Area Men Killed in Separate Weekend Accidents

# One Kewaskum Man Killed, Another Injured in Ozaukee County Crash

Two Washington County men were killed in separate accidents over the weekend.

On Friday, June 22, Dennis Spaeth, 27, of West Bend, died in a two-car accident on State Highway 33, in the Town of Saukville in Ozaukee County.

According to an Ozaukee County Sheriff's Department spokesman, Spaeth was eastbound on Highway 33, when his vehicle and another car driven by Robert Wilkens, 22, of Fredonia collided near Birchwood Road, at 9:28 p.m.

Spaeth was pronounced dead at the scene by Ozaukee County Coroner John Holicek. Wilkens was transported to St. Mary's. Ozaukee, where he was treated and released.

Wilkens was charged Monday, with causing the death of another person by operation of a vehicle while under the influence of an intoxicant.

The second accident also occurred in Ozaukee County, killing Christopher A. Kirsch, 18, of Kewaskum.

The Ozaukee County Sheriff's Department release said the accident occurred Sunday morning, at 9:01 a.m., at the intersection of Hwy. 60, and Horns Corner Road, in the Town of Cedarburg.

A department spokesman said Kirsch was headed south on Horns Corner Road when he collided with a westbound car on Hwy. 60, driven by James T. Andre, 79, of Kewaskum. According to the release, after colliding, the two cars knocked down an electric pole, with both vehicles rolling over and landing on their roofs.

Kirsch was pronounced dead at the scene by the Ozaukee County Coroner. Andre and a passenger in his car, Sarah L. Schulze, 79, of Grafton, were transported to St. Mary's Hospital, Port Washington, with multiple injuries.

No further details were released and the accident is still under investigation.

### KHS Re-Roofing Contract Okayed

At a special meeting Monday night, the Kewaskum School Board approved the awarding of a contract to the HIS Corporation of Hartford, for the reroofing of a portion of the Kewaskum High School building, at a cost of \$55,300.

District Administrator Dr. David Heather advised the board HIS had also presented an alternate bid which included an additional \$525, to remove and close skylights in the corridor section. Heather said Buildings Superintendent Fred Boehlke was on vacation and no further information was available as to whether or not the skylight work would be done.

Heather said the HIS bid was the lowest of six, ranging from the \$55,000 to a high of \$80,000. In other action the board accepted the resignation of Mrs. Sue Paul-Kenfield as KHS physical education and health instructor. Paul-Kenfield also-served as Girls Gymnastics coach. She has decided to accept employment elsewhere.

The board approved the hiring of Ms. Renee Roels as Kewaskum Middle School art teacher.

The request of Mrs. Linda Koepp for childcare leave during the first quarter of the 1990-91 school year was also approved.

As requested by Dr. Heather, the board will hold another special meeting on Monday, July 2, to adopt a 1990-91 budget so it can be published and presented to the electors at the Annual Meeting scheduled for Monday, July 23.

The board then adjourned to closed session.

### Leave Fireworks to the Pros

Prevent Blindness-Wisconsin advises that igniting, detonating and all handling of fireworks be left to the professionals this Fourth of July.

Inexperience and mishandling of fireworks caused 1300 eye injuries last year during Fourth of July celebrations. 40% of these eye injuries caused permanent damage. Half of those injured were children.

Prevent Blindness - Wisconsin supports restrictions on the importation, sale and use of all fireworks devices, except those used in authorized public programs by competent operators.

"We advocate leaving fireworks in the hands of trained, licensed experts," states Prevent Blindness - WI Executive Director, Kathleen Boho.

"The dangers of the private use of fireworks cannot be overstated," Ms. Boho continues. "Adults and children suffer vision loss. People are injured or even killed. Thousands of fires are started due to the misuse of fireworks."

Class C devices (including firecrackers, smoke bombs, bottle rockets and sparklers) are mistaken to be of little danger. Studies cite sparklers as the

### Schwalbach Appointed Wisconsin's New Chief Judge Of the Third Judicial Administrative District

The new Chief Judge of the Third Judicial Administrative District for the State of Wisconsin will be the Honorable James B. Schwalbach, Circuit Court Judge, Branch 2, Washington County. The appointment, which will become effective on August 1, 1990, was announced on June 12, 1990, by Chief Justice Nathan S. Heffernan of the Wisconsin Supreme Court. The appointment is for a two-year term.

Judge Schwalbach will replace the Honorable Patrick L. Snyder, Circuit Court Judge, Branch 4, Waukesha County as chief judge. Judge Snyder, who has been the chief judge since 1984, is no longer eligible for reappointment as he is completing his third twoyear term.

Schwalbach, age graduated from the University of Wisconsin, Madison, in 1964, and the University of Wisconsin Law School in 1968. He was first appointed county judge for Washington County in 1977, becoming a circuit judge at the





#### Food Dehydration Workshop Offered

Drying foods is a great way of preserving the flavorful, seasonal garden vegetables and fruits at their peak of ripeness. Drying is convenient and easy, and is a good alternative to traditional canning methods.

Drying or dehydration is a process that removes moisture from food so that microorganisms are inhibited from growing, and the process inactivates enzymes so foods quit ripening. The foods can be rehydrated or "refreshed" by soaking them later for use in a wide variety of recipes.

The process of dehydrating and refreshing will be demonstrated in a workshop offered by Washington County Extension Office. The guest instructor, Margaret Gubin of Juneau, will show how to dry foods in an oven or in a dehydrator, how to refresh foods, and how to use a wide variety of dried foods in recipes. Participants will taste prepared dishes, including soup, bread, cake, muffins and snacks. Mrs. Gubin has shared her expertise in this area for the last eight years, and has published a cookbook of tasty recipes.

The workshop will be held at the Hartford Recreation Center from 1:30 to 4:30 on Thursday, July 12, 1990. The \$4 registration fee (payable to U.W. Extension Fund) covers the cost of food samples and recipes of the foods demonstrated.

### 50 Years Ago

June 28, 1940

"The rains came." This village is back to normal again after one of the heaviest rainfalls in history over the Monday. weekend and Considerable damage amounting to thousands of dollars was done throughout the vicinity, county and state by electrical, wind and rain storms. Property and crops damaged. The rain began Friday night and continued almost steadily until Monday night. The three days were the wettest in the history of the county and the worst since the cloudburst and flood of 1924. Older residents say they cannot remember a time when the rain continued so long and one electrical storm followed the other continuously for two nights and a full day. The climax of the electrical storms struck the village shortly after the supper hour Saturday when a small tornado hit with severe force. The young twister raged through town from west to east. It lasted only a couple of minutes and then disappeared as suddenly as it had come. Following the three-day rain the Milwaukee River here and many creeks ran over their banks. Lowlands resembled miniature lakes. Traffic was suspended on some roads for a time. Thousands of dollars damage resulted to crops and cropland. The rains washed much good topsoil from hillsides. Stands of hay were flattened and much cut hay is

still under water. Much planted corn was drowned out and will have to be replanted.

Anabel Guenther, 12, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur (Pat) Guenther of Campbellsport died Friday, June 21, in the office of her uncle, Dr. O. F. Guenther, in that village, where she was taken for treatment for an injury she sustained shortly before 8 p.m. Thursday evening when she fell from a loading platform while at play near the stockyards, which proved fatal. The fatal accident occurred when the platform from which Anabel and some playmates had been jumping tipped and threw the child to the ground. As it tipped the platform struck the child and badly injured the front of her head, shoulder and head. Despite her injuries, Anabel arose to her feet and asked her playmates to call her

mother. Then she lost consciousness and fell again striking her head on a railroad track. She sustained a fractured skull besides her other injuries. She died without regaining consciousness. The railroad company assumed full liability for the accident because the platform had been neglected in coming loose.





The ROADEO competition consists of three parts:


A Written Test detailing school bus driving laws, policies and procedures as well as regular Wisconsin driving rules.

A Road Obstacle Course. Drivers must display proper driving techniques as they negotiate a road course set up with obstacles such as a railroad crossing, students to be picked up, diminishing clearance cones and curves, as well as backing exercise.

The purpose of our annual ROADEO is to promote safe driving techniques and to reinforce the importance of the school bus driver in the education process. In the past, a ROADEO competition was held on a state and national level.

Most dairy farmers recognize the importance of producing high quality forage and the role this has with the productivity and profitability of their dairy herd.

Farmers who like a little bit competition have opportunity to participate in the 1990 World Forage Analysis Superbowl. The event organized to give farmers an opportunity to compete for the production of high quality forges. The event is held in conjunction with the Annual Dairy Expo.

according to Land Use & Park Department Administrator Paul Mueller.







### Experimental Wrestling Tournaments Being Offered to WIAA Schools

A team tournament series has been offered WIAA wrestling schools as a two-year experiment beginning with the 1991-92 school year.

The tournament will feature the 48 regional champions - 16 each in Divisions 1-2-3 (formerly Classes A-B-C) - with eight Division 1 teams and four each in Divisions 2 and 3 reaching the State Tournament.

The Board of Control at its regular summer meeting in Green Lake earlier this week by a 5-4 vote approved the plan which was initiated by the wrestling coaches and by the Sports supported Advisory Committee before the Advisory Council - meeting prior to and with the Board recommended that it adopted.

However, a significant issue in the discussion about providing a team tournament series in addition to the present individual format resulted in another 5-4 Board vote - to name the team tournament winners as official State champions and not to have a team dimension (champions or scoring) in the individual idea (team This format. champions only in the team tournament) is not supported by the coaches who want to have champions in both tournaments six champions in all. The Advisory Council also favored the double-champion idea but the Sports Advisory Committee recommended that the Board declare team champions only in the team tournament.

In the team tournament format, regional champions will meet in two -team playoffs (Division 1) or four-team tournaments (Divisions 2 and 3) on the Tuesday between regional and sectional tournament activity leading to the present State (Individual) Tournament. The State (Team) Tournament will be held on the Saturday following the State (Individual) Tournament, and plans call for that tournament to take place at a site other than UW Madison, probably in the central part of the state.

2. Returned to the growth allowance procedure of two pounds on December 25 and one more on February 1 to tie-in with the minimum weight project which will be voluntary in 1990-91 and mandatory in 1991-92.

In a significant move related particularly to basketball but also to hockey, the Board removed the prohibition of non-school activity in those sports (as well as wrestling) during the fall of the year. For the past three years, students in those sports were not allowed to participate in non-school competition in the fall. But because the membership last spring rebuffed the idea providing similar restrictions in sports, the Board reasoned it is unfair to penalize only basketball, hockey and wrestling. The ban is being lifted immediately.

The Board also clarified for all sports that inter-school scrimmages may be substituted for a game/meet without regard to number of schools participating in the scrimmage. Thus, a school may give up one of its 20 basketball games and hold a four-team scrimmage, example. Or, a school may give up one its dual wrestling meets and have a scrimmage with a half-dozen other schools. Each inter-school scrimmage, however, counts toward the season's game/meet maximum.

These junior high changes were approved:

1. Grade 9 football teams which contain some Grade 8 (and/or Grade 7) players will be permitted to play six games (up from five) which is one less than the seven which "pure" Grade 9 teams may play.

2. Pre-season practice requirements (days) will be the same as for senior high teams in

3. Multiple-team meet maximums have been established as follows: For "pure" Grade 9 teams - four in soccer, tennis and wrestling and six in volleyball; for teams which have Grade 7 and/or 8 participants - three in soccer and tennis, four in wrestling and five in volleyball.

 Three running events will be allowed in track & field as long as one of them is a relay.

5. Schools no longer are required to request WIAA permission to shift a sport season from the "normal" time to some other period of the year but adjusted seasons must continue to be no longer than the "normal" seasons.

The Board reorganized after its meeting with Dist. Admin. William Knapp of Greendale moving up to the presidency. Knapp, who had been vice-president, succeeds Dist. Admin. Michael Williams of Osceola who remains on the Board. Dist. Admin. Michael Healy, who had been treasurer, was elected vice-president, meaning he will become president for 1991-92. The new treasurer is Asst. Admin. Donna Thomas of Waterloo.

The other Board members are Dist. Admin. Douglas Smith of Manawa, Prin. Gary Einerson of DeForest, Prin. Chris Nelson of Randolph, School Board Representative Harriet Jelinek of Rhinelander and newly-elected Prin. Donald Pierce of DePere who succeeds Dist. Admin. Jerry Kain of Sturgeon Bay.

Because Pierce was elected to the Board, the Advisory Council had to name a new vice-president. He is Dist. Admin. Michael Cox of North Crawford. He will serve until the October meeting as vice-president, then for 1990-91 he will be president of the Council which is now headed by Prin. Robert Roloff of Baraboo.

The Board congratulated Gordon Jensen who concluded nearly a quarter-century as liaison to the Board repre-



TWO RIVERS — When your starting pitcher gives up the same number of hits in seven innings that your leadoff hitter collected in the same game, a team's prospects of winning are pretty great.

Although it wasn't a blowout by any means, the Kewaskum baseball team will definitely take its 2-1 victory over Two Rivers here, last Monday.

There was no question who the stars of this contest were, on either side for that matter. For the Indians, sophomore Chad Cook threw a three-hitter and struck out eight Two Rivers batters to record his third conference victory of the year, while senior Dan Heisdorf continued to tear up the league, rapping out three hits, including the game - winner in the top of the seventh inning.

Heisdorf, along with junior Chris Donath collected five of the seven hits that the Indians got off of the Raiders' starting pitcher, Miller. Donath figured a prominant role in each of the Indians' run-scoring innings.

Donath then singled to rightfield, and when the rightfielder's throw to try and cut down Weddig at third was wild, Weddig scampered home with the game's first run.

Miller socked his homer in the bottom of the inning to tie things at one, and that's the way things stayed until the seventh, as both Cook and Miller showed no signs of letting up.

The Indians finally got to Miller in the seventh, though.

With one out, Donath got his second hit of the game, a single, and moved to second when Brian Leitheiser walked. Heisdorf then came through with his third hit, a single which scored Donath and put

the Indians out in front 2-1.

In the bottom of the seventh, things got a bit hairy when Cook walked the first batter of the inning. But Cook quickly rectified himself as he got the next batter to ground into a double play, and then struck out

the ensuing Raider to end the ballgame.

The win moved the Indians back above the .500 mark, as they improved to 8-7 overall, including 5-4 in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference.

### Heisdorf, Schneider Lead Indians Past Sheboygan Falls

### Indians Lose to First Place Kiel

KIEL — The Kewaskumbaseball team had an ideal opportunity to really tighten things up in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference baseball race when it took on first-place Kiel here, last Thursday.

Things looked good for the Indians, leading the hosts 2-1 with sophomore lefty Chad Cook cruising along on the mound, pitching a four-hitter.
