## Improvements Should be Budgeted

# School Board Against Capital Improvements Loan

With the administration getting down to the wire in preparing the school district's budget for the coming year, Dr. David Heather recommended, at the School Board's meeting Monday night, that the district borrow \$200,000 for capital improvements throughout the district.

Heather told the board it needed to decide whether the district should borrow another \$200,000 as it did this past year or whether it wanted to increase the tax levy to cover recommended capital repair and improvement projects. Dr. Heather stated he would prefer to try for the loan as it would have a lesser impact on next year's tax increase.

In comparing figures, taxes for 1989 on a \$70,000 home at a rate of \$15.36, equalled \$1,075.20. On that same home, with a \$200,000 loan, the mill rate for the 1990 proposed tax

levy would be \$16.24, an increase of \$61.60, to \$1,136. If that \$200,000 were added to the levy, the mill rate would be \$16.93, an increase of \$109.90, to \$1,185 for the 1990 proposed tax levy.

Heather said the district could, "borrow, add to the levy, or do nothing," but a decision would have to be made so any proposal decided upon could be placed on the Annual Meeting agenda scheduled for Monday, July 23rd.

Board member Paul Seymour said he would like to see it (the \$200,000) on the tax levy.

Board member Perry Ankerson also indicated he was against borrowing. "If we continue to borrow, we tie up future school boards by having them sit here explaining our actions. I can see borrowing for a major rebuild, but we're borrowing long-term for short-term projects."

A motion to place a recommendation to borrow

\$200,000 on the Annual Meeting agenda was defeated by a 4-3 vote, with Ankerson, Seymour, John Schulte and Ron Beimborn voting 'no.' Ruth Schmitt, Neal Weare and Janet Wolfenberg voted 'yes.' A second motion to place an agenda item to borrow "or" increase the tax levy was approved 5-2, with Weare and Schmitt casting the dissenting votes.

In addressing the district's recent audit report from the Wisconsin School Evaluation Consortium, Heather recommended the hiring of a full time guidance counselor at the elementary level, as suggested in the report. The board chose not to consider the recommendation and no action was taken on the request. The position would have added another approximately \$30,000 to the 90-91 budget.

The board did approve the administration's request to hire

## St. John of God Church to Receive Funding 1990 Wisconsin Historic Preservation Development Subgrants Awarded

The State Historic Preservation Review Board has selected six Wisconsin projects for acquisition and development (A&D) subgrants and three projects for historic lighthouse subgrants for 1990, according to the State Historical Society of Wisconsin.

The funds are provided by the federal government. The State Historical Society administers the funds, and the State Historic Preservation Review Board selects the recipients.

This is the first year since 1981 that Congress and the National Park Service authorized distribution of A&D awards. This also marks the final year for historic lighthouse subgrants.

The A&D awards, totaling \$34,145, will help recipients acquire, restore, preserve, stabilize or rehabilitate historic properties in the state. Subgrants were awarded on a competitive basis to owners of buildings, structures or sites listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Recipients must match each dollar of the subgrant with a dollar from outside funding sources.

The State Historical Society of Wisconsin received a \$5,000 A&D subgrant to rehabilitate the Brisbois House at the Villa Louis in Prairie du Chien. The Brisbois House, which will be used as an exhibit building at the historic site, has experienced significant deterioration in recent years, and the subgrant will contribute toward its rehabilitation.

The Manitowoc Maritime Museum will use \$6,145 in A&D support to stabilize and restore the USS Cobia, a World War II submarine on permanent exhibit at the museum. The submarine suffers from deterioration and some rust damage.

The Seth Peterson Cottage Conservancy plans to use its \$7,000 A&D subgrant to rehabilitate the Town of Delton's Seth Peterson Cottage. Advanced deterioration and collapse of its wooden structure currently threaten the historic property.

The Kemper Center Inc. received a \$6,000 A&D award to repair roof damage to Kemper Hall, a cultural center located in Kenosha.

The Friends of St. John of God Church will use a \$5,000 A&D subgrant to help rehabilitate St. John of God Roman Catholic Church in rural Kewaskum. The friends group sought a subgrant to save the church from possible demolition or collapse.

The Westside Conservation Corp. of Milwaukee received a \$5,000 A&D subgrant to reverse damage caused by ongoing deterioration and vandalism to a historic Milwaukee residence located at 3200-02 McKinley Ave.

The three historic lighthouse-matching grants-in-aid approved by the State Historic Preservation Review Board total \$42,765. Apportioned to Wisconsin by the federal government through the Bicentennial Lighthouse Fund, the subgrants will assist in identifying, evaluating and restoring historic lighthouse properties in Wisconsin. The subgrantees must match the grant amounts on a dollar-for-dollar basis.

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources received \$22,000 to restore and repair the Pottawatomie Lighthouse on Rock Island in Door County.

Ridges Sanctuary Inc. will use a \$2,000 grant to create a historic structures report and maintenance plan for Bailey's Harbor Rangelights in Door County. The group will also prepare construction drawings for repairing and restoring the lights and to create a guide for their continued care.

The Kenosha County

Historical Society and Museum received \$18,765 to clean and repair exterior masonry and an iron stairway on Kenosha's Southport Lighthouse. In addition, the group plans to re-create and install a lantern room in the lighthouse.

**Former Resident Granted Patent**

Ralph Butz, son of Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Butz of Kewaskum, was recently granted a United States patent for a process to make ultra-pure hydrogen peroxide. The patent, number 4879043, was granted to Butz and five other co-inventors, all of whom are employed by E. I. du Pont de Nemours and Co., Inc. Butz helped invent the new process while working at Du Pont's Experimental Station, a research center in Wilmington, Delaware.

In the patented process, a hydrogen peroxide solution is purified by forcing it through a special membrane that will allow the water and peroxide to pass through it but will hold back ionic impurities and other contaminants. As much as 99 1/2% of some impurities are removed by the new process.

The ultra-pure product is a high value chemical used in the manufacture of computer chips and other state-of-the-art electronic devices. Du Pont is already using the new process to supply customers with high purity peroxide.

Butz is a 1975 graduate of Kewaskum High School. He received his B.S. degree in Chemical Engineering from the University of Wisconsin - Madison in 1979. Butz, his wife Sarah and their 3 sons currently live in Orange, Texas.

two part-time instructional aides, which could be increased to full-time if necessary, for the two third grade classes at Kewaskum Elementary School for the coming school year.

Both Heather and KES principal Richard Zarling noted this particular group of 55 students has more than its normal share of problems. "This group is more difficult than most classes," said Heather. "A number of students in both classes have social problems which they bring to school," stated Heather. He also noted that in one of the classes eighteen students had been identified as underachievers.

Kathy Charland, the parent of one of the third grade students, asked why Heather had decided to go with two aides rather than adding a teacher and breaking the group down into three instead of two, classes. He stated he thought

two qualified aides would reduce the contact ratio to 1 to 13, whereas adding one teacher would have resulted in dropping that contact to only a 1 to 18 ratio.

In other action the board approved a contract with Bray and Associates at a cost of \$5,700, to design and bid out the KES ceiling modification project for the second and third floor classrooms. It also approved the purchase of a laser printer for the administration office at a cost of \$1,799, a new water softener for FES at a cost of \$1,125, the annual dues of \$2,332 to the Wisconsin Association of School Boards, service contracts with CESA 6 and permission for Dr. Heather to sign a contract with Whittle Communications to provide 'Channel One' programming, at no cost to the district, to the middle and high school.

The board gave Buildings Superintendent Fred Boehlke permission to shop for a used van, not to exceed \$5,000, at the State vehicle auction.

The board accepted the

resignations of Spanish instructor Virginia Waddick and payroll secretary Patty McGuire. District insurance contracts for 1990-91 were also approved.

In its final action, the board gave Mrs. Schmitt authority to speak for the district at a Town of Barton meeting regarding the reconstruction of a dangerous intersection affecting the Town of Kewaskum and Barton.

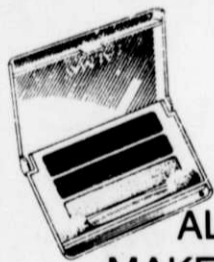

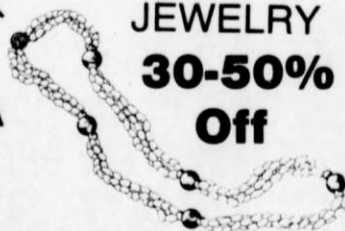

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# Balloonists Full of Hot Air

It may have been too windy to fly in the skies over the Wisconsin Dells, however, the balloonists and crews took the time to renew old friendships and acquire new ones at the 15th Annual Balloon Rally last week-end.

The main topic of discussion was the weather! Storms and gusting winds cancelled the entire event. Among the 90 pilots and their crews, was Ripons' own Gregg Rasske. The beautiful red "Wisconsin" balloon envelope is 80 feet high and 105,000 cubic feet. Gregg enjoys the fact that while having fun flying, he promotes our state and helps tourism. With the weather as the main factor in ballooning, Gregg estimates a total of 100 flights a year for competition, pleasure and

commercial. The evening package ride over the Green Lake area with dinner and champagne is \$135.00 per person. The Wisconsin balloonist and crew are "among friends" as they continue to attend balloon rallies throughout the midwest, the "hot-bed" of competitive ballooning.

The "Balloonmeister" for the Dells rally was Tom Sheppard of West Bend, formerly of England. He officially coordinated the race for every balloon launch. Tom has the final say, whether the balloons will fly according to the weather and winds. Saturday morning as the "Pi-Bals" (small test balloons) were released, a new instrument, the "theodalite" was used to measure the lower winds every 200 feet. Sheppard noted that the wind-reader is the biggest advancement in the sport of ballooning since he has been involved.

Sheppard is the most experienced and sought after Balloonmeister in the world. As a former Navy test pilot, his knowledge and experiences helped him to pass his balloon pilots' in 1973-74. He and three friends from the Campbellsport and West Bend areas invested

in a balloon and when they were rejected from entering a balloon rally, Tom organized his own. Thus, the Wisconsin Dells Balloon Rally was started in 1976 and today is attended by over 70,000 people. This year 11 states were represented. Balloonists and crews came from Nebraska, North Carolina, Florida and the surrounding states to enter the competition.

Sheppard has been the Championship Director of two world, three North American, two U.S. and five Canadian ballooning competitions. His expertise and fairness are greatly appreciated. A mile stone in his career was in 1988, when he served as the balloonmeister for the Winter Olympics in Calgary, Canada.

This summer, as in the past, Tom with his co-director and business partner, Debbie Spaeth, also of West Bend, will attend and officiate balloon rallies in different states and Europe, and end the season in Japan at the 1st Women's World Cup Balloon Championships. Tom and Debbie were among the pilots who flew the hot air balloons at the gigantic birthday party for the late billionaire Malcomb Forbes. He was a balloon enthusiast and had many different shapes and sizes, from elephants to castles.

As a new-comer to hot air ballooning, this free-lance writer had a goal for the week-end, learn from the ground-up what it takes to participate in the sport and get a ride with John Henry Cook of West Bend in his balloon, Union Jack. Every morning, wake up call was at 4:30 a.m. for a 5:30 briefing as to the weather conditions and possible tasks for the races. I wanted to earn my Union Jack pin for being part of the crew and balloon chaser. The next rally will be held at Battle Creek, Michigan, June 16th - 23rd, with over 200 balloons entered. June 29, 30 and July 1, a rally will be held at Rockford, Ill. and on July 13th - 15th one will be held at Monroe, Wisconsin.

Maybe I'll be able to make a dream come true at one of these events. Additional stories will follow. As the balloonists say,

"The ride is nothing like you have ever done." "It is so serene," "an unexplainable peace come over you" as you glide the skies in a hot air balloon. I'm looking forward to that experience!

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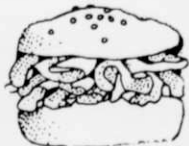
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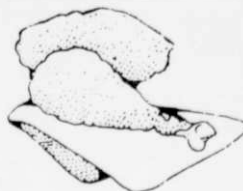


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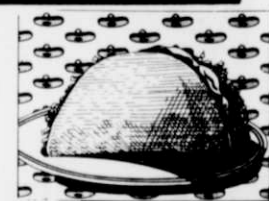

# UWWC's Richard Cleek Recipient of Rolf's Foundation Teaching Award

Teaching geography was supposed to have been a temporary job for Richard K. Cleek when he was hired by the University of Wisconsin Center - Washington County right out of graduate school at the University of Texas in Austin in 1970. Being a teacher was a way to make some money for a couple of years and still allow time to raise a family until he could get into his real love, research, Cleek thought.

Twenty years later, now an associate professor of geography and computer science at UWWC, he is still there and still teaching. It was for his exceptional teaching ability that Cleek was recently named as the 1990 recipient of the \$1,000 Rolf's Foundation Teaching Award at UWWC.

Arthur Hoberg, Senior Vice President of Finance at Amity Leather Products Company, surprised Cleek with the special award at the UWWC Honors Convocation held earlier this month at the campus.

"Although I got into teaching by accident, I've never regretted it," Cleek said. "I really don't think I was any good at it at first, but my teaching has evolved and my love of teaching has evolved. I never thought I was an outstanding teacher. It's nice to have a tangible award like the Rolfs, something to hang on my

wall to remind me."

Although Cleek now instructs more than 180 UWWC students each semester in both cultural geography and computer science courses, he regrets never getting to see the "glory years" of his students, when they transfer to a four-year institution and eventually graduate.

"Working with freshmen and sophomores, I don't have many geography majors," said Cleek. "But the neat part is that I get to give my students a geographical sense - basic information about the world - a sense of process - the relationship between cultural values and the environment, for instance."

Cleek said he demands more of his students now than he used to, more research papers, and more daily assignments. He finds it helps them to better come to grips with the information.

"If a student has to do a lot of work for a class, it keeps them more involved," he said.

At UWWC, Cleek also has time for his academic research work, which includes writing numerous papers, articles and now, a book, a field guide to barns of North America. In fact, a portion of the Rolfs award money has gone toward the purchase of an expensive camera which Cleek is using to

continue his research on classifying different styles of barns.

"This book will be written for the person who wants to understand the environment outside their car window," said Cleek. "It's like a field guide to birds or wildflowers to help you learn about the barns you're seeing."

Cleek said he became interested in barns several years ago when he began to notice that barns in various areas of the state and outside the state had many differences. For instance, barns in northern Illinois are more English in nature, usually not built into a hill as they are in Wisconsin. They also lack the forebays (the first floor area of the barn that protrudes over the foundation) of Washington and Ozaukee County barns, which tend to be more Pennsylvania - German in origin.

"We're losing our barns so fast," Cleek said, "that it's important to capture this information now before they burn down or are blown away."

Cleek hopes the book, which he plans to find a publisher for this summer, will encourage people to send in reports of their barns so a historical record of the barns can be kept.

On the opposite side of the geographical spectrum, Cleek's other recent research led to the publication last April of an article in the journal "Human Biology," which indicated a possible link between surnames and cancer genes. His groundbreaking research in this area looked at the frequency of surnames among women who had died of breast cancer, for example, as compared to the last names of women who died of other

causes.

"I found a radically different frequency of names, which indicated a strong genetic component of some cancers and also suggests strong evidence of cancer suppressing genes," Cleek said.

All of this extensive research, done over the past 20 years on computers, has also led Cleek to an added interest in computers and his title of "computer guru" at UWWC. Cleek not only oversees one of UWWC's two student computer labs and all faculty/staff computers, but serves as chairman of the UW Center System's Committee for Computer Related Technology.

This committee has been charged with overseeing and instituting the recent \$2.75

million grant from AT&T. This grant will enable the UW Centers to be linked to each other and to the entire UW system and many private colleges in the state to be linked by computers this fall. The system will allow a professor at UWWC to communicate via computer to colleagues around the world, as well as provide UWWC students access to the library card catalogs of other libraries in the UW system, Cleek said.

Cleek, and his wife Margaret, associate professor of psychology at UWWC, live near Kewaskum.

Just Say No Clubs are groups of children, 7-14 years old, who are committed to leading drug-free lives. The Clubs use positive peer pressure to reinforce members' resolve to say no to drugs, including alcohol and tobacco.

Club members take part in educational, recreational, and service activities. Members learn that it is not necessary to use drugs to make friends or have fun. Members learn to stand up for what they know is right, and to feel good about themselves for doing so.

"Children are joining the Just Say No Club because the 'war on drugs' campaign has frightened them. They don't want to drink alcohol or use drugs, and they don't want their friends to," Taylor explained.

"Just Say No Clubs give kids the information and techniques they need to remain drug-free. And it's fun. It gives them a chance to make a positive difference," Taylor added.

Plans are underway to form Just Say No Clubs at Kewaskum and Wayne Elementary Schools after the summer break.

The Washington County Sheriff's Department has assisted the Club in its education efforts. Sheriff Robert Schulteis attended one meeting to congratulate the students on their membership and to answer questions about law enforcement. Deputy Sheriff Marie Joers showed members actual drugs and explained the effects of each one.

The Just Say No Club concept started in 1985 at Peralta Year Round School in Oakland, California after children there were inspired by a visit from the First Lady Nancy Reagan, who simply observed that one way to counter peer pressure was to "just say no." A student seized her statement by asking "why don't we start a 'just say no' club," and in what was to turn into a highly successful national movement in just the second year, the Just Say No Club approach was born.

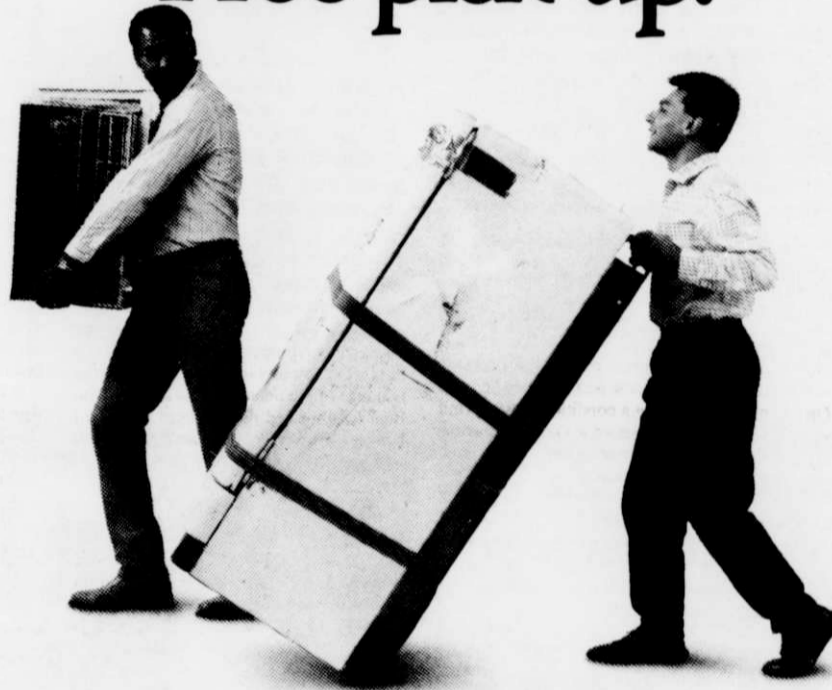

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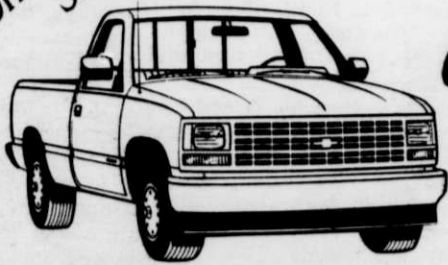

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# TODAY'S AGRICULTURE

By Jack Trzebiatowski, Extension Agriculture Agent

## EMPLOYMENT OF FARM WORKERS

Many farms need to hire extra labor either on a regular or part-time basis. This extra help can be either adult or youth. Farms that employ workers need to be concerned about a number of regulations that affect both employers and employees.

The employment of minors on a part-time basis is common. Minors under the age of 12 are not permitted to be employed at any time. Minors in most areas of employment between the age of 12 and 18 need a work permit. There is an exception for minors employed in agricultural work.

Minors are protected by other laws that restrict their hours of labor, the time of day they may work and the type of work they may do, depending upon their age.

It is not possible to cover all the related rules in this article. Employees wishing to have a copy of requirements can contact the Wisconsin Department of Industry and Human

Minimum wage rates increased on April 1, 1990. Rates for adult agriculture workers are now \$3.60 per hour and minor agricultural workers, \$3.25 per hour. Deductions may be made for meals and lodging, if provided as a part of employment.

Records need to be kept on each employee for at least three years on the following items: name and address; date of birth; dates employment began and ended; time work began and ended each day; total hours worked daily and weekly, rate of pay for each payroll period; wages paid each payroll period; amount and reason for each deduction and output of employee, if paid on other than a time basis.

Employers must also follow rules for deductions of social security and income taxes. Up to date rules are found in "Circular E, Employers Tax Guide," available from the IRS.

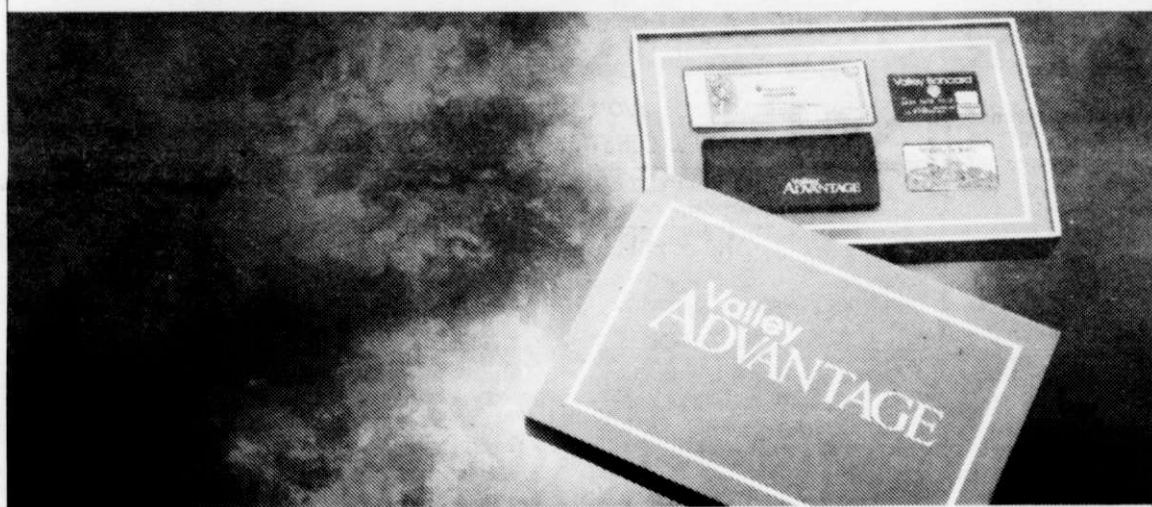

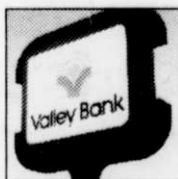

## Turkey Hunting Season Closes

The 1990 Spring Turkey Hunting Season ended on May 20 with a total of 98 birds taken by hunters. The break down for each time period was: Period 1 = 27, Period 2 = 26, Period 3 = 19, Period 4 = 12, Period 5 = 5, and Period 6 = 9.

Of the 98 birds taken 79 were adult Toms and 19 were Jakes (immature males). Success averaged out to 22% which is about the statewide average for hunting success. Sixty-eight of the birds were registered at Dins Mini-Mart and 25 at Behr's Bait near Plymouth. The majority of the birds were taken in the Mauthe Lake and Long Lake Area.

Looking back at the completed season, I would call it VERY SUCCESSFUL. The hunters that I contacted during the season were very excited about the hunt. I would compare the enthusiasm equal to what I see in the deer season. The only complaint was that more hunters would like to participate, but this will take a few years.

Nesting success in 1989 was not as good as hoped and with the cool, wet, and snowy May we had in 1990 nesting success again could be low. I would look to see about the same of permits (75) issued for each time period in 1991.

There will not be a Fall Turkey Hunt in Unit 30 this year. In areas with an open fall season applications will be available after July 1, 1990 and due by August 10, 1990. These applications can be obtained at DNR outlets.

The turkey program in the Campbellsport area is a real success story and needs your continued support.
