Dan Heisdorf Takes Second at State Tourney

Dan Heisdorf muscled his way into finals of the WIAA "Class B" State Wrestling Tournament, eventually emerging as the 152-lb runner

up in the UW Fieldhouse Saturday.

His efforts made Heisdorf the highest finisher in KHS history. In 1980 Scott Klein took third. Dan is also the first Indian to win 31 matches in one season. His final record stands at 31-4. (all four losses came from State Qualifiers). Heisdorf closed out his KHS career with a 92-21-3 mark.

Heisdorf dispatched Garth Tippery of Lodi in the opening round winning by a pin in 5:43. Tippery jumped to a 5-1 lead after a 0-0 first period. Heisdorf connected on a headlock, one of eight attempts, to put Tippery on his back for a five point play. The second period saw Heisdorf take a 6-5 lead. The lead changed again as Heisdorf was put on his back dropping behind

Heisdorf regained the lead by escaping and tossing Tippery for the final time, eventually pinning him.

In the second round Heisdorf

The complexion of this spring's Kewaskum Board of Education election changed this week when it became public that there will now be competition for the three terms which are expiring.

Janet Wolfenberg confirmed Tuesday that she will enter the race as a write-in candidate, challenging the three previously announced candidates whose names will appear on the April ballot. Those candidates include incumbents Ronald Beimborn and Ruth Schmitt and former school board member Clara Trapp. Trapp is hoping to


decided to take an active role in the education of my children and others. I would like to announce that I am campaigning as a write-in candidate for the school board election to be held in April.

Administrator Daniel S. Schmidt presented a tax collection update for 1989 indicating the village was ahead of last

On a motion by Trustee Robert Beisbier, seconded by Trustee Richard Schlice and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board approved the building permit application for Mary Ann and Kim Peterson, 202 Forest Avenue, Kewaskum, W1. The permit is for remodeling and an addition to the kitchen. The permit was approved by both the Zoning Administrator and the Building Inspector. The office was authorized to issue said permit after payment of proper fees.

Coroner Wesley Van Zanten of Sheboygan County said no motive could be found for the double killing and suicide except that the youth had been a victim of melancholia. Roland was well known as a reputable young man, of fine character and manners. Neighbors and friends looked to him as a perfect gentleman, one of the finest they had known, which fact leaves authorities at a loss as to the motive for his crime. After questioning relatives friends and authorities gathered that Roland had been moody recently and it is believed he had been brooding over some personal problem or trouble from which he became deranged. Little of the slayer's body, only part of the spine and some fingers were found in the ruins of the barn. Authorities, because of the location of the body, believe Roland, after killing his parents, climbed into the haymow and met his death there.

NOTICE OF REFERENDUM ELECTION APRIL 3, 1990

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that at an election to be held in the several towns, wards, villages and election districts of the State of Wisconsin, on the first Tuesday, of April, 1990, being the Third day of said month, the following proposed amendment to the Constitution of the State of Wisconsin, having been approved by two successive legislatures, will be submitted to a vote of the people pursuant to law:

QUESTION: "Partial veto of appropriation bills. Shall section 10 of article V of the constitution be revised, and shall an additional provision be created in that section, so that the governor's power to veto appropriation bills in part does not permit the creation of a new word formed by rejecting individual letters in the words of the bill passed by the legislature?"

This referendum is a result of 1989 Enrolled Joint Resolution 39, which was adopted by two successive legislatures. A copy of 1989 Enrolled Joint Resolution 39 can be obtained from the office of the county clerk, or the Legislative Documents Room in the State Capitol.

VOTING BY ABSENTEE BALLOT

Any qualified elector, unable to get to the polling place on election day for any reason, may ask to vote by absentee ballot. A qualified elector is a person who is a U.S. citizen, who will be 18 years of age or older on election day, who has resided in the ward or municipality where the person wishes to vote at least 10 days before the election. If the voter resides in a municipality which requires voter registration, then registration is also required for the voter to receive an absentee ballot.

To obtain an absentee ballot, the voter should contact the clerk of the city, village or town in which the voter resides. A written request must be made by the voter for the absentee ballot. If the voter contacts the clerk by telephone the clerk will send the application form to the voter. If the voter requests an absentee ballot by mail, a written request, signed by the voter which indicates that the voter resides within the municipality, will be honored. Written requests may be made beginning six months before the primary election. The deadline for receipt of the written request by mail is 5:00 p.m. on the Friday before the election. If the voter goes to the clerk's office to complete a written request, the request must be made no later than 5:00 p.m. on the day before the election.

the absentee voter resides in a nursing home, the absentee ballot will be livered to the nursing home by two special voting deputies appointed by the nicipal clerk. The special voting deputies will present the absentee ballot the voter and provide assistance in marking or punching the ballot if cessary. At the request of an absentee voter a relative may provide the sistance. After voting at the nursing home is completed, the special voting puties will return the absentee ballot to the municipal clerk.

Hith two exceptions, the voter who wants to cast an absentee ballot, must make a separate written request before each election. If a voter is indefinitely confined to his or her home or a care facility because of illness, age, or disability, the voter need not make a request before each election. There is a special statement on the application form which is provided by the municipal clerk which can be completed asking that an absentee ballot be automatically mailed to the indefinitely confined or military voter before each election. If the voter fails to vote and return the ballot sent to the voter, a separate written request for the next election must be made before the voter can obtain a ballot.

A voter who is hospitalized on election day may obtain an absentee ballot by designating another person as the agent for the voter. There is a statement on the application form for this purpose. An application by agent for a hospitalized elector may be made in person at the municipal clerk's office no earlier than 7 days before the election and no later than 5:00 p.m. on the day of the election.

If a voter requests an absentee hallot stating the reason that he or she is a sequestered juror, the application can be made no earlier than 7 days before the election, and no later than 5:00 p.m. on the day of the election. If the application from a sequestered juror is received by the municipal clerk after 5:00 p.m. on the Friday immediately preceding the election, the municipal clerk or the clerk's agent will deliver the absentee ballot to the court and the judge will call a recess to allow the voter to cast his or her vote.

The municipal clerk will send the absentee ballot to the voter once the request is received and the ballots are prepared. Absentee ballots are available twenty-one (21) days before the spring primary and spring election. The municipal clerk keeps a public record of all individuals requesting an absentee ballot indicating when the ballot is requested, sent, and returned to the municipal clerk.

An absentee ballot can be voted at home any time after it is received in the mail. An absentee ballot can also be voted in the clerk's office if the voter appears in person and fills out the written request. The voter should make sure that the certificate—affidavit is properly completed and witnesses by two persons. The voter and the witnesses must sign the certificate on the absentee ballot carrier envelope. If the absentee elector receives assistance in marking the ballot, the person providing the assistance must sign the statement on the back of the ballot which provides that the person giving assistance marked the ballot as directed by the absentee voter. The municipal clerk will make sure that the certificate—affidavit is properly completed by the voter when the absentee ballot is voted in the clerk's office.

The completed absentee ballot must be in the possession of the issuing municipal clerk in time for the clerk to deliver the ballot before the polls close on election day. Voted absentee ballots may be delivered in person to the municipal clerk. Any absentee ballot received after the polls close or any absentee ballot where the certificate-affidavit is not properly completed cannot be counted.




McNamara led the Huskies with 16 points, while Ann Lautenschlaeger added 13 points, including a pair of three-pointers to pace the New Holstein attack.

Both teams will travel to Brown Deer High School (8060 North 60th Street) to compete at 7:30 p.m. to determine Saturday's sectional finalists.


