

computer system. The package Schmidt recommended will cost about \$5,700 and includes a hand-held unit which, when the meter reading is punched in, will provide that data to the computer. "Right now we process all that information by hand," said Schmidt. The cost of the software will be covered, in part, by the money presently being paid for the outside billing services.

In going through department reports, Schmidt advised the trustees that the village will be proceeding with a Hepatitis immunization program for its employes. Members of the Fire, Police, Public Works and Water Pollution Control Department will be invited to attend an informational meeting at St. Joseph's Hospital, which has agreed to administer the shots and maintain employe records for the village.

Schmidt noted the program will be voluntary, however, any employee refusing the shots will be required to sign a release form. The program will cost the village \$132 for each employee who received the immunization.

Police Chief Richard Knoebel advised the board that his department, in conjunction with the Washington County Sheriff's Department and other neighboring communities, is soliciting private businesses for funds to set up a tip line which would provide rewards for

information regarding crimes. Knoebel said the program, like Milwaukee's Crimeline Anonymous, would be set up so individuals could call a toll-free '800' number and provide information on a crime without having to give their identity away. "The caller will remain anonymous and be given a number," said Knoebel, "and if the tip leads to an arrest and conviction, that person could claim the reward by taking that number to the bank handling the funds."

Knoebel said the West Bend Police Department has already agreed to man the phone line 24 hours-a-day.

Knoebel also informed the board that a grant for the DARE program had been approved for Kewaskum and it will pay for the cost of the officer's training, salary and fringe benefits as related to the program.

In final action, the board approved a Class 'B' Beer license for Eckl's Main Street Inn (formerly Landmark Inn), a building permit to Michael Berger for an attached garage, and changing the first September meeting date to Tuesday, Sept. 4th, due to the Labor Day holiday.

The board also approved a resolution to keep the Municipal Building's office hours adjusted to the summer schedule. The office will now be open from 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., all year round.

The board then adjourned to closed session.



Your Child: Home Alone After School?

How can you decide if your child is old enough to be home alone? To help decide, parents may ask themselves some questions that focus on the maturity of the child and the readiness of the parent. Parents and children can then plan together regarding "self-care" for the children.

"respon-What are the "respon-sibilities" of a child home alone? The child may need to unlock doors, which means responsibly handling a house key. The key may be clipped on a child's belt or hung around the neck. The key may even be kept with a reliable neighbor. The key should not be kept in the mailbox, on a ledge, or under the doormat - burglars could break-in much too easily if keys are in those common places! Can you child handle a house key?

A child home alone must be able to handle phone calls and visitors, especially callers and visitors the child does not know. The child may need to deal with repairmen or sales persons, and perhaps with a shady individual who may be eyeing the household valuables! Children need to role play and practice these situations in order to gain confidence in dealing with visitors and to prevent fear and uncertainty in a real-life situation. Can your child handle a caller or visitor?

Parents' minds will be put to rest if the parents know the child will follow family rules. Parents and children need to make clear whether or not the child may have playmates over to visit (and if so, who), may or may not use the stove or should do microwave, household chores, or should phone someone to report on being home safely. Is your child likely to follow family rules?

Your child may be ready for "self-care" if he/she ...

- 1. can handle a house key
 - 2. can deal with callers, and
 - 3. can follow family rules.

Your child also needs to be willing to stay home alone. Be the child has the sure confidence and security to be home alone on his/her own before your child is allowed to do so.

KHS Indians Looking to Improve on 0-9 Record

KEWASKUM - After a 1989 campaign which saw it go winless in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference for the fourth straight year, there is but one way to go for the 1990 edition of the Kewaskum Indians football team - up.

With seven returning starters, three on offense and four on defense, and a total of 36 juniors and seniors out for the sport this year, Indian head coach Clark Pearson has a solid base on which to build the squad. For that reason and others, Pearson is optimistic about this year's team. This is his third year as head coach, and his 18th year as football coach.

"We're looking pretty good," Pearson said earlier this week. "We're a little bigger than we were last year, and a little quicker. We also have a lot more depth.

Heading the list of nine letterwinners is returning senior Mark Felix, who looks to be the frontrunner for the starting quarterback position. The 6-3, 160-pound Felix has been competing with 5-9 junior Chad Cook for the signal-calling duties. Cook quarterbacked the JV squad to a 6-2 record last season.

"Felix is going to start,' Pearson said of the quarterback situation. "They both have been looking good in practice, he noted, but the bact that Felix saw quite a bit of action last season probably was in his favor.

Joining Felix in the backfield will probably be junior letterwinner Randy Schlice. Schlice has been battling a pair of nonseniors Kevin lettermen Herriges (6-0, 160) and Rob Kertscher (6' 161) for the starting running back spot.

The fullback position got a bit of a blow in last week's scrimmage against West Bend East and Slinger, as hopeful Brian Jackson (6', 180) injured his knee and it is not known just how serious the injury is. Senior Jamie Miller (6' 170) will take over the fullback spot in the meantime.

As for the offensive and defensive lines, they will be anchored by returning secondteam all-conference selections, Scott Heller (6' 202) and his brother Brian (6-2, 180). They will be joined on the offensive line by senior center Craig Krell (6-2, 180), who shined in the scrimmage at both center and his linebacker positions.

'He looked real good,'' Pearson said of the senior Krell. 'He's been doing a real good job so far. Scott and Brian

As for strengths of the team. Pearson said "It's hard to say at this stage. Obviously we're going to have much more depth this year, so that will be a key. He also went on to say that "We should be able to throw the ball a bit more," as he has been impressed with his corps of quarterbacks and receivers thus far

"We must improve our running game," Pearson said when citing weaknesses. "We don't have any real dominating players either." Pearson also mentioned that inexperience may hurt the Indians at times.

Pearson points to Two Rivers and Plymouth as the teams to beat in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference this season. Before the Indians get ready to go after their first conference victory in years, they first have their sights set on their old rival, Campbellsport, where they will travel for Friday night's season opener.


