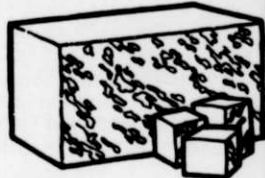

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Peer Listener Training Held

The Council on Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse of Washington County will hold a training for one hundred eleven Peer Listeners during the week of July 30 - August 3rd. Participants will be students from West Bend West, East, Kewaskum, Hartford, Slinger, Germantown, and Kettle Moraine Lutheran High Schools.

Students will meet at Our Saviors Lutheran Church to participate in workshops on alcohol and other drug abuse, suicide, active listening,

relationships, teen sexuality, abuse, information and referral, eating disorders, and stress management.

"We are grateful for the expertise of presenters who will provide the Peer Listeners with helpful information regarding many of the issues faced by teens," said Sandy Gunderson, Coordinator of the program. "Role-playing will also be an essential part of the training," she added.

The Peer Listeners make themselves available at their respective schools to provide a listening ear for their fellow students who feel more comfortable talking to someone their own age.

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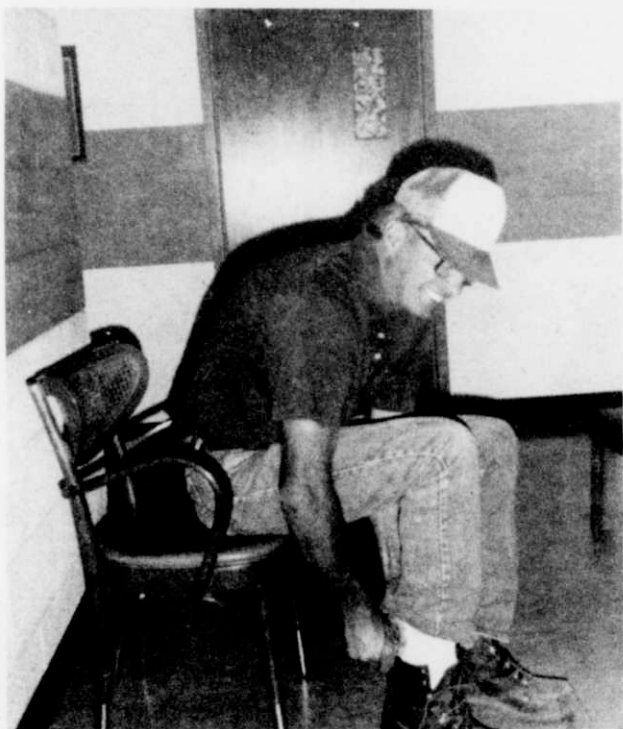
Peace UCC Volunteers Work on 1990 Habitat For Humanity Project in Lexington, Kentucky

Transforming the rough shell of a new house into a structure awaiting finishing touches was the five day work project of the Peace UCC volunteer crew in Lexington, Kentucky July 7-14. Home again now in Kewaskum, the 21 Peace Church members have exchanged their hard hats and hammers for the tools of their regular jobs, but all of them agree that the 1990 Habitat for Humanity work week was "the best ever."

The Lexington project has seven other houses already inhabited by buyers with no-interest mortgages, the Habitat ethic. These payments are lower, usually under \$200.00 per month than rents previously paid to absentee landlords for the dilapidated "shotgun" type houses in old Irish Town of Lexington. (Shotgun houses have each single room directly behind another and are usually very close together). An eighth Habitat house is still under construction, with Peace Church crew working on the ninth.

During the three years of building, only one house was rehabilitation; others were constructed on vacant,

tax-delinquent lots purchased by the Lexington Habitat. In 1990, to celebrate the fifteenth anniversary of Habitat International, Lexington plans to build 15 more houses, and Peace Church has been invited to return and help!

Temperatures in Lexington were in the humid, high 90's all week, but the volunteers insulated, constructed interior partitions and stairs, electrified, installed windows, and roofed. Dirt was moved to fill the yard, and the crew ate noon lunches on a board over sawhorses just adjacent to the dirt pile. Marion Erdmann and Betty Bettin, cooks for the crew, prepared all meals at Koinonia House, a religious fellowship building on the University of Kentucky campus.

At night the Koinonia dining area became a dormitory, covered with the tired Kewaskum workers on their air mattresses. Rev. James Bettin coordinated this fourth annual work trip. "This was the best organized Habitat project we've ever been privileged to serve," observed Bettin. "The on-site supervision and concern for our comfort and safety were outstanding. We've made some wonderful new friends in

Kentucky."

The crew attended Sunday services at Emmanuel UCC, a black congregation, in Lexington. Rev. Leticia Rouser planned the early morning service for the Wisconsin guests. Daily devotions were led all week by Rev. Bettin in the chapel at Koinonia House with hymnals written in both Korean and English, since Korean Christians meet there each Sunday! Lexington's Second Presbyterian Church provided an evening dinner for the Kewaskum crew, and the Lexington Habitat workers hosted a midweek potluck party with owners of Habitat homes and local volunteers attending.

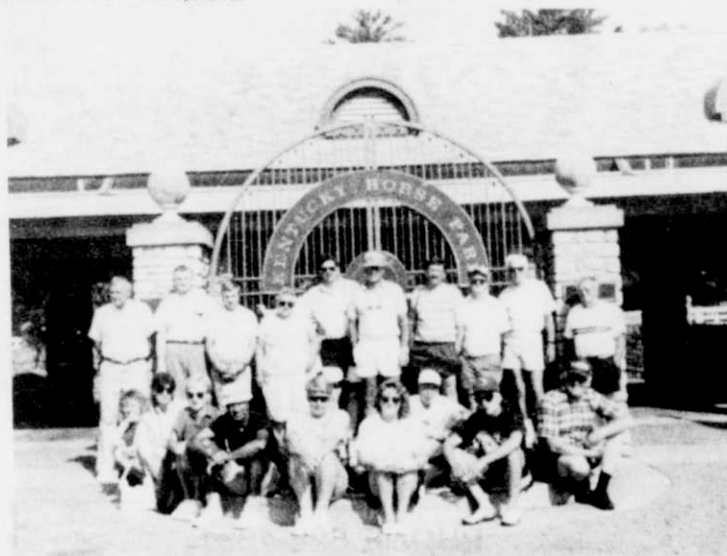
During the afternoon enjoyable concertina music was provided by "Pappy." A variety of games were played with prizes going to the lucky ones.

The Lutheran Vanguard successfully completed its fourteenth season by capturing the Grand Champion Parade Band award at the National Cherry Festival in Traverse City, MI on July 14.

The Lutheran Vanguard is comprised of 125 students from seven Lutheran high schools in Wisconsin, including Kettle Moraine Lutheran High School of Jackson. 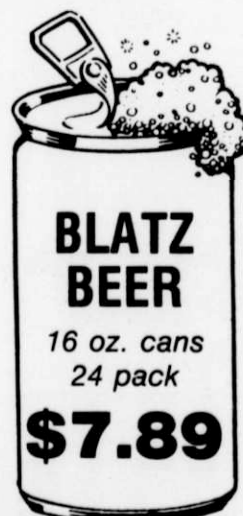

Again, as last year, the threat of rain forced the Livestock Sale committee to make a quick, last-minute decision Thursday night, to move the Washington County Fair's 21st annual livestock sale indoors.

The weather, however, did not dampen either the fair goers or the bidders' enthusiasm and the sale went off without a hitch.

Steve Janz of West Bend may have set another Washington County Junior Fair record this year. For the second straight year, Janz showed both the champion hog and champion beef steer. In 1989, Janz also showed the top hog and steer which brought record-breaking prices.

While bidding was steady and prices good, Janz' animals (this year) brought less than half of the going price of his 1989 entries. Janz' 1990 entry in the hog division brought \$6.50 a pound, for a total of \$1,657.50, from Enders Construction. Another coincidence, both last year's and this year's hogs were exactly the same weight, 255 pounds.

Janz' 1,275 - pound champion beef steer brought \$5.00 a pound, for a total of \$6,375, also purchased by Enders Construction. (In comparison, a bidding war last year between Royal Ford and Pick N Save, both of West Bend, brought

Janz \$3,188 for his hog and \$12,495 for his steer).

The 1,255 pound reserve champion beef steer of Kevin Parish, Kewaskum, was purchased by Pick N Save of West Bend for \$1.60 a pound, earning Parish \$2,008.

On an average, prices throughout the evening, bidding were about 75c to \$1.00 a pound lower than 1989. Prices still, however, were considerably higher than those at the Fond du Lac Fair last week, where the champion steer only brought \$2.35 a pound.

The 250-pound reserve champion hog shown by Sean Parish of Kewaskum, went to Pick N Save for \$2.50 a pound bringing in \$625.

The 285-pound Home Bred and Raised champion hog shown by Keith Herman of Allenton, was purchased by Krebs Trucking for \$2.50 a pound. The 230-pound HBR reserve champion shown by Kurt Langenecker of Hartford, went to WTKM for \$2.75 a pound.

The 1,355 - pound HBR champion beef shown by Matt Merry of Hartford, went for \$1.10 a pound to First National Bank of Hartford. The 1,190-pound HBR reserve champion beef of Brian Butzlaff sold to Farmers, Inc., for \$1.40 a pound.

The 1,250-pound champion dairy and HBR champion steer of Tim Serman of Hartford, went to Amateur Electronics for \$4.20 a pound. The reserve

champion dairy steer of Brad Oelhafen, Allenton, was purchased by Kewaskum Frozen Foods for \$1.40 a pound.

In the Sheep Division, the 107-pound champion lamb shown by Davin Gahns, West Bend, was purchased by Family Farm Meats for \$5.00 a pound. The reserve champion lamb of Theresa Gahns went for \$2.75 a pound to Janz Farms.

The HBR champion lamb shown by Dave Tischer, Cedarburg, was purchased by Art Degnitz for \$2.50 a pound. Ewan Glass was the successful bidder at \$2.50 for the HBR reserve champion lamb of Terry Groth, Jackson.

Prices by other local hog exhibitors included, Ryan Herman - Allenton, (two hogs) \$1.50 and \$2.25. Mike Ruplinger - Allenton, \$1.50. Adam Bingen - Kewaskum (two) \$1.00 and \$1.00. A total of 119 animals (up six from 1989) were sold at this year's 21st annual auction, bringing in a total of \$83,341.65. Even though the number of animals sold this year was up, the gross sales

were down by slightly over \$2,800. There were three less hogs and five less sheep in this year's sale, while the number of beef increased by fourteen.

The next phase of competition for the exhibitors, even though the fair is officially over, will be the carcass shows and judging this Wednesday and Thursday at Kewaskum Frozen Foods and Family Farm Meats. The carcasses will be judged for fat content and meat quality produced in the finished animal.

While the livestock auction is a big part of the fair, judging and competition go on throughout fair week. Everything from garden produce, crafts and animal showmanship come under the scrutinizing eye of the judges.

Not only are the animals and projects judged, their exhibition surroundings are also inspected and awards given on a variety of points, from neatness to presentation. In the dairy barns, someone is always busy

sweeping or disposing of a freshly produced load of "fertilizer" to keep things looking 'show-shape.'

And, of course, what would a fair be without its "Fairest" to reign over the activities. This year, Fairest of the Fairs winner Bambi Hathaway of Slinger, was chosen Wednesday evening from a field of seven candidates. Hathaway's duties included being the official hostess of the fair and handing out ribbons during the numerous competitions.

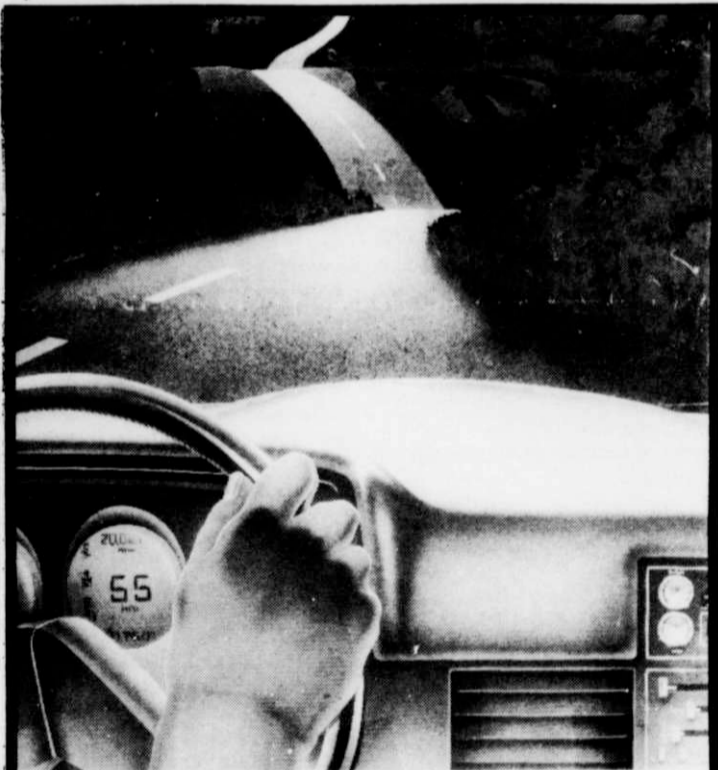

Computer Course Offerings Expanded At Moraine Park

The number of computer courses offered by Moraine Park Technical College will double this fall when the college completes its expansion of computer labs at all three campuses.

At both the Beaver Dam and West Bend campuses, rooms formerly used for typing classes will be converted into computer labs, doubling the number of computer labs at both campuses. Beaver Dam will get 10 additional micro-computers raising its number of workstations to 36. West Bend will get 30 additional workstations for a total of 56.

Moraine Park will add 14 microcomputers to its Fond du Lac computer lab for a total of 92 workstations. That represents a 25 percent increase in the work space there, according to Bruce De Boer, associate dean of business for Moraine Park. "This will allow us to offer at least one more full computer section."

With the additional workstations and an upgrading of equipment, Moraine Park can now offer more courses at both Beaver Dam and West Bend, De Boer explained. More evening and weekend classes to all three campuses are also planned, he said.

The computer lab expansion is necessary because demand for the courses exceeds Moraine Park's capacity to accommodate everyone who wants to enroll, De Boer said.

Enrollment for all of the college's computer courses are full and Moraine Park had a total of 264 people waiting to get into the classes during the 1989-90 school year. "Our computer courses are extremely popular," De Boer said. "There were waiting lists for computer courses at all three campuses."

The expansion is a response to those waiting lists, he said, as well as an effort to meet demands from local business and industry for the college to provide more classroom-sized facilities for their employee training needs.

The additional computer space in Fond du Lac should make it "easier for business and industry to come in and use our facilities instead of setting up their own computer training centers," De Boer said.

Moraine Park has been able to provide specialized staff computer training for a few Fond du Lac area firms during times when the Fond du Lac computer labs were not in use for classes, De Boer explained. The college had not been able to do the same on the Beaver Dam and West Bend campuses. "We haven't had the opportunity there," he said. "We've scheduled virtually every available hour with our own classes."

The additional computers and the conversion of lab space at Beaver Dam and West Bend should make it possible to offer local businesses in those communities customized computer training for their staffs.

A brochure listing the equipment, software and courses available at Moraine Park is being prepared for distribution to firms within the Moraine Park District to highlight the specialized training opportunities that will

be available, De Boer explained.

Full-time programs at Moraine Park that use the computer labs include accounting, administrative assistant - secretarial, legal secretary, medical secretary, computer information systems - programmer/analyst, computer information systems - technical support specialist, accounting assistant and office assistant.

Courses currently offered at Fond du Lac that will be offered at the Beaver Dam and West Bend campuses:

- * Integrated Microsoftware
- * Desktop Publishing
- * Presentation Graphics
- * Electronic Office Applications
- * Advanced Dbase
- * Microcomputer Operating Systems
- * Beginning COBOL Programming
- * Information Software Applications

In addition to the expanded course schedule, Moraine Park will also offer three new certificate programs, each requiring five courses to complete:

- * Desktop Publishing - suggested for people interested in print production graphics, layout and design.
- * Software - designed for office workers who wish to upgrade their computer skills.
- * Advanced Software - for experienced office workers needing more detailed training in electronic office applications.

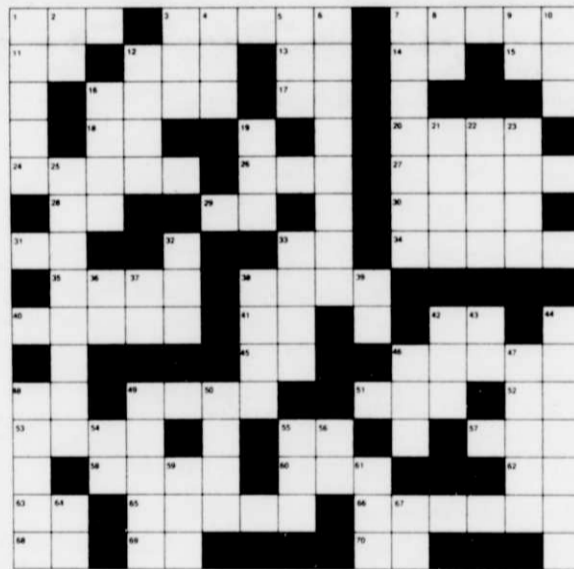

Boaters... Show Respect for Others

MADISON, WI — Applications for Wisconsin's Fall 1990 wild turkey hunting season are due August 10, reminds Ed Frank, Department of Natural Resources turkey season coordinator. This is the second year that Wisconsin hunters have the opportunity to hunt turkeys in the fall.

Applications for the 12,465 permits available for the fall turkey hunt must be postmarked on or before Friday, Aug. 10, or delivered before 4:30 p.m. on Aug. 10 to the DNR Information Center, 101 S. Webster Street, Madison. Application forms are available at DNR and county clerk offices statewide; completed forms should be mailed to: DNR Fall Turkey Hunt, P.O. Box 7956, Madison, WI 53707.

The Fall 1990 turkey season runs for three consecutive Monday - Sunday hunting periods: Oct. 8 - 14, Oct. 15 - 21, and Oct. 22 - 28. Twelve hunting zones are open for hunting, including 10 zones in southwest Wisconsin and two zones in Marinette and Florence counties in northeast Wisconsin.

In 1989, the first year that Wisconsin had a fall wild turkey season, there were 7,260 permits available for eight hunting zones, all in the southwest corner of the state. More than 17,000 hunters applied for permits last year. The total harvest for the Fall 1989 season was 1,570 birds.

Turkeys of any age or sex are legal. Shotguns or muzzle loading shotguns are the only legal firearms for hunting wild turkeys.

Frank also reminds hunters that they must have a valid Wisconsin hunting license to APPLY for a fall turkey permit; a 1989-90 or 1990-91 small game, sports, patron or archers license is required. And be aware that 1989-90 hunting licenses expire Aug. 31 - the 1990-91 licenses go on sale July 31.

A 1990-91 Wisconsin Turkey Stamp is also required to hunt turkeys during the Fall 1990 season. Stamps cost \$5.25 each and are also available at DNR and county clerk offices. The 1990-91 stamp will also be good for the Spring 1991 wild turkey hunt.

Applications for Fall 1990 Wild Turkey Season Due August 10

Every summer I hear numerous complaints from boaters complaining about other boaters. It maybe a water skier coming too close to a fishing boat, or a fishing boat anchoring in the middle of the lake blocking a water skiers path.

There is a law that forbids a boat towing persons engaged in water skiing, aquaplaning or similar activities on any lake to pass within 100 feet of any occupied anchored boat. This only applies to the boat, and also only when it is pulling a skier etc. It also only applies to an occupied anchored boat not a

drifting fishing boat.

There are laws that can be used in extreme situations, they require a motor boat towing a skier, etc., do so in a careful and prudent manner and at a reasonable and safe distance from persons or property. Also an operator of a motor boat is responsible for his wake or wash when approaching or passing another boat. An operator is liable for damages caused to another by his or her wake or wash.

In most cases the real problem is a lack of respect for others. Our lakes are becoming more crowded every year with various activities and water craft, ranging from fishing from a canoe to barefoot skiing behind a 200 h.p. ski boat. More rules and regulations are not the answer, instead boaters must show more respect for others on our lakes. Stay as far away as possible from other lake users and slow down when the water is crowded to allow more time to avoid obstacles.

At times lake users must also sit down and discuss their concerns. More laws are not the answer, courtesy and respect for others is.
