Fire Department Budget and Rescue Costs Discussed

Village Board Begins 1991 Budget Review

Kewaskum Village Board, Monday night, began the tedious, but necessary task of reviewing departmental budgets for 1991. In beginning the reviewing process, Village Administrator Dan Schmidt told the board, he anticipated little change or increases in the 1991 total budget over this year. There are no major projects, non-budgeted emergency repairs or unexpected budget items, he noted.

Monday night's discussion centered around the Fire Department's annual budget, fire contracts with the local townships and the increasing cost of maintaining a rescue squad.

Preliminary figures for the 1991 budget department's remain about the same as this year's, however, some issues brought up by the trustees could affect the final numbers.

Based on the proposed 1991 figures, Schmidt presented fire contracts for the village, Town of Kewaskum and Town of Auburn served by department.

Using the formula which has been in place since 1981, the Village of Kewaskum's contract will cost \$57,615, down 5.4% or \$3,294 from 1990. The Town of Auburn (covered by Kewaskum) will also see a drop in its fire contract cost. The 1991 contract of \$25,147, is down .9% or \$237 from this year's contract. Both decreases are due to the drop in the number of fire calls over the last three years. The figures are used in the formula to calculate contract

The Town of Kewaskum, on the other hand is going to see a dramatic increase in its fire

service costs for 1991, due in part, to a large increase in fire during that same three-year period. The Town of Kewaskum's bill for 1991 fire service will go up 28% or \$11,537, from \$41,265 in 1990, to \$52,802, for 1991.

Records show the village had a total of 22 calls for the period 1987-89, Town of Auburn 15, and Town of Kewaskum 35 (21 of which occurred in 1989).

Discussion of the department's budget then got around to the escalating cost of maintaining an ambulance and rescue squad and providing those services to the townships. "We receive absolutely no money from the townships for those services," said Trustee Ken Bonlender," and it should be made clear to the townships that their fire service contracts do not include any costs for the emergency services provided to their residents." "They're "They're getting that service for free.

Schmidt was asked if the department received any reimbursement for ambulance calls. He said only that which is billed directly to the individual receiving the service, however, that money does not completely cover the cost of a run. Nothing is billed to the townships.

Several of the trustees commented then, basically the village and its residents are picking up the tab for maintaining an ambulance service. Schmidt indicated that was correct. Bonlender told fellow trustees the only township to make any contributions to the department over the years was Scott. "It was just a token contribution, but at least it was something," he said. Trustee Mary Krueger said

then it was about time some changes were made. "It's about time non-residents pay more for ambulance services, Krueger.

Schmidt told the board it had several options that could be considered, dropping rescue service to everyone except for village residents, starting to charge townships ambulance service, or dropping the rescue squad completely and contracting out to a private provider for village rescue services to its residents.

Fire Chief Robert Stoltzmann told the board the issue of funding the Rescue Squad had been discussed on numerous occasions by his department, but the members were reluctant to bring anything to the board. 'I'm glad to hear the board feels the same way we do," said Stoltzmann, "I just wish you would tell that to the rest of the department." The trustees indicated they would. Schmidt said if it was the board's unanimous feeling, he would convey that message to the department when he attends their next meeting.

Loan Bid Goes To Valley Bank

Valley Bank of Kewaskum was the successful low bidder to provide \$1.4 million in short-term borrowing to the Kewaskum School District.

The district received six bids on its proposal to acquire the loan for cash flow purposes. Valley Bank was the lowest of six bidders, offering two notes of \$700,000 each one at 6.09% interest and the other at 6.13%.

Trick or Treat Set for Sun., Oct. 28

Other budget than discussions, the Kewaskum Village Board had little on its agenda Monday night.

Police Chief Richard Knoebel advised the trustees of two issues. First, that trick or treat has been set for Sunday, Oct. 28, from 2 to 4 p.m., to coincide with neighboring communities and secondly, that the enhanced 911 service for the village should be in operation by next fall.

Knoebel said he will be attending meetings beginning next week regarding 911. "We'll start talking about the locations and installation of dispatching stations and boundaries and then proceed from there.

Village Administrator Dan Schmidt advised the board that because Kewaskum's telephone system was not due for updating, the county had agreed to pick up the added cost to upgrade the village's lines so it could become part of the new The phone 911 service. company refused to absorb that cost, noted Schmidt. Because of the county's action, Kewaskum will be included in the initial changeover. Had the county not picked up the cost, the village would have been faced with that issue or been excluded from the service until its system was due for its routine upgrading.

In other business Schmidt informed the board regarding Department Transportation's plans replace the Highway 45 bridge on the north side of the village and the "Buss" bridge north of the village limits.

After seeing the DOT's blueprints, Schmidt said he found an error in the design. The new bridge is narrower than expected and has no room for sidewalks as stipulated by the village

Public Works Superintendent Augie Bilgo told the board, "the present bridge is 33 feet wide and with the new plans we're only gaining 7 feet so why even take out the bridge. "Also, now we've got a sidewalk. We thought the new bridge would be 70 feet wide.' Schmidt said he had submitted a letter to the DOT noting the discrepancies.

Schmidt said work on the bridge is scheduled for July 15, 1991, and it will be closed about 25 days during the construction. He also noted the Buss bridge is scheduled for reconstruction next summer. Work has to begin on that bridge before May 25th or wait until after August 25th, because the DOT said

construction cannot begin once the swallows start nesting. 'That's the honest truth," said Schmidt.

In other action the board approved a building and remodeling permit for Ken Weddig at the residence at the corner of Highway H and 45, bartender licenses, and increasing the rents for apartments in the village owned property on Fond du Lac

The board also voted to move its second meeting in November back to November 26, because of deer hunting season.

Town of Kewaskum Crash Kills Hartland Man

An accident which claimed the life of a 52 year-old man Monday afternoon is still under investigation according to a spokesperson for the Washington County Sheriff's Department. The victim was identified as Raymond R. Falk, 52, of Hartland, Washington County's 19th traffic fatality of the year.

According to the depart-ment's release, the accident occurred at 1:55 p.m., on Highway H, approximately 2/10ths of a mile west of Oak Road, in the Town of Kewaskum.

By GERRY MUELLER Falk was eastbound when his vehicle crossed the centerline and struck a farm implement (haybine) being towed by a westbound truck driven by Roger W. Lueder, 39, Cedarburg.

> The Kewaskum Fire Department was called to the scene and the Jaws of Life used to extricate the man from his car. The Kewaskum Rescue Squad transported Falk to St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend. where he was pronounced dead.

No other details on the incident were available.

In a special meeting, which included a closed session, Monday night, the Kewaskum Board of Education decided to rescind its action of October 8th in which it approved the hiring of two young women as Ke-waskum High School Gymnastics coach and assistant

district has been searching for someone to replace Sue Paul-Kenfield who resigned from her position as a teacher and the KHS gymnastics coach. It was feared the sport would be dropped if a replacement could not be found.

When data on the two applicants was presented, concern rose over the ages of the two indivdiuals being considered for the positions. Heather declined to comment further Tuesday on the special meeting other than to state that the board had voted to rescind its action and re-advertise the positions.

More Schools, More Money **Working Toward Drug-Free Schools**

MADISON Superintendent Herbert J. today reported significant progress in schools efforts against alcohol and other drugs (AOD) as 424 of the state's 429 public school districts receive federal Schools and Drug-Free Communities Entitlements.

"We are encouraged by the level of participation in this federal program this year,"
Grover said. "Thirty more districts qualified for reimbursement for their 1989-90 AOD programming than in the previous year. Department staff members have worked diligently to get entitlements and resources to the school districts. The results will be good for the districts and are gratifying to us at the department."

The 424 districts will share \$3.5 million for 1989-90. The Public Department of Instruction distributes funds, which are allocated by the U.S. Department of Education (ED) based on a district's student enrollment.

State To receive the money, districts must provide details of their AOD education and prevention programs. staff training, community involvement, and evaluation techniques. The districts also must provide program goals and a budget for the year.


Although the application period for 1989-90 funds continued until June 30, 1990, those funds became available for distribution on July 1, 1989. Funds are distributed by the department as districts request reimbursement for authorized

An additional benefit of the entitlement program is the information we gather in the process," Grover said. "Seeing the data about programs that are producing results for a district enables us to share that information with districts that are looking for solutions." The ED has increased the

amounts available for 1990-91, when entitlements will total approximately \$6.3 million. Part of the increase to districts results from an additional entitlement based on the amount of funds a district Chapter receives for programs.

Because of federal rule changes, districts must apply for the 1990-91 entitlements by August 17 this year. That application, however, will cover entitlements to funds 1991-92 and 1992-93.

Kewaskum School District's 1989-90 entitlement was \$7,847.

Most of the solicitations involve the scale of advertising in law enforcement-oriented magazines, and include a claim that such advertising will help support programs in schools

1991 Bridge Work To Close US 45 In Village

Washington and Fond du Lac County residents who like to be prepared can start planning now for a 1991 construction project that will close US Highway 45 for 25 working days next summer.



Rustic Roads Guide Available for Hassle-Free Motoring

Remember the olden days of the leisurely Sunday drive? Those slow-paced, scenic roads are still around, many of them preserved through Wisconsin's Rustic Road program.

What's more, they're going to be at their absolute peak of fall color and beauty in a couple or three weeks, according to the State Department

Transportation.

Wisconsin's Rustic Roads system was created by the state Legislature in 1974 to preserve the state's scenic, lightly-traveled country roads for the leisurely enjoyment of bikers, hikers and motorists.
Currently there are 59

segments of rustic roads located in 34 counties ranging in length from 1.5 to 26 miles. The scenery is as diverse as the state, itself. Many roads pass through dense northern forests where waterfowl and wildlife abound. Others traverse open farmlands offering pleasant agricultural vistas.


Some of the roads are gravel surfaced, but most are paved. The maximum speed on any rustic road is 45 mph. Some rustic roads are curved, others hilly...but all offer opportunity to shun today's busy turnpikes and step backwards into the leisurely pace of yesterday.

Rustic Roads are marked by brown and yellow signs with a one-to-three digit number prefixed by the letter "R."



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NICK JOSEPH

Nick Joseph, 73, of 1115 E. Brownell Ave., Tomah, died Monday, Oct. 8, 1990, at his residence.

He was born Nov. 3, 1916, at Fond du Lac, a son of Daniel and Ida Abraham Joseph. On Dec. 30, 1971, he married Joy B. Edinger at Chicago.

Mr. Joseph was a world traveler, adventurer, ambulance driver, free lance writer, salesman and fighter pilot. He traveled the South Pacific, Japan, China, Spain, Africa, Germany, Australia and New Zealand. During his travels he was a free lance writer for a numer of magazines. At one time he was a salesman for Service Motors of Fond du Lac. In the late 1930s, he drove ambulances in Spain during the later years of the Spanish Civil War. When the Germans invaded France, he went to France to set up the American Volunteer Ambulance

Prior to World War II, he smuggled U.S. dollars into Nazi Germany to help get the Jews out of the country.

In 1940, he joined the Royal English Air Force and flew Spitfires in Europe. He later transferred to the Royal Canadian Air Force where he taught flying and instrument flying until 1945.

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
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JV Volleyball Team Indians Finish Finishes 8-4


down the Tigers on Thursday.

1992 Wisconsin State Parks Sticker Design Contest Opens

MADISON, WI - High school seniors are again invited enter the state park admission sticker design contest sponsored by the Natural Department of Resources' Bureau of Parks and Recreation, said Pamela Birschbach, DNR contest coordinator.

"The contest has worked successfully for the past four years, providing the department with very professional - looking vehicle windshield stickers," Birschbach said. "The contest affords young artists an opportunity to apply their skills and talents.

The design contest is open to any 12th grade student attending public or private schools, or equivalent in Wisconsin. The winning artist will be awarded a \$500 posthigh school scholarship and plaque. Second and third place plaques will also be presented, and seven entries will be awarded honorable mention designation.

The winning sticker design will be displayed on more than 150,000 vehicles across the state. Entries are due March 1, 1991 with the announcement of the winner to be made during March.

The winning entry for 1991 was submitted by Bryon Hamann of Green Bay Preble trilliums. The 1990 winning Saloon 3-5; Audrey & Don's 3-5. a pair of ducks showed design on a lake with a setting sun in

the background, and the 1989 design depicted a butterfly.

"The design must be the artist's own original creation and not copied or duplicated from previously published art, including photographs, Birschbach said. "Artists are limited to four colors, with black and white each counting as a



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Indians Shut Out New Holstein, 12-0

NEW HOLSTEIN — The New Holstein football players and fans probably thought that last Friday night was going to be quite a festive occasion. It was the Huskies Homecoming game, and the school was also dedicating their new football field on this night as well.

New Holstein was also playing Kewaskum, losers of its last 30 games in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference, dating back to October 25, 1985. But it was the Indians who were celebrating at the end of the game, as they ended their long drought with a 12-0 shutout of the Huskies.

"It feels great," said Indians coach Clark Pearson, who probably didn't even mind getting the traditional bucket of water over the head after the game, despite it being only about 30 degrees at the time. "We finally got the monkey off our back."

The Indians defense was the difference in this game, as the defensive line came up with eight sacks of Husky QB Joe Williams, accounting for a loss of 64 yards. Overall, the Huskies came away with a net of minus 32 yards on the ground.

"The defensive line played just super," Pearson said. "The whole defensive unit played

Another key was field position. Fueled by Jamie Miller's opening kickoff return to the Husky 49, the Indians average starting field position in the first half was at the New Holstein 45 yard line. New Holstein, meanwhile, started their drives from their own 26.

"That makes a big difference," Pearson said, obviously from experience in past games when the Indians were in New Holstein's shoes.

Despite the fine field position, the Indians were unable to get on the scoreboard until the 6:10 mark of the second quarter. That's when Mark Felix hooked up with Shawn Schneider in a beautiful 15 yard pass play in the corner of the end zone.

"Felix threw just a perfect pass," Pearson said of the play, which occurred on a fourth-and-six. "We've been working on that play a lot in practice." While the extra point was no good, the Indians still took a 6-0 lead into the locker room, with thoughts of the elusive victory dancing in their heads.

The Indians continued to dominate defensively in the second half, as they forced a couple of interceptions while consistently putting pressure on Williams. The Husky QB finished the night just 5 of 17, for 53 yards, all going to tight end Matt Savola.

The Indians then put the game away, as Felix scrambled for a 10-yard TD run with 7:38 left to play in the game. The score was set up by Chad Cook's interception at the Kewaskum 38.

Kewaskum, which finished the season 1-5 in conference, finished with 184 yards on the ground, with Miller getting 83 yards in 10 carries. "He had a real nice game... did a real good job overall," said Pearson. Felix also did a nice job, finishing with 45 yards rushing to go along with 8 of 12 passing for 52 yards. Schneider was the recipient of 39 of those yards.

"It was just a real excellent team effort," said Pearson, who in particular praised the linemen, both of offensively and defensively. The Indians outgained New Holstein in total yards, 248-27, and were thus much deserving of the standing ovation that they received from their fans at the end of the game.

"It was a great way to end the year," Pearson concluded. "Hopefully, it will be a springboard for us into next season."

Indian JV, Freshman Football Teams End Successful Seasons

Kewaskum — While the Kewaskum varsity football team has been struggling in the Eastern Wisconsin conference this season, the Indian junior varsity and freshman football teams recently concluded one of their most successful seasons in

recent memory.

The JV squad completed their season last week with a 32-6 thumping of New Holstein, thus finishing the year with a 3-2 record, including a last minute 12-6 victory over Two Rivers. It was the second straight year that the JV team beat the Raiders.

The JV squad was led by the backfield of running backs Matt Schlosser, Dan Schulties, Jim Rix and quarterback Scott Donath, who consistently rolled up big numbers with the Indians running game. Schlosser and Schulties, along with Aaron Rettler were the catalysts of the tough Indians defense as well.

Those five players along with other JV leaders such as Brad Weinreich and Todd Muckerheide will definitely push the returning members of the varsity squad for starting spots next year, thus providing hope that the long losing streak that was recently snapped by the varsity will be long forgotten.

Indian freshman, The finished their meanwhile. season with a 3-2-1 record, which was highlighted by a 30-12 romp over perennial powerhouse Two Rivers. It is believed that this was the first time in history that a Kewaskum freshman football team has beaten the ever-tough Raiders. In the frosh's final game of the year, the Indians led 14-0 in the first quarter, but could not hold on as New Holstein came back to win

For the season, the freshman squad was led by talented running back Beau Coulter. Coulter handled the majority of the team's running game, averaging over 100 yards per contest. Coulter's best game was against Kiel when he rushed for over 100 yards and piled up four touchdowns in the process.

"He had a very good season," Frosh coach Jim Westphal said of Coulter.
"He's just a very good running back...very talented." Coulter finished the year with 11 touchdowns, most coming on

long runs.

The freshman offense was led by quarterback Jason Gaffke, who also had a very fine year. Gaffke showed very good arm strength for a freshman, according to Westphal.

"He threw the ball real well," Westphal said of Gaffke. "Most freshman teams don't have much of a passing game, but we could pass because we had him. He did a fine job."

While Westphal would not go as far as to say that some of the freshman would challenge for varsity spots next fall, he did say that the kids should be proud of what they have accomplished.

"Having never played tackle football (at a competitive level), they came a long way, ..made great strides," Westphal said. "We weren't all that big," but "it was one of the more successful teams as far as wins and losses that I can remember."
