No Immediate Plans to Replace School District Business Manager

Kewaskum School District Administrator Dr. David Heather confirmed Tuesday, that there are no immediate plans to fill the vacancy created by the recent resignation of Business Manager Cherna Gorder who had been with the district for five years.

Heather said he will assume the duties of business manager, with bookkeeping duties being handled by members of the Administration Office's staff.

"We'll see how thing go,"

said Heather, "and if it looks like the position requires the services of a full time person we will look at hiring a replacement next spring." He noted the district would not look for anyone to fill the vacancy until next April or May. "It's difficult to hire personnel in mid-term after contracts have been signed for the school year."

The district was left without a business manager when Gorder submitted her resignation, effective October 27th, to take the post of comptroller with the Sheboygan School District.

Support Staff Grievance Resolved

Following a special meeting Monday night, to hear a grievance regarding insurance from representatives of the Kewaskum Auxiliary Personnel Union (KAP), the Kewaskum School Board went into closed session and came out with a decision to pick up the added cost of monthly single and family plan premiums which rose due to a hike in rates last September. The grievance was filed after District Administrator Dr. David Heather informed 13 full time employes by letter, that effective September 1st, they would have to pick up the added cost, ranging from \$20 to \$53 per month. That amount represented an 18% increase in premiums, from \$114.04 to \$134.52 for single and \$298.12 to \$351.12 per month for families. Norman Kempf, president of KAP and Heather disagreed on the interpretation of language in the union's contract. Heather contended exhibits presented at the hearing contained wording which stipulated the district would pay "up to \$289.84 for a family plan and up to \$110.86

for a single plan." He asked the board to determine if the language, as stated in the contract, was being correctly interpreted by the administration. Heather noted the wording was quite clear as to how much the district would contribute to those premiums and he recommended the board deny the grievance. Kempf, on the other hand, argued the intent of the original contract was that the district would pay the full 100% of the dental and health insurance for all the eligible employes. Kempf told the board the purpose of placing a dollar amount in the contract had been to give the district an idea of what kind of costs it could expect. It was not to be used as a cap on costs.

candy to the kiddies. Santa's elves will also be marching alongside the units to make sure the children stay back and so that no accidents happen.



The attendance door prize name was drawn and the winner was Dick and Mary Ann's Tap of St. Michaels. They were not present.





Mielke Receives Teacher Of the Year Award



Ann Mielke

Informed! Energetic! Knowledgeable! Enthusiastic! These are just a few of the adjectives her colleagues use to describe Ann Mielke of Fond du Lac, Wisconsin's Sociology Teacher of the Year for 1989.

Mielke, a social science and communications teacher at Moraine Park Technical College, received the Hans Mauksch Award for Excellence in Teaching at the annual Wisconsin Sociological Association conference held in Béloit on Oct. 13.

"I don't know how to feel about this award," Mielke says. "I like to teach and I don't need to be rewarded for something I like to do, but this is a nice affirmation coming from my peers."

"We're so proud of our teachers," says Moraine Park President John J. Shanahan, "especially of Ann - taking the initiative to do this. We are pleased our students have a teacher of this quality.

Shanahan says Mielke serves as a model for other teachers: ""She typifies our efforts to identify leaders as we work on building a better Moraine Park community. She's a leader.

Mielke is the first teacher from a two-year college to receive the award. "We have many outstanding instructors at Moraine Park," she says. 'But people look at a technical college and don't see the quality of the education. The people I work with are outstanding."

Her colleagues return the compliment. In his recommendation of Mielke for the award, fellow instructor LeRoy Thielman wrote, "Ann's dedication to successful teaching is evident in her preparation for an organization of class activities. Her energy and enthusiasm



plementing unique teaching techniques.

"Here is a person who makes sociology come alive for her students and her peers," says Jean Woolley, dean - general education. "She is a master at making connetions between the theory and practice. She well deserves appreciation and recognition.'

Betty A. Brunelle, vice-president - instruction, echoes Woolley's comments: "Moraine Park's students are richer for their exposure to Ann's sensitive teaching style and, even more significant, to her treatment of all learners as individuals with unique learning styles and special talents. Her positive attitude and enthusiasm are infectious.'

Her enthusiasm for teaching was born in the idealism of the '60s, says Mielke. "That idealism is still very much a part of me. I think that through teaching I can make the biggest impact. Sure there are other places I could go and make more money, but I'm not interested in that.'

Mielke's early interests were tied to history. "My first attempt was to be a history teacher," she says. 'But back in the '70s, history teachers were a dime a dozen so I went into elementary education."

She taught junior high school in Menasha for two years and in Fond du Lac for four years before joining the Goodrich High School staff as a replacement teacher.

One year later, in 1983, she received a call from Katie Soles, Moraine Park's vice president - student services, who asked her if she than they have thought before and was interested in working for the college part time.

"I was pregnant at the time and it wasn't easy getting a job,' Mielke says. "Moraine Park was very supportive - I never felt confined. The support services here are outstanding.

Hunting Hours for Small Game And Big Game are Now Uniform

With the deer gun season less than one month away, there is one rule change which has to do with the hunting hours for the 1989 gun season.

If you small game or bow hunt you will be accustomed to using the hunting hours table on the back page of your regulation pamphlet. If you're only a gun deer hunter take time to look at it for there have been changes. In the past hunting hours for the gun season were 6:30 a.m. until 4:30 p.m. They now are the same as the small game hunting hours.

What does it mean? In most cases you will be able to start sooner and also be able to hunt later each day. It will although require that you determine the proper opening and closing times depending upon the area of the state that you hunt. To do this check the zone map on page 31 of the hunting pamphlet and add the proper number of minutes to the hours listed on the hunting hours table. For example, in our area in Fond du Lac County we are in hunting hours Zone B, which requires that we add 4 minutes to the opening time and also to the closing time. On November 18th, 1989, opening day of the deer gun season, the season will open at 6:21 a.m. and close at 4:45 p.m. This will change daily for the whole season, so be sure to check it daily to determine the legal shooting hours.

Why was it changed? First of all to allow hunters in the western part of the state a chance to hunt later in the afternoon where their sun set is 16 minutes later than ours, and also to start 16 minutes later in the morning which should make it considerably lighter. The second reason was to make both small game and big game hunting hours uniform and hopefully easier to understand.

Take some time before the season to write down the opening and closing times daily. In Fond du

Lac Counties it is as follows if you want to clip it out:





Thanks to our families, friends, and co-workers who bowled and helped out in the event. Thanks also to the following businesses for their support and generosity: M&I First National Bank, Lighthouse Lanes, Regal Ware, Dairy Queen, West Bend Mutual, Family Furniture, Sentry Foods of Kewaskum, Buffy's Village Inn, West Bend Company, Cedar Haven Rehabilitation Agency, Jerry's Restaurant, Dick's Pizza, Weasler Engineering, Ken's Carpets, Hart Oil, and Wisconsin Lift Truck. The generosity of many was evident as the pledges of over 100 bowlers totaled \$6,000.00. This money will be donated in memory of our son, David Louis Leitheiser, and will go toward SIDS research and counseling for SIDS parents.

We would like to share some facts about SIDS, more commonly known as crib death. SIDS is not a rare disease. It is the leading cause of death in infants ages 1 week to 1 year. About 150 infants in Wisconsin and 7,000 infants in the United States die yearly of SIDS.

The cause of SIDS is unknown and, therefore, SIDS cannot be prevented. SIDS is not hereditary, not contagious, and is not due to suffocation or aspiration. Babies that die of SIDS appear to be very healthy, and even after a thorough autopsy, no significant defect is found to account for death. SIDS is still a mystery. Much research is being done in hopes to identify a cause, and method of prevention.

We are glad to have this opportunity to raise awareness of Sudden Infant Death Syndrome.



One of the major issues confronting the Legislature this fall is recycling. The Senate will be debating a comprehensive statewide mandatory recycling bill when it reconvenes this month.


Because the bill is so complex - more than 60 pages long -Republicans Senate have formed a working committee to scrutinize the bill and come up with amendments to make it better.

Republicans do not want to trash recycling. Burying materials which can be reused is wasteful, and waste is contrary to our conservative philosophy. We do, however, have concerns with some parts of the bill which we believe are unfair or actually work against the intent of the legislation.

One major concern is with incineration. In the bill, incinerators are considered generally the same as landfills and the incineration of solid waste is discouraged, even in waste-to-energy facilities. We believe this goes too far.

Clearly, materials which are easily separated from the wastestream and which are easily recyclable - such as glass, aluminum and other metals - ought not to be buried or burned. Other materials, however - certain plastics or coated papers, for example are not so easily separated or recycled. For these materials, recovery of energy through incineration is certainly preferable to landfilling and the bill should allow that.

We are also concerned with the funding mechanism which will raise some \$24 million through the imposition of a one-sixth of a cent fee on a single-use, throwaway packaging. The fee will be costly and difficult to administer. Also, because of the definition of a package, the fee will be paid primarily by one sector - the food and food-



service industry.

The fairness issue is Solid important. waste problems affect us all and we are all responsible for the waste we generate. That's why Republicans are looking for a more equitable solution to fund recycling programs. This may include the use of general tax dollars, a tax on waste disposal, increasing tipping fees or a combination of any of these and other revenue sources.

The recycling bill before the Legislature goes a long way toward achieving the goal of reducing our dependence on landfills. It accomplishes this primarily by banning from In the Service not to be buried in the first place. The bill also contains many good provisions including market identification and development, recycling rebates for manufacturers, education efforts, expanded state purchases of recycled materials, technical assistance and grant programs.

The bill is far-reaching and will have a powerful effect on the lives of all Wisconsin Without careful citizens. consideration and scrutiny we could create more problems than we solve.

Wisconsin has a solid record

of leading the nation in fashioning progressive laws to protect our environment. The recycling bill before us is another opportunity for us to continue that proud tradition. A comprehensive, but fair, recycling law can serve as a model for other states to follow. With the right improvements, this could be such a bill.

Potpourri Burners Are a Potential Fire Hazard

Consumers should be very careful with potpourri burners and tea lights, says Jane Jansen, Director of the Bureau of Consumer Protection at the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP).

"Our regional offices have received several calls about candle flare-ups with the burners," says Jansen. "While we haven't found any defective products, we hope consumers are careful with these decorative items."

First, tea lights and potpourri burners should not be left unattended. "They can be a fire hazard if lit and not carefully watched," says Jansen. "Under some circumstances, their small flame can turn large very quickly."

When using them, consumers should make sure they have the proper candle size and shape for the burner. The most common problem is using candles which are too tall. Jansen suggests following manufacturer guidelines. If the manufacturer doesn't suggest a specific candle, she recommends a candle one-half as tall as the burner.

Proper ventilation is vital for safe burner use. Some manufacturers have designed burners with larger and more ventilation holes in the lower portion of the burner. Jansen says air should flow freely around the device and not be placed on or near combustible items, for example, matchsticks should always be kept away from the burners.






Approximately 150 parents participated in the mini "school

programs.



The season closed with last Friday's games. Kewaskum compiled an outstanding record for the season by scoring 213 points in the six games, as compared to 14 points scored by its opponents. Results of all six games were as follows: Kewaskum 74, Lomira 0; Kewaskum 6, Brandon 2; Kewaskum 38, Rosendale 0; Kewaskum 33, Campbellsport 12; Kewaskum 28, Oakfield 0; Kewaskum 34, North Fond du Lac 0. Only two teams scored against Kewaskum and only one team, Brandon, came close to Kewaskum. Standouts on Kewaskum's squad in the games were Paul Kral, good offensive and defensive halfback, Petermann, great defensive fullback, and Wahlen, six foot two pass snatching end. Romaine, Bunkelmann, Bilgo and all the others consistently played fine football.



Wisconsin's Canada Goose Season Is **Progressing Nicely**

MADISON, WI - Wisconsin's Canada goose season has been great, with hunters harvesting an estimated 14,100 geese in the exterior zone, said Jon Bergquist, DNR waterfowl/wetlands ecologist.

"With about 40 percent of the season gone, hunters have harvested more than 65 percent of the exterior zone quota," Bergquist said. "We have some 8,200 geese left out of a 22,300 bird quota. However, we expect the harvest rate to decrease as the season progresses. Hunting pressure and weather conditions will push the geese into Horicon and other tag zone areas.'

In the Horicon zone, a recent population survey indicates that more than 225,000 Canada geese are present. The harvest at Horicon is in its third period now, with many waterfowls enjoying the liberal season. The third period hunt at Horicon runs through Friday, Nov. 17 and then closes for the gun deer season. The fourth and last time period runs from Monday, Nov. 27 through Dec. 16.

Goose hunters have also been successful in other zones.

"By last count on October 23, hunters at Theresa Marsh had harvested 2,796 Canada geese of a 4,500 quota," Bergquist said.


