Levy to Increase Less Than 1%

# **Public Hearing Nov. 27th** For 1990 Village Budget

After long hours of discussion and review, the Kewaskum Village Board and the various municipal department heads have come up with what they feel is a financially sound and prudent budget for 1990.

That proposed budget carries a price tag of \$1,270,002, up 10.1% or \$117,478, over the 1989 budget of \$1,152,524. The good news for village taxpayers though, is the fact that, despite a double-digit increase in the budget itself, the tax levy will go up less than 1% over last

Based on a levy of \$427,723.72 (including the TIF District), Kewaskum's municipal levy will only go up .805% or six cents, to \$7.36 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation as compared to last year's mill rate of \$7.30.

Village Administrator Dan Schmidt told the board at its meeting Monday night, however, he could not calculate the total tax levy since he has not received any figures as yet, from either the state or county. Schmidt said he suspected the state's levy would be about the same as last year, however, he had no idea what the figures might be for the county.

"I've already received the school district and VTAE's (vocational school) figures,' said Schmidt. The school district's levy is \$949,213.82, carrying a rate of \$16.34 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation. That represents a 16.97% or \$2.37 increase over last year. The VTAE levy is \$101,310.08, with a mill rate of \$1.74/\$1,000, up 5.84% or ten cents over last

Schmidt noted because he was lacking some levy numbers and would not receive the state credit figure December, he could not calculate exactly what the total tax levy would be. He indicated he did not care to make a guesstimate at this time which might end up too low or too

high. While the total budget represented an increase of 10%, the average increase, by department, came out to about 3.5%. The reason for that, noted Schmidt, was that some operations such as streets and sidewalks (due to the repair program), had substantial while other increases, operations had no increases or dropped, such as the Parks budget.

Also slated for a public hearing November 27th, will be the Water Pollution Control and Water Department budgets. In discussing the Pollution Control budget Schmidt noted there is no planned rate increase through 1990.

The board also reviewed the budget. proposed Library Schmidt said that, while the total budget comes to \$43,051, the village's portion is only \$25,079, with the balance of \$17,972, coming from county library funding.

In other action, the board approved a building permit for the construction of footings for an apartment complex being built by Drs. Cesar and Aurora Sison at 1038 Fond du Lac Avenue. It also gave conditional approval for a building construction permit, contingent upon receipt of state approved building plans.

The trustees also approved an increase in fees for special assessment certificates, a new Bowmar contract with Appraisals and a revised meeting schedule for the months of November, Decem-

ber and January, due to the holidays.

Bids were opened for the new 1990 replacement squad for the Police Department. Five bids were received with Ewald Chevrolet of Oconomowoc, apparent low bidder with a 1990 Chevy Caprice with police package, for \$13,523. The other Schwartzburg were, Chev/Olds of West Bend, Caprice - \$13,952.29, Honeck Chevrolet, Kewaskum, Caprice \$14,145, Meyer Ford, Campbellsport, Ford Crown Victoria -\$14,458, and Young's Royal Ford, West Bend, Ford CV -\$15,283. The bids were turned over to Police Chief Knoebel for further review.

In reviewing correspondence, Schmidt advised the board the village had received a letter from residents involved in the Bonnie Lane annexation. He said the property owners are requesting another meeting with the board on five objects of concern, including a possible moritorium on the curb and gutter installation, financial hardship, and the possibility of obtaining some type of state or

Schmidt said the village has been "scratching hard" to help the owners find some money to fund the project. The board directed Schmidt to continue to provide as much assistance as possible.



Washington County Sheriff Robert H. Schulteis has received, on behalf of the Sheriff's Department, a \$500 donation from the Jackson Area Business Association. The donation will be used to support the sheriff's department implementation of a DARE program.

DARE, which stands for Drug Abuse Resistance Education, is a primary prevention program aimed at children who have not yet had their first alcohol or drug experience. The program emphasis is to help students recognize and resist the subtle pressures that can influence them to experiment with drugs and alcohol.

IN DARE, a uniformed deputy who has been specially trained for the task, meets with 5th and 6th grade students at participating schools. Each meeting lasts one hour, and is held once a week for 17 weeks.

The program shows the students the dangers of drugs, how to resist peer pressure, and how to experience other aspects of life that can prevent the need to rely on the artificial stimulus of drugs and alcohol.

The Sheriff pointed out that DARE is far more intensive and detailed than any other program used to date. Instead of one visit to a school, there are 17. And this extensive contact between the Deputy and the students is a major reason for DARE's success in other cities.

Donations will be used to purchase materials and to help offset the cost of supplying a Deputy for the DARE program. The Sheriff welcomes donations from private citizens and service groups.

A new study by the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) projects continued growth in the number of elderly veterans in the 1990s, but a decline in the total veteran population for the foreseeable future.

"The study provides valuable assistance in developing spending and program policies," says Department of Veterans Affairs Secretary Edward J. Derwinski. "It is particularly important in planning for future medical care for veterans."

In Wisconsin, veterans 65 years old and older will increase from today's total of 122,000 to 162,000 in 2000, according to the projection. But the total veteran population in Wisconsin is expected to continue its decline from 561,000 today to 498,000 by 2000.

The veteran demographics assist the Department of Veterans Affairs in formulating policy, budgeting, and program planning. Included are national and state-level data on living ex-service personnel by age, sex, and period of military service, with breakdowns by county, VA medical districts, and VA medical center primary service areas.

According to the study:

\*There were 27.2 million veterans living in the United States and Puerto Rico as of March 31, 1989. By the turn of the century this number is expected to fall to 24.1 million and by 2040 to be down to 13 million.

\*While the number of veterans will be on a downward trend, the elderly veteran population will grow dramatically. The number of veterans at least 65 years old will increase from today's total of 6.7 million to a peak of 9 million in 1999, a 34 percent increase. Veterans 75 and older will grow from today's 1.4 million to 2.6 million in 1995, and then more than triple in size over the next 15 years to 4.4 million.

\*Those 65 years old and over now represent 25 percent of the veteran population. This percentage will rise steadily over the next 25 years before

peaking at 46 percent in the year 2016.

\*The overall decline in the number of veterans will not be distributed evenly among the states. In general, the Northeast and industrial Midwest will lose the most veterans, while certain states in the Sunbelt will lose the fewest veterans. In fact, only one state, Alaska, is expected to gain veterans between now and the turn of the century, although Florida and Arizona will experience only a slight decrease due to a significant influx of veterans from other states. In contrast, all states will experience marked increases in their veteran population aged 65 years and older during the next ten years.

\*World War II veterans, numbering 9.3 million, are currently the largest group of veterans, and Vietnam era veterans are second, with just under 8.3 million. By 1993, Vietnam era veterans will be the largest group.

# Crop Walk Raises \$24,000 to Fight Hunger



### 1989 Gun Deer Season Has Makings for Breaking Record

MADISON, WI — For deer hunters, the advance view of the 1989 Wisconsin gun deer season looks like it just can't get much better than this and, barring any unforseen catastrophic weather, harvest records could fall, according to Chuck Pils, DNR wildlife manager.

"This season has the potential for a record year in Wisconsin," Pils said. "We have an estimated deer herd statewide of about 1.2 million animals and a season designed to shoot 285,000 deer."

That total, combined with a potential 43,000 to 45,000 bow deer harvest, will make the last deer hunting year of the 1980s the highest harvest year on record in Wisconsin. The potential Wisconsin deer harvest total could be well over 320,000.

The previous top total was in 1985 when gun hunters took 274,302 deer and bow hunters took 40,744. That was the first year the bow harvest topped 40,000. The second highest harvest for gun hunters was the 1988 season with 263,424 deer shot. Bow hunters that year harvested 42,393.

"There are a record number 346,970 Hunter's Choice permits out this season," Pils added. "In the 1988 season there were more than 654,000 licensed hunters and that number should be topped this year, based both on the number of deer available and the Hunter's Choice permits."

Recent winters in Wisconsin have been very easy on the deer herd, with the 1988-89 winter ranking just on the border between moderate and severe with a rating of 80 on the winter severity index. The index adds one point for each day the snow is at a depth of 18 inches or more, or the temperature is at zero degrees or below. When both occur, two points are added. Winters more than 100 points cause high winter mortality on deer.

"Prior to 1988 we experienced only four severe winters in the last 16 years," Keith McCaffery, DNR Bureau

of Research northern forest unit biologist, said. "And those winters have been pretty evenly spaced out over those 16 years, in part as a product of the drought weather cycle we're in now."

Deer seem to be fairly plentiful around the state. In the north however, of the 47 deer management units north of Highway 64, 36 of the units are above population goals. The only potential variance is in the Lake Superior watershed region (the far northwestern countries) down to Winchester in northern Vilas County, where there may have been some heavy winter effect in 1988, McCaffery stated.

Buck harvest this year should be about the same as it was in 1988, McCaffery added, totalling about 124,000. The overall total harvest might be affected by a high number of Hunter's Choice permits being filled with bucks, which may leave some of the bonus antlerless-only permits unfilled.

"The northern third of the state is where deer populations are out of whack, or higher than the prescribed management goals." McCaffery said. "One factor is the mild winters, while another might be that recreational winter feeding of deer is having an upward impact on deer numbers."

Of the 51 farm deer management units south of Highway 64, 15 units are above deer management population goals while 11 are below goals, McCaffery noted. Those units over goals are in the Marshfield to Wausau to Eau Claire area. Northwest of Lake Winnebago there are several units with heavy deer populations and west of Madison three units, 70, and 75 are 70A management goals.

On the western Wisconsin border in Grant and Crawford counties, three units there are below goals. Regulations have changed to buck only for the nine-day season in Units 74A and 74B.

Junior Laurie Vogt didn't start running Cross Country one day because it was a dream of hers. Rather it started at a track meet in the spring of Vogt's freshman year where then Coach Denise Leong said "Why don't you try the mile?'

Vogt not only "tried" the mile, she won the mile. "I just remember being so happy after I won that race and to this day, I still credit coach Leong for getting me into distance,' stated Laurie.

Vogt ended up running the 880 yd. run, the mile, and the two mile in track that season and the first time she ever ran the two mile, she also took 1st place in that.
