KHS Student Council Raises \$500 For Hurricane Hugo Disaster Fund

In the aftermath of Hurricane Hugo, the Student Council organized a "disaster relief" fund-raiser in which they raised over \$500.00 which they donated to the Red Cross to help the hurricane victims.

The fund-raiser ran from Nov. 6th - 10th and each class was challenged to see how much they could raise. The only way they could earn points was by turning in pennies which counted as one point. The trick to the fund-raiser was other classes could put nickels, dimes, quarters, or dollars into into the value amount against that class. Kewaskum School District Policy For Emergency School Closings

District Administrator Dr. David Heather has released for publication the current policy to be utilized when school is to be called off.

As in past years, radio stations WBKV (West Bend), KFIZ (Fond du Lac), WHBL Sheboygan), and WTMJ (Milwaukee) will be used to announce school closings because of bad weather or other emergency situations. When school is being called off in the morning, the announcement will be on the air as early as possible. When school has begun but weather is bad, or turns bad, it is advised that parents, guardians and other responsible parties listen to one of the radio stations (Continued on Page 2)

Winter Parking The and Snow Restrictions Emergency Parking Restrictions go into effect on December

WINTER PARKING

1, 1989. Municipal Code Section 7.04(3) Night Parking Restrictions, reads as follows: Signs have been erected at or reasonably near the corporate limits as provided in Section 349.13, Wisconsin Statutes, no person excepting physicians or licensed emergency vehicles on emergency calls, shall park or stop any vehicle on any public

street or highway within the village between the hours of 2:00 A.M. and 6:00 A.M. from December 1, to April 1, of each year; provided that, notwithstanding such restrictions vehicles may be parked a period of time not longer than 3 minutes for actually loading or unloading of passengers, and provided further that no other regulation restricting parking as to place, time, or manner violated thereby.

State Land Grassfire Under Investigation

A grassfire which burned approximately 90 acres of stateowned land in the Jersey Flats area near New Prospect is still under investigation according to Walt Adams, Superintendent of the Kettle Moraine State Forest, Northern Unit.

Adams stated Tuesday

a mile north of the intersection of Highways G and SS. The fire then began burning its way north through the Jersey Flats.

Hahn said when his department arrived on the scene flames were shooting into the air taller than a barn. "We were lucky the fire dropped down into a low area as it burned," said Hahn, "that cut down the affect of the strong winds and allowed us to get the fire under control." Hahn said his biggest concern was that the fire would get across Highway G, and start burning up into the hills to the west. I received calls that the flames could be seen as far away as Campbellsport, noted Hahn. Several Kewaskum residents said they noticed the bright light in the sky in the north when the fire was at its peak. After the fire was extinguished firemen searched the area for clues as to what might have started the fire. We thought maybe it was a hunter's discarded cigarette or possibly some grass ignited when a hunter warmed up his car, said Hahn. We didn't find any tracks and it was very dark so the DNR decided to continue the investigation the next day, he noted. Firefighters were on the scene for approximately 11/2 hours.

ordinance is:

\$5.00 if paid within three (3) days of the issuance of the parking citation.

\$10.00 if paid after ten (10) days but before 28 days.

After 28 days, the amount is \$20.00 and a notice will be sent to the Motor Vehicle Department to suspend your vehicle registrations and refuse renewals until the citation is satisfied.

An important fact is the owner of the vehicle is responsible for the payment of the citation whether or not he was the operator.

Municipal Code Section 7.04 (4) Removal of Illegally Parked Vehicles. This section covers the issuance of citations to and possible removal of such vehicles in violation of this ordinance. In addition to other penalties provided by Section 7.04(6) of this code, the owner or operator of a vehicle so removed shall pay the cost of the towing and storage. 11-23-2t



75 Years Ago


Nov. 21, 1914

Indian Boys Win Opener

The Kewaskum Indians Boys' Basketball team used a couple of offensive spurts and some clutch free throw shooting in the second half to hold off a determined Slinger team Friday night, winning their season opener against the Owls, 63-59.

The Indians jumped out to a quick 11-0 lead, using an intense and scrappy defense which forced a couple of turnovers by the Owls.

Rich Radtke had the hot hand early in the going, hitting a couple of shots, but then picked up his second foul with about 3:00 left in the quarter.

Slinger used his absence to make a run of their own, scoring 11 unanswered points, after the Indians had taken a 14-1 lead to pull with 2, 14-12, at the end of the quarter. Scott Vespalec scored 11 of his game-high 23 points in the quarter to keep the Owls close.

The second quarter was a seesaw affair as Slinger forged ahead for a two-point lead early but that lead was quickly erased by a three-point play by Indian Steve Gerhartz. Gerhartz also got into foul trouble, however, and took a seat on the bench with over 5:00 to play in the half

Senior reserve center Chris Schmid took Gerhartz's place and reponded well, blocking a couple of shots and playing good overall defense. The two teams struggled offensively in the final minutes of the half, with neither taking a big lead, and the Indians held a slim 30-28 advantage at the half.

The second half started out as the first ended, sluggish.

Indian Freshmen Win; JVs Lose

The freshman boys' basketball team won their first game of the season with a 64-31 thrashing of Cedar Grove in a non-conference tilt. Jim Marx led the team with 16 points, while Matt Schlosser and Andy Dichert each had 8 points apiece and Adam Laatsch contributed 7 points.

The J.V. basketball team lost a tough one to Slinger Friday night, 76-61. The young Indians were down by only a single point at halftime, 36-35, but Slinger came out and put on a 12-4 run to start the second half, and Kewaskum never could

Turnovers were at a premium in the third quarter with 16 being overall, 10 by Slinger.

The Indians didn't cash in on the Owls' sloppy play, however, and Shinger snuck out to a 3-point advantage midway through the quarter. Sophomore Chad Cook hit a pair of free throws for the Indians to cut the lead to one, and then Gerhartz and Brian Leitheiser both hit a pair of free throws in the last :12 of the period to give the Indians a 45-42 cushion at the end of three quarters of play.

the fourth quarter, In Leitheiser and junior Mark Felix combined on a four-point play to give Kewaskum a 51-44 advantage. Another jumpshot by Leitheiser gave the Indians a ten-point lead, 55-45, with 4:54 to play.

The cushion wasn't large enough, however, as the Owls' Baugniet keyed a Larry comeback, getting a couple of layups off steals and bringing Slinger back to within 2, at Gerhartz answered 59-57. though, with a jumper to make it 61-57, and after a Slinger miss, Leitheiser was fouled intentionally and sealed the victory with a pair of free throws.

Vespalec finished with a game high 23 points to lead Slinger. Gerhartz led a balanced Indian attack with 19 points, while Radtke added 17 points, including 10 in the first half, and Leitheiser finished with 16 points, many of which came in the fourth quarter stretch that propelled the Indians to their first win of the year.


My father's career began on February 1, 1937, when he went to work for my grandfather at Schwartzburg Nash in Milwaukee, and he's been going strong ever since.

In late 1969, my father and I moved our dealership to West Bend, where we took over the former John Wicklund Oldsmobile dealership at 319 South Main St. In 1984 we moved to our new showroom at 2620 W. Washington St. and added the full line of Chevrolet cars and trucks. Recently we added the new GEO line to our growing dealership.

Times have changed dramatically in the car dealership business over the years, and we are pleased with the results. Government regulations have taken strict control over manufacturing procedures. Computerized engines, catalytic converters, and most recently the addition of air bags have changed the vehicles dramatically. And due to Japanese influence, American manufacturers have learned to be more competitive with quality and performance.

For Dad & I though, it has always been a business of people, service and committment. We would like to thank all our customers past and future for "Dealing with Schwartzburg".
