estimated to be about 50c to \$1.00 per bag. It is thought the annual disposal costs will be around \$5,000 to \$7,000 and the bag fee charged should be sufficient to keep the disposal service self-sustaining.

Allmann also said the town would be seeking an engineering contract for the closing of the three-acre landfill. The cost for that work could run over \$80,000. Residents will be formally notified by letter of the closing.

The Town of Kewaskum's decision comes slightly over a month after the Town of Farmington's announcement that it will be closing its landfill November 15th, and the closure of the Town of Scott landfill Oct. 1st.

Farmington has decided to go with a private recycling center to be operated by its present landfill custodian. Michael Berres plans to lease the site from the township where he will accept recyclables and have dumpsters available for the deposit of other refuse at 50c per bag.

Farmington and Kewaskum are following in the footsteps of four neighboring townships. The Towns of Ashford, Auburn, Wayne and Scott have all closed their landfills.

Ashford has gone with the dumpsters as has Wayne which closed its landfill in 1987. Residents are charged a

As several state and local officials reminisced at ceremonies Friday, they noted that there were some legislators in Madison who said "it would be a cold day in Hell" before West Bend got its Highway 45 bypass. Well, they weren't far from wrong as approximately 200 people braved wind, rain, snow and wind chill temperatures in the teens to attend the formal dedication of the bypasses two recently completed southbound lanes.

While all the work has not been completed, the entire four-lane bypass is expected to be open to traffic by the first of

November according to Harvey Shebesta, Wisconsin Department of Transportation District Administrator. Some minor work will be left for completion next spring due to the onset of the cold weather.

Among the speakers at the dedication were, State Representative Mary Panzer who played a major roll in pushing the project on to completion before the original target date of 1999, Governor Tommy Thompson, State Senator Carol Buettner, State Representatives Michael Lehman and Steven Loucks, Reuben Schmah, Chairman of the Washington County Board



per-bag fee for each bag brought in for disposal.

The Town of Scott, which closed its landfill earlier this month, has contracted with Waste Management of Fond du Lac to handle its trash. Town Clerk Lester Benzschawel said a refuse center has been set up at the Scott Town Hall. Containers for recyclables along with dumpsters for refuse have been

set up. Because the township has not, as yet, received the special bags required by the disposal service, there has been no charge for disposal. Benzschawel said, however, when the bags do come in, residents will be required to use them and their will be a charge. Although that fee has not been set yet, it is expected to run about 50c to \$1.00 per bag.

The Town of Auburn closed its landfill in 1984, and recently renewed its contract with Zahn's Refuse Disposal for one year, expiring August 31, 1990. Town Clerk Camilla Butzke said residents presently are not charged for depositing their refuse at the collection site located near Auburn Lake on Highway DD. Depending on what happens when the contract comes up for renewal, that could change, she noted. "If the cost gets too high, the township may have to consider some kind of fee also, but for now we're not charging our residents for the service."

Kewaskum Village Administrator Dan Schmidt said the Village of Kewaskum presently has no plans to close its landfill. "Our situation is a little bit different," he said, "we do not use our site for refuse disposal, only construction materials and brush." Because of that, he noted,

regulations governing us are a little different. "The board, however, has been made aware that we may be required to install monitoring wells and we still may be required to do that even if the landfill is closed."

years and only 2c per month thereafter, from 18c to 16c, for the monthly maintenance charge.

Schmahl also stated he had made his recommendation to the Public Property and Safety Committee Monday morning that the county go ahead with the implementation of a full-service 911 system including the communities of Kewaskum and Allenton. "Mr. Dobberpuhl is in total agreement with the proposal," said Schmahl, "and he will be making the same recommendation concerning Waubeka to the Ozaukee County Board."

In discussing the enhanced 911 system Thursday night, Cooper noted that, while modification of the equipment is the most costly aspect of implementing the system, setting up the information network is the most time consuming. "Once a contract is signed," said Cooper, "we're looking at about 18 to 24 months before actual startup." That would mean Washington County could have 911 service some time in mid to late 1991.





of Supervisors, Harvey Shebesta of the DOT, Ronald Fiedler, Secretary of Transportation, West Bend Mayor Michael Miller and David Heying, President of the Washington County Overall Economic Development Committee. Kewaskum's Village Board President Paul Blumer and Administrator Dan Schmidt were among the dignitaries representing local community governments.

Panzer, who acted as Mistress of Ceremonies, said Friday's dedication "marked a milestone" in the completion of the bypass, which had been the dream of a group of West Bend area men for over thirty years. (The County Highway Committee adopted a resolution on May 14, 1968, in support of the bypass. In 1977, a task force was formed to push the bypass and its motto was "45 by 82".) Panzer noted it was the continued cooperative commitment and effort on the part of private, public, local and state individuals and groups which brought the project to reality. She told the gathering, "we, in essence, won out because we did our homework." Panzer was referring to the fact that plans had been designed and drawn up, waiting for the time and opportunity when funds became available. "We were able to pull them (the plans) off the

shelf and get things going when that time came."

Panzer also gave Governor Tommy Thompson, who addressed the ceremony, credit for the project's success. She noted Thompson had been a strong backer of the bypass even before his election as governor, while he was minority leader in Madison.

In speaking to the audience, Senator Carol Buettner said the highway's usage is already 8% above the DOT's projected figures.

Construction of the last two lanes of the 12.7 mile project began in May, at an anticipated cost of \$8 million. Seventy-six per cent of that cost will be covered by Federal funds and the remaining twenty-four per cent by State funding.

Several contractors are involved in the project. Roddie E. Beaudoin & Son, Inc., Menomonee Falls, did the base work and paving at a cost of \$5,086,140. Signing and pavement marking was done by Century Fence of Waukesha at a cost of \$255,330. Zenith Tech, Inc., of Waukesha, constructed the seven bridges along the 13-mile stretch at a cost of approximately \$1.5 million.

The extension of the four-lane highway up to Highway 28, in the Village of Kewaskum, is expected to be completed within the next two to three years.

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Hike-A-Thon for Ice Age Park And Trail Foundation Raises \$50,000

The event was held October 7 at 16 sites throughout the state.

(SHEBOYGAN, WI) Over 2,000 hikers enjoyed a crisp Fall day on the Wisconsin Ice Age Trail, raising approximately \$50,000 in pledges for Ice Age Trail development and preservation, according to figures compiled by Jerry Baumann, Executive Director of the Ice Age Park and Trail Foundation, organizers of the October 7 state-wide Hike-A-Thon.

"Both the participation and revenue figures broke all previous records," Baumann said. The Hike-A-Thon is in its third year, he noted, and hikers this year selected from 16 completed trail segments for their hikes. This was up from 13 segments last year.

Corporate sponsorship from "Wisconsin Trails" magazine was also a "first," Baumann said. "Their financial support, used to help underwrite printing costs for this year's event, will enable us to devote

more of the hike's pledge proceeds to actual Trail work," he reported.

Dan Small, host of public television's "Outdoor Wisconsin" program, was chairman of the 1989 "Take a Walk on the Wild Side" Hike. He was joined by Governor Tommy G. Thompson in visits to hike sites in Manitowoc and Washington Counties.

Both visits were to trail segments where private property owners have granted public access to their property for portions of the Trail route. Gov. Thompson stressed the importance of this type of public/private partnership in Trail preservation efforts in his remarks to the hikers.

Funds raised through the Hike-A-Thon will be used for two purposes: local host Ice Age Trail Chapters will utilize a portion of the funds for hands-on trail improvement and

maintenance programs, and the Foundation will direct a portion of the funds to ongoing development programs.

The Wisconsin Ice Age Trail traces the 1000-mile route carved by the furthest advance of glaciers across the state of Wisconsin over 10,000 years ago. The route includes some of the best evidence of glacial activity in the world, as well as some of Wisconsin's most spectacular scenery.

Half of the Trail route is currently open to public use through a unique combination of Federal, State, County and municipal ownership, plus easement rights granted by

private landowners.

The non-profit Ice Age Park and Trail Foundation has been working for over 30 years toward the goal of a completed Trail route. Activity in recent years has intensified, according to Baumann, because the growth of urban development in major metropolitan areas is posing a threat to critical linkages in the planned trail route, specifically in Washington, Ozaukee, Waukesha and Dane Counties.

"The Hike-A-Thon has been our most successful vehicle for introducing the public to the beauties of the Trail and the need for its continued development and preservation," Baumann said.

"We hope that those who participated in this and prior year's hikes will continue to play an active roll in the development and completion of the Ice Age Trail," he added.

Board Representative for the County Incineration Committee, Trustee Mary Krueger informed the Board that a County Incineration Committee Meeting is scheduled for October 19, 1989.

Administrator Daniel S. Schmidt reviewed upcoming budget committee meeting dates. October 23, 25 and 30, 1989 as per the 1990 Budget Process sheet.

Administrator Daniel S. Schmidt reviewed the Preliminary Fire Department budget as reviewed by the Protection & Public Safety Committee. The budget for 1990 reflects approximately a \$9,336 or 8.7 percent increase. The budget figure used in reference to the fire Contracts with the Townships reflects approximately a \$1,336 or 1.5 percent increase. It was noted that the results of the proposed budget would be reflected in the fire service contracts for the Village of Kewaskum, Town of Kewaskum and Town of Auburn. The Village's share of the budget will go up approximately 10.3 percent (\$5,693), the Town of Kewaskum's will go down approximately 9.8 percent (\$4,456), and the Town of Auburn's will go up approximately 5.8 percent (\$1,399).

Administrator Daniel S. Schmidt informed the Board that the proposed budget is similar to last year with the formula reflecting the same 1/2 of the water usage

charge and other dollar amount constant. The main shift in percentages was caused by the number of fire calls and changes in equalized values.

On a motion by Trustee Mary Krueger, seconded by Trustee Richard Schlice and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board approved the Fire Department budget pending public hearing and authorized the Administrator to send the tentatively approved Fire Department budget and contracts to the Townships.

Clean Bird Feeders Prevent Spread of Avian Diseases

MADISON, WI — Although winter bird feeding can help songbirds survive harsh Wisconsin winters, it could prove fatal to many bird species if feeders aren't properly cleaned.

According to Department of Natural Resources Wildlife Health Specialist Sarah Hurley, parasites and Salmonellosis, a disease caused by Salmonella bacteria, can be transmitted by fecal matter left on feeders and beneath feeding stations.

"Because birds are feeding and defecating in the same area, there is the potential for disease to be spread and any species is susceptible," Hurley said.

Sometimes called "songbird fever," Salmonellosis can lead to an acute intestinal infection that weakens birds and often proves fatal. Parasites can lead to chronic, low-grade infections.

"You'll find dead birds if there's a problem at your feeder," Hurley said. "Where the disease problems occur varies from year to year. Usually there are pocket outbreaks in certain neighborhoods, not devastating nationwide epidemics."

Keeping a clean feeding station is the best way to prevent the spread of Avian disease. Hurley suggests disinfecting feeders each time they are refilled.

Using a 5 percent bleach solution, scrub feeders with a stiff brush, making sure to get the bleach solution into the cracks of wooden feeders. After scrubbing, let the feeder air dry. Clean bird baths the same way. Dispose of seed on the ground by shoveling it into a garbage bag and disposing of it with the regular trash.

Also, make sure to wash your hands after cleaning feeders. Pets and people are susceptible to Salmonellosis.


