State Referendum, School, Village Board Elections

REMEMBER TO VOTE APRIL 2

Kewaskum area voters will be going to the polls next Tuesday, April 2nd, to elect officials for the Kewaskum Board of Education as well as the various village and town boards.

For the electors, the complexion of the school board race has changed considerably, from a shortage of candidates to an abundance. With the announcement of candidacy by two write-ins, electors will now see some competition among three candidates for the two available terms.

Incumbent, and present board president, Neal Weare will be challenged by write-ins Jeanne Goeden, a past member of the board, and Ray Engelking, a newcomer to the political arena, for the two expiring terms of Weare and Perry Ankerson. Ankerson decided not to seek re-election to the board.

The picture has also changed for the Kewaskum Village Board election. Earlier this year it appeared there would be competition for the three expiring trusteeships of Mary Krueger, Kenneth Bonlender and Robert Beisbier, with the announcement of two write-in candidates seeking election. However, with the announcement, last week, of write-in candidate Brian Petermann that he is dropping out of the race, the remaining candidates will run unopposed.

Incumbent board president Mary Krueger will be seeking her first full term as president after completing the unexpired term of the late Paul Blumer. Before Blumer's untimely death, Krueger had planned on seeking re-election as a trustee. Incumbent trustee Bob Beisbier will be seeking his first full term on the board, having been appointed to the board in 1990 to complete the unexpired term of the late Vincent Groh.

Incumbent Mark Vechart is also seeking his first full term as

trustee after having been appointed to fill Krueger's unexpired term when she vacated that position to take over Blumer's post.

The third expiring trustee's position is that of incumbent Kenneth Bonlender, who decided not to seek re-election. That decision virtually assures the only remaining candidate, write-in Robert Wagner, the last open seat on the village board.

In area elections, Auburn and Scott are the only two townships that have any competition for an office. In the Town of Auburn, incumbent town chairman Roger Schleif will be facing competition from challenger Harry Knoelke. In the race for supervisor, incumbents Kenneth Jandre and Ervin Seifert will be running against challengers Dennis Fronck and Gilbert Salm. Incumbent clerk Camilla Butzke and incumbent treasurer Maureen Heberer are running unopposed.

In the Town of Scott, incumbents chairman Larry Martin, clerk Lester Benzschawel, treasurer Marie Edeler and Ward #2 supervisor Clarence Janz are running unopposed. Incumbent Ward #1 supervisor Dale Burke is being challenged by Floyd Klug. For the constable's position, David Mount will be challenged by Jody Rosio. The town clerk, stated Monday, however, there is also the possibility of a write-in candidate for the post of constable.

In the Town of Kewaskum, incumbents chairman George Allmann, clerk Barbara Wenzlaff, treasurer Dan Stoffel and supervisor David Dorn will be seeking re-election with no opposition.

Stoffel is running for his first full term as treasurer after completing the unexpired term of retired treasurer Dolores Prost.

Richard Welch is seeking the second supervisor's post being vacated by Bryant Borland, who decided not to seek re-election.

In the Town of Wayne, incumbents chairman Carl Hohlweck, clerk Orville Kern, treasurer Gerald Schulz and supervisors Leonard Peter and Mark Strobel are all seeking re-election with no opposition.

Also facing local electors on the ballot will be the re-election of incumbent Washington County Circuit Court Branch Two Judge J. Schwalbach.

The position of Municipal Court judge will also list a candidate Daryl Laatsch. Laatsch, announced recently however, that he has decided not to accept the post, which is part-time, even if elected.

Statewide, all electors will be voting on a referendum to create a new provision in the state constitution. That proposed new provision to Section One, Article Eight of the constitution, if approved, would give the state permission to acquire, improve or construct housing for persons of low or moderate income housing.

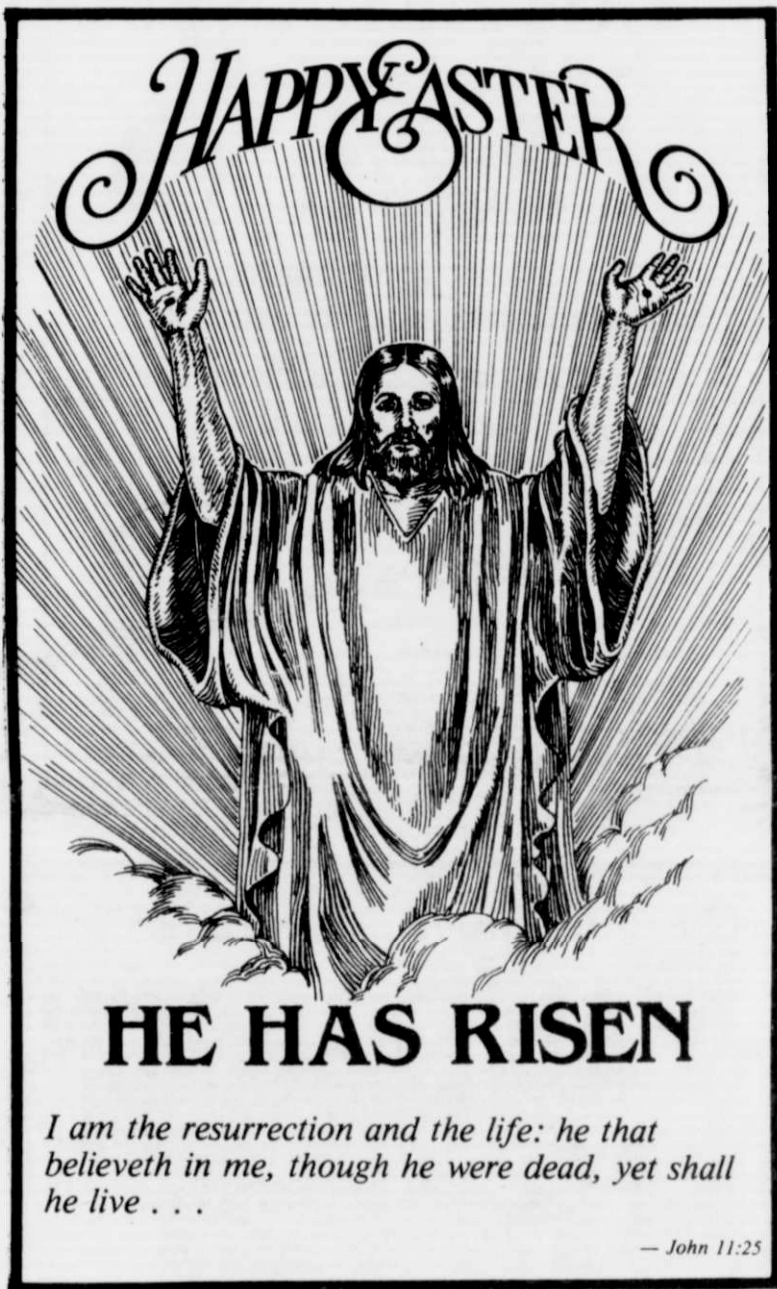
Easter Egg Hunt Saturday

Whereas the 1989 legislature in regular session proposed an amendment to the constitution by 1989 Assembly Joint Resolution 101 (1989 Enrolled Joint Resolution 55) and agreed to it by a majority of the members elected to each of the 2 houses, which amendment reads as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 10 of article VIII of the constitution is amended to read:

(Article VIII) Section 10. The Except as further provided in this section, the state shall may never contract any debt for works of internal improvement, or be a party in carrying on such works; but whenever

(1) Whenever grants of land or other property shall have been made to the state, especially dedicated by the grant to particular works of internal improvement, the state may carry on such particular works and shall devote thereto the avails of such grants, and may pledge or appropriate the revenues derived from such works in aid of their completion. Provided; that the

(2) The state may appropriate money in the treasury or to be thereafter raised by taxation for the:

- (a) The construction or improvement of public highways or the
- (b) The development, improvement and construction of airports or other aeronautical projects or the
- (c) The acquisition, improvement or construction of veterans' housing or the
- (d) The improvement of port facilities. Provided; that the

(3) The state may appropriate moneys for the purpose of acquiring, preserving and developing the forests of the state; but of. Of the moneys appropriated under the authority of this section subsection in any one year an amount not to exceed two-tenths of one mill of the taxable property of the state as determined by the last preceding state assessment may be raised by a tax on property.

SECTION 2. Section 10(2)(e) of article VIII of the constitution is created to read:

(Article VIII) Section 10(2)(e) The acquisition, improvement or construction of housing of primary benefit to persons of low or moderate income.

SECTION 3. Numbering of new section. The new section "10(2)(e)" of article VIII of the constitution, created in this joint resolution, shall be designated by the next higher open whole paragraph number in that subsection if, prior to or simultaneously with the ratification by the people of the amendment proposed in this joint resolution, any other ratified amendment has created a section 10(2)(e) of article VIII of the constitution of this state. If several ratified amendments simultaneously create a section 10(2)(e) of article VIII, the chief of the legislative reference bureau shall determine the sequence and the numbering.

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the assembly, the senate concurring, That the foregoing amendment to the constitution is agreed to by the 1991 legislature; and, be it further

Resolved, That the foregoing amendment be submitted to a vote of the people at the election to be held on the first Tuesday of April, 1991; and, be it further

Resolved, That the question concerning ratification of the foregoing amendment be stated on the ballot as follows:

QUESTION 1: "Affordable housing. Shall a new provision be created in section 10 of article VIII of the constitution, permitting the state to acquire, improve or construct housing for persons of low or moderate income?"

EXPLANATION

Article VIII, section 10 of the Wisconsin Constitution prohibits the state from contracting any debt for works of internal improvement or from being a party in carrying on any work of internal improvement. The term "internal improvement" is not susceptible to easy definition. Generally, the constitutional prohibition has been construed as prohibiting the state from engaging in projects which one might expect to be undertaken for profit or to benefit the property interests of private promoters as distinguished from interests which are primarily and preponderantly an essential function of government. Therefore, the building of a state capitol is not a work of internal improvement but the building of a shipping canal is. Article VIII, section 10 has been amended over the years to allow the state to construct public highways, develop and construct airports, acquire, improve and construct veterans housing, improve port facilities, and acquire, preserve and develop forests. In 1989 the Wisconsin Supreme Court held that article VIII, section 10 prohibited the state from making loans to private real estate developers for privately owned housing, part of which was to be available for persons of low and moderate income.

A "yes" vote on this constitutional amendment would add another exception to the general prohibition against internal improvements in article VIII, section 10. A "yes" vote would authorize the state to acquire, improve or construct housing for persons of low or moderate income. A "no" vote would retain the present language of article VIII, section 10 of the Wisconsin Constitution and would continue the prohibition against works of internal improvement with only the exceptions now allowed.

Emphasis on Energy Conservation Will Keep Electrical Demand Manageable

An increased emphasis on energy conservation by Wisconsin Electric Power Co. and its customers will help keep the growth in electrical demand manageable over the next 20 years.

"We'll continue to emphasize conservation measures by enhancing our existing programs, such as the Smart Money Energy Program, and by aggressively exploring new alternatives and technologies," said Dave Porter, WE senior vice president. "Those steps will help keep the annual growth in peak energy demand to 1.6 percent between now and the year 2010, and over that period will keep average rate increases at or below the rate of inflation."

The 20-year forecast was unveiled today in Advance Plan 6, filed jointly by Wisconsin's electric utilities with the Public Service Commission of Wisconsin (PSCW). The forecast details the utilities' future generation, transmission, energy management and conservation plans.

WE expects to work with its customers to reduce demand for electricity by almost 300 megawatts by the year 2000 through energy efficiency and conservation measures. When combined with the effects of existing programs, this totals almost 530 megawatts of demand reduction. That's 10 percent of Wisconsin Electric's forecasted demand for the year 2000.

"We've invested more in cost-effective customer conservation programs like Smart Money than any other utility our size in the nation," said Porter. "These programs have been successful in eliminating the need for several costly new power plants, in keeping customer bills low, and in helping our business customers

be more competitive."

The plan includes a schedule for the additional power plant capacity needed in the next 20 years. The initial generating units, necessary to supply customer needs at peak demand times, will be the first plants built by Wisconsin Electric since 1985.

As previously announced, WE will install 600 megawatts of new combustion-turbine peaking plants by 1995.

"We've already received PSCW permission for the construction of a 300-megawatt facility near Watertown, with another 300 megawatts to be located at a WE substation near Paris in Kenosha County in 1995," said Porter.

The company also plans three additional 75-megawatt combustion turbines by 1997 at sites still to be determined. In addition, WE plans to purchase additional generating capacity from neighboring utilities.

WE's next baseload power plant is planned for 2001, a coal-fired unit of 400 - 500 megawatts. The specific technology, capacity and location will be determined later.

Between 2002 and 2010, WE's proposed plan would require the installation of two more 400 -mw units to meet customer needs. The specific timing ultimately will be determined by the statewide joint planning process.

FmHA Announces Beginning of Guaranteed Loan Interest-Rate Assistance Program

Ron Caldwell, State Director of the Wisconsin Farmers Home Administration (WI FmHA) announced today that some help was on the way for cash strapped Farmers gearing up for planting the 1991 Crops. He reported the beginning of a Guaranteed Loan Interest-Rate Assistance Program; APPLICATIONS ARE NOW BEING ACCEPTED.

The program offers up to 4% interest-rate reduction to a hard pressed Farm Family currently projecting a negative cash flow for 1991. For example, a typical 12 month \$100,000 Operating Loan with a 4% Interest Assistance could result in an interest savings of \$4,000 to the Farmer (in addition to whatever break the private lender might also choose to pass on).

FmHA Guaranteed Loans are providing through Commercial Banks and the Farm Credit Service (FCS). The first contact, to participate in this program, is between the Farm Family and their private lender.

Caldwell stated, "With milk prices lower, Spring planting right around the corner, and planting costs higher, the timeliness and the flexibility of this program are clearly designed to aid Farmers having trouble making ends meet." The State Director continued, "It adapts to either fixed or variable interest rates, Guaranteed Operating Loans, Farm Ownership Loans, as well as Soil and Water Loans."

In an effort to provide

fast-track service to Farm Families, the FmHA State Office is presently conducting training for Banks, FCS, and FmHA County Office Loan Officers.

"The key to Interest-Rate Assistance is Opportunity," State Director Caldwell concluded, "Opportunity for Farmers, their private lender, and their FmHA — all working together — to create a positive cash flow. And that's good!"

IRS Matches Tax Documents With Your Tax Returns

While taxpayers are getting ready to file their 1990 returns, the Internal Revenue Service is still paying close attention to returns filed for 1988. In fact, the IRS expects to match over a billion documents containing information relating to taxes against the tax returns actually filed by American taxpayers.

As a result of this computerized checking process, the IRS says it will contact over four-million taxpayers nationwide asking them why income that they reportedly received didn't appear on their tax returns. About three-million taxpayers will be contacted and asked why they didn't file a tax return. Other taxpayers will be asked for more information about withholding taxes — information that may result in their receiving an unexpected tax refund.

Here's an example of how the matching program works. Banks and other financial institutions send their customers 1099 Interest Statements, telling them how much interest they earned on checking and savings accounts. Those institutions send the same information to the IRS. The IRS then checks to see that the amount your bank says you earned is the same amount that you reported on your tax return.

The IRS also looks closely at the W-2 forms that taxpayers receive from their employers. Those W-2 forms show wages, tips and other compensation, and the amount of tax withheld. The IRS receives other information about income when corporations, banks and brokerage firms report rents, royalties, interest, and dividends. And the IRS looks at income distribution schedules from partnerships and small businesses, fiduciary tax returns, and some reports of income earned abroad by U.S. citizens.

According to John T. Ader, Director of the Milwaukee District of the Internal Revenue Service, "The IRS matching program is almost fully computerized. When a mismatch is noted by a computer, it is then referred to a person who doublechecks the tax return. If the person agrees that there is a discrepancy, a letter or notice is sent to the taxpayer asking for an explanation."

Because of the time needed to process so much information from so many sources, it usually takes a year or more from the date tax returns are due for that year's matching program to take place. Under the law, a return can be reviewed for three years from the date the return was due or filed — or two years from the date the tax was paid — whichever date is later.

According to Ader, "There are several things you can do to be sure that your records match ours. It's important to use your social security number on all tax documents and cor-

respondence. Be sure that your employer and anyone else who pays you money have your correct social security number. Keep all records (W-2's, 1099's, cancelled checks, receipts) that support any income that you reported or a deduction that you took. And keep a copy of your tax return and the tax return package. They might be helpful if you need to amend a return or in preparing future returns."

Wisconsin Residents Back Recycling

MADISON, WI — Wisconsin residents recycle household trash for love, not money — love of the environment, that is.

Three-quarters of the people interviewed in a recent survey commissioned by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources said they recycle to protect the environment and save natural resources. Less than a fifth cited making money as a reason they recycled.

More than eight out of 10 respondents already recycle some of their household trash, survey results showed. Seven out of 10 people polled recycle more trash now than two years ago.

Nearly four-fifths of those polled supported the state's new recycling law, but two-thirds admitted they were unaware the law had been enacted until they learned of it during the survey, said Lyn Vest, DNR marketing manager.

"The survey shows that people's desire to recycle in Wisconsin is strong," Vest said. "People are willing to recycle even more household trash if some barriers are removed."

Twenty-seven percent of the respondents said their recycling

attempts were hampered by a lack of information about how to recycle or the absence of a community recycling program in their area. Twenty-six percent also cited a lack of space to temporarily store recyclables as a problem.

"Providing more information about how to recycle and establishing more local recycling programs would help more people recycle more kinds of household trash," Vest said. "Creative storage ideas and dwelling designs also would help."

Residents who recycled some household trash usually took it themselves to a recycling center or collection point, according to the survey.

People listed local newspapers as their most important source of information about community recycling programs and requirements (80 percent), ahead of word-of-mouth (40 percent), television (30 percent) and radio (25 percent).

People were polled about their recycling habits in November 1990, just before the department launched a legislatively mandated statewide public information effort to help citizens become aware of and comply with the new law, Vest said.

The survey was conducted by the University of Wisconsin Environmental Resources Center in cooperation with the UW Survey Research Laboratory.

Responses to 42 questions were gathered during randomly dialed telephone interviews with 418 people throughout the state, said Ed Nelson, a sociologist for the DNR's Bureau of Research.

The items respondents most commonly recycled were aluminum cans and newspapers, followed by glass,

plastic and other metal containers. Cardboard and mixed paper were recycled the least. None of these items may be disposed of in landfills or burned in most incinerators after 1995 under Wisconsin's recycling law, which took effect in April 1990.

The law banned the disposal of used motor oil, worn appliances, lifeless vehicle batteries in landfills and most incinerators this year. A similar ban will affect yard waste in 1993.

The bans make recycling imperative, which is the law's intent. The state is authorized to provide local governments that have declared themselves "responsible units" under the law with grants and technical assistance to help local officials set up and run effective household trash recycling programs.

Vest said the department would use annual surveys and other techniques to learn more about recycling needs identified by "people at the grassroots."

"We intend to measure the changing recycling habits of Wisconsin residents as the state's mandatory recycling law is phased in during the 1990s,"

Vest said. "This is important information that we'll use to make sure government programs are targeted to do the most good at the lower cost."

This year the department will query local government officials and other public and private organizations involved in recycling to assess their needs.

"We want to make recycling as easy as possible for all concerned," Vest said.

Minutes of Village Board Meeting

Mid-Monthly Meeting
March 18, 1991
8:00 p.m.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in Mid-Monthly Session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First St.

President Mary Krueger presided. Trustee Larry Williams was absent, all other Trustee Members were present. A quorum was present.

The meeting was opened with a Moment of Silence and Pledge of Allegiance.

On a motion by Trustee Thomas McElhatton, seconded by Trustee Robert Beisbier and unanimously carried by voice vote, the minutes of the February 25, and March 4, 1991 meetings were approved as printed.

The Village of Kewaskum Auditor's Conley, McDonald, Sprague & Co. were present to review the audit prepared for the Village for the year ending December 31, 1990. Mr. Nicholas Quartaro and John Knepel were present for the review. Mr. Knepel reported that they were able to give the Village a clean opinion and that the records of the Village were in excellent condition. It was noted that the Village has established a designated working capital account and that the end result showed a positive revenue figure as well as a favorable expenditure figure for 1990. Moody's or any other financial rating body would look real favorable on the Villages financial status.

It was also noted the Water Utilities rate of return was only 3.6 percent with the Public Service Commission ordering a 5.5 percent rate of return. This would indicate that a rate adjustment must be considered as discussed a year ago following the 1989 audit.

The Sewer Utilities rate of return was 7.6 percent, which reflects a stable condition for that department.

The Auditors indicated the Village of Kewaskum is in good financial condition. They noted that a five year review shows the Village tax rate reflects a 1 percent increase over that five year period, which is excellent. Also it was stated that on the assessed values a 1 percent decrease actually occurred and on the equalized values a 5 percent decrease occurred over that five year period of time.

On a motion by Trustee Thomas McElhatton, seconded by Trustee Kenneth Bonlender and carried by the majority roll call vote, the Board suspended the rule to take action on IX. A. acceptance of the audit report as presented. Roll call vote was 6 "Aye," 0 "Nay," 1 "Absent."

On a motion by Trustee Thomas McElhatton, seconded by Trustee Robert Beisbier and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board accepted the audit for the year ending December 31, 1991 as presented by Conley, McDonald, Sprague & Co. President Mary Krueger extended the Boards appreciation to the auditors as well as thanking Administrator Daniel Schmidt and Bookkeeper Janet Knops for a job well done.

Atrazine Information Effort Targets State's Corn Producers

The 1991 Wisconsin atrazine rule goes into effect Monday, April 1, and the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) is making sure that state corn growers know about these new regulations.

Pocket-sized fact cards, point-of-purchase posters and brochures summarizing the new state restrictions are now available throughout the state wherever atrazine and atrazine-containing products are sold.

The Department's goal is to reach the majority of the estimated 40,000 corn producers in the state.

The DATCP Agricultural Resource Management Division is placing atrazine rule information in local Soil Conservation Service (SCS), and United States Department of Agriculture offices; with University of Wisconsin - Extension personnel, and in public libraries as well as state agency regional offices. Special efforts are being made to brief farm supply store personnel on

the rule's provisions.

Chemical company representatives are cooperating in the information and education campaign by handing out these materials as part of spring product distribution.

The materials highlight the 1991 Wisconsin Atrazine Rule, since it takes precedence over the federal label for rates and times of application and record keeping requirements.

In addition to these written materials, the Department will launch a radio public service campaign targeted to corn growers.

Buettner Pushes Amendment to Protect Flag

(MADISON) - State Senator Carol Buettner (Oshkosh) is co-sponsoring a Senate Joint Resolution to propose an amendment to the U.S. Constitution prohibiting the physical desecration of the flag of the United States.

Buettner, in a letter to the chairman of the Senate Judiciary and Consumers Affairs Committee, has requested a prompt public hearing on the legislation. The resolution introduced has languished to date without action. Buettner has received letters and petitions urging that a hearing be held and the resolution passed.

"We have been reminded in recent weeks following the liberation of Kuwait just how important a symbol the U.S. flag is to our nation and the world. When Kuwait citizens saw our soldiers march into Kuwait City they waved the U.S. flag in both thanks and as a symbol of freedom," Buettner said.

The resolution coming before the Wisconsin Legislature is similar to bills being considered around the United States. The resolution calls upon Congress to submit to the states for ratification an amendment to the U.S. Constitution prohibiting physical desecration of the U.S. flag.

Senate Joint Resolution 16 notes that current law as interpreted by the United States Supreme Court "no longer accords to the stars and stripes that reverence, respect and dignity befitting the banner of that most noble experiment of a nation-state."

"Protecting our flag does not, I believe, push back the rights of freedom of expression. Rather, this action affirms our belief that all the flag stands for deserves full protection. Freedom of speech remains protected, however freedom of acts of physical desecration of our flag would be curtailed," Buettner said.

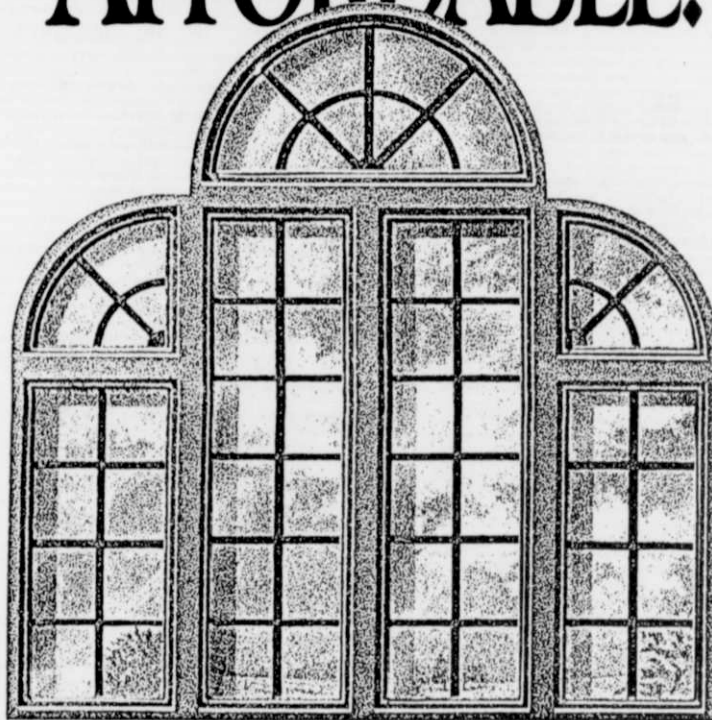
