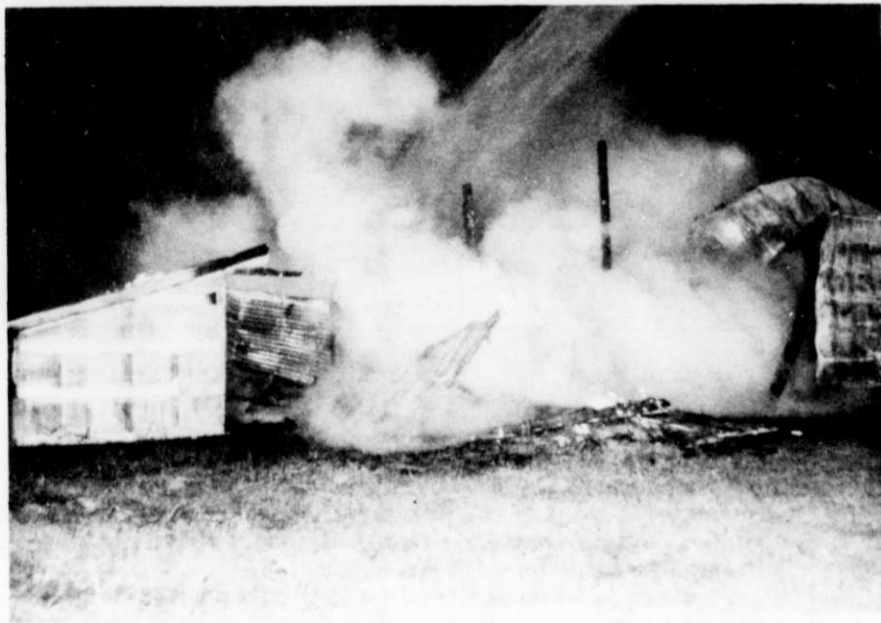

Arson Suspected in Farmington Fire



Almost 100 firemen battled a suspected arson fire which destroyed a 75 x 300 foot pole building at the Brookside Poultry Farm. Water from the Kewaskum Fire Department's telesquirt poured down on the burning building.

A pre-dawn fire which destroyed a 75 foot by 300 foot pole building at the Brookside Poultry Farm, 9249 Wescott Road, Town of Farmington, Thursday, October 25th, is still under investigation according to Boltonville Fire Chief Joe

Enright.

Enright stated his department received the fire call from Mrs. James Powers, wife of the poultry farm's manager, at 5:31 a.m. According to Enright, the Powers' dog became restless and alerted the family that something was wrong.

When the Boltonville Fire

Department arrived on the scene, the building was in flames. Full department mutual aid was requested from the Beechwood, Fillmore and Kewaskum Fire Departments. Approximately 100 firemen were at the scene and battled the blaze for more than 2½

Two Hot Races and Referendum on Ballot General Election Tuesday

The continuous barrage of campaign commercials will undoubtedly intensify over the next few days as the statewide general election on Tuesday, Nov. 6th, rapidly approaches.

Heading the list of battles to get the electors' vote is the gubernatorial race between incumbent Republican Governor Tommy Thompson and his running mate incumbent Lieutenant Governor Scott McCallum and Democratic challengers Thomas Loftus and his partner Joseph Czarneski.

While polls continue to show Thompson having the edge, Loftus has waged a continuous TV and news campaign in the hope of bringing in the undecided vote to his camp.

Just as heated a political contest is continuing between incumbent Republican State Attorney General Donald Hanaway and his Democratic challenger James Doyle.

Depending upon which part of the state you look at, both candidates are claiming polls show they have the edge in next week's election. The fact that both men do have voter strongholds across the state may see a close run race for this post. Though little is heard about it, there is a third candidate in this race. The Labor/Farm Party's challenger, Patricia Hammel.

For Secretary of State, incumbent Democrat Douglas La Follette is being challenged by Republican Robert Thompson.

There are four candidates vying for the post of State Treasurer, incumbent Democrat Charles Smith, challenged by Republican candidate Cathy Zeuske, Labor/Farm candidate Lucille Berrien and Independent David Ameringer.

Also on the state level, (representing our general area), incumbents State Senator Joanne Huelsman and State Representatives Steven Foti, Mary Panzer, Steven Loucks, Michael Lehmann and Susan Vergeront are all running unopposed.

On the county level, incumbents District Attorney J. Dennis Thornton, County Clerk Arthur Degnitz, County Treasurer Fredric Seefeldt, Sheriff Robert Schulteis, Coroner Shirley Hofmaier, Clerk of Courts Carol Puerling and Register of Deeds John Steilen are running unopposed.

In the U.S. Congress, incumbent Republican F. James Sensenbrenner, Jr. is running unopposed for the 9th District.

Also on the ballot is an official local mandate referendum which is asking the question, "Should the Wisconsin Constitution be amended to require the State to provide full funding for any program, service or benefit it requires local government to provide?"

An average turnout is expected for the election, however, the referendum question and races for governor and attorney general could draw more voters out to the polls next Tuesday.

More than four hours later the last fire truck left the scene of last Thursday's fire which left the large metal pole shed and its contents of farm machinery nothing more than piles of twisted rubble.

hours.

One of the first firefighters on the scene noted fires at both ends of the large shed. Because of the suspicious circumstances, the Washington County Sheriff's Department fire investigator and state fire marshal were both called to the scene.

Enright stated arson is suspected. He said the investigators were looking into several good leads. He indicated, however, he could not release any other information for the present.

Enright stated no dollar

amount, as yet, had been set for the fire damage. He said Brookside's insurance carrier was sending in its own investigators and appraisers from Minnesota to access the damage.

Along with the building, a large amount of farm equipment being stored in the shed was destroyed. Lost were several tractors, hay wagons and a variety of implements belonging to Brookside and two local farmers, Gary Schladweiler and Herb Donath, Jr., according to Enright. There was no injury or loss of

poultry which were housed in adjacent pole barns on the property.

The poultry farm made the news several years ago as the scene of an unsolved shooting incident which claimed the lives of two local men, one of which had been an employee of the farm's former owners.

School Board Approves New Gymnastics Coaching Contracts

At a special meeting Monday night, the Kewaskum Board of Education approved issuing new Gymnastics coaching contracts to fill the vacancy left by the resignation of teacher and coach Sue Paul-Kenfield.

Approved for the head Gymnastics coaching position was Irene Heather. Heather has a degree in Physical Education. A contract for the assistant Gymnastics coaching position was approved for Amy Becher.

At its regular meeting October 8th, the board had approved the issuance of a contract for the head coach's job to Becher with Sara Collins being okayed for the assistant's job. At a special meeting October 15th, however, the board rescinded its action taken at the earlier meeting. The decision to rescind the approval of Becher and Collins' contracts came after some concern was expressed over the ages of the two applicants. Becher is 18, while Collins is 15, and would have been younger than some of the athletes she would have

coached.

At Monday night's meeting the board unanimously approved the hiring of Becher as the assistant coach.

In other action the board approved the hiring of Wes Gaedtke as freshmen boys assistant basketball coach and Mary Holfeltz as the 7th grade girls assistant basketball coach.

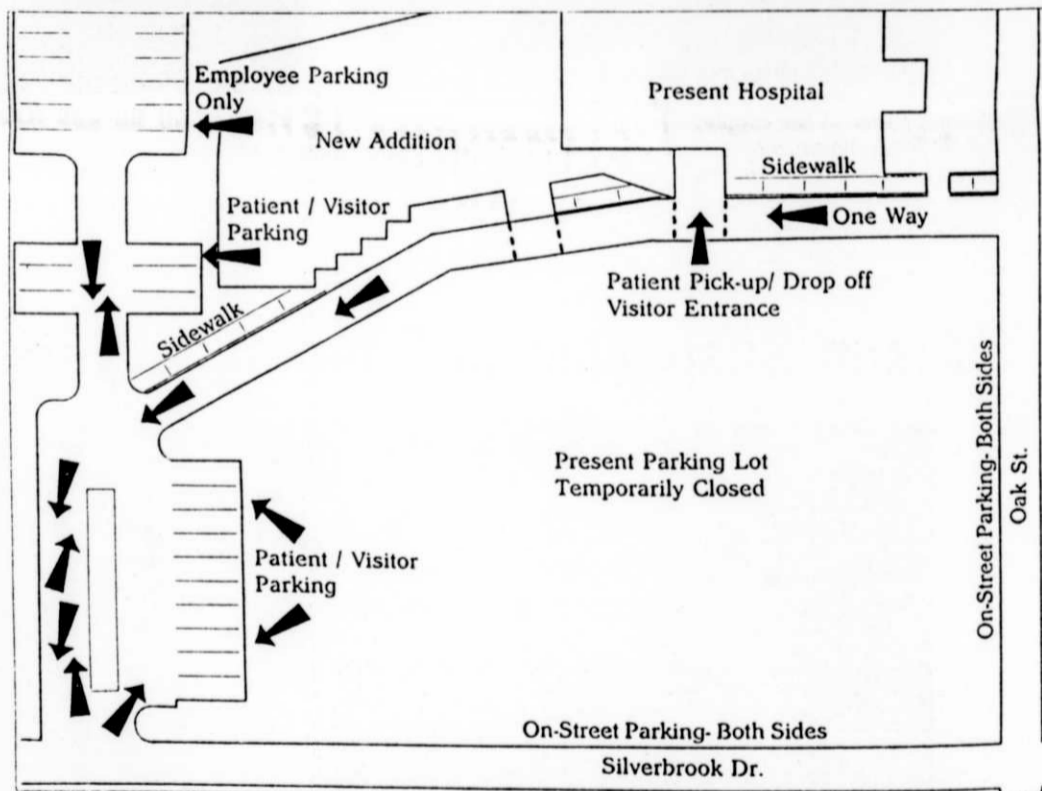
Board of REALTORS Breakfast Meeting

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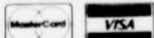

Costlier Oil Could Boost Farm Costs About 3 Percent

Higher prices for oil-based products could increase a typical Wisconsin farmer's production expenses by about 3 percent in 1991, predicts a University of Wisconsin - Madison extension farm finance specialist.

"The increase would come to about \$2100 per farm," says agricultural economist Bruce Jones.

That assumes a 30-percent rise in the cost of fuel, fertilizer and pesticides, which are derived from petroleum. Those costs comprise about one-seventh of the average Wisconsin farm's production budget.

This rough, back-to-the-envelope calculation doesn't consider the inflationary impact oil prices could have on the cost of other inputs, or that farmers may cut back on the higher-priced products, he cautions.

It would hurt about as bad as a 25-cent drop in farm milk prices for a 60-cow herd with average milk yields, he says.

How bad that is depends on the farm. In 1989, Wisconsin farms spent an average of \$57,000 for all production costs including interest. They netted 25 cents out of every dollar they took in. Costlier fuel, fertilizer and chemicals could cut that by about 3 cents, Jones reasons.

Net income is the return to the family's labor and its investment in land, livestock and equipment. It's what's available for reinvestment, savings and retirement.

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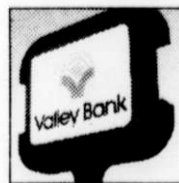

The initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot card, upon being permitted to vote, the elector shall appear alone to a voting booth and cast his or her ballot except that an elector who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the elector's minor child or minor ward. An election official may inform the elector of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

At the November general election, if the elector wishes to cast a straight party vote for all candidates nominated by any party, the elector shall make a punch or a hole or depress the lever or button next to the party designation printed on the ballot card. Unless another name has been written in, a punch or a hole made to the right of a candidate for the same office of another party or hole made to the right of a candidate for the same office of another party is a vote for that party's candidates listed on the ballot. If an elector does not wish to vote for all the candidates nominated by one party, the elector shall make a punch or a hole or separately depress the lever or buttons at the right of or next to each candidate's name for whom he or she intends to vote, or write in the name of a candidate on the envelope provided.

If you wish to vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, write in the name and the office of the candidate of your choice on the ballot envelope provided.

An elector must vote for Governor and Lieutenant Governor jointly on one ticket. To vote for candidates whose names appear on the ballot, make a punch or a hole at the right of the Governor candidate of your choice or depress the lever or button or lever next to the Governor candidate of your choice. For persons whose names are not printed on the ballot, write in the office titles and the names and candidates of your choice for both offices on the ballot envelope or lines provided. A write-in vote for only one person will invalidate your vote.

On referendum questions, the elector shall make a punch or a hole at the right of or depress the button or lever next to "yes" if in favor of the question or the elector shall make a punch or a hole at the right of or depress the button or lever next to "no" if opposed to the question.

The vote should not be cast in any other manner. If the elector spoils a ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one elector. If the ballot has been initiated by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the elector shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place. Not more than five minutes time shall be allowed inside a voting booth or machine. Unofficial minutes may be used to assist the elector in punching or marking his or her ballot or a memorandum to assist the elector in punching or marking his or her ballot may be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

After an official ballot is punched, it shall be inserted in the envelope provided so the punches do not show. After casting his or her vote, the elector shall leave the booth or machine, deposit the envelope containing his or her ballot in the ballot box, or deliver the envelope to an inspector for deposit, and shall leave the polling place promptly.

An elector may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the elector declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing or understanding English or that due to a disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. The individual selected to assist in casting his or her ballot, service or benefit received by the elector or agent of a labor organization which represents the elector.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that an election to be held in the several towns, wards, villages and election districts of the State of Wisconsin, on the first Tuesday of November 1990, being the Sixth day of said month, the following advisory referendum question will be submitted to a vote of the people pursuant to law:

QUESTION: "Should the Wisconsin Constitution be amended to require the state to provide full funding for any program, service or benefit that requires local government to provide?"

EXPLANATION

The State of Wisconsin requires local government, such as cities, villages, towns and counties, to provide certain programs and benefits to the public. The State may provide funding for these programs, but is not required to do so. Therefore, additional money for funding these State required programs must come from the tax levy of the local government.

A "YES" vote on this question would express support to begin the process of amending the Wisconsin Constitution to require that any program, service or benefit, which the State requires the local government to provide to the public, be funded entirely by State revenue rather than local government revenue.

A "NO" vote on this question will support the current practice which allows the State the option of funding all or part of any local government program required by the State, but does not obligate the State to provide any funding to the local governments.

Washington County Law Enforcement WE TIP Program

DETAILS: Over the past several months, all the law enforcement agencies in Washington County along with the District Attorney's office, have developed a program where citizens, having knowledge or information on a crime that has been committed in Washington County, can receive a reward for reporting this information to law enforcement authorities, if the information leads to the arrest and conviction of the person responsible for the crime.

The program is known as the Washington County Law Enforcement WE TIP Program. It has a statewide, toll free 800 telephone number, which can be called by anyone wishing to report information on a crime that occurred in Washington County. The caller will not be required to give his/her name, but will be asked to give as much information as possible about the date and place the crime occurred, and a detailed account of the information they wish to report about the crime. The caller will be given a Confidential Identification Number, along with further instructions about the reward program, and how and where the reward can be collected when it is approved.

After the information has been reported and recorded on the Washington County Law Enforcement WE TIP Line, it will be forwarded to the appropriate law enforcement agency for further investigation. After the information reported to the WE TIP line has been investigated by the appropriate agency, the results will be recorded and a report on the information and results will be turned over the Washington County Chiefs of Police Association for their review and determination on the reward. If the information leads to an arrest and conviction of the person or persons responsible for the crime, a financial reward will in all likelihood be approved. If the information did not result in an arrest and conviction, no reward will be authorized.

Once the reward is determined and approved by the Washington County Chiefs

of Police Association, authorities at the local financial institution handling the WE TIP account will be notified and arrangements made for payment of the specified reward amount. The rewards can range from \$1.00 to \$1,000.00 depending on the information being reported and the type of crime that was committed.

This program is funded through donations from individuals and businesses throughout Washington County.

The toll free number for the Washington County Law Enforcement WE TIP Line is 1-800-232-0594. Citizens are reminded that this tip line is for people to report legitimate information that they may have about a crime that has been committed, and that the information being reported should be of the nature that it will be helpful to the investigation agency in the apprehension and conviction of the person or persons responsible for the crime.

The tip line should not be called to merely report incidents or provide additional information on matters previously reported to Police.

The Washington County Chiefs of Police Association strongly believe that very few crimes occur, where there is not a witness or someone with some knowledge of the crime. We also recognize that for some reason or another, witnesses or people having knowledge of a crime are sometimes reluctant to report this information to the Police. For this reason, the Washington County Law Enforcement WE TIP LINE was developed, and citizens can now report this information to the appropriate authorities and remain anonymous, and at the same time possibly receive a reward for their information if it results in an arrest and conviction.

NOTICE OF REFERENDUM ELECTION

TO: ELECTORS OF THE SCHOOL DISTRICT OF LOMIRA

TAKE NOTICE that a referendum election shall be held at the next regularly scheduled election on November 6, 1990 in the School District of Lomira at the times and polling places as set forth hereafter on the question of whether or not the initial resolution set forth in the referendum election question below shall be approved.

The referendum election question is:

"Shall the following initial resolution be approved?"

**INITIAL RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING
 GENERAL OBLIGATION SCHOOL BUILDING BONDS
 IN AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED
 \$3,530,000**

BE IT RESOLVED by the School Board of the School District of Lomira, Dodge, Fond du Lac and Washington Counties, Wisconsin, that there shall be issued pursuant to Chapter 67, Wisconsin Statutes, general obligation school building bonds in an amount not to exceed \$3,530,000 for the public purpose of paying the cost of constructing additions to and remodeling and renovating the Lomira K-12 complex and acquiring equipment.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT AND EFFECT OF VOTE

The referendum election ballot will ask District electors to vote "yes" or "no" on the referendum election question as set forth above. A "yes" vote on the Initial Resolution is in favor of the Initial Resolution set forth above and is a vote to approve the borrowing of \$3,530,000 by the School District of Lomira through the issuance of general obligation school building bonds for the purpose of paying the cost of constructing additions to and remodeling and renovating the Lomira K-12 complex and acquiring equipment.

A "no" vote on the Initial Resolution is opposed to the Initial Resolution and is a vote to deny the School District of Lomira the authority to borrow \$3,530,000 through the issuance of general obligation school building bonds for the purpose of paying the cost of constructing additions to and remodeling and renovating the Lomira K-12 complex and acquiring equipment.

In the event a majority of the electors voting vote "Yes" on the Initial Resolution, the District will be authorized to undertake the school building program described above and borrow not in excess of \$3,530,000 therefor; if a majority vote "No" on the Initial Resolution, the District will not be so authorized.

POLLING PLACES AND HOURS

District electors must vote on the referendum question at the times and polling places at which they cast their ballots at the regularly scheduled election held on November 6, 1990.

INFORMATION TO ELECTORS

(a) Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall give his or her name and address before being permitted to vote. Where ballots are distributed to electors, the initials of 2 inspectors must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth or machine and cast his or her vote, except that an elector who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the elector's minor child or minor ward. An election official may inform the elector of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

(b) (i) If paper ballots or lever machines are used, then on the referendum election question, the elector shall make a cross (X) in the square at the right of or depress the button or lever next to the answer which he or she intends to give.

(ii) If a punch card voting system is used, then on the referendum election question, the elector shall make a punch or a hole at the right of "yes" if in favor of the question, or the elector shall make a punch or a hole at the right of "no" if opposed to the question.

(iii) If a mark sense voting system is used, then on the referendum election question, the elector shall make a mark in the space at the right of "yes" if in favor of the question, or the elector shall make a mark in the space at the right of "no" if opposed to the question.

(c) The vote should not be cast in any other manner. If the elector spoils a ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another in its place, but not more than 3 ballots shall be issued to any one elector. If the ballot has not been initialed by 2 inspectors or is defective in any other way, the elector shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place. Not more than 5 minutes' time shall be allowed inside a voting booth or machine. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in marking or punching his or her ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

(d) (i) After an official paper ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show but so the printed endorsements and inspectors' initials on the outside do show. After casting his or her vote, the elector shall leave the voting machine or booth and, where paper ballots are distributed to the electors, deposit his or her folded ballot in the ballot box or deliver it to an inspector for deposit in the box, and shall leave the polling place promptly.

(ii) If a punch card voting system is used, then after an official ballot is punched, it shall be inserted in the envelope provided so the punches do not show. After casting his or her vote, the elector shall leave the booth, deposit the envelope containing his or her ballot in the ballot box, or deliver the envelope to an inspector for deposit, and shall leave the polling place promptly.

(iii) If a mark sense voting system is used, then after an official ballot is marked it shall be inserted in the envelope provided so the marks do not show. After casting his or her vote, the elector shall leave the booth, insert the ballot in the voting device, discard the envelope, and shall leave the polling place promptly.

(e) An elector may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the elector declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty in reading, writing or understanding English, or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her vote. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the elector's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the elector.

NOTE: Electors residing in municipalities which require voter registration must be registered to vote in this referendum election. You can register by contacting your municipal clerk.

Medicare to Cover Flu Vaccine Cost

In Wisconsin, Medicare will cover the cost of flu vaccine this year. Anyone attending the flu immunization clinics sponsored by the Washington County Community Health Nursing Service, during November and December, must bring their Medicare card with them so the service cost can be billed to Medicare.

The Community Health Nursing Service was recently notified by the Wisconsin Division of Health that Wisconsin has been selected as one of six states to participate in this demonstration project of publicizing influenza immunization as a covered Medicare benefit. All Wisconsin Medicare providers have been informed about the program and can bill Medicare for flu immunizations.

All persons over 65 years of age are strongly encouraged to receive the flu immunization each year in November, and this year, for the first time, it will be a Medicare covered service.

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FOOD FOR THOUGHT
By Joyce Albrecht

Love home cooking but have to eat in fast-food style? Want to feed unexpected guests a decent main course? Well, prepare your favorite foods and stock them in the freezer. Making your own "convenience foods" takes some work in the kitchen, but it's manageable and worthwhile.

To find out if the quality of a home-frozen food will be acceptable, freeze a small portion the first time. After you try it and decide it's good, you can start the "mass production."

Here are some how-to-tips from UW-Extension's booklet, "Freezing Home-Prepared Foods."

Preparing the food:

1. Don't overcook foods that will be reheated before serving.
2. For pasta casseroles, just combine the ingredients, assemble the casserole and freeze it. The baking time will be sufficient when you heat it before serving. Only add cheese or crumb toppings when the casserole is being heated to serve. If you put them on before freezing, these toppings become soggy or too dry.
3. If you cook a food before freezing, chill and freeze the food as soon as the cooking finishes. The more rapidly the food is cooled, the fresher it tastes and the longer it keeps. To hasten the cooling, place the original pan in a sink filled with ice water. Change ice water frequently. Small amounts of food can also be cooled by placing them directly into the refrigerator.

Packaging the food:

4. When the food is cooled, package and freeze it immediately. It is unsafe to cool foods containing meat, fish or dairy products at room temperature as it increases the chances of food spoilage and food borne illness.
5. Use rigid plastic containers with snap-on lids for semi-fluid products like soups. Allow at least one inch space at the top for food expansion during freezing.
6. Use freeze bags, not light-weight plastic bags designed for refrigerator or room-temperature use. Air and moisture can easily pass through these bags. If you have to use light-weight bags, overwrap with heavy-duty foil or freezer paper.
7. Prepared food may also be frozen directly in the casserole or baking dish. Put a layer of plastic wrap directly on the food surface before putting on the dish's own cover. Then seal the edges with freezer tape to prevent moisture loss.
8. Some ingredients, such as

lemon and orange rind, grated cheese, crumbled bacon, bread or cookie crumbs, are needed for cooking occasionally. Freeze them in small amounts for your own convenience.

9. Label all foods with name, date and reheating instructions. It's helpful to keep a list of the frozen foods with freezing dates so you know what's on hand. Check off the items as you use them.

Thawing and re-preparing:

10. Most main dishes can be reheated with or without thawing. If you thaw them, remember that foods containing meat, fish, poultry, eggs or dairy products should be defrosted only. Keep them chilled until reheated.

1. There is no absolute rule as to how long frozen main dishes should be reheated. Roughly,

start with less than double the original cooking time. For example, if a dish should have originally cooked for 30 minutes, start with about 50 minutes from the frozen state. Check it often before the end of the 50 minutes to prevent overcooking.

12. Microwave ovens do an excellent job of reheating frozen foods without that "warmed over" flavor. Refer to your own microwave instructions for times or experiment on your own. Note the times for future reference if necessary.

Minutes of Village Board Meeting

Mid-Monthly Meeting
October 15, 1990
8:00 P.M.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in Mid-Monthly Session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First St.

President Paul Blumer presided. Trustee Larry Williams asked to be excused and was absent. All other Trustee Members were present. A quorum was present.

The meeting was opened with a Moment of Silence and Pledge of Allegiance.

On a motion by Trustee Robert Beisbier, seconded by Trustee Thomas McElhatton and unanimously carried by voice vote, the minutes of the October 1, 1990 meeting were approved as printed.

On a motion by Trustee Mary Krueger, seconded by Trustee Gary Gavin and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board approved the applications for Operator's Licenses upon proper payment of fees and authorized the office to issue said licenses as follows:

Turner, Marion L. - Kewaskum, WI
Collins, Cheryl A. - Kewaskum, WI

Note: The Police Department had no objection to the application.

On a motion by Trustee Gary Gavin seconded by Trustee Kenneth Bonlender and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board approved the building permit application of Kenneth Weddig, 111 CTH "H" for an addition to the house and a new attached garage. The office was authorized to issue said permit upon proper payment of fees. (The application was approved by both the Zoning Administrator and the Building Inspector).

Administrator Daniel S. Schmidt reviewed information from the Department of Transportation regarding the bridge replacement on Fond du Lac Avenue USH "45" north. It was noted the DOT did not engineer for the placement of sidewalk. The Administrator read a follow-up letter he sent to the DOT. By consensus of the Board the Administrator was to send a copy of the DOT letter to our legislators.

Chairman of the Protection and Public Safety Committee, Trustee Robert Beisbier noted the public should be reminded to stop before exiting parking lots and driveways. A news note on the subject will be published.

Chairman of the Park and Recreation Committee, Trustee Thomas McElhatton reviewed the summer statistics regarding the swim and tennis programs.

On a motion by Trustee Mary Krueger, seconded by Trustee Robert Beisbier and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board authorized the establishment of the Winter Recreation Program and authorized Mr. Butch Buddenhagen to again set it up and to work with the School District as to the time and dates.

Board Representative for the Mid-Moraine Municipal Association, Legislative Committee, Trustee Robert Beisbier informed the Board that a DNR representative was at the meeting and they discussed storm water runoff and the cleanup of the Milwaukee River.

Administrator Daniel S. Schmidt reviewed upcoming budget committee meeting dates. It was noted the budget meetings would be setup as committee meetings of the whole Board. October 29 & 31, November 5, 12 & 26, 1990 as per the 1991 Budget Process Sheet.

On a motion by Trustee Thomas McElhatton, seconded by Trustee Mary Krueger and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board moved to cancel the November 19, 1990 meeting due to the lack of a quorum and to schedule the mid-monthly meeting for November 26, 1991 in conjunction with the 1991 budget public hearing.

A discussion was held on the 1991 budget and revenue estimates were reviewed as well as general budget increases due to outside services.

Administrator Daniel S. Schmidt reviewed the Preliminary Fire Department budget. The budget for 1991 reflects approximately \$5,427 or 4.6 percent decrease. The budget figure used in reference to the Fire Service Contracts with the Townships reflects approximately a \$7,024 or 7.9 percent increase. It was noted that the results of the proposed budget would be reflected in the fire service contracts for the Village of Kewaskum, Town of Kewaskum and Town of Auburn. The Village's share of the budget will go down approximately 5.4 percent (\$3,294) the Town of Kewaskum

will go up approximately 28.0 percent (\$11,537) and the Town of Auburn's will do down approximately .9 percent (\$237).

Administrator Daniel S. Schmidt informed the Board that the proposed budget is similar to that of last year, with three areas causing the increase. Those areas are salary/wages, schooling and insurance. The formula is identical to that of last year reflecting the same 1/2 of the water charge and other dollar amounts constant. The main shift in percentages was caused by the number of fire calls and changes in equalized values.

On a motion by Trustee Mary Krueger, seconded by Trustee Gary Gavin and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board approved the Fire Department budget pending public hearing and authorized the Administrator to send the tentatively approved Fire Department budget and contracts to the Townships.

It was noted the increase in the insurance account was due to the new Hepatitis B vaccination requirements and the related cost. It was further noted those using the rescue squad service should pay that cost as well as the general insurance cost instead of the taxpayers.

On a motion by Trustee Kenneth Bonlender, seconded by Trustee Thomas McElhatton and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board set the 1990 Trick or Treat hours to coincide with the rest of Washington County, 2:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. on Sunday October 28, 1990.

On a motion by Trustee Thomas McElhatton, seconded by Trustee Mary Krueger and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board approved raising the rent at 1102 and 1102 A Fond du Lac Avenue effective January 1, 1991 as follows:

- 1102 Fond du Lac Avenue (lower apartment) \$255.00
- 1102 A Fond du Lac Avenue (upper apartment) \$225.00

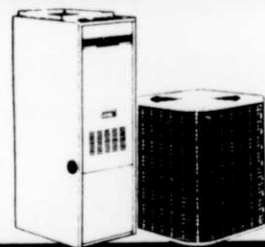

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Hunter's Choice Deer Permits Mailed Beginning November 1

MADISON, WI — Applicants for Hunter's Choice permits for Wisconsin's 1990 gun deer season should begin receiving their permits during the first week of November, according to Dick Royston of the Department of Natural Resources licensing section.

Hunter's Choice permits allow a deer hunter to kill a deer of either sex in a specified deer management area. This year a record 514,370 Hunter's Choice permits are available; in 1989 a then-record 342,321 permits were issued and gun deer hunter harvested a record 310,192 deer.

"Hunter's Choice permits will be mailed starting November 1," said Royston. "We hope to have them all out by November 9."

Wisconsin's regular nine-day gun deer season begins Saturday, Nov. 17 and runs through

Sunday, Nov. 25. This year an extended seven-day gun deer season is available for only those hunters having Hunter's Choice permits for 67 specific deer management zones (see the map). The extended season begins Monday, Nov. 26 and runs through Sunday, Dec. 2; hunters may only take antlerless deer during the extended season.

Deer hunting licenses for residents (\$15.35) and non-residents (\$106.60) are available at DNR and county clerk offices, and at some retail outlets. Licenses must be purchased before the gun deer season begins. More than 660,000 deer hunting licenses were purchased in 1989.

Improving Environmental Conditions for Dairy

Dairy cattle must be kept in clean and dry facilities if mastitis is to be kept under control. Producers that find increases in the level of mastitis during wet conditions may benefit by improving conditions for dairy cattle. Wet conditions increase mastitis, decrease milk production and lower milk quality premiums.

Wet barnyards are the most likely area to contribute to environmental mastitis in dairy cows. There are a number of ways of improving the barn yard conditions. Some of the concepts involved diverting water from upland areas and roofs of buildings, away from the barnyard. Shaping and grading the yard to allow water to drain off rather than accumulate in low line areas, adding concrete or other hard surface areas to a lot and possibly providing an elevated area such as a cattle mound to provide a resting area.

Another option is to keep the cattle off the yard during wet

conditions. This will require that facilities be adequate to provide clean resting areas for animals indoors. Ventilation systems also need to be designed to maintain a comfortable temperature and environment.

Improving barn yard facilities will do more than improve the quality of milk and conditions for livestock. Many barnyards can be sources of water pollution to either surface or groundwater. Adding barnyard improvements can eliminate or reduce the amount of pollution reaching these water sources.

There are a number of funding sources to assist farmers in improving their barnyards and improving water quality. The Watershed Program can provide both cost share funding and technical assistance to help land owners. Other sources of funding may be available outside the boundaries of watershed. This funding and the increased production and reduced mastitis can make barnyard improvement very cost efficient.

Producers wishing more information about barnyard improvement can contact their county Extension Office or Land Conservation Department.

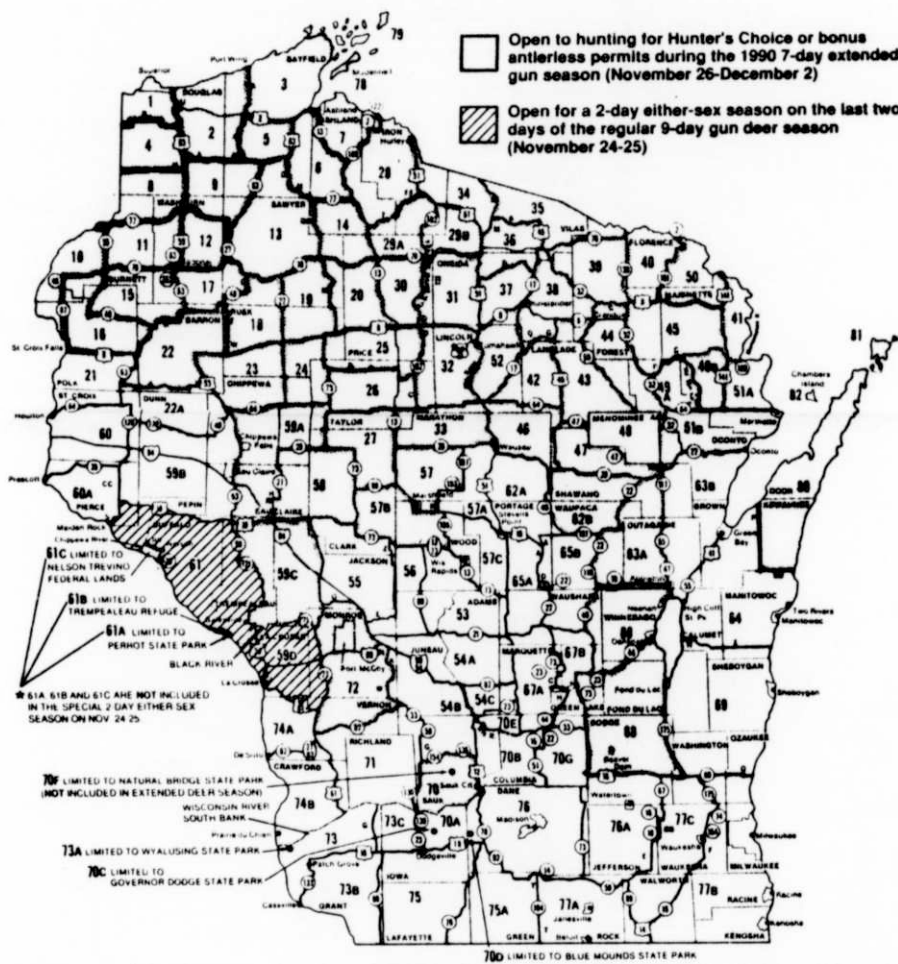

Spring Turkey Hunting Applications Due Nov. 2

With the opening of deer season just a couple of weeks away, the thought of turkey hunting in the spring of 1991 is not on the top of your list. The applications are none the less due this Friday Nov. 2.

A total of 41,340 are available for the Spring 1991 hunt. In unit 30, (the unit open for turkey hunting in our area) the number of permits available has increased from 450 in 1990 to 600 in the spring of 1991. This will increase everyone's chances, but only slightly.

Last year 1670 hunters applied for the permits in Unit 30, 450 received permits, that left 1220 without a permit. If the same number applies this year, and the same people that would leave about 1200 with preference for the 1991 spring hunt. With the 600 permits available, it means even with preference only a 50% chance of getting a permit in Unit 30. In some of the other units all the applicants will receive a permit, so consider applying for another Unit if you want to increase your chances of getting a permit.

The season will begin April 10th, with 6 separate hunting periods running from Wednesday thru Sunday.

Applications can be picked up at the Mauthe Lake Office on weekdays, 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

1990 Hunters Choice Permits are to be mailed starting November 1 and should all be

mailed by November 9th.

Be sure to purchase your deer hunting license before the season opens for a license can not be issued after the season opens, except for special circumstances.
