Village to Eliminate Aging Lift Station

On the recommendation of the Water Pollution Control Department, the Kewaskum Village Board Monday night, voted to eliminate an aging sewage lift station located at the north end of Reigle Drive.

Both Administrator Dan Schmidt and Water Pollution Control Superintendent Peter Albers agreed the cost to remove the lift station, which is in need of major repairs, would pay for itself in two years. Schmidt told the trustees the annual cost to operate that station ran about \$3,000 a year.

Albers told the board removal of the old lift station and the installation of a lateral line to the new lift station recently completed, will also increase that unit's operating efficiency.

In other action the board approved building permits for the construction of two new homes, one at 459 Knights Avenue and the other at 1121 Edgewood Road.

The trustees also approved a Class 'A' liquor license for Kuehl's Suds & Spirits at 355 Main Street (formerly J-N Liquor) and two operators licenses to Linda M. Thorn and Kimberly Gaffke.

Both Schmidt and Police Chief Richard Knoebel indicated they have no legal objection to issuing Gaffke a

bartender's license, however, they did have some serious concern in issuing the license. "Having an 18-year-old tending bar is a bad situation," said Knoebel. "When a person this age is tending bar with adults can they realize when to cut them off and be able to handle the situation? This individual just turned 18 a month ago and is still in high school," said Knoebel.

Knoebel said he would like to see the board adopt a resolution to the state legislators that this situation be changed. He noted there should be uniformity in the laws. "If they're not old enough to drink," he said, "they should also be considered not old enough to serve drinks."

Knoebel also advised the board that his department has applied for a grant, through the schools, to participate in the DARE drug awareness program. The program is directed at the fifth grade students. He said an officer would be running four 17-hour classes, two at the elementary school, one at St. Lucas and one at Holy Trinity. A Washington County Sheriff's Department officer would be running courses for the two outlying elementary schools.

In other business the board approved the signing of a 1990 agreement with the Kewaskum Softball Association for the use

of the Kiwanis Park northeast diamond and concession building. As part of the agreement, the trustees decided that it should be the village's responsibility to relocate the diamond's scoreboard to a new location closer to the third base side of the field, to insure the work was done promptly and correctly. The board also approved the installation of fencing along the third base line. The village already has the materials on hand and the cost of \$780 will cover labor and the drilling of some post holes.

The board gave Schmidt authorization to purchase fireworks for the July 3, 1990, celebration at a cost of \$2,135, and to advertise for bids on this year's asphalt repair projects.

Chief Knoebel also reminded the board that this is National Tornado Awareness Week and, beginning this month, the sirens will be tested on the first Thursday of every month during the tornado season.

Early Returns Show Beimborn, Schmitt, Wolfenberg Winners In School Board Race

Although one of the Kewaskum School District's townships has not reported in its count, early figures show incumbents Ronald Beimborn and Ruth Schmitt were successful in their bids for re-election to the Kewaskum Board of Education.

Janet Wolfenberg, a last-minute write-in candidate, has apparently defeated former school board member Clara Trapp in her

bid to return to the board. The third vacancy on the board is that of Donald Nowak who did not seek re-election.

Unofficial counts show Beimborn receiving 1,184 votes, Schmitt 1,158, Wolfenberg 885 and Trapp 445.

Vote counts reported for all the elections are unofficial and they will be formally verified by a Board of Canvassers.

AFS Student Dalvani Marques Released From Hospital, Returns Home to Brazil

Kewaskum's American Field Service exchange student from Brazil, Dalvani Marques, returned to her home last Thursday, March 29, cutting her academic year short after a serious sledding accident in January 4 left her hospitalized for almost three months.

Dalvani, a guest of the Agnes Fellenz family, was accompanied home by her sister, Davina Cavalcante and her mother Anna, both of whom arrived in America a few days after the accident and have remained since, staying at the Ronald McDonald House, across from the Milwaukee County Medical Complex.

Classmates, teachers, and the Kewaskum community have been supportive of Marques, age 19, and donations were directed to giving units of blood in her name and monetary contributions to the Ronald McDonald House.

Marques, at 5 feet 10", enjoyed playing basketball, as a center for the Kewaskum girl's team and attended half the

games before her season abruptly ended. She is expected to fully recover, although her extended hospital stay has left her in a weakened state with physical therapy required to regain complete use of her legs.

Before her departure, Dalvani visited Kewaskum High, to say goodbye to all her friends. Teachers and classmates presented her with gifts and homemade signs. One of her favorite momentos was a basketball signed by her teammates and coach, painted the school's colors of green and white.

On April 5th the Adult Chapter of Kewaskum's AFS held a chili supper to celebrate her hospital release, and her return home, and as a fundraiser to help curtail some of the additional costs that have accumulated during Dalvani's recovery. It was hoped she and her family could have attended, but instead photos were displayed as a reminder of Dalvani Marques's stay in Kewaskum.

Williams, McElhatton, Gavin Elected To Village Board

Unofficial totals Wednesday morning, show incumbents Larry Williams and Tom McElhatton were successful in retaining their posts on the Kewaskum Village Board.

Williams was the top votegetter with 436, followed by McElhatton 342. Challenger Gary Gavin pulled out a narrow victory over another newcomer to the political arena Joseph Gitter. By a margin of 16 votes, 295 to 279, Gavin won the trusteeship being vacated by retiring board member Richard Schlice.

On the county level, West Bend

attorney Lawrence Waddick defeated his opponent Washington County District Attorney J. Dennis Thornton, 6,997 to 6,627, to win the post of Washington County Circuit Court Judge, Branch One. Waddick will replace retiring Judge J. Tom Merriam.

Statewide, figures show voters approving an amendment which will limit the veto powers of the governor. Early figures show the amendment being passed by slightly less than a two-to-one margin.



Fog Blamed for Series of Accidents

Drivers in two separate Washington County accidents Saturday morning found themselves in the ditch apparently as the result of poor visibility due to last Saturday morning's heavy fog.

A spokesperson for the Washington County Sheriff's Department said records on the first incident, which occurred at 7:00 a.m., were not complete and no driver had been listed for the vehicle. The vehicle was westbound on Highway H, when it went through the stop sign at Hwy. H and 45, crossing the highway and ending up in the ditch in front of Struebing Electric.

An hour later, at 8:05 a.m., a second vehicle driven by Kenneth Sargent of 2342 Brazelton Drive, Adell, repeated the scenario. According to the Sheriff's Department, Sargent also failed to stop for the stop sign, also crossing Hwy 45, striking a sign

and ending up in the ditch in almost the same spot of the first accident. According to the report, Kelly Sargent 9, Keith Sargent 11, and Kevin Sargent 13, passengers in the Sargent vehicle, all suffered unspecified injuries.

At 9:25 a.m., a third accident occurred this time at the intersection of Auburn-Ashford Drive and Highway 45, in Fond du Lac County.

According to the Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Department, James L. Pfantz, 40, of 1511 Highway 45, Campbellsport, was traveling south on Hwy. 45, when he swerved to avoid hitting a truck driven by Dean Ratajczak of Oostburg. According to the release Pfantz said Ratajczak failed to stop for the stop sign. Ratajczak told officers he tried to stop for the sign but was not able to do so quickly enough.

In swerving to avoid the collision, Pfantz lost control of his truck which went off the west side of Hwy. 45 and then

back onto the road before rolling over.

Both Pfantz and a passenger in his vehicle, Jacklin A. Lorrigan, 38, of 1511 Hwy. 45, were wearing seatbelts at the time of the accident. Pfantz and Lorrigan suffered head and trunk injuries and were transported to St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend, for treatment.

Fog was again listed as a contributing factor in the accident.

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

GUM DISEASE



Dan Stoffel Participates in National Extension Seminar

Washington County Supervisor Dan Stoffel of Kewaskum was among 15 Wisconsin delegates who participated in a three-day national seminar on Extension in Washington, D.C. Stoffel, a member of the County Board's Agriculture and Extension Education Committee, represented the Wisconsin Associated County Extension Committees.

"The seminar was an important opportunity for citizens from all states to help shape the national agenda for Extension in the 1990s," Stoffel said.

According to Stoffel, delegates were asked to identify the top priorities for Extension programs in the 1990s during 16 town meetings held the first morning of the seminar. The top five priorities from all 16 meetings were then compiled into one report presented to the entire seminar that afternoon.

The top five national priorities identified were: environmental education, families and youth-at-risk, community economic revitalization, food safety, and the future of agriculture. Within each priority, delegates listed specific programs they felt Extension should address.

"I was impressed by the common interests all delegates to the seminar shared in the future of Extension," Stoffel said. "We all believe that Extension is an important educational resource in our states and that it can help people address some very serious problems."

Stoffel said that water quality, solid waste management and recycling, air quality, protection of open space and agricultural lands, and preservation of natural resources were the specific program initiatives identified with the first priority on environmental education.

University of Wisconsin - Extension Chancellor Patrick G. Boyle also attended the seminar and was equally impressed by the final report.

"Wisconsin has placed a priority on a diverse Extension program," Boyle said. "We have been building program priorities very similar to those identified by the lay leaders, and their support at this seminar has helped by encouraging financial and staff investments in these programs."

On the seminar's second day, delegates met with members of the Wisconsin Congressional delegation. Stoffel met with Representatives Jim Sensenbrenner, Jim Moody and Bob Kastenmeier.

"We wanted to let our representatives know that federal Extension funds are important to us in Washington County and throughout the state," Stoffel explained. "While Extension is a small part of the overall budget, federal funds support a very relevant and innovative educational system which cannot be duplicated by any other federal, state or local agency."

The 1990 National Lay Leaders Seminar, co-sponsored by the National Association of Land-Grant Universities and the state Cooperative Extension Services, was held from March 11-13. Over 400 delegates from 35 states attended the seminar. In addition to the eleven

delegates from the Wisconsin Associated County Extension Committees, Wisconsin was also represented by delegates from the Wisconsin 4-H Adult Leaders Council and the Wisconsin Extension Homemakers Council.

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


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KES Students Learn Reading is Important



The Village Board and the Library Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in Special Joint Session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

President Paul Blumer presided. Trustee Larry Williams asked to be excused and was absent, all other Trustee Members were present as well as all of the Library Board Members.

Discussion regarding non-compliance of the Kewaskum Public Library with regard to the certification of the Library Director was held. It was noted the village received the letter on February 22, 1990 and that Mrs. Hlavaty received the letter as well. Mrs. Hlavaty stated she was aware of this action dating back to early last fall and indicated the system had informed the Library Directors in December that such a letter was being prepared and would be mailed.

Mrs. Hlavaty was then asked what her current level of education was.

Mrs. Hlavaty indicated she had a high school education and that she had some continuing education credits to renew her A 50 certificate. She indicated she had taken one course at the University last fall which should apply toward the two year requirement. She also indicated she was not enrolled in any course at present.

The boards then discussed the matter of staying in the system or accepting the expulsion. After reviewing what would be lost to the taxpayers and the possible increase in cost, it was the consensus to remain in the system. On a motion by Trustee Thomas McElhatton, seconded by Trustee Mary Krueger and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Boards moved to stay in the system and meet the state requirements.

Options regarding meeting the compliance were discussed: The first was to try and bring Mrs. Hlavaty into compliance. The second would be to recruit a new Library Director.

The first option regarding Mrs. Hlavaty acquiring the needed two years of education were discussed. The Boards indicated that she should check into the matter to see what she would need, the time involved and the personal cost to her for such action. Mrs. Hlavaty is to get back to the Boards as soon as possible so if recruitment is necessary they can proceed.

Mrs. Hlavaty asked what would hap-

pen to her if she was unable to remain as Library Director. She followed up by adding she would be willing to serve as an Assistant Librarian. The Board has no policy or prior practice regarding such an instance, but would take into account all aspects of the situation.

It was noted a joint meeting would be scheduled as soon as additional information is available.

On a motion by Trustee Thomas McElhatton, seconded by Trustee Richard Schlice and unanimously carried by voice vote, the board approved the building permit for Thomas Johann to construct (move in) a detached garage at 509 Main Street, Kewaskum, WI upon proper payment of fees. It was noted a picture of the garage was brought in and that Mr. Johann had made the arrangements for the moving of the garage for Saturday, March 31, 1990. It was also noted the building permit was approved by both the Building Inspector and Zoning Administrator.

In a motion by Trustee Mary Krueger, seconded by Trustee Thomas McElhatton to adjourn. Roll call vote was 10 "Aye," 0 "Nay," 1 "Absent". The motion was carried by the majority.



Farmland Preservation Tax Credit

It's Tax Time again. Farm families tax professionals are busy trying to meet the deadlines for filing of income taxes.

Each year at tax time a number of questions are raised about the Wisconsin Farmland Preservation Tax Credit Program. It's very complex program that has had a number of changes since it's beginning in 1977. The situation has become even more complex in Washington county with recent changes in the legislation to allow land owners to apply for farmland preservation agreement.

Farmland owners in townships that had exclusive agricultural zoning become eligible for the program if their land is owned as exclusive agriculture. Exclusive agriculture zoning has been initiated in the townships of Kewaskum, Barton, Trenton, Hartford, Richfield and the Village of Germantown. Land owners in those townships need to go to their town zoning authority and obtain a zoning certificate verifying that their land is in the exclusive agricultural zone.

Land owners in the remaining townships need to have a farmland preservation agreement in order to be eligible for the tax credit program. Land owners commit their land to agriculture use by signing an agreement with the State of Wisconsin not to develop their land. Land owners that wish to obtain tax credit for the 1990 tax year need to make application for a Farmland Preservation

agreement by June 30, 1990. Application forms are available at the office of the County Clerk, located at the Washington County Court House.

The amount of tax credit varies with the amount of property tax paid and the household income of farm family. Basically the higher the property taxes and the lower the income the greater the amount of tax credit.

Most tax payers have as a goal to pay the lowest amount of tax that is required and make use of any tax credits that may be available. This is a good time of the year to think about programs such as a Farmland Preservation program and how it may effect your tax liability and your farming business. Land owners or tax professionals that are interested in more information about the Farmland Preservation program can contact the Washington County Extension Office.

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

County United Way to Discontinue Funding for Planned Parenthood, Friends for Life in 1991

The Board of Directors of the United Way of Washington County has voted to discontinue funding Planned Parenthood and Friends for Life beginning in 1991.

"United Way's support of these two agencies is controversial and donor concern has been growing — especially in the last year." So said Daniel A. Holtan, United Way Board President.

The vote was taken at a special meeting of the United Way Board of Directors. Both agencies made presentations prior to the vote, detailing their services.

"We recognize the educational services they provide but unfortunately, the public only focuses on the abortion issue," he said. "By dropping both agencies, we are not taking a stand one way or the other on the pro-life or pro-choice issue. We're giving these two agencies the

opportunity to seek other funding for 1991."

1990 funding for the two agencies is not in jeopardy. "We raised funds in 1989 on the premise that both would be funded in 1990, and we will honor that commitment," said Holtan.

The most recent campaign raised \$629,000 in seven communities. Of this, Planned Parenthood receives \$9,000 from United Way, 1.8% of 1989 funds raised. Friends for Life receives \$4,800 from United Way, 1% of 1989 United Way funds raised.

There are 2,300 local United Ways in the United States; of these, less than 40 fund Planned Parenthood.

"The lines are drawn on both sides of the issue in the courts, state governments, and even families," Holtan said. "United Way's mission is to provide funding for many different community services. However,

in doing so we should not take sides or be in the middle of social or political issues that divide the community."

The services of both agencies were acknowledged, but the mandate of the Board is that they seek funding elsewhere.

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Annual Spring Conservation Rule Hearings April 23

MADISON, WI — Wisconsin citizens are encouraged to attend the annual conservation rules hearings conducted by the Department of Natural Resources on Monday, April 23 at 7 p.m. in each county.

The hearings offer people an opportunity to discuss and vote on fishing and hunting rules changes being considered by the department. Advisory questions from the department and the Wisconsin Conservation Congress will also be discussed and voted on. Department personnel will be at each location to answer questions.

The hearings also provide a forum for the election of county delegates to the Wisconsin Conservation Congress. The Congress serves as a citizens advisory group to the state Natural Resources Board. Eligible candidates include any adult county resident who is not employed by the DNR or is not a member of the Natural Resources Board.

Some of the proposed rule changes and advisory questions

to be voted on at the April 23 hearings include:

- * Making state law consistent with federal law that makes it illegal to attempt to take in excess of the daily bag limit;

- * Establishing a new eastern ruffed grouse management zone with a season concurrent with the pheasant season;

- * Changing the amount and types of bait used by archery hunters and requiring bait hunters to have a valid bear harvest or archery deer tag;

- * Eliminating the bear dog permit;

- * Restricting the shooting of depredating birds to normal hunting hours;

- * Establishing pheasant management zones and restricting hen hunting in some public hunting areas;

- * Reducing the number of time zones for gun deer hunting from six to two;

- * Restoring the 2-day either sex followed by 7-day buck only deer season in units 74A and 74B, and subdividing units 49 and 51 into two new units;

- * Prohibiting the hunting of other animals during the spring wild turkey hunting hours;

- * Increasing the minimum size limit for lake sturgeon taken by hook and line to 50

inches in all waters of the state; and

- * Increasing the minimum size limit of muskellunge to 40 inches on 10 lakes in seven counties.


Besides the head instructors Jon and Joe Sanfilippo this is

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Indian Girls Finish 2nd, Boys Last in Washington County Indoor Track Meet

WEST BEND — The defending co-champion Kewaskum girls track team couldn't repeat its first-place finish of a year ago, but finished second to powerful West Bend West and Rebecca Butt in the Bob Bull Washington County Indoor Track meet held here, last Thursday.

The Indian boys, who were dominated by New Holstein in their first dual meet of the year, finished last among the six boys' teams participating in the meet.

The Indian girls received some fine individual performances from key runners in accumulating a point total of 100, 31 points behind the champion Spartans.

Heading that list was Kristi Lubahn and Melissa Braun. The pair finished 1-2 in the 50 yard dash, with Lubahn's winning effort being a 6.6. The two, combined with Shelley Kasseckert and Rachel Zuelhke, also brought home a second place finish in the 4-lap relay. Braun capped off her day by winning the 213-yard dash with a time of 27.6 seconds.

Her winning height in the high jump (5'8") set a new county indoor record, while her time in the 50 yd. hurdle preliminaries of 6.9 seconds, also set a new county record.

License Requirement for Turkey Hunting

Questions on the upcoming turkey season are beginning to come in. A few have to do with license requirements for the hunt.

First of all, to apply for a turkey hunting permit a valid Sports, Small Game, Senior Citizen Recreation Card, Conservation Patrons Card, first year Wis. Hunter Education Certificate or Archers license was required. All of these licenses are valid until at least August 31, 1990. Most applicants applied for the permit on a Sports or Small Game Hunting License. This would allow for the hunting of turkeys with a shotgun or a bow as would the Senior Citizen Recreation Card, Conservation Patrons Card and a first year Wis. Hunter Education Certificate. An applicant that applied with an Archers License must hunt with a bow, unless he or she possesses one of the other licenses. Only then may a gun be used.

Several unsuccessful applicants have also been wondering if they can call for or assist a successful applicant who has a permit. The answer is "Yes" as long as they have a valid hunting license for hunting turkeys. A turkey stamp is not needed.

A license is not required for observing, taking photo's or other non-hunting activities.

Finally, a signed and attached 1989-90 Turkey Stamp (\$13.75) is required for the Spring 1990 Turkey Hunt. The 1990-91 Turkey Stamp will be issued Sept. 1, 1990 at a cost of \$5.25 and will be required for the 1990 Fall Hunt, in zones open, and the 1991 Spring Hunt. Senior Citizen Recreation Card holders, along with first year Wis. Hunter Education Course Graduates and Military Licensee do not need this stamp.

Spring Turkey Hunting Season Opens April 11

MADISON, WI — Wisconsin's 1990 spring wild turkey hunting season opens Wednesday, April 11, reminds Ed Frank Department of Natural Resources turkey season coordinator.

The spring 1990 season has six hunting periods: April 11 - 15, April 18 - 22, April 25 - 29, May 2 - 6, May 9 - 13 and May 16 - 20. More than 30,000 permits were issued for 19 separate hunting zones, including three new zones. The department received 32,918 applications for turkey hunting permits. In the spring of 1989, there were 33,080 applications for the 21,280 available permits. Hunters bagged 4,406 turkeys during the Spring 1989 season and 1,570 turkeys during Fall 1989, which was Wisconsin's first fall turkey hunt.

Fifty-four turkey registration stations are located throughout the 19 hunting zones.

Turkey hunting is allowed by permit only. A current 1989-90 Wisconsin Wild Turkey Stamp is also required; the stamp must be signed across the face and attached to the hunting license. Only bearded or male turkeys are legal to shoot; they must be registered by 1:30 p.m. on the same day they're bagged.

Application deadline for permits for the Fall season is Friday, Aug. 10, 1990.


