A Victory for KMS Parents

Board Approves Two Staffing Positions for Middle School

For the past few months, Middle Kewaskum School parents and Principal David Jones have been waging a series of losing battles to add two positions to the school's staff and reinstate the house plan. After some discussion, parents attending Monday night's school board meeting heard the vote that signaled they had finally won the war.

After Jones' presentation that the added staff would not only help re-institute and expanded the house plan but would aid dramatically program to provide tutorial assistance to all the students, the board voted 4-3, to add the positions for the 1990-91 school

In stating his case again, Jones noted that by definition, the school did not have any "Children At Risk," however there was a large number of students who were academically in that category. Jones said his present temporary remedy to help these students was tutorial sessions during lunch hour and the institution of a 9th hour for about four students. It is a negative approach to the problem, said Jones, but at least we are getting them some help. Jones said he presently has one student who had received a grade of F, in all seven classes

While Jones noted he was not using these students as leverage to force the board to approve the request, he indicated the additions would help tremendously in improving middle school's total programming.

Board member Ankerson again noted his opposition to the request by commenting, "Are we, in fact, in violation of state mandates to provide these services students?" He At-Risk wondered if this was a way of intimidating the board by suggesting it was in violation of state laws

School District Administrator David Heather said he could not, at this time answer that accurately, indicating he would have to wait for the receipt of the district's formal curriculum audit report which he expected later this week.

The DPI mandates an At-Risk program be in place starting at the fifth grade level, said Heather. We do not have such a program in place at this time, noted Heather, however, we

also do not know if some of our students officially fall into that category

indicated that the Jones added staffing would also allow for the expansion of the computer literacy course and industrial general arts program.

Paul Seymour, Chairman of the Finance - Transportation -Buildings and Grounds Committee, updated the board regarding the repair and lowering of ceiling in the three-story portion Kewaskum Elementary School.

Before making any major repairs, noted Seymour, we would like to have a complete inspection of the building to determine it is in sound condition.

Seymour said he had no question as to the building's soundness and felt it would receive a good report. He recommended the board consider hiring an engineering firm to draw up repair specification and seek bids. One thing we will have to decide is, are we going to do this room by room, floor by floor, or can we do this all at once He suggested the work also include energy efficient lighting and insulation to aid in lowering operating costs.

Board member Ankerson indicated he was in general agreement with Seymour's comments. He did, however, recommend that when the district does seek bids, they be broken down into phases which would help the board determine how much, if not all, of the work could be done at one



March Winds, April Showers and May Snowstorms?



Schulte Critical of Quest Program

John Schulte, a member of the Kewaskum Board of Education, expressed his concern during Monday night's school board meeting regarding the 'Quest' program which has been presented the Kewaskum Middle School for the past four years. In a memo addressed to his fellow board members and anyone else concerned, Schulte stated, "As for the Quest Program, specifically - I believe it to be counterproductive and that it severely undermines a majority of families values. It is a means social change/behavior modification that is anything but healthy for our community and society as a whole.'

Schulte questioned whether the program, sponsored nationally and locally by the Lions Clubs, was beneficial or detrimental to the district's students.

Schulte's personal opinion appeared to be, rather than teaching youngsters to stay away from alcohoi and drugs, the programs instead, merely opened the door to more questions and experimentation. Schulte also said, from his own daughter's experience in the program, decisions arrived at during discussions by the students were that it was "all right to lie.

KMS teachers Linda Bastable and William Wuebben, who conduct the nine-week program, told Schulte they only use portions of the program which they feel are applicable and work into their overall teaching programs for facing the issues of adolescence, self awareness and problems and pressures related to drug and alcohol abuse in today's society.

Bastable told those attending the meeting she had received good comments regarding the program. Over 80% of the parents who attended the parent seminars, which are a part of the program, answered questionaires and rated it good to excellent.

Bastable also told Schulte she was somewhat upset by his frequent referrals to class activities and discussions as

Schulte's comment that she and the program condoned lying, Bastable indicated that was not correct. If anything, it was a hypothetical situation, she noted. A student is pressed by some of his friends student to go out and drink. The student knows it is wrong and doesn't want to go. Instead of just saying no, the student says his parents won't let him go out that night. For a particular student, they may feel that is the best way to handle and solve a difficult situation. I wouldn't consider that condoning lying, she noted.

Bastable noted she was distressed by Schulte's criticism of how Kewaskum's program was being run especially since he was one of the few parents who had not attended the Quest seminar when his daughter was in the program.

Schulte then questioned the materials and methods used by Wuebben to address drug and alcohol abuse in his Health classes. Wuebben told Schulte that while he used some information from a section of the Quest program, most of his

therapy sessions. As for data and facts came from the Department Instruction. I also have guest speakers come in and address the students, he said. Wuebben then asked Schulte if he had actually looked at and was familiar with the course curriculum set up for the class. While Schulte would not actually admit he had not looked at the curriculum, he did admit he was not familiar with its actual content.

Schulte held up several articles which he said confirmed his opinion and the fact that the Quest program was not working and should not be used, especially on children. Connie Strand, the district's curriculum coordinator, told Schulte they could trade reports and articles, pro and con, all evening long and nothing would be accomplished. She suggested and that if Mr. Schulte felt so strongly about this issue, it would be better served if he met with herself, Mrs. Bastable, Mr. Wuebben and the Human Growth and Development Committee, where his concerns could be addressed in greater depth

Wisconsin Tourism Week May 13-19

Tourism is big business in the 1990s. In Wisconsin a recent study indicates that tourism was a \$5.4 billion dollar business in 1989 and 44 percent of that was generated in the months of June, July and August. The tourism industry also provides more than 114,000 full time jobs in the state. In recognition of this growth of the tourism industry in the state, the week of May 13-19 is declared Wisconsin Tourism Week.

In Washington County, the Washington County Tourism Council has just released a study on tourism. Based on a survey of local businesses, the Wisconsin Bell Economic Development Study contains conclusions and recommendations for businesses in the county and for the Tourism Council. The survey was provided by Wisconsin Bell as a service to the community.

Over 400 surveys were mailed to tourism related businesses including dining, lodging, selected retail and entertainment throughout the county. The responding 123 businesses reported a total of 1,815 jobs. Forty percent of the businesses were established since 1981, over half are corporations and own their building. Ninety-six percent of the respondents feel more tourists should be encouraged to come to the area, and most agree tourism is good for business and the community.

As a result of the study, the Washington County Tourism Council will be expanding their role to encourage coordination and cooperation in the tourism promotion area. "One of the primary activities will be to develop a countywide tourism marketing plan," stated Dennis Bandle, Tourism Council President. The marketing plan would include a review of the existing logo, encouraging joint advertising, and improving our coordination with the state's promotional activities

Bandle also indicated that the Tourism Council wants to work with local businesses to provide informational resources and assist all businesses to provide the best possible service to our visitors making them feel welcome.

As the tourism industry grows, trends are apparent; and Washington County is in a prime position to capitalize on this. One major trend is families taking shorter vacations that are closer to home. "For this county, where

many of our visitors are from the Milwaukee and Chicago area, this is good news," according to Marcia Theusch, the Economic Development Director for the County. "This offers a great op-portunity for the local businesses and attractions.

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

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New Holstein Sweeps Conference Relays; Indian Girls Place Second

SHEBOYGAN FALLS Known over the years as a power in track and field. New Holstein backed up its claim as the best, or at least the deepest, in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference Relays held last

The boys team piled up 114 points on its way to the team title, edging Sheboygan Falls (106). Third was Chilton (61). followed by Plymouth (59), Two Rivers (45.5), Kiel (25) and Kewaskum, who had 20.5.

The girls meet was much however, as New Holstein won it with 95, just squeaking by the Indians, who were second with 93. After that it was Chilton (57), Two Rivers (54). Plymouth (53.5). Sheboygan Falls (53), and Kiel (25.5).

The Indian girls piled up five first place finishes to go along with four seconds. It wouldn't be enough against the evertough Huskies however. Even though New Holstein had just four firsts and three seconds, it backed that up with four thirds and three more fourths to outdo the Indians. Totaled, it meant that the Huskies finished fourth or better in 14 of the 15 events.

'We knew we'd be right up there," Indian head coach Perry Koth said of his team's finish. "It's hard to predict how a team

is going to do." Kewaskum got first place finishes out of its 400, 800, 1600, and sprint medley relay teams, at least proving that the Indians had the fastest runners in the meet. The 400 relay, consisting of Melissa Braun, Kelly Korth, Tina Schwartz and Rachel Gosa, came across the tape in 55.5 just ahead of Chilton's 55.7.

The 800 relay, meanwhile, had a little bit easier time of things. The foursome of Braun, Korth, Schwartz and Kristi Lubahn finished in 1:55.3, more than three seconds ahead of

The 1600 relay was not to be outdone. "They really had a great time," Koth said of Lubahn, Laurie Vogt, Nicole Doherty, and Rachelle Zuehlke. who crossed the finish line in 4:20.5. "They won easily...were way out in front," as evidenced by the six-second differential between them and Holstein.

The spring medley, a race with the competitors running different distances, was won by Kewaskum's Lubahn (200 meters), Gosa (100), Braun (100), and Zuehlke (400) in

Kewaskum's other first place came in the high jump competition, an event the Indians are quite deep in. Pam Osterbrink, Ingrid Ankerson, and Adrea Fleiss teamed up to jump 14'2", with Osterbrink leading the way with a 5'2" mark, once again tying the school record she already co-holds.

Three of the Indians' seconds came in the field events. The long jump team of Tammy Michaels (14'10''), Terri Vogt (14'6''), and Korth (13'11.75") combined for 43'3.75", while the triple jump trio of Fleiss (31'2"), Ankerson (31'0") and Michaels (30'.25'') was just two feet short of New Holstein's winning total.

The discus team (Tina Weddig, Robyn Winninghoff, and Lora Delcore) put up a good battle against the Huskies as

well, before settling for second. Weddig's throw of 114'6" led the group. "She's throwing real well right now," Koth said of the senior Weddig.

The Indians' other second came in the distance medley, where Doherty, Terry Vogt, Schwartz and Laurie Vogt teamed up for a 4:49.0 finish, earning a solid second.

A third was recorded by the 300 hurdle shuttle team (:58.24), while the shot put team took fourth (91'8") and the 900 hurdle team sixth

"That's twice now that they've nipped us," Koth said of the New Holstein squad, referring to just three days earlier, when the Huskies beat the Indians by a single point in a triangular. "They're the school to beat.

While the Indian girls have their sights set on the top spot in Thursday's conference meet at Chilton, the Indians' boys team will be doing its best just to challenge the middle of the pack. In the relays, though, the Indians, hurt by a lack of numbers this year, struggled and eventually wound up last.

The Indians did get some nice performances out of some individuals, however. KEWASKUM - At the time, it didn't seem so significant. It was still early in the triangular track meet here, last Tuesday. The 400 meter dash had just been completed and Kewaskum's Nicole Doherty apparently had finished third, just ahead of New Holstein's Flynn. But, after a conference between the timers, it was decided that Flynn had actually edged Doherty.

That little flip-flop of places turned out to be the deciding factor in the meet, however with 71 and Sheboygan Falls 24. The one point difference in the standing equalled the one point difference between third and fourth place.

"Nicole thought she had finished third," Indian head coach Perry Koth said, although

he was disappointed in the final outcome, had no bitter feelings about the situation, adding those things happen, and there's nothing you can do about it.

"That was pretty typical of Koth said of his senior ace. "She's a very compettive person, and that's the first race this year that somebody's really pushed her.

Lubahn also teamed with Braun on the winning 800 relay, joining Tina Schwartz and Kelly Korth on the first place team. Lubahn won the 300 hurdles as well, this one with east as she crossed 49.0.

Schwartz and Korth teamed up with Gosa and Stacey Heberer to pull out a win in the 400 meter relay as well, running a 55.4. Korth added another first in the long jump, joining 14'1". Zuehlke took the top spot in that controversial 400 dash. winning in 1:05.6. Gosa, who has shown steady improvement all year, added a second in the 100 meter dash, finishing right behind Braun in 14.1.

"Her times have come down considerably," Koth said of Gosa. "She's one of our top three sprinters (along with Braun and Lubahn) now. She's just been really steady all

Kewaskum's only other first came in the high jump, where Pam Osterbrink went 5'2" to tie her own school record. Osterbrink tried to clear 5'3" to set a new record, but "she just barely knocked it off," according to Koth. "She's right there though," he added.

Not far behind Osterbrink was Ingrid Ankerson, who cleared 4'10", which was good enough to take second in the event. Ankerson was also the Indians' top finisher in the triple jump, leaping 30'10" good enough for third.

Laurie Vogt also had a second and a third place finish. Vogt placed second in the 800 run (2:41.3), and third in the 1600 'run (5:58.9).

In the 100 hurdles, Jessica Rohrer (18.6) and Joy Castro (19.2) finished 3-4, respectively, while in the shot put, Lora Delcore and Tina Weddig also placed 3-4. Weddig though, took second in the discus, throwing 111'7", while Delcore was fourth with 89'4.5.

Shelley Kasseckert fourth in the 400 meter run, as she crossed the finish line in 30.6 seconds, while Tammy Michaels rounded out the Indians' scoring with a fourth in the long jump (13.25").





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
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
