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



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## Peace UCC Volunteers Work on 1990 Habitat For Humanity Project in Lexington, Kentucky





Know why things are always in the last place you look? Because after you find them you stop looking.

Transforming the rough shell of a new house into a structure awaiting finishing touches was the five day work project of the Peace UCC volunteer crew in Lexington, Kentucky July 7-14.

Home again now in Kewaskum, the 21 Peace Church members have exchanged their hard hats and hammers for the tools of their regular jobs, but all of them agree that the 1990 Habitat for Humanity work week was "the best ever."

The Lexington project has seven other houses already inhabited by buyers with no-interest mortgages, the Habitat ethic. These payments are lower, usually under \$200.00 per month than rents previously paid to absentee landlords for the dilapitated 'shotgun'' type houses in old Irish Town of Lexington. (Shotgun houses have each single room directly behind another and are usually very close together). An eighth Habitat house is still under construction, with Peace Church crew working on the ninth.

During the three years of building, only one house was rehabilitation; others were constructed on vacant,

tax-delinquent lots purchased by the Lexington Habitat. In 1990, to celebrate the fifteenth anniversary of Habitat International, Lexington plans to build 15 more houses, and Peace Church has been invited to return and help!

Temperatures in Lexington were in the humid, high 90's all week, but the volunteers insulated, constructed interior partitions and stairs, electrified, installed windows, and roofed. Dirt was moved to fill the yard, and the crew ate noon lunches on a board over sawhorses just adjacent to the dirt pile. Marion Erdmann and Betty Bettin, cooks for the crew, prepared all meals at Koinonia House, a religious fellowship building on the University of Kentucky campus.

At night the Koinonia dining area became a dormitory, covered with the tired Kewaskum workers on their air mattresses. Rev. James Bettin coordinated this fourth annual work trip. "This was the best organized Habitat project we've ever been privileged to serve," observed Bettin. "The on-site supervision and concern for our comfort and safety were outstanding. We've made some wonderful new friends in

Kentucky."

The crew attended Sunday services at Emmanuel UCC, a black congregation, in Lexington. Rev. Leticia Rouser planned the early morning service for the Wisconsin service for the guests. Daily devotions were led all week by Rev. Bettin in the chapel at Koinonia House with hymnals written in both Korean and English, since Korean Christians meet there each Sunday! Lexington's Second Presbyterian Church provided an evening dinner for the Kewaskum crew, and the workers Lexington Habitat hosted a midweek potluck party with owners of Habitat homes and local volunteers attending.





Again, as last year, the threat of rain forced the Livestock Sale committee to make a quick, last -minute decision Thursday night, to move the Washington County Fair's 21st annual livestock sale indoors.

The weather, however, did not dampen either the fair goers or the bidders' enthusiasm and the sale went off without a

Steve Janz of West Bend may have set another Washington County Junior Fair record this year. For the second straight year, Janz showed both the champion hog and champion beef steer. In 1989, Janz also showed the top hog and steer which brought record-breaking

While bidding was steady and prices good, Janz' animals (this year) brought less than half of the going price of his 1989 entries. Janz' 1990 entry in the hog division brought \$6.50 a pound, for a total of \$1,657.50, from Enders Construction. Another coincidence, both last year's and this year's hogs were exactly the same weight, 255

pounds. Janz' 1,275 - pound champion beef steer brought \$5.00 a pound, for a total of \$6,375, also purchased by Enders Construction. (In comparison, a bidding war last year between Royal Ford and Pick N Save,

Janz \$3,188 for his hog and \$12,495 for his steer).

The 1,255 pound reserve champion beef steer of Kevin Parish, Kewaskum, purchased by Pick N Save of West Bend for \$1.60 a pound, earning Parish \$2,008.

On an average, prices throughout the evening. bidding were about 75c to \$1.00 a pound lower than 1989. Prices still, however, were considerably higher than those at the Fond du Lac Fair last week, where the champion steer only brought \$2.35 a pound.

The 250-pound reserve champion hog shown by Sean Parish of Kewaskum, went to Pick N Save for \$2.50 a pound bringing in \$625.

The 285-pound Home Bred and Raised champion hog shown by Keith Herman of Allenton, was purchased by Krebs Trucking for \$2.50 a pound. The 230-pound HBR reserve champion shown by Kurt Langenecker of Hartford, went to WTKM for \$2.75 a pound.

The 1,355 - pound HBR champion beef shown by Matt Merry of Hartford, went for \$1.10 a pound to First National Bank of Hartford. The 1,190-pound HBR reserve champion beef of Brian Butzlaff sold to Farmers, Inc., for \$1.40 a pound.

The 1.250-pound champion dairy and HBR champion steer of Tim Sterman of Hartford, went to Amateur Electronics for both of West Bend, brought \$4.20 a pound. The reserve

champion dairy steer of Brad Allenton, Oelhafen, by Kewaskum purchased Frozen Foods for \$1.40 a pound.

The carcasses will be judged for fat content and meat quality produced in the finished animal.

While the livestock auction is a big part of the fair, judging and competition go on throughout fair week. Everything from garden produce, crafts and animal showmanship come under the scrutinizing eye of the judges.

Not only are the animals and projects judged, their exhibition surroundings are also inspected and awards given on a variety of points, from neatness presentation. In the dairy barns, someone is always busy

## Kohl to Promote Flavored Milk at State Fair Get Paid to Go

Kohl visited the Walter Breuer farm in Washington County, which sells its milk to Kemp's Dairy, Kewaskum. Kemps will supply "Herb's Superb Milk House."

U.S. Senator Herb Kohl kicked off June Dairy Month with an announcement that he will promote Wisconsin milk at the Wisconsin State Fair in

Kohl said he will sell five flavors of milk at "Herb's Superb Milk House," his new stand at the state fair.

'We'll be giving people a chance to taste something different raspberry, strawberry, chocolate, banana, and even root beer - flavored milk," Kohl said.

'It's a great chance for me to help promote Wisconsin dairy products in a new way," Kohl said. "The dairy industry is the backbone Wisconsin's of economy and anything we can do to give it a little boost helps

"It's also a chance to invite fair visitors to drop by, say hello, enjoy a cool dairy drink, and let me know what's on their minds," he said. "I plan to be there as much as I can, and I hope to see a lot of people from all across the state during the

Kohl said the product he will sell is real Wisconsin milk, with some flavoring added. "It's a lot better for you than most of the things you'll find along the midway," Kohl said, "and it will be reasonably priced."

Kohl announced his plans during a visit to the Breuer family farm near Allenton, in Washington County. The farm is one of those which sells milk to Kemp's Dairy, Kewaskum, which will supply "Herb's

Superb Milk House."

The farm has been operated by the Walter Breuer family for 45 years. Walter Breuer and his wife, Bernice, recently retired and turned the farm over to their four sons - Larry, Garry, Terry and Mark.

The Breuers gave Kohl a tour of the 400-acre farm. The Breuers milk about 100 head of Holsteins.

## Around the Hill

the three priority watershed areas in Fond du Lac County, (the East Shore Winnebago, Milwaukee River, and Sheboygan River), hills are common. When farming hills, the potential for soil erosion increases proportionately with the steepness and length of the hill. Therefore, two common and cost-sharable practices to reduce soil erosion on hills are contour farming, and contour strip-cropping. Contour farming is cost shared at \$6.00 per acre, and contour strip-cropping is cost shared at \$12.00 per acre.

Contour farming is the practice of farming across the side of the hill instead of up and down the hill, and can reduce soil loss by up to 50 percent. Contour strip-cropping contour farming with alternate strips of row crop and grass/legume or small grain crops. Contour strip-cropping can reduce soil loss by up to 75 percent.

Contour farming and contour strip-cropping are two very easy practices to save topsoil and improve environmental quality. They require only one change for the operator - a change in habit. Aim the tractor around the hill instead of up and down

the hill, and get paid for it! Information on these and other conservation opportunities are available at the Fond du Lac County Land Conservation Office, 574 Prairie Road, Fond du Lac, 923-3033.



#### Minutes of Village **Board Meeting**

Regular Meeting July 9, 1990 8:00 p.m.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in Regular Session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street

President Paul Blumer presided. All Trustee Members were present. A quorum was present.

The meeting was opened with a Moment of Silence and Pledge of Allegiance.

On a motion by Trustee Gary Gavin seconded by Trustee Mary Krueger and unanimously carried by voice vote, the minutes of June 18, 1990 were approved as printed.

Administrator Daniel Schmidt reported that a response was received from the Department of Transportation regarding the village's request for a flashing warning light by the Fire House driveways. The State Department of Transportation will be placing two fire truck warning signs approx imately 300 feet in both directions of the Fire House

Fire Chief Robert Stoltzmann asked the Board to consider ungrading the electrical system within the River Hill Park for next year.

Chief of Police, Richard L. Knoebel informed the Board that the Chamber of Commerce may bring a request in to temporarily close the south end of Parkview Drive to hold some events in conjunction with Kettle Kountry Kolors. The Board did not foresee a problem as long as the property owner

agreed to the closing.

Superintendent of Public Works Department, Augie Bilgo brought to the attention of the Board the number of dogs running at large within the parks and the amount of damage caused by those dogs. It was noted dogs and cats are not to run at large within the village and that in the Park Rules and Regulations dogs and cats are not allowed in the parks. The Board by consensus directed all personnel to enforce the ordinances and rules of the village and to place signs informing the people that pets are not allowed. It should be noted that citations will be issued to anyone violating the ordinances or rules

WHEREAS, traffic volumes, projected to increase by 27 percent by vear 2000, as well as safety considerations suggest the need for controlled access along the USH 41 corridor

WHEREAS, the USH 41 corridor is a major north/south trucking route that serves increasing economic activity;

WHEREAS, conversion of the corridor to freeway status is the least costly long term solution to protecting the investment already made in USH 41 and allowing the development that has already occurred to continue to benefit from the highway; and

WHEREAS, the conversion to freeway status DOES NOT meet the statutory definition of a Major Highway Project and it will be necessary to create statutory language making the project a major project; and

WHEREAS, completion of this north/south facility will enhance the area's lagging tourism industry; and WHEREAS, the cost to acquire

right-of-way to accommodate the necessary changes will only increase over time

THEREFORE, BE IT NOW RESOLVED, that THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM respectfully requests the Transportation Projects Commission to recommend to the Legislature that the USH 41 corridor be enumerated as a major project and subsequent funding be made available.

2. The public improvements shall be the installation of sanitary sewer mains/connection stubs, water mains/connection stubs and storm sewer, catch basins, street/road way, cub and gutter and other related improvements deemed necessary by the Village Engineers on Edgwood Road and to meet the specifications contained in Section 8 of the Municipal Code of the Village of Kewaskum and under the Village Engineers specification for utility and street improvements.

The total amount assessed against the properties in the defined assessment district shall not exceed 100 percent of the total cost of the improvements. The Village Board determines that the improvement constitutes an exercise of police power and the amount assessed against each parcel shall by based on the lineal footage of said parcel on Edgewood Road.

4. The assessment against any parcel may be paid in cash or in annual installments the number of which shall be determined at the public hearing on the proposed assessment.

5. The Village Engineer shall prepare a report which shall consist

a. Preliminary or final plans and specifications for the improvements b. An estimate of the entire cost of

these proposed improvements.
c. Schedule of proposed assessments against each parcel. When the report is completed, the Village Engineer shall file a copy of the report with the Village Clerk for public

inspection 7. Upon receiving the report of the Village Engineer, the Clerk shall cause a notice to be given stating the nature of the proposed improvements, the general boundary lines of the proposed assessment district, the time and place at which the report may be inspected, and the time and place of the public hearing on the matters contained in the preliminary resolution and the report. This notice shall be published as a Class a notice and a copy shall be mailed at 10 days before

the hearing to every interested party 8. The hearing shall be held in the Kewaskum Municipal Building, 204 First Street, at a time set by the Clerk in accordance with Sec. 66.60(7), Wis.

#### Computer Course Offerings Expanded At Moraine Park

The number of computer courses offered by Moraine Park Technical College will double this fall when the college completes its expansion of computer labs at all three campuses.

At both the Beaver Dam and West Bend campuses, rooms formerly used for typing classes will be converted into computer labs, doubling the number of labs at both computer campuses. Beaver Dam will get 10 additional micro-computers raising its number of work stations to 36. West Bend will get 30 additional workstations for a total of 56.

Moraine Park will add 14 microcomputers to its Fond du Lac computer lab for a total of workstations. That represents a 25 percent increase in the work space there, according to Bruce De Boer, associate dean of business for Moraine Park. "This will allow us to offer at least one more full computer section."

additional With the workstations and an upgrading of equipment, Moraine Park can now offer more courses at both Beaver Dam and West Bend, De Boer explained. More evening and weekend classes to all three campuses are also planned, he said.

The computer lab expansion is necessary because demand for the courses exceeds Moraine Park's capacity to accommodate everyone who wants to enroll, De Boer said.

Enrollment for all of the college's computer courses are full and Moraine Park had a total of 264 people waiting to get into the classes during the 1989-90 school year. computer courses are extremely popular," De Boer said. "There were waiting lists for computer courses at all three campuses.

The expansion is a response to those waiting lists, he said, as well as an effort to meet demands from local business and industry for the college to provide more classroom-sized facilities for their employee training needs.

additional computer The space in Fond du Lac should make it "easier for business and industry to come in and use our facilities instead of setting up their own computer training centers," De Boer said.

Moraine Park has been able to provide specialized staff computer training for a few Fond du Lac area firms during times when the Fond du Lac computer labs were not in use for classes, De Boer explained. The college had not been able to do the same on the Beaver Dam and West Bend campuses. "We haven't had the opportunity there," he said. "We've scheduled virtually every available hour with our own classes.

The additional computers and the conversion of lab space at Beaver Dam and West Bend should make it possible to offer local businesses in those communities customized computer training for their

staffs. A brochure listing the software equipment, and courses available at Moraine Park is being prepared for distribution to firms within the Moraine Park District to highlight the specialized specialized training opportunities that will

be available, De Boer explain-

There are laws that can be used in extreme situations, they require a motor boat towing a skier, etc., do so in a careful and prudent manner and at a reasonable and safe distance from persons or property. Also an operator of a motor boat is responsible for his wake or wash when approaching or passing another boat. An operator is liable for damages caused to another by his or her wake or wash.

In most cases the real problem is a lack of respect for others. Our lakes are becoming more crowded every year with various activities and water craft, ranging from fishing from a canoe to barefoot skiing behind a 200 h.p. ski boat. More rules and regulations are not the answer, instead boaters must show more respect for others on our lakes. Stay as far away as possible from other lake users and slow down when the water is crowded to allow more time to avoid obstacles.

At times lake users must also sit down and discuss their concerns. More laws are not the answer, courtesy and respect for others is.
